Key Insights

The Meredith Poll conducted a survey of North Carolina likely voters. The online sample--from Qualtrics--used a quota based on the 2020 General Election turnout of voters in North Carolina. After the survey was completed, we **weighted** the survey for **gender**, **party affiliation**, **geographic location**, **race and ethnicity**, and **education** so that our sample most closely resembles North Carolina.

The sample had 802 respondents, giving us a confidence interval of \pm 3.5%. The survey was in the field September 17-20, 2024.

General Election Preferences

Harris-Trump Matchup

The results of the recent survey underscores North Carolina's status as a battleground state with Kamala Harris and Donald Trump tied at 48 percent apiece. Only two percent of respondents were undecided just over six weeks until Election Day and third-party candidates received the remaining two percent of respondents' support. Although this seems negligible, in a race decided by approximately 75,000 votes (out of approximately 5.5 million votes cast) in 2020, this support could be meaningful.

Harris has resurrected the "Biden coalition" from 2020 with strong support among Democrats, Black and young voters, and educated voters. She also is running strong in the urban areas. Harris has a 12-point gender gap advantage over Trump.

Trump remains strong with Republican voters, rural voters, and older voters. He has an advantage over Harris with male voters, but not to the same extent as he had over Joe Biden.

The battle over the last few weeks of the campaign will be for unaffiliated voters and in the suburbs. Although Harris has a small lead among suburban voters, a small shift could be meaningful in this tight election.

Meredith College Poll Director David McLennan states: "Kamala Harris' candidacy has returned the presidential campaign to essentially where it was in 2020 – an election that will be one of the tightest in the country's history. A Trump victory in the Electoral College hinges on his winning North Carolina. The Trump campaign will continue to pour resources into the state. If Harris is able to squeak by and win North Carolina, her chances of winning the presidency are greatly enhanced."

Opinion of Kamala Harris and Donald Trump

Harris' competitiveness against Trump in North Carolina is based, in part, on North Carolinians' positive opinion of her. She is "above water" with a 51-45 favorable/unfavorable rating. Harris' favorability is net positive among most demographic groups – the same groups who express a desire to vote for her on or before Election Day. Even groups like men, who tend to support Donald Trump, have a net positive favorability rating for Harris.

Trump, on the other hand, is "under water" in favorability with North Carolina voters, although the 45/53 favorable/unfavorable split is consistent with his favorability for the last year. Many groups that support Trump's election consider him favorable with a few exceptions. Most men have unfavorable views of Trump, as do those with less than a high school diploma.

"Harris' improvement in favorability since becoming the Democratic nominee is remarkable," said David McLennan. "Her previous favorability ratings were similar to that of Joe Biden in the spring. Her increased favorability, performances in high stakes events like the presidential debate, and favorable news coverage all contribute to this rise. Trump remains a candidate who can attract votes even from demographic groups that don't like him."

Opinion of Tim Walz and JD Vance

As compared to the presidential candidates, more North Carolinians have no opinion of them as people or candidates. However, Tim Walz's favorability is considered "above water" – 48/39– while Vance's is "underwater – 37/53.

Walz's favorability is generally from the same groups as those who are favorable towards Kamala Harris. The one group where Walz's favorability is significantly lower than Harris' is with unaffiliated voters.

Outside of typically Republican voters–conservatives and those who live in rural parts of the state–JD Vance is viewed unfavorably. His favorability is beneath that of Donald Trump even among groups that say they will vote for Trump, like males.

"There is no question that JD Vance's launch as Donald Trump's vice-presidential candidate was awful," said David McLennan. "He was put on the defensive by his statements about women, abortion, and several other issues. Walz's claims about his past have also raised questions about his credibility. Although both vice-presidential candidates have issues affecting how voters perceive them, the vote in North Carolina will boil down to whether voters cast their ballots for Harris or Trump, not those in the second chair."

