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

Four-down territory

1. Not adding up: Auburn coach Hugh Freeze spent the first eight minutes of his 30-minute Monday press conference hyping up the good things the Tigers did in last week's loss to Oklahoma, and the progress the team has made this season. It was hard for Freeze to comprehend how Auburn has a 2-3 record. "To sit here and tell you all that with what the results are is the complicated thing about taking ownership of it," Freeze said. "There are a lot of positives not matching up with the results."

2. Brutal stretch: Five straight home games to start the season seemed like a good situation for Auburn. Instead, the Tigers hit the road for the first time and it's the Deep South's Oldest Rivalry. Auburn is more than a 20-point underdog. Next week is another road game with Missouri, and then a matchup at Kentucky.

3. Fenced-in Dogs: One area where Auburn can pen in the Bulldogs is the running game. Georgia is 15th in the SEC with 129 rushing yards per game. Georgia combined for 182 yards in its two SEC games. Auburn isn't the best at defending the run (121 per game) but if the Tigers can bottle up Georgia on the ground, good things could happen. It doesn't help, though, that QB Carson Beck is highly accurate and is fourth in the league with 302 yards per game, including a 400-plus yard effort last week at Alabama.

4. He's the guy: After a few weeks of turmoil at the quarterback position, it appears Payton Thorne is the starter moving forward. He was benched for the Arkansas game but stepped in during the second half to finish the game. He took control in the Oklahoma game and passed for 338 yards and three touchdowns with his one big mistake being a pick-six in the fourth quarter. "I thought he was solid," Freeze said. "He wishes he had that one throw back, but I thought he really laid it on the line for us."

Key matchup

Auburn WR KeAndre Lambert-Smith vs. Georgia WR Arian Smith

Lambert-Smith is having a sensational

season and leads Auburn with 415 yards and six touchdowns. He's proven to be a weapon when it matters. Smith stepped up big last week with 132 yards a TD. He leads the team with 274 yards.

Player of the week

Cam Coleman, WR

The true freshman has made some big plays and came up clutch last week with 82 receiving yards. He seems to have found a rhythm and Auburn will need him to continue stepping up against the Bulldogs.

By the numbers

0: Number of games Auburn will play at Jordan-Hare Stadium in October. The Tigers also played zero October home games in 2019 and went 1-2 in that stretch.

13: The Tigers have thrown a TD pass in 13 straight games, the longest streak since 15 in 2018-19.

16: Auburn is ranked last in the SEC in time of possession.

2017: Auburn hasn't defeated the Bulldogs since 2017. The Tigers have lost seven straight.

Prediction

Georgia 35, Auburn 13

Auburn's got one heck of a first road game. The Tigers are catching the Bulldogs during the worst possible time — fresh off a close loss to Alabama. That doesn't sit well with them, so look for an aggressive Georgia performance in a loud and rough environment for the Tigers. This is not the ideal opponent for an Auburn team looking to turn the season around.

Kentucky's upset a testament to Stoops

The seeds for the Kentucky football team's 20-17 upset of No. 6 Ole Miss last weekend were not planted overnight. Nor during the week of practice. Nor the game before that. Nor the week of practice before that.

Kentucky's biggest win of this 2024 season — if not many seasons — was a direct result of the reaction to Kentucky's most embarrassing loss of the 2024 season — if not many seasons.

"(That loss was) a direct reflection on me," Mark Stoops said on Saturday. "And that hurt bad."

You know the hurt he's talking about. That 31-6 home embarrassment against South Carolina on Sept. 7. That wasn't just Kentucky's third straight loss to the Gamecocks, but a head-scratching, no-show performance that rocked not just the Cats themselves, but their coaches, as well.

There was some soul-searching after that. Long gazes into the mirror. Hours upon hours in the film room. As a coach, it's one thing to know what you think your team is going to look like, and quite another to be blindsided by something completely different. They had some stuff to figure out.

And so they did. One week later, Kentucky came within a break — not even a break or two — of upsetting a then-No. 1 Georgia that had won 27 consecutive regular-season SEC games. Then last week, the Cats took care of business against a solid MAC team in Ohio University.

For all the criticism the coaches rightfully received for laying the egg against South Carolina, and the heat Stoops took for playing it conservative against Georgia, the coaches deserve credit getting Lane Kiffin's Rebels to play UK's game on Saturday.

