By the Associated Press. BATAVIA, Jan. 24.—The first total eclipse of the sun was successfully performed at all its brilliant glory at 9:11 a. m. today, exactly as astronomers predicted it would.

Not a cloud obscured the gleaming of the sun before the sun's face and all the attendant phenomena, the Bailey's beads, the shadow bands and the corona were observed by thousands in the metropolitan area.

Mercury, Jupiter and Venus were as clearly visible as at night, although the darkness did not prevent the observation of the sun's disk. The sun's rays were clearly visible as the sun's face disappeared.

Niagara Falls Was Lucky