Robinson-Stein Matchup

The Meredith Poll was in the field as the CNN story broke alleging that Republican candidate Mark Robinson made many inflammatory comments over a decade ago. The first two days of data collection showed the electoral gap between Josh Stein and Mark Robinson at about 8 points–50-42. However, the group that answered our survey after the story broke had a 13-point gap (50-37). In the end, our survey indicates that Josh Stein has a double-digit lead over Robinson (50-40), but it appears that the CNN story peeled Robinson supporters away from him without adding to Stein's support. Robinson's support remains among conservative, rural, and older voters, but not from elsewhere.

"The CNN story clearly had an impact on voter perceptions, but Robinson's campaign was already struggling against the Stein campaign. It is worth noting, however, that we have seen this story before in North Carolina governor's races. The Republican candidate, like

Dan Forest, was running well behind Roy Cooper in September and October polls, only to lose on Election Day by 4.5 points. This shows the power of political partisanship in North Carolina," said David McLennan. "I suspect that the actual margin in the gubernatorial vote in November will be smaller than the current polling average. This is not because the polls are wrong, but that some Republican or Republican-leaning voters simply won't be able to vote for a Democrat."

Policy Issues

Abortion

The abortion issue has generated a lot of attention during the campaign season and pundits have speculated on its importance in shaping election outcomes in 2024. Our survey reveals some important findings related to this issue. First, a plurality of voters (49-43%) support the new abortion law in North Carolina. This is a change since the last time the Meredith Poll surveyed North Carolina attitudes about the potential change in state law, where a plurality of voters wanted the limit on abortion procedures to remain at 20 weeks.

Among demographic groups, there is a large partisan split over approval of the 12-week ban on abortion with most Democrats (57.4%) being against the change, while 70.7 percent of Republicans approve of the new law. Unaffiliated voters are almost evenly split over the new law (47% approve and 44.4% disapprove).

With this issue and the others we surveyed about, we tried to gauge its importance by asking respondents to compare abortion to the economy in terms of its relative importance in their voting decision since almost every poll, including the Meredith Poll, identifies the economy as the top issue. On the topic of abortion, 41 percent of respondents stated that abortion is more important than the economy in 2024. Among the demographic groups, a majority of Democratic respondents felt that abortion is more important than the economy, but far fewer Republicans felt this way (54.1% for Democrats and 33.7% for Republicans). Also, a majority of both Gen Z (56%) and Millennials (51.2%) said abortion is more important than the economy.

"It is clear that the issue of abortion affects different groups differently in terms of being a motivating factor in voting," said David McLennan. "It appears as though the issue is motivating to Democratic voters and may be energizing young voters to participate in this year's elections."

US Policy Toward Israel and the Palestinians

As with many foreign policy issues, the results of the question about the U.S. response to the Israel-Hamas war indicated that many North Carolina voters are sure how they feel, but most feel that it is not more important than the economy in terms of their voting decisions. The plurality of respondents indicated that they did not know whether the U.S. response favored Israel or Hamas or even was appropriate. Almost 70 percent stated that it was not as important as the economy or not important at all in terms of a campaign issue.

"Foreign policy issues, unless American troops are directly involved, rarely influence electoral outcomes. Despite the protests that occurred on college campuses in North Carolina, the issue of the U.S. response to the Israel-Hamas war doesn't seem to be that influential in this year's races," said David McLennan.

Immigration

The topic of immigration is the stuff of many political ads and campaign speeches in 2024. We surveyed North Carolinians about their support of legislation loosely based on the Biden proposal for increased border security, but some changes in the ability of immigrants to become citizens. Most respondents (53%) supported this approach to immigration. The partisan differences, however, were stark as almost 73% of Democratic respondents supported such an approach, but only 45 percent of Republican respondents did. Unaffiliated respondents were in the middle at almost 52 percent support.

In terms of how immigration compares to the economy in terms of a campaign issue, 41 percent of respondents indicated that it was much more important or more important than the economy. Interestingly, it was Republican respondents (57.6%) and Gen Z voters (67.4%) that strongly identified immigration as more important than the economy.