"We played it our way," Stoops said.

Offensive coordinator Bush Hamdan called a versatile and effective game. Kentucky controlled the first half with extended drives that kept Ole Miss' explosive offense off the field.

Then there was Stoops' decision to go for it on fourth-and-7 from UK's own 20-yard line with the Cats trailing 17-13 with three minutes to play. Hamdan responded by not just going for it, but going long for it. Brock Vandagriff and Barion Brown connected on a 63-yard

pass that was the play of the game.

Defensive coordinator Brad White devised a game plan that harassed Ole Miss quarterback Jaxson Dart just enough while corralling the Rebels' run game.

And UK was operating without its best cornerback. Playing the nation's top-ranked offense is not the best time to have your All-SEC defensive star Maxwell Hairston, who was hospitalized by an infection. An 18-point underdog, Kentucky won anyway.

"Next man up," UK corner JQ Hardaway said.

Stoops' best teams have always showed a certain kind of toughness. They're not going to razzle-dazzle you or overwhelm you or always win the day on style points. But they do play a gritty, physical brand that more often than not gives them a chance to win.

At Ole Miss, Kentucky took advantage of that chance. The plan was good. The players executed the plan. And after being humiliated after South Carolina and heartbroken after Georgia, the team was throwing its head coach into the air for some locker room bodysurfing.

"Stoops is in the air," Key said when asked to describe the postgame celebration. "When Stoops is in the air, it's a pretty good thing."

Four-down territory

1. Fourth-down blues: It's no secret Alabama's defense has the edge on third down. Opponents have converted just 11 times in 64 chances (No. 2 in the country). Fourth down is where the Crimson Tide breaks down. Teams are 10-of-14 in those situations (No. 115 in the country), including five by Georgia last week. "Probably the thing that shows up the most was our lack of ability to get off the field on fourth down," Alabama defensive coordinator Kane Wommack said. "They were 3-of-15 on third down and then were able to execute on fourth down."

2. Top choice: What a difference a game makes. Last week, Jalen Milroe was No. 4 on the FanDuel Heisman Trophy odds list. After a big game against Georgia, Milroe is the favorite at +200. The team benefited from the win, too. Alabama jumped three spots to take the No. 1 ranking in The Associated Press poll. "You've got to earn it each and every week and so that's really the message and the focus for the players," offensive coordinator Nick Sheridan said. "We have to put a good plan in for the players, they've got to practice hard, we've got to prepare them, we've got to go execute on game day."

3. Elusive Commodore: Alabama will face one of the more mobile quarterbacks on the schedule in Diego Pavia. The New Mexico State transfer has 721 passing yards with six touchdowns and no interceptions. He leads the team with 239 rushing yards and two touchdowns. "You can tell there's a confidence from the rest of his teammates that I think he breathes into their football team. You see it on the sideline," Wommack said.

4. Could be trouble: Through its first three games, Alabama allowed 347 total passing yards and was among the top passing defenses in the SEC and the nation. That went out the window against Georgia (439 yards). The Bulldogs had 100 first-half passing yards but exploded for 239 and three touchdowns in the second.

Key matchup

Alabama QB Jalen Milroe vs. Vanderbilt QB Diego Pavia

The Crimson Tide is always in the hunt for a win as long as Milroe is on the field. He leads the team in rushing (273), rushing TDs (8) and his 10 passing TDs are third in the SEC. Diego Pavia is the most valuable player on the Vandy offense. He's also the team's leading rusher and keeps the team in the game until the end.

Player of the week

Jam Miller, RB

The Crimson Tide running back hasn't dominated in a game so far. Vandy opponents average 122 per game. It has to

happen at some point, so Miller having a breakout performance against Vandy is as good a time as any.

By the numbers

22: Alabama has given up 22 points in the fourth quarter through four games. Georgia scored 19 in the fourth quarter last week.

23: Alabama has won 23 straight games against Vandy. The last loss was in 1984.

28: Ryan Williams is averaging 28 yards per catch, which leads the SEC. He averages 115 per game.

41: The 41 points Alabama scored against Georgia was the lowest total this season. Alabama averages 47 points per

game.

