

General Manager's Message



Wildfire Safety: What You Need to Know

Although wildfire in California has become a year-round concern,
October is considered the most critical time in the East Bay.
Vegetation is dry and Diablo winds blow in from the east, conditions that often lead to extreme fire danger and red flag warnings.

The Park District works year-round to reduce wildfire risks and stay ready. Efforts include large contractor-led projects, a 16-person fire fuels reduction crew focused on vegetation management, and a grazing program that covers 86,000 acres annually.

To prepare for wildfire, the Park District has a fire department with 23 wildland firefighters, specialized firefighting equipment—including two helicopters that can drop water—and four remote weather stations that monitor fire conditions.

FIRE SAFETY TIPS:

- No smoking or vaping in parks.
- No fireworks.
- Follow all fire safety rules.
- Be aware of Red Flag Warnings.
- Report fire hazards and call 911 to report a live fire.



New Trails Open: Sycamore Valley Open Space Regional Preserve

On June 24, the East Bay
Regional Park District, Town
of Danville, and Save Mount
Diablo celebrated the opening
of 3.5 miles of new trails at
Sycamore Valley Open Space
Regional Preserve in Danville.
The new trails are part of the
381-acre Magee Preserve, which
was permanently protected by
Danville voters in March 2020
through Measure Y. Save Mount
Diablo was a major proponent
of the measure.

The new trails offer views of rolling hills and valleys, with Danville to the south and west and Mount Diablo to the north. The open space is mostly grassland and seasonal ponds, with Sycamore Creek nearby.

Reducing Wildfire Risks

667-Acre Fuels Reduction Project Completed at Anthony Chabot

For the past three years, the East Bay Regional Park District has been working to thin and remove brush and hazardous trees on 667 acres at Anthony Chabot Regional Park to reduce fire intensity and help prevent catastrophic wildfires.

This groundbreaking effort, the first of its kind in California, included large-scale eucalyptus removal and the use of a climate-friendly carbonizer to dispose of debris. The carbonizer produces low emissions and creates biochar, which is being used throughout the Park District to improve soil

health and water retention.

Fire fuels reduction efforts continue districtwide, with ongoing and planned projects at Tilden, Claremont Canyon, and Anthony Chabot regional parks, as well as Leona Canyon Open Space Regional Preserve. A 16-person fuels crew works year-round on vegetation management projects. And goat, sheep, and cattle grazing covers 86,800 acres annually.

Reducing fire fuels is essential to slowing wildfires and giving firefighters time to stop them before they grow out of control.







Ancient Autumn Ritual

The story of corn begins with a wild grass called teosinte, first cultivated in central Mexico around 9,000 years ago. Through generations of selecting and replanting the best seeds, early farmers transformed this grass into one of the world's most important food sources. Today, corn—also known as maize—nourishes communities around the globe. From popcorn and cornbread to polenta, hominy, cereal, and, of course, corn on the cob (especially with butter!), many popular foods trace back to this remarkable plant.

To learn more, attend Ardenwood's annual Harvest Festival on Oct. 11 and 12, where visitors can walk through the cornfields and participate in the ancient autumn ritual of harvesting maize. This year, Ardenwood's farmers planted 8 acres of corn, including both popcorn and flint corn. At this crop-share event, guests will help with the harvest and are welcome to take a few ears home (one-bag-per-person limit). Pop the kernels straight off the cob, cook them into a favorite dish, or use them as colorful fall décor.


The Harvest Festival is an opportunity to connect with a timeless tradition, the land, the season, and one another.

HARVEST FESTIVAL INFORMATION

Enjoy old-time country fun while bringing in this year's crop of corn. Search the field for ears of flint corn or popcorn. Outside the field, enjoy seasonal activities, cider pressing, live music, and historic crafts. Ride a narrowgauge train and learn what late-19th century life was like on a tour of the beautifully restored farmhouse. Bring a bag to take home harvested corn (one-bagper-person limit). Drop-in; no registration required.

Celebrating the Evolution of the Sunol Heritage Festival

Each year, the hills of Sunol echo with music, laughter, and the shared stories of generations. What began in 2008 as the Cowboy Culture Extravaganza has since blossomed into something richer and more inclusive: the Sunol Heritage Festival. This annual gathering has grown beyond its cowboy roots to honor many cultures that have shaped the valley.

In its early years, the festival focused on celebrating cowboy and pioneer heritage. Visitors enjoyed cowboy poetry, bolo tie-making, branding demonstrations, and the sweet reward of hand-cranked ice cream. By 2012, the event had evolved into the Pioneer Folk Festival, broadening its historical focus to include local pioneer and ranching culture. Attendees enjoyed horse rides, square danced to live music, and explored interactive exhibits like the ranch fashion show and Geary family history talks. From 2013 to 2019, under names like the Cowboy Hootenanny Folk Festival and Sunol's Old Timey Hootenanny, the tradition continued, blending music, old-fashioned games, and community storytelling.

Then came the pandemic, which brought a pause and time for reflection. When the festival returned in 2021 as Sunol Stories, it came with a renewed mission: to celebrate the people and cultures who have called Sunol home.

Now the Sunol Heritage Festival reflects a fuller cultural narrative, exploring the weaving of Ohlone, Spanish, Mexican, and European cultures in California heritage through Sunol history.

Since 2023, a significant addition to the festival has been Café Ohlone, the world's only Ohlone restaurant. Guests can enjoy an acorn processing demonstration, sip herbal teas, and sample acorn brownies, offering a taste of ancestral knowledge and a deeper connection to the land's first peoples.









Visitors who come to Sunol for the festival commonly remark on the connection they feel to the land itself, one of the last open spans of wilderness in the Bay Area. That connection deepens when history is honored not as a single story,

but as a collection of voices, traditions, and shared experiences.

On Saturday, Oct. 18, experience the Sunol Heritage Festival—not just as it was, but as it continues to grow and change. The event is more than just a day of fun; it is a tribute to those who have helped shape the land now called Sunol.



The East Bay's diverse habitats—from wetlands to woodlands—offer year-round birdwatching, with seasonal migrations, nesting, and winter waterfowl arrivals providing unique species observation. At the East Bay Regional Park District, birdwatching has evolved into a cherished activity. The Park District offers birding programs for all experience levels, including hikes, community science events, and kayak excursions. Spring and summer focus on migrations, nesting, and fledging, while fall and winter highlight waterfowl and shorebirds. Events like the Great Backyard Bird Count and birding apps like Merlin and eBird make birdwatching more accessible.

SOME KEY BIRDING PROGRAMS INCLUDE:

- Birding at Big Break:
 Focuses on Delta waterfowl,
 raptors, and songbirds.
- Black Birders Week
 (districtwide): Promotes
 diversity through events and guided walks.
- Great Backyard Bird Count and Great Winter Bird Count: Blend guided experiences with community science.
- Monday Birding (Tilden Regional Park): Weekly, this program challenges birders to identify species in diverse ecosystems.

- Birding by Kayak (Big Break Regional Shoreline): Paddle through the Delta spotting herons, egrets, and other water-loving birds.
- Bird Exploration (Sunol Wilderness Regional Preserve): Guided hikes introduce bird identification basics amid Sunol's woodlands, riparian corridors, and meadows.
