

Oilers aim to bounce back against Bulldogs tonight

After suffering its first loss of the season, Oil City’s football season will try to rebound tonight as it travels to Meadville for a Region 6 clash. Kickoff is slated for 7 p.m.

The Oilers (2-1, 0-1 R6) moved the ball well at times a week ago against General McLane, but a lack of consistency and a few key mistakes proved costly in a 28-7 loss to the Lancers. Prior to that setback, OC had been rolling, racking up a 50-14 win over Harbor Creek in Week 1 followed by a 36-14 victory over Mercyhurst Prep.

The Oilers offense enters to-

night’s contest as a balanced attack, having rushed for 593 yards and passed for 459.

Running back Steven Heise has had back-to-back 100-plus yard games and currently sits at 329 yards and six touchdowns on 75 carries.

Quarterback Cole Findlay has also been a threat with his legs, carrying the ball 21 times for 133 yards and a TD, but the majority of his

damage comes through the air as he’s completed 31-of-58 passes for 459 yards, four touchdowns and two interceptions.

His primary target has been Landon Baker, who caught nine passes for 123 yards last week and now has 11 catches for 174 yards and a score on the year. My’Saun Mills also has eight catches for 132 yards and a TD.

On defense for the Blue and White, Abdul Stanton and Blake Stevens tie for the team lead with 19 tackles apiece while Tycen Sindlinger, Heise and Xander Piercy

have 11 stops each.

Brayden Buzard has a team-leading two sacks while Findlay recorded a pair of interceptions against General McLane, bringing his season total to three.

Meanwhile, Meadville enters the contest at 1-2, sandwiching losses to Fort LeBoeuf (29-22) and Butler (48-34) around a victory over Connellsville (35-14) to open the campaign.

Tailback Jordan Lawrence is the focal point of the Bulldogs’ offense as he’s rushed for 516 yards and five TDs on 69 carries. Tymir Phillips has also toted the ball 28 times for

223 yards and three scores.

At QB, Jacoby Thompson has completed 13-of-27 attempts for 257 yards and three touchdowns, but he’s been prone to turn the ball over, throwing five interceptions. Phillips has caught eight of those 13 completions for 191 yards and three scores.

The Bulldogs currently have a five-game winning streak going against the Oilers, dating back to 2021. Two of those losses came last year, including OC’s season-ending loss in the District 10 playoffs. Meadville holds a 62-45-4 edge all time in the lengthy rivalry.

Knights to host streaking Lancers tonight for Homecoming

For the third straight week, Franklin’s football team will be playing in the friendly confines of its home stadium as the Knights will host General McLane tonight for Homecoming. Kickoff is slated for 7 p.m.

Head coach Matt Turk’s Knights (0-3 overall, 0-1 R6) are coming off of a hard-fought 14-6 decision to Warren last week while the Lancers are riding high following a 28-7 victory on the road at Oil City. It was the second win in a row for GM (2-1, 1-0) after also beating Harbor Creek

(28-0) the week before after losing to DuBois (56-35) in the opener.

Caden Mincer led the Knights again last week as he carried the ball 26 times for 106 yards while quarterback Freddie Blackhurst ran for 48 yards and completed three passes for 56 more yards. For the season, Mincer has run for 376 yards on 68 carries (5.5 yards per

game average) and a touchdown.

Jayden Wilmoth caught two of those passes for 32 yards while Josiah Rodriguez had a catch for 24 yards. Wilmoth also recovered a fumble on defense.

But, the Knights were not able to crack the end zone and relied on a pair of field goals from Connor Ritchey for their points.

Franklin’s defense played well once again, allowing only 257 yards of total offense to the Dragons, but two runs of 23 and 14 yards by Aid-

en Eger set up a late first-half score while a 48-yard run by Ayden Corbett provided the second score.

The Lancers showed some balance on offense last week as QB Matt Caro passed for 185 yards and three touchdowns, but he also tossed a pair of interceptions. His top target was Kyle McConnell, who hauled in three passes for 74 yards and two scores. Caiden Holler also grabbed a 46-yard scoring pass off the arm of Caro.

For the season, Caro has completed 51-of-84 passes for 696 yards

with eight touchdowns and two interceptions. McConnell has caught eight balls for 173 yards and four scores while Jared Corwin has 14 grabs for 170 yards and two TDs.

The ground game compiled 117 yards with Cohen Beachly leading the way with 78 yards and a 25-yard TD run on 11 carries. Nick Swenson added 34 yards rushing on eight attempts.

