Fish	Hot Bite?	Boat	Shore	Where	Depth	Bait	Expert advice			
Laketrout				Deep Water	60 to 120 feet	Sutton spoon trolling	"Good bite right now. I would go trolling if trying to catch them." — Mike Norton			
Musky				Anywhere	Around 15 feet	Any form of Musky lures	"The bite is not hot, but you can try toward the shallow water." — Mike Norton			
White Bass				Deep Water	20 feet or more	Trolling with spinners	"They are starting to bite in deeper water. Go trolling with spinners." — Mike Norton			
Browntrout				Near surface	8 feet or less	Spinners	"The bite isn't great. You might catch one or two." — Mike Norton			
Largemouth bass				Near piers	10 feet or less	Crank baits	"Not much happening with the bass right now. Cast around piers and you might get a few." — Charlie Walker			
Smallmouthbass				Shallow	6 to 15 feet	Crank baits	"It's an OK bite; about the same as last week. I would fish by rocks." — Charlie Walker			
Bluegill				Around piers	8 to 10 feet	Worms	"They are starting to move a bit deeper, but stay in that 8- to 10-foot range." — Charlie Walker			
Northern Pike				Around piers	Anywhere	Crank baits or live minnows	"People are really starting to fish these a lot and the catch is starting to heat up." — Charlie Walker			
Walleye				Edges of weeds	Around 15 feet	Spinner rigs	"Not much happening around walleye. I would use spinner rigs when trying to catch them." — Charlie Walker

Fish	Hot Bite?	Where	Depth	Bait	Expert advice					
Musky		Shallow water	8 to 12 feet	Small lures with bucktails	"The bite is consistent, so it hasn't slowed down yet. I'd use small lures with bucktails." — Todd Schulz					
Largemouthbass		Under piers	8 to 12 feet	Plastic worms	"Cast under the piers and along the shore." — Todd Schulz					
Walleye		Deep water	15 to 20 feet	Leeches	"You'll have to go deep for these. Try trolling." — Todd Schulz					
Blugfil		Under piers	8 to 12 feet	Wax worms	"They are done spawning, so try casting around piers." — Todd Schulz					
Perch		Not many biting	8 to 20 feet	Minnows	"You might catch one or two on accident. They are just not biting right now." — Todd Schulz					
Crappies		Deep water	15 to 20 feet	Wax worms	"Try the deeper water. The bite is pretty good right now." — Todd Schulz
