City sets 'modest increase' on some Juniper Hill golf rates

Weekend golfers and season passholders will be paying a bit more to tee it up at Juniper Hill Golf Course next year.

On Monday the city commission unanimously voted to ap-

prove an increase greens fees for season passes and those who golf on weekends.

"We were trying to find a happy medium from public feedback," explained Frankfort Parks, Recreation and Historic Sites Director Shawn Pickens, who called the rate hike "a mod-

est increase."

Weekday rates will stay the same regardless of whether a cart is leased or the golfer is walking. For adults the rate is \$33 to play a round with a cart and \$18 for those who walk. Nine holes with a cart for adults cost \$20 and walkers pay \$12.

For seniors 60+, juniors, military, students and city employees who qualify for a discounted rate, a weekday 18-hole round with a cart is \$28 and walkers pay \$16. The nine-hole rate for those who qualify for the discount is \$18 with a cart rental and \$10 for walkers.


Weekend fees are an additional \$3 across the board.

The projected revenue produced by the increase is \$17,345, based on the number of rounds sold in 2019.

Community gets a look at recently renovated F.D. Wilkinson Gymnasium

A year and approximately \$5 million dollars later, Frankfort High School's F.D. Wilkinson Gymnasium is now open. A grand opening revealing the gymnasium's renovations was held Friday, and on Saturday, students led tours for the public.

"The whole thing is more than I could have hoped for," Jina Greathouse, chair of Frankfort Independent Schools Board of Education, said Saturday during the public tours. "There are lots of really special aspects of the gym that the students are having a good time sharing today."

Renovations included window replacement, water bottle filler stations, lighting replacement, signage, a new gym floor,

locker room renovations, bathroom renovations, classroom renovations and more.

In the gym, a four-sided basketball scoreboard is suspended from the ceiling and large video screens hang on the wall at either end of the gym.

"The scoreboard and video boards bring it up to a higher level," Greathouse

Fiscal court discusses possible treatment center

The Franklin County Fiscal Court recently deliberated on a potential residential treatment center for drug users seeking recovery under the direction of

practicing doctors from Georgetown.

A first reading of an ordinance took place Friday morning to amend the Franklin County Code of Ordinances as follows: Sections 155.010 (Definitions), 155.085 (Table of Permitted Uses) and create Section 155.124 Residential Recov-

ery Facility to Section 155 (Conditional Uses) to add the Land Use of Residential Recovery Facility as a Conditional Use in the Agricultural (AG), Rural Residential (RR), Rural Residential A (RA), Rural Residential B (RB), Rural Residential C (RC), Special Residential (RS), Two Dwelling

(RD), Rural Low Density Multi-Family (RL), Rural High Density Multi-Family (RH), Professional Office (PO), Rural Limited Commercial (CL), Industrial Commercial (IC) and General Industrial
