Steel Wheeled History

Located on the campus of East Tennessee State University in the Campus Center Building (176 Ross Drive), the George L. Carter Railroad Museum is open on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM. There is no admission fee, but donations are welcome for its upkeep.

The museum is housed in multiple exhibit and work areas on the first floor of the building, and handicap access is available.

Named for late 19th century industrialist George L. Carter, who developed the Clinchfield Railroad and provided the land for the ETSU campus, the museum's objectives are four-fold. First, to honor Mr. Carter's legacy to the region and to railroad history. Second, to foster educational outreach by showcasing realistic model railroading operations and by displaying both model and prototype rail-related equipment with multiple scale models and time periods. Third, to use special activities, such as The Little Engineer's Room, birthday parties, and Heritage Days, to encourage the interest of young people who are not as familiar with railroading. Fourth, to serve as a regional meeting facility for both prototype and model railroading enthusiasts, which is accomplished through two organizations, the Mountain Empire Model Rail Roaders Club and the G.L. Carter Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society, both of which offer age-appropriate membership opportunities.

The museum is excited to have been nationally featured for 7 consecutive years in an annual narrow-gauge model railroad magazine. The museum also hosts off-site activities such as annual public rail excursions and an annual Big Train Show. The director of the Carter Museum is Dr. Fred Alsop. ride, or take in a nature program. Options abound in this 3,500-acre, city-owned park now celebrating its 50th anniversary.



Johnson City Dog Park

(St. Paul, Va.): A city-owned park with a wetland and forest complex adjacent to the Clinch River, it features walking and biking trails, small boat access, fishing and picnic areas. Visit stpaulva.org or call (276) 762-5297.

Rhododendron Gardens

(Tn-NC Line): Plan your peek at Roan Mountain's spectacular natural Catawba rhododendron gardens during peak bloom time (usually in mid-June). (Bristol): Hundreds of miles of beautiful shoreline and water draw skiing, boating and fishing enthusiasts to this TVA reservoir known for its smallmouth bass. Steele Creek Park

(Bristol): This 2,200-acre regional park features a 52-acre lake, a nature center, playgrounds, athletic fields, picnic tables, disc golf, exercise trails, a splash pad and paddle boat rentals. Sycamore Shoals State Historic Park

Allandale Mansion

(Kingsport): The Georgian-style mansion referred to as Kingsport's White House is a popular event venue with tours available upon request and during some community events. Call (423) 229-9422.

Doe River Covered Bridge

(Elizabethton): Built in 1882, it's believed to be the oldest such bridge still in use today. Take a walking tour, feed the ducks or picnic on the banks of the Doe River. Covered Bridge Jams offer live music on most Saturdays (June-September). Visit tourcartercounty.com.

Exchange Place

(Kingsport): A living history farm that once served as a relay station along the Old Stage Road, the Gaines-Preston Farm and its Burow Museum recapture life in the early 1800s.

Netherland Inn



Old Deery Inn & Museum


