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Chopaka Gathering

You won't need a U.S. passport to cross the Canadian border, yet. Tribes on each side of the 49th parallel protested a new law that was going into effect on June 1st requiring a passport to cross either side of the border. Colville tribal business council members worked on this side of the border with U.S. government officials, while Okanagan chiefs and staff worked with Canadian government officials. The final determination was a quick-fix that will allow each tribe's identification cards to be used until further notice. About five hundred natives gathered at the old Chopaka crossing where the Colville Tribes had bought five hundred acres in the eighties. Herman Edwards and others with drums led a symbolic crossing of the border, where a barbed wire fence was cut down to make way for a short walk across the 49th parallel.

A longer term fix will be to redo tribal identifications that will include a computer chip that can be read at border crossings. This decision will not affect citizens with felonies, who may be turned away anyhow.

Historical, spiritual, and cultural ties between the tribes led to the "protest." As spoken during the epilogue and prayer by Joe Pierre of Pentiction, "if we'd taken care of our old Indian laws of long ago, we wouldn't be here today. A long time ago, we were one nation, not a bunch like now. We were one people with one language and way of life. There was no line across the land that said, 'stop, show me your paper that says you can cross here.'"

Jeanne Jerred, Keller district council representative, and Business Council chairman, said, "it's about time for all the natives of both sides of the border to work together for a single cause. Like it has been said before, there was no such thing as a border for our people before; and there shouldn't be now."

Keller Athletes Prove Impossible Is Nothing

YAKIMA, WA--The Wilbur-Creston-Keller baseball team won the first boy's team 1B title in Wildcat history at Parker Stadium in Yakima, on May 30.

The Wildcats prevailed 10-6 over Touchet in the title game; a game that took a complete team effort to win.

The road to the title game was not easy, as they had to claw their way through some tough competition and tough times.

To think, just two years ago they didn't even have a baseball team. With a group of gritty young athletes, a great coaching staff and an outpouring of support from the community, they proved anything is possible. They got a taste of defeat early in the season and took stride when it counted the most – the Playoffs.

The team rallied past Pateros and then defeated Northport with a late run in the final inning. That playoff win put them into the quarterfinals where they would face Curlew, the last team to defeat the Wildcats. On May 23, they returned that favor (10-6) and then went on to defeat Almira/Coulee-Hartline 8-4 in the semifinals at Avista Stadium in Spokane, and earned a chance to play for the State Championships in Yakima.

The championship team was made up of five players from each community, Wilbur, Creston, and Keller. Upon hearing the news of the accomplishments of the Keller area athletes, many of which are tribal members, the Colville Tribes stepped forward and purchased State Championship Sweatshirts for the entire team. The Colville Business Council wished the team the best of luck and hoped they had a memorable experience.

The team and coaching staff sent a letter of thanks that said in part: Your dedication to the students from the Keller area is very evident; this is evident through the pride they have shown. Your support throughout our playoff run has been overwhelming. We truly appreciate the support that you have shown all of the team, not just the Keller athletes.

The giant traveling trophy will be displayed at each community throughout the summer. It was proudly displayed at the Keller store for the first week and is now in Wilbur.

The team celebrated their title with a team barbecue June 4, and then gathered for their awards program at the Wilbur High School.

Sculpture signals time for change

SOAP LAKE, WA -- The town of Soap Lake's sculpture dedication ceremony on June 20, turned into a day of reconciliation between town and the Colville Confederated Tribes.

It had been more than 30 years since members of the Colville Tribes gathered on the shores of Soap Lake. The Colville's were ran out of town back in the 1960's and asked not to return. The tribes used to hold annual powwows, have horse races and play stickgame by the lake.

The feeling from the community is that they would like for them to return, and the words of Soap Lake Mayor Wayne Hovde "You are welcome. You are welcome forever," reinforced that sentiment.

With the spirit of the project being about healing the community invited the tribe back.

The Soap Lake Garden Club wanted to recognize the tribes that were here first by having the Seal of the Colville Tribes stamped into the sundial plaza.

Members of the Colville Business Council, powwow royalty and drum group along with several dancers attended the ceremony. Steve Iukes, Sr., said the opening prayer and North West Outlaws (Dan Nanamkin, Montee Nelson, Alton Kaulity, Walter Williams) drum group sang the honor song for the color guard.

Council members Deb Louie, Andy Joseph, Jr., and Juanita Warren gave a brief history the Colville Tribes and described our cultural ties to the area.

The sculpture "Calling the Healing Waters" was commissioned to honor the healing properties of the waters

of Soap Lake and the importance these waters had to the Indian tribes. The sculpture is a joint collaboration

project by artists David Govedare & Keith Powell depicting mother earth and father sky.

2009 Elections Results Reported

Political season comes to an end with the outcome of the 2009 elections held on the reservation and its four districts: Nespelem, Omak, Keller, and Inchelium. All of the incumbents were behind at the polls. For position number one in Nespelem, Deb Louie trailed Brian Nissen by a count of 110 to 172. For position number two, in the same district, Andy Joseph, Jr. trailed Darnell Sam by a count of 139 to 146. The concluding vote in this particular case ended with Deb Louie losing the election by a count of 300 to 356. Brian Nissen wins the

election; but it's not his first term in office. Meanwhile, Andy Joseph, Jr. defeated Darnell Sam by count of 368 votes to 297.

