A WONDERFUL ASTRONOMICAL SIGHT FOR OBSERVERS TOMORROW IF SKY IS CLEAR

Tomorrow morning at 9:07 o'clock — & the weather man permitting — Batavia will be given the opportunity to witness one of the greatest natural phenomena, a total eclipse of the sun.

eclipse will not be visible but Genesee County people, who are in the path of the shadow of the moon that will fall onto earth, will experience one of the eclipse's thrills, the sudden turning of the day to midnight, the darkness to continue for a little over 1 1/2 minutes.

It has been 119 years since the shadow caused by a total eclipse has passed over any part of New York State and it will not happen again in the United States until 1970 when the shadow will pass over Georgia and Florida.

BANKS WILL NOT OPEN UNTIL AFTER ECLIPSE TOMORROW MORNING

Batavia's banks will not open until 9:30 o'clock tomorrow morning and dry goods, ladies' ready to wear and all stores opening regularly at 8:30 o'clock will not open until 9:30 o'clock so that their employees may have an opportunity to see the eclipse.
