NPI/Franklin News National Tracker – April 2025

Methodology: The poll was conducted by Noble Predictive Insights from April 15-18, 2025 and surveyed registered voters nationally via opt-in online panel and text-to-web cell phone messages. The sample included 2,527 respondents comprised of 1,089 Republicans, 1,187 Democrats, and 251 True Independents (Independents who, when asked if they leaned towards one of the major parties, chose neither).

The poll weighted each party – Republicans, Democrats, and True Independents – independently. In other words, our Republican subsample is weighted so it matches the national Republican population, and the same is true for Democrats and True Independents. Additional weighting variables include age, region, gender, education, and race/ethnicity.

The margin of error was +/- 2.0%. Numbers may not add up to 100% due to rounding.
