Alternate A Gets Approval

Louisiana voters approved a new constitution by better than a 3-to-2 margin Saturday, setting in motion a massive reorganization of state government.

The new constitution will be phased into being over a two-year period, beginning in January 1976.

It replaces a 53-year-old document which had grown to 255,000 words which few people in the state fully understood. Rigor mortis had finally set into this document, and the last few attempts to amend it resulted in voters rejecting the proposed amendments on a wholesale basis.