On the year, Beachly has racked up 225 yards and two scores on 35 carries (6.4 ypc) while Swenson has gained 107 yards on 24 carries (4.5 ypc).

Why has Sidney Crosby’s camp suddenly shifted on trade talk?

PITTSBURGH — It’s possible that Sidney Crosby has softened his stance on being a Penguin for life. It’d be understandable, too. But I also have to wonder if Crosby might be quarterbacking a power play to get Mario Lemieux back in the building.

Either way, this is by far the biggest story in Pittsburgh sports at the moment. Crosby’s powerful agent, Pat Brisson, made it so when he launched a grenade into the hockey world Monday night. Brisson does not do that if Crosby doesn’t know he’s doing it.

Asked by The Athletic’s Pierre LeBrun if Crosby would entertain a trade out of Pittsburgh “one day,” Brisson said, “I mean, I’m answering something that ... let’s put it this way: It’s always a possibility, you know?”

That is far different from what Crosby told the same outlet early last season, which was this: “I’ve said I’m going to always be here. I

just signed a new contract to be here. I’ve been very upfront about it — I’m a Pittsburgh Penguin.”

Crosby, incidentally, had a chance to repeat that statement yesterday at the NHL player media tour in Las Vegas, specifically asked about rumors linking him to his childhood favorite team, the Montreal Canadiens.

Instead, he said this: “I get it, trust me. They’re so into it [in Montreal], and I get it as to why that would come up and that sort of thing. It doesn’t make it any easier when you’re losing, for sure, to hear those things, but at the same time, to know that a team like that wants you, it’s not the end of the world. It could be worse. I just think that’s part of it.”

By the way, if Sid has indeed softened his stance on a trade, good for him. And maybe good for the Penguins in terms of jumpstarting their rebuild, or their retool, or whatever they want to call it.

After two decades of giving, giving, giving — giving us Stanley Cups, giving back millions of dollars in salary in order to keep the team

competitive, giving himself in every imaginable way — maybe Crosby is thinking of himself for once.

And maybe, as LeBrun put it, “The current Canadiens front office would move heaven and earth to trade for Crosby if he and the Penguins ever indicated that was actually a possibility.”

Unless I’ve lost my ability to read, I believe Brisson indicated just that when he said “it’s always a possibility.” And make no mistake, Crosby and Brisson would be making that decision. Not the Penguins.

The Canadiens have an outstanding young core and a highly rated farm system. The Penguins could raid both, taking the best of both and more. Crosby could always come back and finish his career here.

Anyway, Brisson continued his conversation with LeBrun Monday by telling him, “It’s been three years they haven’t made the playoffs. [Whether Crosby would ever entertain a trade] all depends on how Sid is going to be and how the team is going to do. I maintain the same position that I do believe that he should

be playing playoff hockey every year, in my opinion.”

So, again, this much is inarguable: Crosby’s camp has suddenly changed its talking points. And it can’t just be about the losing. The losing was expected and is not likely to end anytime soon.

I have to wonder if there is something more here. Could this indeed be a move to put the Lemieux/Ron Burkle group in better position to buy the team back from Fenway Sports Group?

Without Crosby, the Penguins suddenly become much less attractive, right? Would David Hoffmann or any other potential suitor back off if Crosby trade talk heats up?

You’d have to think suitors would have much less interest in buying the team and giving FSG — the F standing for “Franchise Flippers” — a near billion-dollar profit from when they bought the club just four years ago.

Perhaps Crosby isn’t thrilled that FSG subsequently alienated Lemieux over a financial disagreement — he is no longer around the team

— and is wary of new ownership, combined with the current state of the team.

Why would Crosby feel loyal to a guy named David Hoffmann and his family?

Meanwhile, if the Penguins start poorly, does Kyle Dubas start selling off parts? Would Crosby want to be a part of that? I’m guessing he’d love to play with Gavin McKenna, but that is literally a lottery’s chance.

Just last month, Sportsnet’s Eliot Friedman reported that the Lemieux group’s offer was “well below” FSG’s alleged price. The Pittsburgh Post-Gazette reported the expected price is \$1.75 billion, and the Hoffmann group was close to finalizing a deal.

“I gotta think that’s where the Penguins would want to be,” Friedman wrote. “From what I understand, that bid is just not close to that at this point in time. ... That’s a story that probably doesn’t go away for a while.”

He got that right. Brisson and Crosby made sure of it.
