Hundreds of visitors thronged the streets, and the city was in gala attice throughout the day. The holiday spirit was in evidence everywhere, and thousands crowded the side lines to view the monster parade along its

The day was one of the big days in the history of the Baton Rouze fire department. For seventy-nine years this volunteer fire department has rendered its inestimable services to the city of Baton Rouge, and during its entire history reaching back for more than three-quarters of a century it has upheld a record for service and a standard of efficiency of which every nember is proud. With few exceptions, an annual celebration has been held every year on Washington's birthday. February 22. As this date comes on Sunday this year, the celebration was moved up to February 20. The day's program began at 10 o'clock, when the five-mile Marathon race was begun. The race started in front of the Elks Club.
