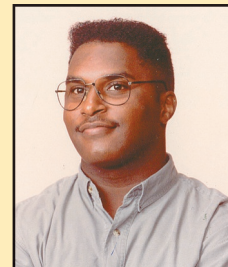
Mom's Chicken Thighs

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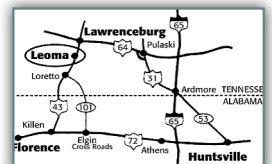

1. The hunted: Sometimes it's hard to figure out who has the advantage in a rematch game. In Alabama's recent history, there's a pattern — it's best to lose the first time. Alabama's had two pivotal rematch games from the same season, starting with LSU in 2011. Alabama lost the regular-season clash, but downed LSU in the national title game. Alabama downed Georgia in the 2022 SEC title game but lost to the Bulldogs in the national title game. Alabama won this year's regular-season meeting with Georgia in September and has a motivated Georgia team to contend with in Atlanta.

2. Running low: It's bad enough Alabama's run game is one of the worst in the SEC, but now the Crimson Tide is down two backs heading into Atlanta. Starter Jam Miller left the Auburn game with an injury and is questionable for this week, and backup Kevin Riely has been out with a jaw injury. That leaves sophomore Daniel Hill and freshman AK Dear as the options as well as rarely used Dre Washington. "They'll all have to do their part," Alabama coach Kalen DeBoer said. "We just got to keep plugging away with guys that are excited about their opportunity."

3. Under the gun: The defensive strategy of putting pressure on Alabama QB Ty Simpson seems to work. Oklahoma dialed up several blitz packages for Simpson, who was sacked four times, was strip-sacked and threw an interception. Last week, Auburn constantly pressured Simpson, who finished 19-of-35 for 122 yards and was sacked three times. He also tossed three touchdowns. In the first meeting with Georgia, Simpson was 24-of-38 for 276 yards, two touchdowns and no sacks. "None of that means anything. They're going to have a chip on their shoulder and something to prove and we know what's at stake," Simpson said.

4. Same Dawgs, new tricks: In the first meeting, Georgia was caught off guard, and Alabama used two drives of 14 plays that ended with touchdowns. Later, Alabama scored on another long drive and sealed the game by converting a crucial third down. Several months have passed, and the Bulldogs have matured a bit. "Defensively we've got guys a little more experienced," Georgia coach Kirby Smart said. "That's probably the biggest difference probably is that the guys that were young when we played them last time, they're a little more grown up now."

Key matchup**Alabama QB Ty Simpson vs. Georgia QB Gunner Stockton**

The game will be decided by the play of these two. As Simpson goes, so goes the Tide offense. He's third in the SEC with

3,056 passing yards and tied for second with 25 touchdowns. Stockton's passing numbers aren't eye-popping at 2,535 yards with 20 touchdowns, but his 403 rushing yards with eight touchdowns make him dangerous.

Player of the week**Isaiah Horton, WR**

In the first meeting with Georgia, Horton led the Tide with five catches for 65 yards and a touchdown. Also, he's coming off a game against Auburn where he caught five passes for 35 yards with three touchdowns.

Alabama will play with lots of emotion Saturday with a playoff spot at stake. There is a slight chance of getting in with a loss, but nothing should be left to chance. Georgia is in the driver's seat, having won eight straight since the September loss to the Tide. The Bulldogs have had plenty of time to stew on that loss and will come up with a game plan to finally break through and beat Alabama in an SEC title game.

Tide's fate could hinge on SEC success

Alabama's trip to the SEC championship offers some reward and plenty of risk.

The Crimson Tide's path to the play-off narrowed before the calendar flipped to September after a loss to Florida State in Week 1. Months later, despite winning 10 of its last 11 games and clinching the SEC championship game berth, Alabama still isn't a sure thing for the College Football Playoff.