In the Omak district, position 1 incumbent Cherie Moomaw had won 106 votes at the polls, and then 95 votes in the absentee ballots. Michael Marchand had won 115 votes at the polls, and 200 absentee. Michael Marchand, former business council chairman, wins again! For position 2 incumbent Karen Condon won 92 votes at the polls, and 157 absentee. Her challenger, Shirley K. Charley won 126 votes at the polls, and 128 absentee. Shirley K. Charley wins again! She'd been on

the council before, too.

In Inchelium, Virgil Seymour, Sr. ran unopposed for the number 2 position. In the number one position incumbent Elizabeth Allen (Mason) won 71 votes at the polls, and 122 absentees. Her opponent, Doug Seymour won 84 votes at the polls,

and 84 absentees. The incumbent wins the election.

In the Keller district, John Stensgar defeated Lee Adolph for the only position available. At the polls John Stensgar won 35 votes; and then 73 absentees. Lee Adolph won 45 at the polls; and then 23 absentees.

Moses Update By Harvey Moses, Jr.

Tribal members:
I recently went for a drive in the hills around my home and with the quick weather warm up I would like to remind everyone to be very careful because it is already extremely dry. The plants have really shot up and it appears there are fires just waiting to start. Please, let's all do our best to prevent potential fires from starting, because it is too expensive to allow any more of our natural resources to go up in smoke.

The wildlife food supply must really be scarce out there for because for the first time since I've been living on Owhi Flats, on more than one occasion several bears have been coming to my home, as well as my neighbors and rummaging through garbage. It's been a real experience for my daughter who's been a city girl for approximately 20 years to now be dealing with wild animals so close up. Thanks to the quick action of our Fish & Wildlife department, the bears are removed for now.

I would also ask each of you to watch out for and protect one of our most important assets, which is our fire wood. Most of you know where I live off Cache Creek highway. I am seeing a lot of fire wood being taken off by vehicles and their hauling trailers down the highway. This is legal if the haulers are properly permitted tribal members, and the wood is for their own use or sale. Remember this reservation and its

natural resources belong to all of us enrolled members. I ask each of you to watch and call our tribal police department (634-4911) anything and anyone that appears questionable or suspicious.

The Colville Confederated Tribes (CCT) and Okanogan Nations Alliance (ONA) held a peaceful boarder crossing rally at a locale referred to as the Cutchie Property. The Tribe purchased this land, which abuts the Canadian Boarder, directly across from the Karamuse Reserve, and above Nighthawk. The rally participation turnout was good, and many speeches were made. Future meetings were scheduled for joint efforts to get passport and boarder crossing issues resolved, as well as, to begin working on other possibilities between the ONA and CCT. During the rally it was disclosed by a government official that we as natives can still use our blue cards to cross the border. This government official making the announcement did not give any specific timeframe as to the length of time this would be allowed. The contention is that we natives are being forced to live by this unwarranted standard of the federal government.

June 8, 2009, I traveled to the Coeur D' Alene Hotel Casino, to attend a Tribal Leaders Forum. The topics discussed were: Health Care on the Reservations, Trust Reform,

Taxation on Reservations, and Timber Stimulus possibilities. We elected a Chair and officially established a Trust Reform Committee at ATNI, the elected Chair is long time Chair and OST fighter, Ernie Stensgar.

The CCT Enrollment Code is now being amended to require DNA testing prior to enrollment, in all cases. Also, as things stand now, if an individual chooses to disenroll themselves from the CCT, that disenrollment is not effective until the other Tribe accepts that individual as an enrollee of their Tribe. The code is going to be amended so that the disenrollment is complete, when it is approved by Council resolution. Currently, if an adult chooses to disenroll themselves from the CCT, they can never be reenrolled. But if a child is disenrolled by their parent,

that child can reenroll themselves, at the age of 18 years, if they choose to do so.

I am getting a number of calls inquiring about an August Per Capita payment. There will be no payment. The per capita payment is dependant upon our timber stumpage income. Our mills are not selling and there is no market for our timber products, at this time. We are trying to develop other sources of income so we will not get into this situation again, but it will take time to get our feet on the ground. Our economy is no different than the world economy. If you watch the news, you see businesses still laying off and the unemployment rate still at it's highest. Many businesses, including mills have completely gone under. You've seen that the "big three" auto makers

in bankruptcy trouble; banks and lending institutions are very tightened up on the lending restrictions. We are hopeful that the economy will turn soon, because the stumpage dollars are also used to operate our tribal government.

The CBC will be negotiating with the Key Bank on the terms of Resolution 2009-330, regarding the CTEC bailout. It may not be as bad as first thought, but we are still not in the best financial position, when the Tribal government must continually assist in financial situations that CTEC has created. I realize that the politicians (myself included) are continually blamed for some of these situations; however, at some point in time tough decisions must be made. CTEC has to step up and demonstrate its ability to solely support itself and provide jobs for enrolled members of the Colville Indian Reservation.

Things have looked bleak for us, but on the positive note, let's

remember that if it were not for the Colville Confederated Tribes, North Central Washington would not be near as prosperous as it is. In reality would Omak have rapid the off reservation growth that their communities are experiencing with Walmart, Home Depot, and other large chains? Look at the expansion of the city of Chelan; once a seasonal community, until the Mill Bay Casino was established. We have so much opportunity within our reservation and our tribe, if we all work together to protect what is ours and strategically plan for our own responsible growth our future possibilities are endless.