Prediction

Alabama 44, Vanderbilt 12

It's hard to imagine this game mimicking Alabama's thriller over Georgia last week, but if the Crimson Tide doesn't take this game seriously, it could be catastrophic. Bama's back in the No. 1 spot, and that comes a target on its back. The Crimson Tide will get every team's best shot and this isn't the Vandy doormat of the past. Look for Alabama to handle its business and quickly turn its attention to South Carolina.

Milroe, Williams bedeviling Tide foes

TUSCALOOSA — Jalen Milroe is a fourth-year junior who waited his turn to start. Ryan Williams is a 17-year-old freshman who has become an instant sensation.

Together they've rapidly forged one of the nation's most electric passing combinations for the now top-ranked Alabama Crimson Tide. Not even No. 5 Georgia could slow them down, much less stop them in the Tide's 41-34 win last weekend.

"That man's always making a play on the ball," Milroe said of Williams. "I just have so much trust in him. When he's out at receiver, he's going to do something special with the football."

They're both doing special things so far this season. Williams and Milroe each blend speed, talent and moves that most running backs would envy. And Milroe has emerged as one of college football's top passers.

Milroe had perhaps his best game — a career-high 374 passing yards and two touchdowns, 117 rushing yards and two TDs — against a team that came in with the nation's top pass defense and no touchdowns allowed. He became the first player in the AP poll era to reach 300 passing yards, 100 rushing yards and run for two touchdowns against a top-5 opponent.

Even his first interception of the season came when the ball was knocked out of a receiver's grasp by a Georgia defender.

Milroe emerged from that game as the Heisman Trophy favorite, according to BetMGM Sportsbook and won AP's national player of the week honors for the second time. Next up: A trip to Vanderbilt on Saturday.

Milroe's eight rushing touchdowns — two in each game — are tied with Navy's Blake Horvath for the most in the country by a quarterback this season.

"Man, he's a weapon out there," Alabama coach Kalen DeBoer said. "And he's doing it both through the air and with his feet. He's tough to game-plan against when you're on the other side."

Then there's Williams, DeBoer's most prized and needed recruit. He caught six catches for 177 yards and a touchdown against Georgia. He made a 75-yard, back-shoulder catch for the go-ahead

touchdown late in the game, with a spin move that sent two Bulldogs defenders running into each other.

That was highlight-reel play No. 2 for the freshman from Saraland.

Earlier, he bobbled the ball at least twice before turning and snagging it out of the air. Then Williams spun the other direction to complete a 54-yard gain.

Georgia coach Kirby Smart illustrated the seemingly unsolvable dilemma of trying to contain the Milroe-Williams duo when asked about it by ESPN before the game.

Milroe's running ability makes it hard to double team Williams.

"I said we can't do anything special for Ryan Williams," Smart said afterward. "They got a guy back there at quarterback that could be the best running back in the country, and he throws the ball. You can't put two people on Ryan Williams, you can't do it."

Williams has led Alabama in receiving in all four games. He has 16 catches for 462 yards and five touchdowns after reclassifying to enter college a year early.

Williams said the season so far has been like a dream he doesn't want to end. "I like the dream," he said.

Milroe, meanwhile, had to bide his time for two years at Alabama before

getting his shot last season. He wound up leading the Tide to the Southeastern Conference championship after an early benching and has returned better than ever.

Milroe's passer rating of 204.7 trails only No. 12 Mississippi's Jaxson Dart in the FBS.

"Guys don't always have to be wide open right now," DeBoer said. "You saw him throwing guys open and you saw receivers anticipate that and going, Hey, I'm going to get the ball. That's progress in our passing game. If we keep doing that, we're going to be tough to defend."

Four-down territory

1. One-two punch: Tennessee has the No. 1 scoring defense in the country. On the flip side, the Vols are the No. 2 scoring offense. That's a winning formula for sure. Tennessee isn't just beating opponents; it's annihilating them. The Vols have scored 26 touchdowns and average 54 points per game. Defensively, the Vols have given up just three touchdowns and three field goals to average seven points allowed per game. Tennessee has outscored opponents 216-27.

2. Get off the field: Arkansas doesn't do everything great on offense, but the Razorbacks do one thing better than any team in the SEC. The Hogs have converted 55% of third downs (41 of 74). The good news for Tennessee is the Vols' defense is No. 1 in the country (17%), holding opponents to nine conversions on 53 third-down attempts. Arkansas is also 5-of-10 converting on fourth down. But the Vols are pretty good in that department, too. Tennessee has allowed just one conversion in five attempts.