That could change this weekend. A win against Georgia on Saturday would secure a spot for Alabama as one of the five highest-ranked conference winners. A loss would put the Tide's fate in the hands of the CFP committee, which could dock them for a third loss — even if it stemmed from a championship game competitors didn't qualify for.

Saturday gives Alabama the chance to take control of its own destiny, and the Tide has no interest in giving any outsiders final say.

As far as second-year coach Kalen DeBoer is concerned, his team's future shouldn't be a topic of debate. The Tide is 10-2 this season. Their only loss aside from a Week 1 blunder was a close one against a ranked Oklahoma team in Week 12. That was after knocking off six conference opponents, four of which were ranked.

"We're in the championship game with a 7-1 (SEC) record, won four conference games on the road in the toughest conference," DeBoer said Monday. "I just think when you're really trying to have a playoff, you need your best teams in there. There's no doubt in my mind that we are one of the best teams. I don't say that arrogantly. I just really believe that's what it is."

It doesn't help that the CFP committee is subjective by nature, and the playoff race is overcrowded. But no matter how the numbers are crunched, even with a loss, DeBoer argues his squad has proved it belongs.

"There's a ton of metrics I know people look at: strength of record, FPI. We're right at the top," he said. "Playing in your conference championship in the SEC shouldn't be something that we're worried about as far as what that would do to our playoff hopes. We got here by earning it."

Should Alabama lose on Saturday, earning a CFP bid would be historic. No three-loss team has ever appeared in the playoff. Alabama would have to compete for one of the seven remaining spots. In the SEC alone, Texas A&M, Ole Miss, Oklahoma and Vanderbilt would have stronger overall records. In other words, Alabama's back is against the wall, but that's not a new feeling this season.

"Man, I feel like honestly we've kind of had that mindset ever since our first loss," senior linebacker Deontae Lawson said. "Just control what we can control, and that's doing our best to win the game, leave nothing up for chance."

The Crimson Tide has had Georgia's number in recent years. Kirby Smart is 1-7 against his former team, and Bama has won the past three. In September, Alabama snapped Georgia's 33-game

home win streak, 24-21. That offers the locker room some peace of mind ahead of the heavyweight showdown.

"We've already beat this team before. We're going to go out there and make sure we do the same thing," Tide defensive lineman Tim Keenan III said. "We're going to make sure we handle business on our own end and not leave it up to the committee to make decisions for us."

Four-down territory

1. Another round: This will be the second meeting between the programs in less than a month. Jacksonville State beat Kennesaw State 35-26 on Nov. 15 in Jacksonville. Foreshadowing? The Gamecocks led from the 2:42 mark of the second quarter on with the Owls making it a one-score game with 3:22 left. Jacksonville State had two running backs rush for more than 100 yards. Cam Cook scurried for 132 yards and a score on 27 touches, while quarterback Caden Creel ran for 127 yards and two touchdowns on 14 carries. Kennesaw State quarterback Amari Odom threw for 248 yards, but three of his passes went to defenders. It allowed the Gamecocks, who later lost to Florida International, to host the conference title game.

2. A smooth transition: Unlike a cross-state school, Jacksonville State has invested quite a bit into its football program — both in terms of money and facilities — and, wouldn't you know, it has helped result in wins as it has moved up in classification. (Good coaches and administrators aren't a bad thing, either.) The Gamecocks made the jump from the FCS to FBS ahead of the 2023 season. Friday will mark their second straight CUSA title game appearance (they beat Western Kentucky 52-12 last season). A win would also give them their third consecutive nine-win FBS season and fourth overall. Overall, Jacksonville State is 20-4 against regular-season CUSA competition. Not too shabby at all.

3. Quite the turnaround: It's not a stretch to say Kennesaw State is enjoying its second season in the FBS a lot more than its first. The Owls went 2-10 last season, including 2-6 in conference play. It was the fewest games the program had won since its founding in 2015. Under first-year coach Jerry Mack, Kennesaw State is in line for its first double-digit win season since 2021. Of the Owls' three losses, two have come against Power Four foes — a 10-9 loss at Wake Forest on Aug. 29 and a 56-9 drubbing from Indiana, which is currently the No. 2 team

in the nation. Now, Kennesaw State has been helped by its ability to win close games. Of the six single-score matchups they've played, the Owls have won five.