The Turtle's Corner By Carleen Anderson

Dear Tribal Members:

Another Tribal Election Season has come and gone and we have change. Hopefully, change that will modify the way the Council does business. To say this was a frustrating year is an understatement. There was a clique in the last Council that continually held meetings with managers and CTEC without the knowledge of the rest of the Council, so often we didn't know what was going on until it hit the table. From my standpoint, that was how CTEC was able to get Resolution 2009-330 passed. As you'll recall, this is the resolution that stated the Tribes would assume nearly all of CTEC's debt so they could go out to borrow more money. Now I don't claim to be a fiscal wizard, but there is something wrong with that picture!

Anyway, there are Council coming on board the 9th of July (Swearing in day) that are making sounds like this assumption of debt isn't the best road to take for the Tribes. We are already financially hardput.

A number of members called me last week and asked why Administration was taking off at 2 p.m. on the 1st of July when they already had the 2nd & 3rd off. In asking the Executive Director, the response was that it was an "early release" and staff had to take leave. It still doesn't seem quite kosher to me. As a matter of fact, only the Executive Director can authorize this and administrative leave. The Council doesn't have anything to do with it.

I'd like to share with you're my vision for the next year:

1. Council takes steps to institutionalize how members are delegated to go to meetings. As it is currently, any CBC member who wants to travel, gets a delegation sheet, and obtains signatures from one Committee member and one Executive Committee Member. There are no designated Committees – so any CBC who roams into the room is the Committee and it changes from one meeting to the next. (Is this why we have so much chaos?)

2. Once delegated to travel, Council must report back to the full CBC. We have members who travel and have never let anyone know what they are doing or saying so they become the spokespersons for the Tribe and no one has a clue about what is being said!

3. Personally, I have gone on an expense system. This means I do not draw per diem. My flights, food, and rooms are paid for by credit card so I do not get the BIG per diem checks. It has proven to be a much more cost effective way to travel and saves the Tribes significant amounts of money. I challenge my colleagues to do likewise.

4. Once again, the membership needs to know that Council wages are \$24.11 per hour and we often work days, nights, and weekends – it's the nature of the job! Some of our managers are paid from \$80,000 to over \$100,000 a year. If you think there is disparity here, please let me know, ok?

We have a number of CBC now who have degrees (both BA and Masters) and a comparable wage would be nice for everyone at the table. We make decisions involving millions of dollars – probably more accurately – hundreds of millions of dollars, so you need some folks who can understand balance sheets and accounting and organizational dynamics.

5. Notes of Committee meetings must be transcribed in a timely manner. As it is now, in one committee, we are awaiting minutes from April – isn't

that too long? I believe so and hope that we can inspire Administration to take these recordings seriously and transcribe them as soon as possible. We sincerely appreciate our Council Secretary (CY) who transcribes for some Committees and is the recorder for our full Council meetings. She is fast and efficient. Her transcriptions are usually completed within a week. As Council, we appreciate that she works so hard. AND THE MINUTES SHOULD BE POSTED ON THE TRIBAL WEBSITE, so the membership can see what we are doing. Without knowledge of how your government works, how can you vote wisely at elections? You can't.

7. Have you been stunned by the employee travel? It's been exhorbitant. I heard one program is on a two-week junket – just how can our administration justify these expenses? If everyone went on expenses only, I bet the travel would be significantly curtailed. This is a goal for this year – cut back on the travel and associated costs

8. It is time for us to begin working on the FY 2010 Tribal Budget – after last year's "gnashing of teeth and pulling of hair", my hope is that this year will be smoother. There is still a big waste of Tribal money and, we as your elected leaders, need to flesh this out and assure your dollars are spent wisely and effectively.

9. My colleagues and I have talked about a whole new accountability for the Council and staff. We need it. We must bring back the honor to the Council that it once held and this means each of us must act and behave as elected officials. There is no room for "high school behavior". You should be proud of those you elect.

10. As a piece of earning your respect, CBC can no longer tolerate Council members who do not come to work, do not attend meetings, make their job full-time travel, and fail to give trip reports. The CBC has to "bite the bullet" and initiate checks and balance. It is unacceptable to have absentee Council members.

These are a few of my dreams for the year. It's my belief that if we set in our heads where we want to go, we subconsciously move toward it. (kind of like our old people who had visions of the future) I will print this and put it on my wall and hope that all of them come to be.

I haven't been able to keep my commitment to be at work at 7:30 a.m. every day. Because of medical issues, my mornings are filled w/ eating, taking meds, and pretty much trying to stay healthy so I can be a working member of the CBC. I often will not get in until about 8:15 a.m. and notoriously work long after everyone is gone. One night last week, it was midnight before I left the office. So I ask for and would appreciate your understanding.

The huckleberries are starting to ripen. For those of you who aren't home, my hope for you is to have family who will stash away some berries for you! The long, hot summer is here – the 4th of July is past for another year. Hope you all have a safe summer and remember. Always remember, this is always your home.

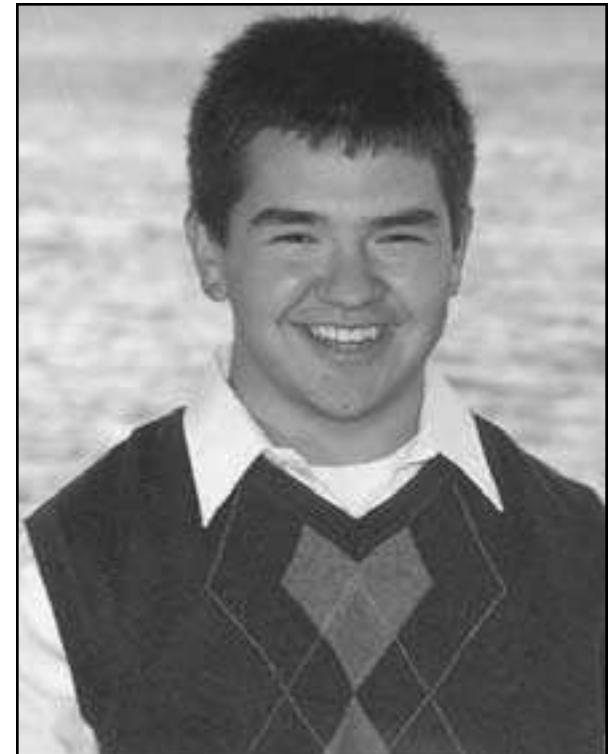

He is the first in our family to graduate high school. We are all just so proud of him and we want to let everyone in his family know.

