## Electoral timeline

Significant dates surrounding the Electoral College and election of the next U.S. president:

Before election day: Political parties in each state select slates of potential electors.

**Dec. 13:** Deadline for states to make decisions on any controversies related to appointment of electors. **Dec. 28:** State and federal officials, including the president of the Senate and archivist of the U.S., must have the certificates of vote in hand.

Jan. 20: Inauguration Day. The new president and vice president are sworn into office.

Nov. 8: Election Day. Voters casting ballots for president and vice president are in fact picking electors for their chosen candidates.



Dec. 19: Electors meet in their states to vote for president and vice president. The documents, known as "certificates of vote," are packaged and sent to state and federal officials. Jan. 6: Congress meets in a joint session to count the electoral votes. As president of the Senate, vice president Joe Biden presides, announcing the results.