3. Taking it easy: For a college football coach, finding time off is tough, especially during the fall. Josh Heupel did his best to take advantage of the Vols' bye week. There was not travel destination for the Vols' coach, only his couch. "The weather didn't cooperate the way I would have liked, but I got a chance to spend some time with my family on Saturday, play some catch and watch a couple of games," Heupel said. "I had a really great weekend with them."

4. Running hog wild: Tennessee's offense is the best in the SEC, but Arkansas is not too far behind. Ja'Quinden Jackson is a big reason for that. He's third in the league with 509 yards and has nine touchdowns. QB Taylen Green can run, too. He's got 331 yards to go with four TDs. "You have to play gap integrity and assignment sound and go make a play," Heupel said. "(Green's) speed and how dynamic of a player he is makes that a difficult thing to do because he has the ability to outrun the defender."

Key matchup

Tennessee QB Nico Iamaleava vs. Arkansas QB Taylen Green

Iamaleava continues to improve each game, throwing for 892 yards with just two interceptions and a nearly 70% pass completion percentage. He's run for 117 yards and one TD. Green is the best player on the field for Arkansas. Along with his 1,236 passing yards, Green is second on the team with 331 rushing yards and four TDs.

Player of game

Bru McCoy, WR

Arkansas has a great run defense, so the Vols may have to rely heavily on the

passing game and the hands of McCoy. He's the leader in receptions (12), yards (200) and average yards per catch (17).

By the numbers

2: The Tennessee defense has allowed two plays of over 30 yards this season.

3: Tennessee has dropped three straight games to Arkansas. The last win was in 2007.

10: Tennessee's Dylan Sampson leads the SEC and ranks second in the nation with 10 rushing TDs.

24: Tennessee is 24-2 in the Heupel era when rushing for more than 200 yards. The Vols have 200 rushing yards in three

games this season.

Prediction

Tennessee 42, Arkansas 17

There's no chance Arkansas extends its win streak against Tennessee. It stops at three games. Tennessee arguably has the best offense and defense in the country. That's a lethal combination and makes beating this team nearly impossible. The only thing that can take Tennessee down is Tennessee. That's happened too many times in the past to count. It won't happen this week.

Vols' stingy D complements dazzling O

Josh Heupel made his coaching reputation as a guru running offenses so fast that defenders were left gasping for air, unable to substitute fresh players.

Through three seasons, that was enough to get Tennessee back in the AP Top 25 rankings.

Now his Volunteers are much more balanced, with a stingy, pounding defense that has helped them climb to fourth in the poll and has them among the teams chasing a national title. As Heupel pointed out, Tennessee's history goes far beyond Peyton Manning, Willie Gault and Johnny Majors.

"The standard at Tennessee is to be elite on defense," Heupel said after his Vols routed then-No. 24 N.C. State in early September. "This is the home of Reggie White, Al Wilson, Eric Berry."

White was inducted posthumously into the Pro Football Hall of Fame for terrorizing quarterbacks in the NFL. Wilson is the linebacker who led Tennessee to its last national championship in 1998. Eric Berry was the 2008 Southeastern Conference defensive player of the year and a five-time Pro Bowler in the NFL.

Tennessee came into this season with only one preseason AP All-American in pass rusher James Pearce Jr., who is considered a possibility to be the No. 1 overall selection in the 2025 NFL draft.

Pearce and defensive coordinator Tim Banks, who's been with Heupel since he came to Knoxville, have lots of help.

The Vols (4-0, 1-0) have held five straight opponents under 250 yards total offense, a streak started with a shutout of Iowa in the Citrus Bowl in January. They also thumped N.C. State in Charlotte and held then-No. 15 Oklahoma to just 222 yards baptizing the Sooners into the SEC and notching the Vols' first road win over a top 15 team since 2006.

Oklahoma did snap Tennessee's streak at 19 consecutive quarters without giving up an offensive touchdown, Tennessee's longest since the Vols shut out 15 straight opponents between 1938 and 1939.