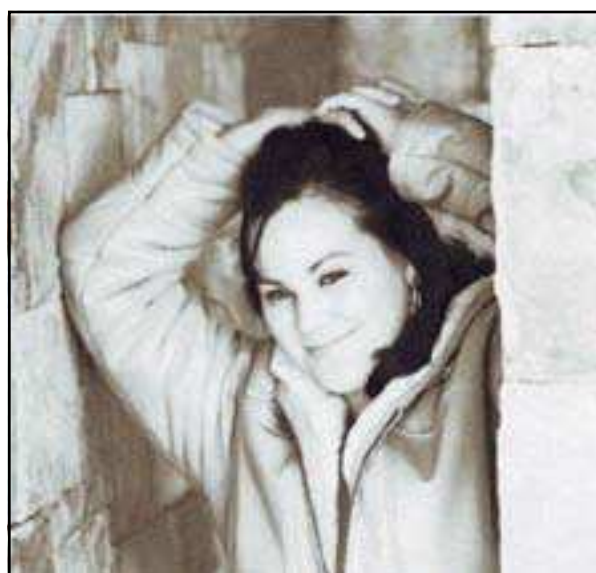

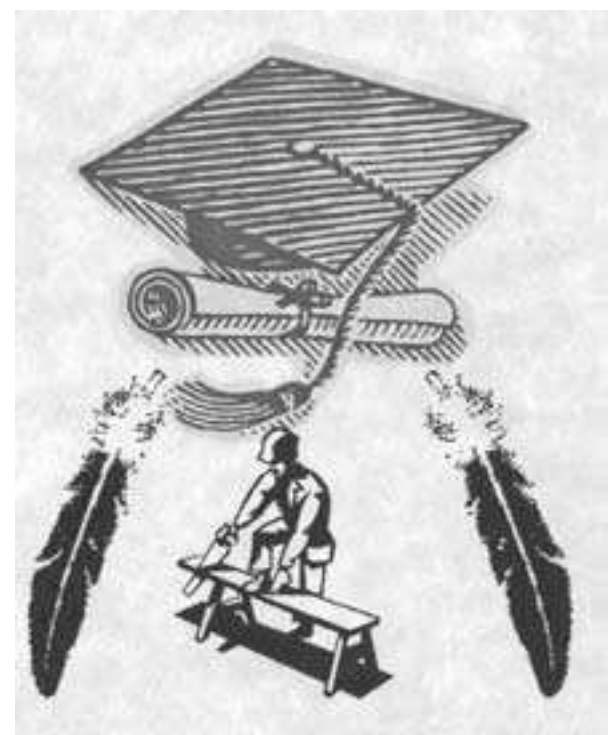

Colville students awarded scholarship

Angelena Compobasso-Comptor and Spusman Wilder, both members of the Colville tribe, were recently awarded scholarships for the 2009-2010 academic year by the Washington Indian Gaming Association (WIGA).

Angelena is currently pursuing a bachelor's degree at Eastern Washington University, and Spusman is working on an associate's degree at Salish Kootenai College in Pablos, Montana.

WIGA is a non-profit organization of tribal leaders in Washington state. It runs a scholarship program for tribal members pursuing higher education degrees. The program is designed to promote tribal self-sufficiency by providing scholarships for Native American students in Washington seeking to advance their own self-sufficiency and broaden their personal and professional potential through higher education. The organization also educates the Indian gaming community, the public and

all levels of government about gaming issues.

Angelena received a \$1,200 scholarship—the amount allotted to undergraduate students. Spusman was awarded the \$900 scholarship for associate's degree candidates.

Enrolled members of the WIGA tribes and Indian students in Washington state are eligible. Scholarships are awarded to students pursuing degrees at community and technical colleges, four-year colleges, and post-graduate and professional schools.

"This year, we had many qualified applicants to choose from, which made our selection process very difficult," said WIGA chairman W. Ron Allen. "But it reflects the increasing depth of talent among young tribal members. The winners should be very proud of themselves for standing out among their peers."
 WIGA awarded a total of \$30,000 in scholarship funds to 25 students.

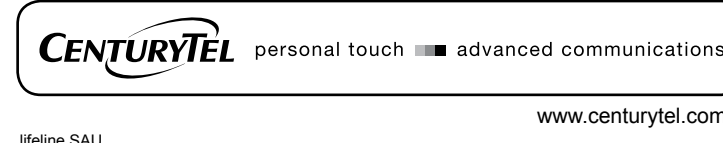
CenturyTel offers telephone assistance to individuals living on Tribal Lands

Consumers living on a federally-recognized tribal land may qualify for assistance programs that discount initial telephone installation and basic monthly residential service. CenturyTel is spreading the word about the programs so tribal residents who participate in federal or state assistance programs may apply for the phone discounts.

