

NPI/Franklin News National Tracker – March 2024

Methodology: The poll was conducted by Noble Predictive Insights from March 11-15, 2024 and surveyed registered voters nationally via opt-in online panel and textto-web cell phone messages. The sample included 2,510 respondents comprised of 1,044 Republicans, 1,126 Democrats, and 340 True Independents (Independents who, when asked if they leaned towards one of the major parties, chose neither). Of the full sample of registered voters, 2,145 were qualified as "likely voters."

The poll weighted each party – Republicans, Democrats, and True Independents – independently. In other words, our Republican subsample is weighted so it matches the national Republican population, and the same is true for Democrats and True Independents. Additional weighting variables include age, region, gender, education, and race/ethnicity.

The margin of error was +/-2.0% for registered voters and +/-2.1% for likely voters. Numbers may not add up to 100% due to rounding.