Even working through scholarship reductions as part of Tennessee's self-induced punishment for NCAA violations under former coach Jeremy Pruitt, the Vols have built enough depth

to allow Banks to play a bunch of linemen and keep pass rushers fresh. Against Oklahoma, five linemen had at least one tackle for loss as the Vols held the Sooners to a season-low 36 yards rushing.

The Vols lead the nation giving up just 176 yards per game and second both allowing just 7 points a game and 50.8 yards rushing a game.

Lineman Elijah Simmons helped set the tone on Oklahoma's opening offensive snap, breaking through for a 5-yard tackle for loss. That was the first of 11 tackles for loss in a defensive show that also included a safety and three sacks.

Heupel says Simmons played "violent and destructive" all game.

Simmons said the Vols are so deep on the defensive line that it doesn't really feel like there's a true group of starters. They certainly have instilled confidence in their teammates with how they've played to start this season.

"I believe, and I feel like everyone else believes, that they're the best in the nation," defensive back Christian Harrison said.

Tennessee has won 13 SEC championships but last played in the league title game in 2001. The Vols' last SEC

championship was in 1998 when they won the national title to kick off the BCS era. The Vols visit Arkansas (3-2, 1-1) on Saturday night and still have home games against Florida, No. 1 Alabama and Kentucky before a visit to No. 5 Georgia on Nov. 16.

Heupel sees his defense building a strong identity that means his offense doesn't have to score big every game to win.

"Then it's about tying all three phases in together to make sure that you end up on the right side of the scoreboard," Heupel said.

Four-down territory

1. Two is better than one: UNA managed to snap an eight-game losing streak that dated to last season thanks to its 25-16 win at West Georgia last week. Now, the question is, can the Lions get a second? Since playing a full Division I schedule in 2019 – 2018 was a mixture of Division I and II opponents – UNA has only managed to win back-to-back games once. That was in 2021 when it beat Robert Morris in the seventh game of the season and followed by beating Charleston Southern.

2. Another reunion: The Lions honored the 30th anniversary of their 1993 Division II national championship team last year. On Saturday, the 1994 edition will get its turn. UNA went 13-1 that season that culminated with a 16-10 win over Texas A&M-Kingsville for the second of its three straight titles. The Lions became just the third school in DII history to win back-to-back national championships, joining Southwest Texas State (1981-82) and North Dakota State (1985-86). They're only loss was a 17-14 defeat to Youngstown State, which won the I-AA title that season. Overall, UNA held 12 of its 14 opponents to 21 points or less, including six to no more than seven. Five players from the defense were All-Americans.

3. Looks familiar: Speaking of a five-game losing streak, Utah Tech is in the same position UNA was last week. In desperate need of a win. Three of the Trailblazers' opponents were ranked in the Stats FCS top 25. They opened against then-No. 4 Montana State, played at No. 12 UC Davis and hosted No. 22 Abilene Christian last week. Utah Tech has also played Northern Arizona, which is now ranked 25th, and UNLV, the No. 25 team in the FBS. Overall, the Trailblazers have given up more than 30 points in each game and scored more than 17 once.

4. In need of 6, not 3: The good news for UNA was it won last week. The not-so-good news was it again struggled to capitalize in the red zone. The Lions reached the West Georgia 20-yard line six times. Four times, they had to settle for field goal opportunities – all from the

15 or closer – and made three. Of the 22 red-zone trips UNA has made this season, only nine have accounted for six points. It's part of the reason the Lions are averaging less than 17 points a game.

Key matchup

Utah Tech QBs vs. UNA defense

Ah, yes. A possible quarterback conundrum. The Trailblazers have played two this season – Deacon Hill and Reggie Graff. Hill has started four games but is completing just 48% of his passes for 412 yards, two touchdowns and an interception. Graff has started one and has been a bit more effective. He's completed 52% of his throws for 463 yards, three scores and a pick. Hill started last week against Abilene Christian, but Graff came on in

relief to throw for 231 yards and a touchdown, while rushing for 79 yards and a score. Should be interesting for a defense that allowed fewer than 250 yards at West Georgia.

Player of the week

Dennis Moody, RB

The sophomore has been UNA's most effective tailback in two of the last three games. He rushed for 53 yards on six carries at UT Martin and had 54 yards on 12 touches at West Georgia. Perhaps he gets a touchdown this week.