The assistance programs, known as Link-Up and Enhanced Tribal Lifeline, are available to qualifying tribal residents and vary from state to state, depending on whether the state has its own Lifeline program. Link-Up support for tribal lands provides a discount on the initial installation of a traditional, wireline telephone for a primary residence. The Enhanced Tribal Lifeline Assistance program enables participants to receive basic monthly telephone service, depending on current rates, at their primary residence for as little as one dollar a month.

Residents of American Indian and Alaskan Native tribal lands may qualify for Enhanced Tribal Lifeline discounts of up to \$35 per month on basic monthly telephone service and up to \$70 of expanded Link-Up support beyond current levels. An individual living on tribal lands may qualify for Enhanced Tribal Lifeline and Link-Up discounts if he or she participates in one of the following programs: Medicaid, food stamps, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Federal Public Housing Assistance or the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), Head Start, Tribally-Administered Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TTANF), Tribal National School Lunch Program, and Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance, or have a household annual gross income at or below 135 percent of the federal poverty level.

Individuals living in a CenturyTel service area should call 800-201-4099 and ask for Tribal Lifeline or visit www.centurytel.com/lifeline to inquire about eligibility. Residents living outside of the CenturyTel service area should contact their local phone company for more information.

Sk^want 4-H Life Science Camp -Another Great Year!



The 3rd Annual Sk^want 4-H Life Science Camp was held June 15 – 19 at Paschal Sherman Indian School in Omak, WA. Sk^want 4-H Life Science Camp is part of WSU Colville Reservation Extension's STAR Program (Science and Technology Across the Reservation). This camp is five fun-filled educational days of science, teambuilding, and life skills. Through their participation, campers learn the importance of higher education, goal setting and a wide range of life skills that they can draw upon for a lifetime. The goal is for these young scientists to become the leaders of tomorrow. Through generous donations from outside

organizations, youth were able to attend and participate free of charge.

Sk^want 4-H Life Science Camp brought together over 50 volunteers, from across the state, to create an experience for campers that engaged and inspired students about education, science, and their future. These volunteers consisted of research scientists, Native American students, student athletes, 4-H challenge volunteers and current WSU students. This camp made science fun and presented learning as an active and hands-on experience.

Campers completed a variety of hands on experiments. One of the most popular experiments was facilitated by Bellevue College Chemistry professor, Dr. Jeannie Mayer PhD, where the students made hand stirred ice cream using liquid nitrogen. Some of the students also talked a lot about the beautiful reactions demonstrated by Dr. Ursula Mazur, PhD and Dr. K.W. Hipps, PhD. Dr. Hipps is currently the Dean of the Chemistry Department at Washington State University. Presenters like Dr. Hipps is what makes Sk^want 4-H Life Science Camp really stand out. Dr. Hipps is a top researcher in his field, as are many of the faculty whom volunteer to demonstrate the opportunities for our reservation's potential young scientists. Sk^want 4-H Life Science Camp is a part of a larger Extension and USDA-ARS science project on the reservation, where WSU and USDA researchers periodically visit schools to encourage and engage students in science and math. Sherry "Bear" Johnson, 50, of Keller, WA, was this year's recipient of a \$1,170 Susan G. Koman grant for cancer survivors. The grant was established several years ago to help cancer survivors defray costs of travel to and from hospital visits or treatment centers, hotel stays, and food costs. In this case, Bear had to travel as far as Wenatchee for treatment

Bear, as she's commonly known in the Keller community, was diagnosed at the Keller clinic a year ago after she'd undergone a screening and mammogram. She'd since then gone to Wenatchee for a biopsy, and on 9/11 opted for breast removal. In retrospect, the grant helped cover the costs of eight weeks of travel for

chemotherapy at Omak, and eight weeks of radiation treatment. She's now hopeful that it's all gone.

As for her learning experience from all of this she says, "I hope everyone will submit to screening. A lot of us have lost family members to this disease in the past, and a lot of us might lose family members in the future. But if we can prevent it from happening to us now, we should do what we can about it."

National HIV & STD Testing Resources

A Health Message from your Tribal Health Staff

Should I get an HIV Test?
The following are behaviors that increase your chances of getting HIV. If you answer yes to any of them, you should definitely get an HIV test. If you continue with any of these behaviors, you should be tested every year. Talk to a health care provider about an HIV testing schedule that is right for you.

*Have you injected drugs or steroids or shared equipment (such as needles, syringes, works) with others?

*Have you had unprotected vaginal, anal, or oral sex with men who have sex with men, multiple partners, or anonymous partners?

*Have you exchanged sex for drugs or money?

*Have you been diagnosed with or treated for hepatitis, tuberculosis

(TB), or a sexually transmitted disease (STD), like syphilis?

*Have you had unprotected sex with someone who could answer yes to any of the above questions?

If you have had sex with someone whose history of sex partners and/or drug use is unknown to you or if you or your partner has had many sex partners, then you have more of a chance of being infected with HIV. Both you and your new partner should get tested for HIV, and learn the results, before having sex for the first time.

For women who plan to become pregnant, testing is even more important. If a woman is infected with HIV, medical care and certain drugs given during pregnancy can lower the chance of passing HIV to her baby. All women who are pregnant should be tested during each pregnancy.

OUR CHILDREN ARE SCARED

What can you do to lower your Baby's risk of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome(SIDS)?

- Invite a Public Health Nurse to visit you and your baby at home
- Keep soft things away from your baby's sleep area such as stuffed toys, pillows, quilts, and sheepskins to avoid suffocation.
- Consider using a pacifier when putting the baby down to sleep
- Breastfeeding, Breastfeeding, Breastfeeding
- Always put your baby on his or her back to sleep

What increases the risk of SIDS?

