

Keeping People & Parks Safe

At the East Bay Regional Park District, safety is top of mind in all that we do. Our Public Safety Division works tirelessly each day to protect park visitors, safeguard natural resources, and support the surrounding communities. With dedicated police, fire, and lifeguard services, the Division responds quickly to emergencies, reduces risks, and ensures peace of mind for all who enjoy Regional Parks.



Full Police Staffing

In August, the Park District reached 100% staffing for sworn police officers. With all 76 positions filled, the department is better prepared than ever to deliver on its high standards for service and safety.

Wildfire Safety Progress

The Park District recently completed fuels reduction on 667 acres at Anthony Chabot Regional Park, with more projects planned. A 16-person fuels crew works year-round on vegetation management, while goats, sheep, and cattle graze over 86,000 acres annually.

Through prevention, preparedness, and response, we are dedicated to keeping Regional Parks safe and welcoming for all.

The first round of public engagement, held this past spring and summer, drew a strong response. Nearly 5,800 community members participated in an online survey to share their ideas and priorities for the future of Regional Parks. Park District Gets New Technology to Fight Wildfires



Las Trampas Wilderness Regional Preserve

The Park District has ioined the statewide **ALERTCalifornia** wildfire camera network, which uses cutting-edge technology to identify wildfires, provide early detection, and enhance situational awareness. Cameras can rotate 360 degrees and use artificial intelligence to identify possible smoke — with alerts sent to emergency command centers and firefighters. Tilden Regional Preserve

Park District Acquires Point Molate Property for Future Regional Park

The East Bay Regional Park District has acquired 82 acres at Point Molate in Richmond — a remarkable achievement for the entire Bay Area.


For decades, residents and community leaders have envisioned transforming the historic Point Molate shoreline into a park that preserves natural and cultural resources and provides access to the bay. The property holds significant environmental and cultural history, including Native American sacred sites, a historic Chinese fishing village, and Winehaven, once known as the world's largest winery.

The Park District purchased the property from the Guidiville Rancheria of California for \$40 million. Funding for the purchase included \$36 million in state funds secured by former state Sen. Nancy Skinner and \$4 million from the Park District's voterapproved revenue measures AA and WW.

Planning for the new park is expected to take several years and will include significant public engagement.

GARDEN GREETER TRAINING



Salamanders With Fireproof Fur?

Thousands of years ago, many believed that salamanders were born in fire or could extinguish it. They also thought if salamander blood was rubbed onto the body, a person could become fireproof.

The legendary Marco Polo heard stories of a mystical fireproof cloth made of salamander wool. But was there ever such a thing as a hairy salamander? Salamander wool was actually the name of an ancient type of fabric woven from asbestos fibers, which are naturally fire resistant. No one knows where or why these fanciful ideas originated, but they were strangely widespread around the world.

Even without all those mystical qualities of yore, salamanders are still fascinating creatures. Take one local salamander, the yellow-eyed ensatina, Ensatina eschscholtzii xanthoptica, which does

not have lungs but breathes through its skin and the tissues in its mouth. It has a golden flake at the top of each eye, hence the name. If threatened, the ensatina performs a swaying warning dance and exudes milky poison from glands on its tail and head for protection. A healthy and fortunate ensatina might prowl the rainy woodlands for up to 15 winters.


It appears that salamanders do indeed have some amazing attributes and powers. Even today, another local salamander, the California newt, can perform a truly incredible feat: closing South Park Drive in Tilden Park each year! Because these animals are known to migrate across the road in great numbers, the road is closed to vehicle traffic from November through March.



GREEN FRIDAY HIKE

Enjoy the crisp, fresh air and admire the fall colors on a beautiful hike through diverse chaparral. Bring curiosity and share gratitude while connecting with nature and each other on this naturalist-led hike of 2-3 miles. The trail includes steep, uneven, unpaved terrain with 400 to 500 feet of elevation gain. Dropin; no registration required.

WINTER ASL WALKS

Black Diamond Mines Regional Preserve offers programs alongside American Sign Language (ASL) interpreters on a quarterly basis. The winter ASL walk uncovers the forgotten history of the coal mines and surrounding communities. With the help of historic photos, maps, and markings on the landscape, this 1-mile walk pieces together a past that enabled California's rise in the global economy. 



A Year of Nature & Community

As the end of the year approaches, it is a good time to reflect on the critical role the East Bay Regional Park District plays in the community. Amid the East Bay's busy cities, heavy traffic, and constant digital connections, Regional Parks offer something essential: simple, restorative access to nature.

The Park District manages 73 parks and more than 126,000 acres of open space across Alameda and Contra Costa counties. These landscapes include forests, wetlands, hills, lakes, and shorelines — home to diverse wildlife, native plants, and countless opportunities to explore and learn. Whether for a weekend walk, a morning run, or a school field trip, the parks provide spaces to slow down and connect with nature.

Over the past year, people of all ages and backgrounds have flocked to the parks for fresh air, exercise, education, and enjoyment. Programs led by naturalists and recreation staff helped visitors deepen their

understanding of local ecosystems and how to protect them. Parkgoers developed new outdoor skills while enjoying adventures. Volunteers helped restore habitats, cleaned up trails, and supported public events. Thousands of schoolchildren explored nature — a first experience for many of them.

East Bay Regional Parks are free or low-cost, making them accessible to everyone. The Park District remains committed to equity and inclusion, ensuring that people from all communities can connect with nature.

Time spent in nature is important — whether exploring a new trail, inviting a friend to join a naturalist-led program, or simply taking a moment to appreciate the birds, trees, and seasonal changes throughout the year.

Reinhardt Redwood Regional Park