4. It appears to be an advantage: Conference USA has used a No. 1-vs.-No. 2-seeded championship game since 2022. The home team has won all three — UTSA besting North Texas 48-27 the first year, Liberty topping New Mexico State 49-35 in 2023 and Jacksonville State last season. The winner seems destined for the Cure Bowl. It's where UTSA and Jacksonville State both went. Liberty went to the Fiesta Bowl as the highest-ranked Group of Five school that year. But three games is a small sample size. How about when divisions were used from 2005-21? Home teams were 12-5 in that format.

Key matchup

JSU RB Cam Cook vs. KSU LB Baron Hopson

Cook had a successful outing the last

time the Gamecocks and Owls met (see above). But the junior has been effective nearly every week. He leads the nation with 1,581 yards (5.7 yards per carry on 276 touches) and is tied for sixth with 15 rushing touchdowns. So far, only two teams have held Cook to less than 100 yards — UCF (75 yards on 17 carries) and Southern Miss (77 on 22). Hopson, meanwhile, ranks 10th in the country with 120 tackles. He has also tallied 8 ½ tackles for loss.

Player of the week

Amari Odom, KSU QB

As mentioned above, Odom did throw three interceptions the last time the teams met. Two of those led to Jacksonville State touchdowns. So ...

By the numbers

41: The number of touchdowns Jacksonville State has scored this season. Only 12 have been via the pass game. The

rest are rushing.

3: The number of conference titles Kennesaw State owns. Each one — 2017-18 and 2021 — came when the Owls were in the Big South.

Troy at James Madison

Records: Troy (8-4), No. 11 James Madison (11-1)

The series: James Madison leads 2-1.

Four-down territory

1. Goose is not cooked: Troy quarterback Goose Crowder missed much of the season due to an injury, but he has blossomed in two games since his return. Crowder is 51-of-77 passing for 646 yards and seven touchdowns, helping the Trojans beat Georgia State and Southern Miss to claim their third West Division championship in four seasons. He began the season as Troy's starter before getting hurt. In the two games before Crowder's return, both losses, the Trojans mustered 187 and 138 yards total offense against Arkansas State and Old Dominion. In the two games since, they've averaged over 425 yards. The "Goose" nickname comes from his brother, Michael, who hung it on him in honor of their favorite movie, "Top Gun".

2. Short-timer? James Madison coach Bob Chesney is reportedly set to become UCLA's new coach at the end of the season. He has the Dukes contending for the Group of Five's College Football Playoff berth. JMU, at No. 19, is the highest-ranked Group of Five team, ahead of No. 20 North Texas, No. 21 Tulane and No. 23 Navy. Chesney is 131-51 in 16 seasons as a head coach, including 20-5 in two seasons with the Dukes.

3. Let's go streaking: James Madison, with last week's 59-10 win at Coastal Carolina, has a 10-game winning streak. The Dukes are tied for the third longest streak in the FBS and, with a win, will be second at worst. No. 1 Ohio State (16 wins in a row) and No. 2 Indiana (12) play for the Big Ten title Saturday. Notre Dame (10) does not play this weekend. JMU lost 28-14 at Louisville on Sept. 5 before hitting its stride.

4. Put up your Dukes: James Madison is in its fourth season in the Sun Belt and playing for its first Sun Belt championship. However, the Dukes have nine league titles in their history, most recently in 2021 when Curt

Cignetti — now at No. 2 Indiana — led them to a sixth Colonial Athletic Association crown. JMU was ineligible for the league title in 2022 and 2023 and, had it been eligible, would have been in the championship game. Against Troy both times.

