

Hendrickson joins Ravens, Crosby still on Raiders and Jones re-signs with Colts

NEW YORK (AP) — The Baltimore Ravens landed their star pass rusher in Trey Hendrickson, Maxx Crosby is back in Las Vegas for now and Daniel Jones is staying in Indianapolis as part of a busy start to the new league year.

The biggest move Wednesday came when the Ravens agreed to a four-year, \$112 million contract with four-time Pro Bowl defensive end Trey Hendrickson a day after backing out of a deal with the Raiders for Crosby over a failed physical, a person with knowledge of the deal told The Associated Press.


Hendrickson was an All-Pro for Cincinnati in 2024 when he led the NFL with 17 1/2 sacks. He played in only seven games because of injuries last season and had four sacks but has reached double digits in sacks four times in the previous five seasons.

It was a quick pivot for the Ravens after the surprising development Tuesday night when Baltimore pulled out of the trade that was supposed to send two first-round picks to Las Vegas.

A person with knowledge of Baltimore's decision told the AP that Crosby failed his physical. The person spoke on condition of anonymity because those results are private.

Crosby had surgery in January to repair a torn meniscus in his left knee. He missed the final two games of the season because of the injury despite wanting to play through it at the time.

The Raiders, who have been among the biggest spenders in the opening days of free agency, now must figure out what to do with Crosby. Las Vegas still has plenty

of cap room to keep the five-time Pro Bowler on the roster with his \$30 million salary if the team can't find another trade. Crosby was back in the team facility in Nevada on Wednesday, a person with knowledge of his whereabouts said on condition of anonymity.

Jones and the Colts agreed on a two-year contract that is worth up to \$100 million, a person with knowledge of the contract told the AP. The person requested anonymity because the deal had not yet been announced.

Jones will receive \$88 million over the next two seasons with \$50 million guaranteed instead of playing on the \$37.8 million transition tag. He can make an additional \$12 million through incentives.

Jones led the Colts offense to a productive 10-game start. But following

the bye week, Jones played through a hairline fracture in his left leg and then wound up suffering a season-ending torn right Achilles tendon in early December.

Jones set career highs in passer rating (100.2) and completion rate (68%) as Indianapolis ranked fifth in the NFL in scoring at 28.9 points per game before he went down for the season.

All the people who confirmed new deals with players on Wednesday spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because teams hadn't announced the moves or other developments.

Buffalo reached a three-year agreement with pass rusher Bradley Chubb, a person familiar with the deal said. Chubb agreed to terms with the Bills shortly after the Miami

Dolphins announced his release.

The 29-year-old Chubb has eight seasons of NFL experience. He spent the past three-plus years in Miami, including missing the entire 2024 season because of a torn knee ligament. He had 8 1/2 sacks last season.

All-Pro safety Kevin Byard left Chicago to reunite with his former coach Mike Vrabel, agreeing to a one-year, \$9 million deal with New England, a person familiar with the contract said. Byard led the NFL with seven interceptions last season. Byard played under Vrabel for five-plus seasons in Tennessee.

Washington agreed to terms with edge rusher K'Lavon Chaisson on a one-year contract worth \$12 million with \$10.3 million guaranteed, according to Athletes First, the agency that represents him. Coming off ranking last in the NFL on defense, the Commanders also reached deals with linebacker Leo Chenal, safety Nick Cross, cornerback Amik Robertson and tight end Chig Okonkwo.

The Buccaneers agreed on one-year contracts with defensive lineman A'Shawn Robinson and backup quarterback Jake Browning, two people with knowledge of the deals said. Robinson is getting \$10 million guaranteed, one of the people said.

The New York Jets agreed to terms with former Las Vegas Raiders left guard Dylan Parham on a two-year, \$20 million contract. The signing helps offset the free agency losses of Alijah Vera-Tucker (Patriots) and John Simpson (Ravens) and gives New York a new starter on an offensive line that'll help protect Geno Smith — Parham's former teammate for one season in Las Vegas.

New Orleans announced a multi-year contract with veteran tight end Noah Fant and a two-year extension for reserve defensive tackle John Ridgeway III. Fant spent last season with Cincinnati, where he caught 34 passes for 288 yards and three TDs. He spent his previous three seasons with Seattle and his first three with Denver, and has 334 career receptions for 3,593 yards and 18 TDs.

Jacksonville agreed to a two-year deal with former Commanders running back Chris Rodriguez Jr., giving the Jaguars another option in the backfield after losing Travis Etienne in free agency. Rodriguez rushed for 500 yards and six TDs last season for Washington.

Several other players hit the open market after being released by their former teams at the start of the league year, with many of these moves having already been telegraphed.

Among those are Arizona quarterback Kyler Murray, Atlanta QB Kirk Cousins, Minnesota defensive tackles Javon Hargrave and Jonathan Allen, and Detroit edge rusher Josh Paschal.

