

**JOHN WIMBERLY TAILOR**

309 HIGHLAND AVE.

John Wimberly, son of a former slave and state representative and senator during the Reconstruction era, advertised his tailor and dry cleaning business in the Green Book.

**LINCOLN PARK MOTEL**

1000 LEGGETT ROAD

The Lincoln Park Motel was located in a planned subdivision for black families and served as a waypoint for black travelers through Rocky Mount.

**DIXIE CAFE**

106 E. THOMAS ST.

The Dixie Cafe was located in the Douglas Building, and its successive owners who advertised in the Green Book in the 1950s all were white men.

**CITY BARBER SHOP**

200 E. THOMAS ST.

The Rev. William T. Grimes, reporter, circulation manager and music minister, owned the City Barber Shop in the 1940s and 1950s and employed both men and women at the shop.

**WRIGHT'S MOTEL**

501 RALEIGH ROAD (NOW BLVD.)

Wright's Motel and Chick-Shack restaurant were part of the Bryant family's business enterprises that started in the early 20th century and also included a grocery store, barber, beauty parlor and service station.

**ATLANTIC SERVICE STATION**

216 E. THOMAS ST.

Leo Randolph Tillery, known as the "Transmission Man," operated the Atlantic Service Station during the Green Book era.

**SHAW'S SERVICE STATION**

440 RALEIGH ROAD

Shaw's Service Station also featured a pool room and operated under various names during the Green Book era.