"Immigration as a political issue generates a lot of heat on the campaign trail and among a good number of voters. The topic generally or even something like the conspiracy theory about Haitian immigrants eating pets specifically hits a nerve with many voters," said David McLennan. "There is no surprise that even Republican state candidates in North Carolina are campaigning on this topic, as it motivates their base supporters."

Election Security

Since the 2020 elections, the topic of election security has generated lawsuits, changes in state election laws, and countless conspiracy theories. The results of these and way too much heated rhetoric about the voting and certification processes have resulted in less trust in the system on the part of many voters.

North Carolina's processes around voting and producing results are well-regulated by state law and dutifully maintained by professionals at the state and local levels. The problem is that very few North Carolinians are aware of all that state or county officials do to maintain election security. We asked a battery of questions about people's knowledge of processes, like whether election officials conduct audits of voting results or whether officials try to match the signatures of people who submit absentee ballots. At best, only two in ten voters knew about one process that the state uses to maintain the integrity of voting.

"Despite efforts of the North Carolina Board of Elections or nonpartisan voter education groups to educate citizens on the processes currently in place to protect election integrity, most citizens are woefully uninformed," said David McLennan.

The Most North Carolina Grocery Store Chain in the State Although several grocery store chains contend to be the sales leader in North Carolina, there is one winner in terms of the grocery store chain that most citizens see that most symbolizes the state– Food Lion. Just under 50 percent of the respondents identified the grocery chain as most representative of the state, with just over one-in-five respondents identifying Walmart as the most representative. Harris Teeter came in third with 16 percent of the responses.

Support for Food Lion as the most representative grocery store chain was consistently strong among all respondents.

Methodological Information

Mode: Online

Population: N.C. Likely Voters 18+

Dates in the field: September 18-20, 2024

Sample Size: 802

Credibility Interval: +/- 3.5%

Weighting Variables (NC): Gender, Education, Location (Urban, Rural, and Suburban counties). Political Party, and Race and Ethnicity.

Procedures: The Meredith Poll used an online sample provided by Qualtrics. Participants were recruited into the sample by Qualtrics and received small amounts of compensation in exchange for their opinions. The survey was not an open-link, posted on social media, but rather was by direct invitation to a very large national pool of people who agree to take online surveys. More information about the Qualtrics panels and quality tests are available here. Quotas on demographic variables such as gender, race, etc. were applied prior to online survey commencement.

Online interviews were included in the final dataset if respondents spent a minimum length of time on the interview and particular sections, and if a respondent progressed through the entire survey. Respondents were recruited to the survey with a generic description about the fall elections.

The way we determined "likely" voters, as compared to registered voters, is through using a two-question screening method. We asked their intent to vote and their voting method. Anyone

who indicated that they did not intend to vote or did not indicate a preference for voting method was excluded from the election questions—vote for president and vote for governor.

Credibility Interval

Unlike a traditional random digit-dial telephone survey, online surveys do not have a traditional margin of error. Non Probability quota samples like these do not adhere to assumptions of random selection. To account for uncertainty inherent in any sample-based research design, we provide a credibility interval. More information about this technique can be found here. The credibility interval was calculated by inflating traditional confidence intervals by a design effect calculated using the squared sum of weights. For this North Carolina sample, this means: (1.0 * 2.5= 3.5). We round these values up for presentation of results. As with all surveys, Total survey error often exceeds sampling error.

Weighting Information

Weights were generated in Qualtrics using a technique known as iterative proportional fitting, also known as raking. The weight variable was calculated based on the variables in the table below.

The demographic information was obtained through self-report--respondents answered closed ended questions.

Model—we used the 2020 General Election voter turnout. Professor Michael Bitzer of Catawba University gives a full description of the 2020 turnout by demographic group: 2020 Voter Turnout.