Player of the week

Tae Meadows, Troy RB

Meadows leads Troy with 685 yards rushing, more than double the No. 2 Trojan, with five touchdowns. His rushing could clear things for Crowder since Troy has given up 49 sacks this year, which is tied with Ball State for worst in the FBS. Unfortunately, the Dukes surrendered minus-5 yards last week at Coastal.

Key matchup

Troy DE Donnie Smith vs. JMU QB Alonza Barnett III

Barnett has accounted for over 3,000 yards offense and 33 touchdowns this season, while Smith leads the Sun Belt with nine sacks. Barnett accounted for four touchdowns last week at Coastal Carolina. Smith had a season-high two sacks in Troy's win at Southern Miss.

By the numbers

3-31: Troy has a 3-31 record against ranked teams. The Trojans beat No. 17 Missouri at home in 2004, No. 22 LSU on the road in 2017 and No. 22 Texas-San Antonio in a 2022 bowl.

5: Where James Madison ranks in total defense in the FBS. The Dukes

allow an average of 253.5 yards per game.

Plus-4: The Trojans already have a four-win improvement in coach Gerad Parker's second season.

8: Troy has eight Sun Belt titles, the most in the league and two ahead of Arkansas State.

Prediction

James Madison 34, Troy 14

The Shenandoah Valley is a scenic place that played a prominent role in the Civil War. Unfortunately for Troy, the Trojans won't be marching home with many warm memories or, in particular, a conference championship.

Big Ten stars chasing title, Heisman

INDIANAPOLIS — Ohio State quarterback Julian Sayin and Indiana quarterback Fernando Mendoza each have one prize in mind for their showdown this weekend in Indianapolis: a Big Ten championship.

It's another one — Heisman Trophy winner — that will consume most of next week's debate.

The two first-year starters at their respective schools each played their way into frontrunner status by leading their teams to unbeaten regular seasons, posting outstanding numbers and delivering when the stakes have been highest. They get final chances to pad those Heisman resumes when No. 1 Ohio State and No. 2 Indiana square off in the Big Ten championship game.

Sayin and Mendoza appear tailor-made for the moment.

"With the spotlight, with the pressure of it, comes a privilege," said Mendoza, a two-year starter

at California before arriving in Bloomington.

Mendoza has been deferential to his teammates and coaches all season, routinely using his platform to build up those who helped him reach the precipice of becoming the first Indiana player to win college football's most prestigious award.

Sayin, meanwhile, has spent most of this season trying to get acclimated to being the starter for the defending national champs and more recently with a revolving door of receivers caused by injuries. He started his career at Alabama and redshirted last season in Columbus. He would be Ohio State's first Heisman winner since Troy Smith in 2006.

Mendoza and Sayin find themselves as the feature attractions in a rare, late-season head-to-head matchup between the Football Bowl Subdivision's last two unbeaten teams.

The tale of the tape is every bit as close as one might expect.

Sayin's staggering 78.9%

completion rate leads the nation, as does his passing efficiency of 184.85. His 30 touchdown passes rank second nationally. He's 13th in passing yards with 3,065 and tied for 15th in points responsible for with 180.

Mendoza leads the FBS with 32 TD passes, ranks second in passing efficiency at 183.71 and points responsible for at 228, fifth in completion percentage (72.0%) and 27th in yards passing with 2,758.

Both are 12-0 overall, 9-0 in conference play and have five interceptions. The biggest difference statistically — Mendoza averages 13.07 yards per throw, No. 24 nationally, while Sayin ranks 62nd.

Mendoza has a chance to put an exclamation on Indiana's second straight record-breaking season — if Indiana beats the Buckeyes for the first time since 1988, claims its first conference crown since 1967 and reaches No. 1 in The Associated Press poll for the first time in school history.

Sayin is trying to extend the nation's

longest active winning streak to 17 games, capture Ohio State's first conference crown since 2020 and help the Buckeyes become back-to-back national champions for the first time in school history.

