Identifying the Issues

The detrimental impact the opioid crisis continues to have on St. Louis County is extensive. Criminalizing addiction and mental health instead of treating them has only resulted in increased crime, violence and fatalities.

- In 2017, one out of every 65 deaths in Missouri resulted from opioid overdose
- In the past two years in St. Louis County, opioid overdose has killed nearly three times as many people as homicide
- Research demonstrates a clear link between participation in mental health court and reduced recidivism
- Despite such staggering statistics, less than one percent (0.9%) of criminal cases in St. Louis County were admitted to treatment court in 2017
- Evidence/data-driven research demonstrates an increased focus on diversion, through treatment and other resources, reduces both non-violent and violent crime

The Bell Plan will expand the capacity St. Louis County's diversion programs and alternative courts, the purpose of which is to reduce criminal activity by addressing addiction and mental health care. Partnerships with local organizations and community support are essential to achieving this goal.
