Virginia went enough of the way with "LBJ" to put the Old Dominion back into the Democratic presidential column yesterday for the first time since

Senator Byrd, who kept mum in the presidential clash, won re-election easily—by nearly 70 per cent of the vote.

A big tide of votes in Northern Virginia and Norfolk apparently more than offset a distinct white "backlash" against the Johnson-Humphrey ticket in Southside areas disturbed by the civil rights and desegrega-

There also seemed to be a "frontlash" which reduced the normally Republican vote in the Roanoke area and parts of the Seventh district. Southwest meanwhile, through strongly for Mr. John-

Shortly after 1 a.m., with more than 966,000 ballots counted, the President was holding almost 54 per cent of

the total vote. If this held up, he would reverse the 53-47 proportions by which Virginia went Republican in 1960 but would fall short of the 55-plus percentages which General Eisenhower maintained
