Population represented:	Adults (people over the age of 18) in North Carolina. Screened to represent registered voters and likely voters for the 2024 elections.
Sample size:	1001 adults in North Carolina (814 individuals who said they are registered to vote and 589 individuals who were identified by the SRC as likely voters). Self-identified registered voters passed a two-item screen (shown below). Likely voters were identified using a series of items to create an index (explained at the end of this memo). This memo focuses on responses from self-identified and likely voters.
Mode of data collection:	Online interviews. All interviews conducted in English.
Type of sample:	Non-probability from <u>Dynata</u> 's online panels.
Dates of data collection:  Credibility interval for samples:	September 20, 2024 – September 29, 2024  This memo focuses on responses from self-identified and likely voters. Self-identified Registered Voters:  Approximately +/- 3.6 percentage points. This accounts for a standard margin of sampling error of 3.4 (as if it were a probability sample) and a design effect (1.1) caused by weighting.  Likely Voters: Approximately +/- 4.9 percentage points. This accounts for a standard margin of sampling error of 4 (as if it were a probability sample) and a design effect (1.5) caused by weighting.
Data weighting:	The all adult data is weighted toward population parameters for age, gender, education, race, and ethnicity published by the U.S. Census. The sample was also weighted using a past presidential vote questionnaire item and the North Carolina 2020 presidential election results (North Carolina State Board of Elections <a href="https://www.ncsbe.gov/">https://www.ncsbe.gov/</a> ). The High Point University Survey Research Center (SRC) produces weights through an iterative procedure within SPSS.

#### Likely Voter Index

How much thought have you given to the upcoming election for president -- quite a lot, some, or only a little? (Quite a lot, Some)

Do you happen to know where people who live in your neighborhood go to vote? (Yes)

How often would you say you vote -- always, nearly always, part of the time, or seldom? (Always or Nearly always)

Do you, yourself, plan to vote in the election this November, or not? (Yes)

I'd like you to rate your chances of voting in November's election for president on a scale of 1 to 10. If 1 represents someone who definitely will not vote and 10 represents someone who definitely will vote, where on this scale of 1 to 10 would you place yourself? (Respondent chose 9 or 10)
