# The race for the Assembly seat

#### Ramos wants to focus on homelessness, mental health

California 40th Assembly incumbent James Ramos is ready to build on his productive first term.

During his first two years in office, the Democrat from Highland drafted multiple bills that were signed into law by Gov. Gavin Newsom.

AB 2112 created an office of suicide prevention for the first time. AB 1767 allows for policy on pupil suicide prevention that specifically addresses the needs of highrisk groups in grades K-12. Previously, suicide prevention policies only served grades 7 to 12.

"We want to make sure mental health is not forgotten," said Ramos. "When I first ran in 2018, youth suicides were taking place in my district due to social bullying. I wanted to do more. That is why I ran because laws are created in Sacramento."

Some of Ramos' other bills include AB 3099, which partners tribal government and t

California Assembly candidate Jennifer Tullius is new to politics but wants to create change.

"I started as an activist for Travis Allen when he ran for governor in 2018," said Tullius. "I joined the Chaffey Republican Women's Federated and was appointed as a delegate to the California Republican Party."

Tullius is a businesswoman who started her medical billing business in 2007. Growing a successful business is one of the reasons Tullius supports Proposition 22.

"If elected, I hope I can make policy changes to repeal AB 5," she said. "AB 5 destroyed millions of independent contractors. Mothers, fathers, students, they didn't ask for this. The government should not be allowed to tell someone who they can work for or for how long. I would not have been able to grow my business if AB 5 existed in 2007. It

# **Board has no faith** in Splash Kingdom, revokes its permit

The Redlands Planning Commission voted unanimously to revoke the conditional use permit for Splash Kingdom on Tuesday, Oct. 13.

The amusement park, which hasn't operated at full capacity in a decade, has had a tumultuous history.

The facility opened in 1994 as an Egyptian-themed water park with bumper boats, gokarts, water slides, pools and a lazy river.

In 2009, the Planning Commission revoked its conditional use permit due to non-compliance and code violations after operating as a center for night-time music and dance

## Grants helping teachers enhance distance learning

On Beattie Middle School students' computer screens, Synnove Tyo's digital math wall depicts a dozen whimsicallooking "buttons" that they can click on to take them to various lessons, such as "primes," "exponents" or "transformations."

As her colleagues in the teaching profession everywhere knows, eighth-grade math teacher Tyo could tell you that contemporary textbooks are simply not designed for distance learning.

Software she has acquired through a \$500 grant from the Redlands Educational Partnership (REP) gives her a new virtual means of reaching her students. The programs include a virtual word wall, game showstyle learning quizzes inspired by the "Jeopardy!" format, and