- An unsafe sleep environment can be very risky. Some dangerous places for your baby to sleep are:
- Soft mattresses

- Waterbeds
 - Any soft surface
 - Couches, sofas or armchairs
 - Smoking or allowing anyone else to smoke around your baby anywhere in the house or the care is unsafe.
 - Using alcohol while you are pregnant or breastfeeding is unsafe
 - Dressing babies too warmly may cause them to overheat. They can sleep comfortably in light clothing.

FOOD REALLY MATTERS

Summer is approaching !! This is an ideal time to locate a Farmer's Market near you. From what we know about vegetables and fruits and their antioxidants and other phytonutrients, this is an excellent place to take advantage of what a local market can offer. If you need help locating a market close to you, call the Tribal Health office and check with any of the CHR's.. The next step is to "browse" the market, identify the vendors who have the freshest produce. What could be better than to eat a fresh ear of corn on the cob that was picked just that morning?! Go as early as you can to get the best choices. This is a great time to try a brand new fruit or vegetable. If you are unsure how to use it, ask the vendor for some tips on how to prepare it. If you can't find any recipes for your choice, you may always call me at my number listed below and I will get some for you !

Be sure to buy a variety of colors, the deeper the better, to make sure you are getting all the nutrients and antioxidants you can get.

Check your produce carefully: Vegetables should have a smooth, shiny, crisp skin. Avoid produce that is bruised, wrinkled, overripe or discolored. Green beans should have smooth, crisp pods. Tomatoes should feel firm and solid. Bright red means they are ripe and ready! Remove the corn husks to view the corn kernels and make sure they are plump and tightly packed. Choose peppers that are firm. Make sure you wash all produce when you get home with cold running water, before cutting or eating any. If you get a really good price, you may want to buy a large amount and try freezing or canning it for year-round eating. You can spread grapes, melon balls, cherries, and berries on a cookie sheet and placed in freezer; and once frozen they can be put into freezer bags for the summer.

Eating 6-10 servings of vegetables and fruits a day can help control your diabetes and reduce your risk of cancers and heart disease

GREEN BEAN SALAD WITH EGG TOPPING

INGREDIENTS:
1 ½ LBS green beans, trimmed and stringed
salt
2 Tbs garlic oil
1 oz margarine
1 Cup fresh bread crumbs (soft wheat bread is nice for this)
4 Tbs. chopped fresh parsley
1-2 hard-boiled eggs, peeled
Bring a large saucepan of salted water to boil. Add the beans & cook for 6 minutes. Drain well, toss in garlic oil, and allow to cool.
Heat the butter in a skillet, add the bread crumbs and fry until golden.
Remove from heat, add the parsley, then grate in the hard-cooked egg.
Place the beans in a serving dish and spoon on the bread crumb/egg mixture.

Inchelium Repeats Third Place

Serena Condon doesn't settle for fourth.

"I think we just thought of it as the same situation as we were in last year: Anything was possible," she said. "We just pretty much put our hearts into every game to get our trophy, at least."
Especially a trophy taken away from a rival St. Michaels team that beat them three times to open the season, and a team Inchelium used as a footstep to the state tournament in a district tournament opening-round beating.

"It was ten times more exciting, because they're our league rivals," she said. "And they smoked us earlier in the year."

Down 5-4 with two outs and two runners on in the top of the seventh inning, the Inchelium senior unloaded her second home run of the State 1B Tournament in what was to be her final at bat, rallying the Hornets for a 7-5 victory at the Gateway Sports Complex in Yakima.

"My team was relying on me to get a base hit," Condon said. "I was taking wind and pumpin' up, and had my team running through my head."

The third place finish was Inchelium's second in as many years.

It was also the second time in as many years that the Hornets faced the eventual State champion in the first round.

"Two years in-a-row we've played and lost to the state champion in the first game," said Inchelium coach Jerry Signor.

And two years in-a-row Inchelium has rallied back, and brought hardware home through a tough stretch of games in high heat.

With the culmination of the season, the Hornets lose three seniors.

Condon, who resurrected the team in two separate games with home runs, Jordan Signor, who struck out 26 in four tournament games, and Tomi Simpson, the team's shortstop and No. 2 batter.

"We had great senior leadership all year long," coach Signor said. "It's going to be tough to replace them."

On the flipside, the Hornets had promising performances from their freshmen and eighth graders.

"The girls bought into the work ethic system and depending on how much work they put in, we'll be fine next year," Signor said. "They're going to be some ballplayers when their seniors."

The Inchelium Hornets would like to thank the Colville Tribal Business Council and TANF, for their support this season.

Inchelium 7, St. Michaels 5

After leading the third and fourth place game versus St. Michaels all the way through the fifth inning, the Hornets found themselves down 5-4 in the top of the seventh with their No. 6 batter leading off.

Things didn't look good — one eighth-grader and three freshmen batting in-a-row with your state tournament hopes on the line.

After a flyout to start the inning, Inchelium freshman Nicole Simmons reached base on a hard-hit base on error.

And then Sarah Finley came to the plate — clearly rattled.

"She got the bunt signal and panicked when the pitch came," Hornets coach Jerry Signor said. "We had to call a time out, she was sobbing."

Signor called for the high-pressure bunt, again, in the next at bat.

Whiff, again.

"She said she couldn't do it," Signor said. "I told her it's time to toughen up."

The coach waved off the bunt with two strikes, and signaled her to hit away.

Finley, a freshman, then hit a single down the first base line and kept the comeback intact.

