

PARENTING STYLES

Authoritarian

- Rules with little explanation
- Demands compliance
- Loving parents but bend child to their will

Permissive / Gentle

- Fewer rules but explanation
- Listen to children and change the rules if necessary
- Time out and deprivation

Blended

- Rules/some explanation and age specific for explanation

- Allows spanking

- Absolutely no spanking
- Nurturing rather than punishing
- Sees no behavior as bad—just an unmet need

- Controlled spanking for more serious problems, for obedience-resistant child and not after age eight
- No yelling; few second warnings

- Less adult supervision and more free-play time
- No TV in kid's room until appropriate age

- Hovering by parents and structuring of most child's activities (hyper scheduling) out- of-school

- Some scheduling of child's activities but more free play (avoid over-scheduling out-of-school activities)

- A scripture-based relationship in which the parent dictates to the child

- Adults and children often act as co-equals in decision making
- Parents see the child as little adult
- Child centered

- Child does more of what he sees parents do, not what they say

- Little emphasis on warmth

- Touchy/feely relationship
- High in warmth
- Low in demandingness

- Child is positively affected by his being shown affection and seeing his parents show each other affection (builds warmth)

- Builds obedience but not respect and self-reliance

- This democratic style claims to build independence and respect

- This style promotes respect/self-reliance and avoids narcissism
