I come from a family of doctors.” Born in Guatemala to Cuban and Mayan parents, schooled in music in Cuba and Italy, he blends reggae, cumbia, hip-hop, and uses pre-Hispanic instruments linking the ancestral with the contemporary, reimagining and remixing traditional rhythms with socially conscious lyrics that celebrate resistance and grassroots empowerment over a powerful sound.

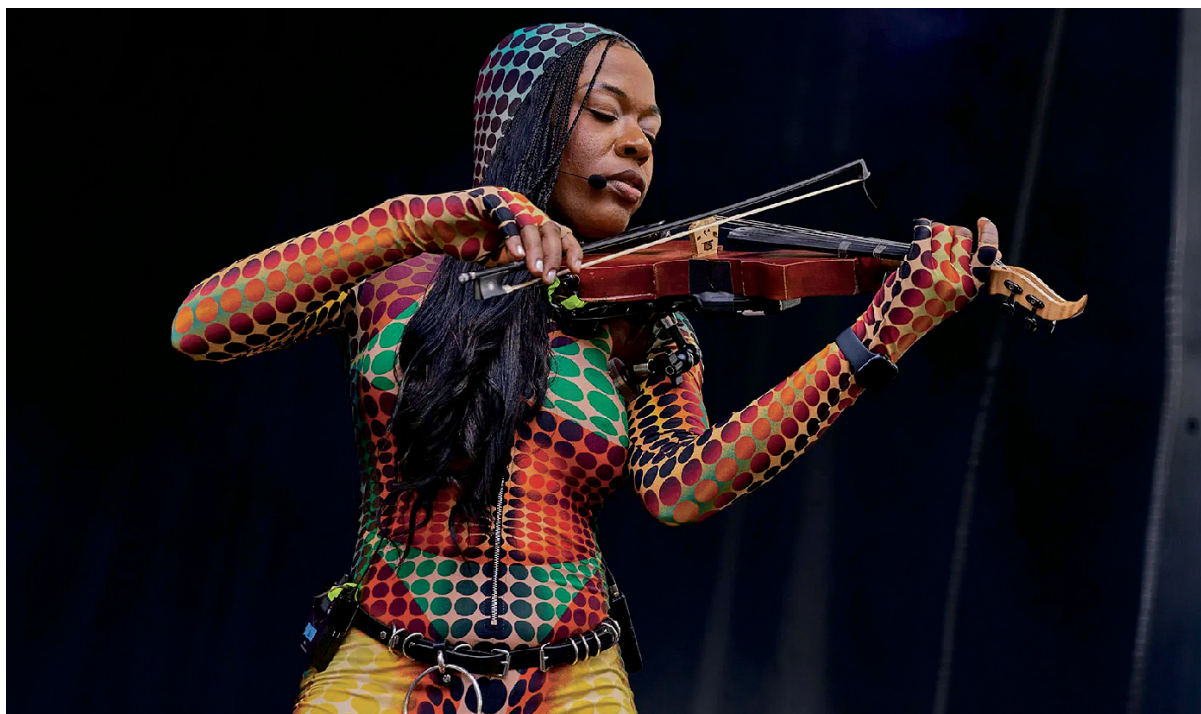
