The Death of the President.

The news of the death of President Garfield was received at the Dispatch office last night shortly before 11 o'clock. It was immediately telephoned to the station-houses, and in accordance with an order given by Mayor Carrington three weeks ago, the bells were tolled at an interval of three seconds for one hour.

There were very few people down town when the news came, most persons believing that the President would live for several days; but hearing the bells tolling, many came out to inquire into the cause, and were not greatly surprised to hear that death had occurred.

The people of Richmond have watched the President's case with the deepest solicitude. From the very beginning he had their prayers and kind wishes, as has Mrs. Garfield, whose courage and trustfulness it seems a pity could not be rewarded by his recovery.

The Third station-house was last night draped in mourning in prompt appreciation of the loss the country suffers in the death of the President at the hand of an assassin.

ENROLLMENT OF PUPILS IN THE RICHMOND PUBLIC SCHOOLS FOR THE FIRST TWO DAYS OF THE SESSION 1881-82.—Richmond High school, 266 pupils; Madison school, 629 pupils; Elba school, 500 pupils; Leigh school, 580 pupils; Central school, 609 pupils; Bethel school, 533 pupils; Bellevue school, 608 pupils; Springfield school, 182 pupils; total white pupils, 3,887. Colored pupils, 284 pupils; Baker school, 780 pupils; Navy Hill school, 875 pupils; Valley school, 744 pupils—total colored pupils, 2,682. Total white and colored pupils, 6,569.

The above table shows an increase of 280 pupils over the enrollment for the first two days of session 1879-80. In order to accommodate the increase in the enrollment in Madison school district, the school authorities are now fitting up an additional room at Madison school.

As soon as the school-building now in course of erection for colored children (now Twenty-ninth and O streets) is completed, a corps of teachers will be assigned, and the colored children of the city's section will be accommodated there.

FORGERY AND LARCENY.

The Two Charges on Which Marvin was Sent On to the Hastings Court for Indictment.

Mr. Clarke, of the Wisconsin Bank, Procures the Draft a Forger—Prisoner Identified by Mr. Andrew Jenkins and Mr. Brownell: Mr. Glover Can't Say that the Man is Marvin—Case Submitted Without Argument—The Bignamy Case to be Taken Up To-Day.

Mr. Samuel A. Glover, cashier of the First National Bank, was put upon the stand and the check, reading as follows, handed him:

MR. GLOVER DOES NOT RECOGNIZE MARVIN. In answer to questions from Mr. Witt, Mr. Glover said that the check was cashed at the First National Bank, and that the bearer was introduced by Mr. Brownell.

Witness turned him over to the teller to get the money. (Marvin told to stand up.) Could not identify prisoner as the party claiming to be Marvin. Marvin appeared to be a younger man than prisoner. Marvin had long side-whiskers. (Prisoner has no side-whiskers; has gray moustache and gray chin-whiskers—both short.)

THE CHECK A FORGERY. Mr. M. C. Clarke, teller of the First National Bank of Madison, Wis., was next called, and he testified that no such draft as the one shown him had ever been in his bank. It is a bogus draft, and was never issued by the First National Bank of Madison, Wis., and there is no such office in the bank as "assistant cashier," and no such man in the bank as Converse.

MR. PAGE DID NOT CARE TO CROSS QUESTION the witness.

MR. JENKINS IDENTIFIES MARVIN. Andrew Jenkins swore: (At the request of the Police Justice, Marvin stood up and took off his spectacles.) Recognized accused. Saw him on 20th July when with Converse, who had introduced him to the Hastings Court and got a license to marry Miss Turpin. Accused now looks different; was then dressed in black, was straight, and had no impediment in his speech. Had no doubt that he is the same man. His attention was directed to him in the office from the fact that he occurred there, and from the fact that next morning Dr. Minnigerode came into the office and asked for a pen to endorse the marriage license, and said that there was something wrong about this affair.

MR. PAGE: Stop, stop; that won't do. Mr. Jenkins was then brought long enough connected with the Hastings Court to know that that is not evidence.

MR. WITT said that Mr. Jenkins merely wished to relate a circumstance showing how it was that he was able to recollect accused.

MR. JENKINS was sure that this is the man, though there has been some change in his appearance.

MR. BROWNELL SAYS THAT THIS IS THE MAN. Mr. Alex. M. Brownell being sworn, recognized prisoner as Marvin. Went with Marvin to the First National Bank here to have the draft cashed. Marvin stated to him that he was the cashier of the bank in Madison, Wis., and that he had a little money to take to him to the First National Bank. Saw him endorse the check T. A. Marvin. Mr. Price gave him a New York check for \$100 and in Madison, Mo. saw accused 16th, 17th, 18th, 20th July. Subsequently he was accused in Lyon. Prisoner was about a block and a half ahead of him on the street; followed him, and crossed over and went into clothing store into which accused had entered. Marvin was not in the store; recognized him by his walk. He was walking erect, with his hands under his arms, and was evidently waiting for the train. They were recognized as Captain George D. Wise and Messrs. J. M. Wise and C. A. Bohannon. As soon as these gentlemen saw the officers approaching they started off, but the officers succeeded in capturing Captain Bohannon, who was taken to the Third police station and released on bail. Subsequently Mr. J. M. Wise was arrested in the city by Captain Epps. He, too, was taken to the same station-house and released on bail. At last accounts Captain Wise had succeeded in eluding arrest.

THE WISE-LEWIS AFFAIR.

Challenge of General Wise Said to Have Been Made by Mr. Lewis—Reported From the City—Reported From the City—Reported From the City.

There were rumors yesterday of a proposed or supposed meeting in connection with the Wise-Lewis case. General Peyton Wise and Mr. L. L. Lewis were the parties named.

Justice William J. Holmes on Sunday made complaint that Messrs. Wise and Lewis were "about to fight a duel," and that he, the said J. H. Holmes, was afraid that they would do each other some grievous bodily harm, and prevented from meeting in hostile array. Therefore Justice Holmes, in the name of the Commonwealth of Virginia, commanded any and all of the police officers of the city of Richmond to apprehend said parties, to be further dealt with according to the law.

Efforts were made to arrest General Wise and Mr. Lewis, but they could not be found. It was currently reported and pretty generally believed that upon the appearance of General Wise's card in the Dispatch a challenge was sent to Mr. Lewis, and that soon afterwards both left the city. Mr. Lewis with one or two friends, General Wise alone.