Hargrave immediately agreed to a new deal, getting a two-year, \$23 million contract with \$10.5 million guaranteed from Green Bay, according to his agent, Drew Rosenhaus. The deal will pay Hargrave \$13 million in his first year as he joins his fourth team in five seasons. He has 49 sacks in 10 seasons.

The Cowboys also made a pair of trades, sending pass-rushing defensive tackle Osa Odighizuwa to San Francisco for a third-round pick and defensive lineman Solomon Thomas to Tennessee as part of a seventh-round pick swap.

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Lander and Wilson are in line to earn medals for the Oilers as Lander is seeded third in the 100 free and 11th in the 50 free while Wilson is seeded third in the 50 para free, which is being held tonight.

Lander not only won the D-10 title in both events, he set school records in both as well with a 21.71 in the 50 free and a 46.72 in the 100 free. If he can earn a medal with a top-eight finish, he would be the first OC boy to do so since Zak Clifford in the 100 back in 2006.

"John didn't swim last year due to injury, so I didn't know what to expect of him, but when he swam those times at districts, I was blown away," Oil City coach Eric Smith said. "I had no idea he was capable of that coming off of an injury. He had a great district meet, he's had a great week and a half of practice and he swam really well at the YMCA District meet over the weekend. If we can ride the wave a little longer, hopefully, he can be the first Oil

City swimmer to secure a medal in 20 years."

With such a compacted field, Eric Smith feels Lander should be able to qualify for another night swim in the 50 free.

"The seed times for the 50 free are very tight from No. 1 to No. 16, so hopefully, John can swim his seed time or slightly faster and make it into the top 16 and get the night swim," Eric Smith said "It's been two years since we've had a boy get a night swim and it's been 20 years since we've had a boy get a night swim in the A final. He has all the tools to accomplish it, we just need to have a repeat performance of the district meet. He's been in the final heat for YMCA Districts and YMCA States before, so I'm not concerned with him being too nervous. He's a very cerebral swimmer and I feel very confident going into the PIAA meet with him."

Wilson became the first para swimmer from Northwestern Pennsylvania to qualify for the state meet after clocking a time of 38.73 in the 50 free. That time is good enough to be seeded third out of four qualifiers in the race.

"We've tried to adjust Natalie's start a little bit so she can be a little quicker off the blocks. We are going to work on it again leading up to the event," Eric Smith said. "I think we've found a good alternative, hopefully, it will equate to a quicker time for her as well and get her in the top three. That's the goal."

Since first going out for the team as a freshman, Wilson has made significant strides in the pool.

"She came out as a freshman and her stroke looks good. She is really happy with how she's doing and we are really happy with her progress as well," Eric Smith said. "She has really come a long way since her first year."

Franklin's girls qualified two relays for states as the foursome of Erdley, Highfield, freshman Sammi Smith and senior Ellie Coyer are seeded 19th in the 200 medley relay at 1:54.20. The 200 free relay team of Smith, Highfield, freshman Chloe Switzer and Erdley are seeded 27th at 1:45.56, but their coach feels they could move up higher.

"When we didn't get the 400 free relay out to states, I was able to pull Evelyn out of that relay and slide her into the 200 free relay, so even

though we are seeded 27th, it's more like we're seeded 19th or 20th because we are dropping two seconds by putting her in that relay," he said. "We were trying to get three relays out to states, but now that we have just two, we are going to beef it up a little and see how fast we can go."

If the Knights qualify either relay for a night swim, how well they do in the free relay will determine which four girls compete in the race.

"All the girls know that if we are lucky enough to get both relays out to the night swim, who swims in those finals will be based on how well the freestylers swim in the morning," Charlie Smith said. "That will give us the opportunity to put the fastest four girls in the night swim if we are lucky enough to get there. We are not too far out, so if we can hold our time or drop it a little, we could possibly make it."

Highfield is also competing in the 100 breaststroke (seeded 20th, 1:07.98) and the 200 individual medley (seeded 25th, 2:18.36).

"I'm expecting Evelyn to have a great swim in the breaststroke, being that she saw evidence of what I'm trying to do with her taper at the

YMCA district meet. She dropped 10 or 11 seconds in the 200 breast, so with that happening, it should give her enough faith that she can stop worrying about the process now and just go out and do it. I think that's going to be huge for her."

Rounding out the competitors for the Knights is Clark in the 100 breast, where he's seeded 25th at 1:01.24.

"I know when Jacksen went into the district meet, he put a lot of pressure on himself because he was such a high seed," Charlie Smith said. "Now that we are at the state meet, he is outside the top 16, so I think that will help him look at that race in a different light and actually help him just go out and do it instead of trying to hold on to the expectations he had at the district meet."

With the team accomplishing so much this year, Charlie Smith is hoping his team can add to it this weekend.

"Things have kind of flipped from where we've been with the program over the last few years as we have more girls than guys at states this year, but we just want to finish up on a good note," he said.