"Julian Sayin is a tremendous football player. He's young but doesn't play like he's young," second-year Hoosiers coach Curt Cignetti said. "Super quick release, very accurate and he's mobile. They've got great weapons on the outside."

But as coaches and players stay focused on Saturday's contest, the quarterbacks are downplaying the game inside the game — whether the winner has the inside track to winning the Heisman.

"A lot of quarterbacks have struggled with (Ohio State's defense) throughout the entire season, and there's a reason for that," Mendoza said. "I think it's a great opportunity and a great challenge for the Indiana offense to play the Indiana brand of ball we want to play against such a great defense."

Morris, Sumrall stay put before moving on

North Texas coach Eric Morris and Tulane's Jon Sumrall confided in each other over the past few weeks when the good friends were facing similar decisions about their futures. Both are going to finish this season with their American Conference teams before moving on to their next jobs.

Morris and Sumrall are two of the league's four coaches who are headed to Power Four schools. Their teams, the No. 20 Mean Green (11-1) and the No. 21 Green Wave (10-2), play Friday night in the American championship game. The winner very likely will make it into the 12-team College Football Playoff.

"Not a ton of people really know what we're going through and how hard some of this stuff is and how hard the decisions are," Morris, who will be Oklahoma State's new coach, said Monday. "Ultimately, I think it's really cool that we're kind of in the same position right now,

and that we're both still able to lead these teams that have fought so hard for us."

Unlike Lane Kiffin, who left playoff-bound 11-1 Ole Miss to become LSU's new coach, Sumrall and Morris are being allowed to finish what they started this season.

There is a very distinct difference in those situations. Kiffin left for a hated Southeastern Conference rival of the Rebels. Morris and Sumrall are both moving up from Group of Five schools.

"A lot of respect for the outfit we're playing, and I'm very honored and privileged that Tulane, given the circumstances we're in, is allowing me to coach in the game and do this experience with our players," said Sumrall, who will be Florida's new coach. "Because when you have a chance to pursue a championship, man, there's nothing like it."

The other American coaches moving up are South Florida's Alex Golesh, who was introduced Monday as Auburn's new coach, and Ryan Silverfield going from Memphis to Arkansas.

Tim Perneti, the American's commissioner, said on a Zoom call about Friday's championship game in New Orleans that he was not surprised that power conference schools needing new coaches looked at those in his league. He expected it.

"This league is overflowing with talented people, from administrators to coaches to student-athletes," he said. "Just a talented, tough, gritty league. And I think we have the ingredients that a lot of programs around America are looking for. ... People are viewing the American as a place that has a lot of talent in the coaching ranks."

Perneti, who said he has no doubt about the American champion making the CFP, also expressed his admiration for Morris and Sumrall finishing out the season with their teams, and for the schools allowing that to happen.

"It says a lot, and it also speaks to the fact that there can be cooperation between institutions when these changes take place," Perneti said. "It

speaks to the administration, like you have to have a maturity about these situations. Like things are gonna change and it's very easy to show people the door. What's harder is to finish the season given all the momentum both of these teams have going into the championship game."

Also under different circumstances, Sumrall didn't have the same chance to finish the season when he left Troy for Tulane in December 2023.

Sumrall was still Troy's coach when the Trojans won the Sun Belt championship with a home win over Appalachian State in the league title game, but the Green Wave hired him six days later and Troy was not a playoff contender.

The Trojans, the same day as Tulane's hire, named defensive coordinator Greg Gasparato interim head coach for their Birmingham Bowl loss that month to Duke. Troy hired Gerad Parker, who is their current coach, days before the bowl game. Gasparato joined Sumrall at Tulane.

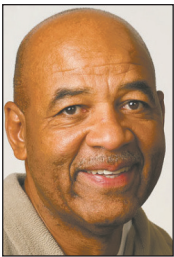

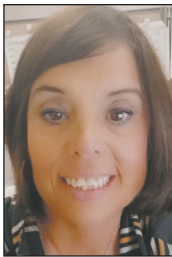

Is it all or nothing for Crimson Tide?