Shayleen Finley then advanced the base runners on a sacrifice bunt, and the Hornets reached the top of their lineup.

Serena Condon then launched her — aforementioned — home run to put Inchelium up 7-5, before the side was retired two batters later.

"All we had to do was hold 'em," Signor said of the bottom of the seventh inning.

Jordan Signor struck out the first batter and forced the second to pop up, before fanning the third to close the game with the Hornets as the State's third place team.

"I was ecstatic," coach Signor said. "After the game everyone was celebrating. I told the girls 'these seniors helped you grow, you better go mug them.'"

"It was great," he added. "The girls stepped up and did everything they could do to the best of their ability."

Signor, the pitcher, had six strikeouts in the game. The Hornets were led offensively by Condon and Tomi Simpson, who each had two hits, and Nikki Fry powered a triple.

Notes: The Hornets lost three times to St. Michaels during the season, but beat the Warriors twice in a district tournament first round match and the State Third and Fourth Place game.

Inchelium 12, Thorpe-Easton 6

The Hornets opened up the third inning of their loser-out game to Thorpe-Easton down 3-0, until a Serena Condon three run homer tied the game, and started an Inchelium rally that would end in a win.

"It was just one that we weren't going to give up," Hornets coach Jerry Signor said. "We answered everything they had and our defense held up."

Six runs would be scored by the Hornets in the inning, including an inside the park home run by freshman Anissa Jerred, and they wouldn't look back.

"That inning just relaxed

everybody and after that we just scored more," coach Signor said.

The Hornets tallied 12 hits in the contest en route to their 12 runs. Condon and Tomi Simpson led the team's offensive attack, each getting three hits. And Nikki Fry added two hits.

Jordan Signor pitched for the Hornets, striking out seven in the game.

Thorpe-Easton would get runs in the fourth and fifth innings, but were shutout in the final two.

"It was a pitching duel," coach Signor said.

The win eliminated Thorpe-Easton and advanced the Hornets to the Third and Fourth place game with St. Michaels.

Inchelium 9, Lake Quinalt 2

Jordan Signor struck out 10 batters and Nikki Fry was perfect from the plate, as the Hornets eliminated Lake Quinalt 9-2.

"It was a good game," said Inchelium coach Jerry Signor, whose team had 11 hits. "We hit the ball, put the ball in play and Jordan was awesome."

Fry went 3 for 3 from the plate,

and the Hornets scored runs in every inning but the fourth.

"We ran the bases smarter and just played relaxed and confident," Signor said.

Inchelium also got doubles from Serena Condon and Donna Villegas.

The win advanced the Hornets to a consolation matchup with Thorpe-Easton.

Colton 12, Inchelium 1 (5 inn.)

Colton scored nine runs in the third inning against the Hornets, and Inchelium saw its No. 1 seeded hopes succumb to the 10-run rule in the fifth inning of the tournament-opening game.

"We were nervous and scared," said Hornets coach Jerry Signor.

The Wildcats had 14 hits in the ballgame to Inchelium's 4.

Serena Condon scored the Hornets lone run after reaching base via a double.

The loss put Inchelium in the consolation bracket, and matched them with Lake Quinalt.

Notes: Colton allowed two runs in the entire tournament en route to capturing the 1B State title.

Tommy Louie, Lakes Indian band member, from Inchelium began with a few words in Indian and a prayer. And then the forty some participants were instructed to find two rocks; that which would be struck together under the water of Omak creek. This said and done replicated the sound of thunder that told of the coming of the salmon.

a huge undertaking. Something they never knew would really be successful, but the salmon can return to spawn there once again.

Lionel Orr, a tribal member from Omak, sang a song that his people used to celebrate the coming of the salmon. It was a song of celebration and happiness. The people long ago knew the salmon must go to the ocean to live for a part of the year, and then return to spawn and die on the banks of the Omak tributary.

Bob Campbell, Lakes Indian, wondered if the tribe didn't do things backwards. "It seems to me," he spoke in Indian and then English, "maybe we should have got rid of some of the cattle upstream first, and then tried to clean up the water. Because as long as cattle's upstream, their waste is coming down the stream."

Joe Peone, tribal member, and the Director of the CCT Fish and Wildlife department spoke of the history of the program and the initial plan to clean up of the creek to clear the way for the salmon to return. He told about other creeks the salmon swam up to spawn; some salvageable, some maybe not. But the sole intent of having salmon come back up the creek that was once blocked by the Biles and Coleman sawmill was



Response to the recent zero tolerance article

Re: Opinion Letter for Proposed New Chapter

This letter is in response to the recent article in the Tribal Tribune on newly proposed rules for tribal members who use, sell or manufacture illegal drugs and who are convicted in a Federal, State or Tribal Court.

While I respect the idea of polling the community and getting a response to such extreme proposals, on the face of it, this plan seems to be an extreme reactionary response that is disproportionate, especially when considering it against other social ills affecting our community.

To be absolutely clear, I do not favor such a harsh, seemingly noncompassionate and over reactive initiative, especially considering how often history has proven such socially driven responses to be overreaching time and time again. Nothing in this proposal said anything about conceiving a program that would aim to address the underlying issues specific to this crisis in our community, of which I certainly agree exists, but of which, I do not

believe necessitates a crime and punishment framework in which to birth a solution.

We need to come together as a community to identify what is the underlying causal factors of this crisis and related community health issues like alcoholism. If we look closely we will discover that there is an underlying common denominator to these problems and we need to be creative in our effort to design the web of assessments, social engineering programs and support and prevention efforts that will lend compassion to a serious issue affecting our community; an issue that demands a sophisticated and multi-pronged approach to a complex problem.

