## HILLIARD SCHOOL DISTRICT SUED BY PARENTS FOR HIDING PRIVATE CONVERSATIONS FROM PARENTS

HILLIARD, Ohio – Today, several Hilliard School District parents sued the Hilliard City School District, in the U.S. Court for the Southern District of Ohio, seeking a declaratory judgment and injunction from the Court.

The parents say, "The Defendant Hilliard School District is allowing activist teachers (as opposed to trained, supervised counselors) to specifically solicit from children as young as six-years old, private, intimate conversations about sexual behaviors, sexual attitudes, mental and psychological questions of the student and the student's family, and private religious practices. This is done, not only without parental consent and knowledge, but the teachers are taking specific actions to hide these conversations from parents. Although, perhaps well-intentioned, this is a recipe for indoctrination and child abuse."

The parents are not asking for any monetary damages. The parents are asking the Court for a declaratory judgment that would affirm their firmly established constitutional rights to direct the upbringing of their children.

Also, the parents are asking the Court to enjoin (an order to stop) the District teachers from the solicitations of intimate sexual conversations from children while affirmatively hiding the conversations from parents. In particular, the parents also seek to enjoin teachers' display and use of "I'm Here" badges, which have a QR code on them that link to a website that offers, for voluntary development, a video titled "Sex acts that don't get enough play" and features the words and phrases "blow job, fingering, vaginal intercourse, outercourse, fisting, rimming, watching porn, BD (bondage and discipline), masturbating, muffing, sexting, and anal sex."

The District's legal counsel specifically and explicitly, in writing, refused to explain the District's policy on these matters, in response to a direct written request from the Plaintiffs.

The Plaintiffs will soon be setting up a webpage which will allow other whistleblowers to come forward and for people to donate to the legal fund needed to pay for the lawsuit.