Here we are, just as we forecast in August, looking forward to a familiar showdown in Atlanta.

Alabama vs. Georgia V.

This could be one for the ages. And it could well bring an end to the SEC championship game as we've known it.

Regardless of the outcome, Georgia is in the College Football Playoff later this month. Georgia survived one of the nation's toughest schedules with just one early-season stumble — to Alabama, of course.

Alabama played an even more difficult slate, starting with a no-show season opener at Florida State and stumbling again with a turnover-plagued shortfall against Oklahoma. Yet the Crimson Tide is still standing.

For now.

Traditional wisdom says getting to Atlanta is enough. With the SEC getting multiple bids, the two playing for the conference title should be automatic participants. But that may not be the case.

The belief is that Alabama is on shaky ground because the CFP committee favors records over strength of schedule, which would make Bama a no-brainer. (Note that Vegas oddsmakers make Alabama a heavy favorite to be included, regardless of Saturday).

Of all CFP contenders, Alabama has taken the most difficult path and leads everyone in quality wins (7-1 vs. the Top 30 per Sagarin) by a wide margin. That includes four wins over then-AP Top 25 teams in four weeks, an unprecedented SEC feat. Plus, the Tide owns the second most-impressive single-game victory, the 24-21 win at Georgia.

The latter will be usurped by the winner of the No. 1 Ohio State vs. No. 2 Indiana Big Ten title game. But the other numbers can't be surpassed.

So, welcome to the showdown that's meaningless for Georgia and means everything for the Tide.

Both were tested in their annual rivalry games but Georgia, frankly, comes in hotter. Alabama could have erased all doubt but hasn't played in November as it did in October.

The guess here is that Georgia prevails

in the rematch.

Even a close loss might be enough to keep Alabama out. If that happens, look for the SEC championship game to go dark rather quickly. With the move to nine conference games in 2026, why include a landmine to cap the regular season?

Instead, look for alternatives — maybe a doubleheader featuring four SEC bubble teams vying for the final spots. Same venue, twice the fun.

In the meantime, prepare for a championship Saturday like no other. And keep your eye on other games that could impact Alabama's inclusion or exclusion with a loss.

Looking ahead

• **American Athletic:** North Texas vs.

Tulane (7 p.m. Friday on ABC): The winner likely gets the Group of 12 spot in the CFP. Tulane is the highest-ranked G5 in the CFP Top 25, but North Texas could surge with a victory. James Madison is also still in contention.

• **Big 12:** BYU vs. Texas Tech (11 a.m. Saturday on ABC): The Red Raiders look to be locked in at No. 5. But what happens if BYU wins? Does the Big 12 get two spots (sorry, SEC) or does Texas Tech tumble out of contention? Regardless, the loser would still have a better record (that word again) than 10-3 Alabama or 9-3 Texas.

• **SEC:** Georgia vs. Alabama (3 p.m. Saturday on ABC): Alabama is 4-0 in SEC title games against Georgia. We said it's meaningless for this year's Bulldogs, but not for Kirby Smart's reputation.

• **ACC:** Duke vs. Virginia (7 p.m. Saturday on ABC): This may be the most oddly compelling game of all. If Duke pulls off the upset, does that knock the ACC out of the playoff? Miami continues to lurk, though.

• **Big Ten:** Indiana vs. Ohio State (7 p.m. Saturday on Fox): Gus Johnson, I hope you're ready and rested. This should go down as one of the most-anticipated conference finales in history. Instead, both teams are destined for CFP byes and could face off again in the national title game. Rest the starters, if you're smart.

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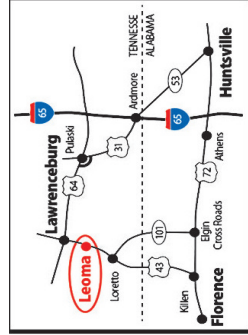
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
