SUPREME HEADQUARTERS, ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY ORCE (Wednesday) (A)-Allied troops swiftly cleared Normandy beaches of the dazed Nazi survivors of a punishing sea and air bombardment and armor-backed landing parties ranged inland today in a liberation invasion which the Germans themselves predicted would expand. Reinforcements streamed across the white-capped Channel. The German radio, in a dawn broadcast, said the Allies had made further landings at the mouth of the Orne under cover of naval artillery" and that heavy fighting was raging on the coast. Just after midnight, the agency continued, strong German homber formations attacked Allied warships and landing craft off the Bay the Seine and north of Le Havre. "Details are purposely kept back as yet, but results were good," the agency added.


