Polling was conducted online from January 5 - 7, 2026. Using Dynamic Online Sampling to attain a representative sample, Change Research polled 1,105 likely general election voters in North Carolina. Post-stratification was performed on age, gender, race/ethnicity, education, region, and 2024 presidential vote.