I am presently serving a twelve and a half (12-1/2) year Federal sentence for a drug related offense. I have taken responsibility for my crime, paid the restitution required and spend every day experiencing the failures of an ill conceived correctional system. I am someone who will get out of where I'm at and

will successfully transition back to my community and back to the tribe. So many of the other inmates I share space with, most of them in fact, will not. They will recommit and be back here in a short time. I hear what they are saying when one gets closer to leaving. Most of them say the same things, that they have no place to go, no job, no programs to access, are afraid of this new world with all kinds of technological advances and cultural shifts to go along with them and it just becomes too much for an ex-felon to master.

While locking up all of our problems under lock and key at remote locations is the historical norm for this country, it has proven to be disastrous when considering the recidivism rate of felons which proves overwhelmingly that prisons do not rehabilitate. Now consider this reality alongside what you're proposing. The cards are already stacked against most felons when they return to the streets and attempt to reacclimate to their communities. Your proposal suggests further

stripping them of their Tribal benefits that are specific to their ability or inability to enjoy their land, heritage, and fellow people. I beg the question: Will we then be surprised when we have created a slew of horrific outcomes as a result of this decision, if realized?

I'm proposing a seismic paradigm shift in the way we are thinking about his challenge. Let's get out the "drawing board" and start over. Only when we have identified the roots to these problems and begun to meet the needs of our community members in big creative ways are we to then have the moral bearings to carefully consider even half of such a proposal and only with the absolute knowing that as a community, we gave it our best in all the many areas of strategic planning and services that would be necessary given the task before us.

I must admit that I was humbled today, when a lady told me that she remembered reading my letters to the Tribal Tribune a few years back. She spoke of my baby sister Morgan, and Virgil, which made me feel good to know that other people still think of them. She also said that she felt that no one really cares about our Women and that her sister was also raped and that my letter really touched her.

We are a "victim blaming" society, and it is us victims that have to pick ourselves up and put our lives back together after "whoever" takes it upon themselves to rip it apart! I am not only talking about rape. I am also talking about domestic violence, child abuse, molestation and drug abuse!

People tend to turn a blind eye to what they know is happening or has happened. It is sad that victims are made to believe that they had done something wrong and that is why

there were hurt.

Well, I do not consider myself a victim... I am a survivor of many of the issues I have mentioned. But I did not let some weak man take my strength away. If anything, I am actually stronger because of what he did. It helped me to make the changes I needed to be a better person. So I guess in a sort of sick way, he did me a favor. And I pray every day that because I was able to report my rape, that I saved at least one woman from ever being hurt by him.

After my first letter, I had a lot of women come up to me and actually thank me for writing it. They would tell me that they were also hurt by someone and some were able to report it, but most felt they were alone. So who ever hurt them never had to pay for what they did.

I haven't had to deal with that issue for a while, besides having to see my rapist around town on my

daily commutes. So it was a big surprise when...

One day my eldest son came home from school and asked me about the man who raped me and was he married to one of his aunts. WOW! I had to think for a while on this question, because I had never broached the subject with him, he is but "10" years old.

As I picked my words carefully, I explained to him what happened to me and what I did about it. He asked if I was scared that he would hurt me again, and I said "No." Then he asked if his auntie knew what he did to me, and I said, "Yes." He hasn't brought it up again, but I know he thought long and hard on the subject.

As I live my life with my man and we raise our children, we talk to them every day about making healthy choices and how their choices can affect so many people. It is hard to raise children these days with so

many temptations at every turn. It is so easy for good kids to go bad, it is up to us parents to raise them to be strong and to love themselves enough to make the right choices.

I pray every day, that what we teach our children will have a lasting effect, long after we are gone. And we try to answer their questions as honestly as we can, so that they can understand, and we try to protect them as best we can. But most of all I love them more than anything else in this world, everything that I do is for my family, as it should be.

Thank you for reading my letter and I thank the lady who lifted my spirit by acknowledging my words today. I guess I have to say that, "Yes, people do care." Congratulations to the incumbents who retained their seats; you must be doing something right, good luck incoming council. Each election year should be a renewal of all that is good for the tribe. I encourage reorganized council to let the negative go, move forward together in the best interest of the people. The infighting of council the past year, has been embarrassing to subject our tribal legacy to. I still have concerns with the election

process. I have over 100 returned campaign letters because of wrong addresses from May's Primary. I am deeply troubled by the campaign booze parties held in the Nespelem District to get votes. Alcohol and drugs are responsible for tragic injuries and death of our young. It is my prayer our people change for the better. If you are 21 or older, alcohol is legal. Don't provide alcohol and drugs to minors. I believe our future generations deserve elected leaders based on integrity and leadership skills. I hope this trend of "booze-for-votes", does not continue.

Moving on, conduct an immediate forensic audit of CTEC. Keep tribal members employed at CTEC. My best recommendation is to build a

destination casino resort in Moses Lake. The Colville Tribe needs to do something NOW! Any CTEC loans should be wise investments, not wasted money for a nonsense "balloon" over Mill Bay. Our reservation casinos have maxed their customer potential. None of our rez casinos will ever "boom". We need take a chance, like the Spokanes, Kalispels and Cd'A's. Those tribes "gambled on their gaming", and look what they achieved today. The Colville Tribe opted out, and lost out. Moses Lake is the prime location on the Washington east-west throughway, where we can intercept the gaming traffic going to, and from, the coast. Tri-cities is in close proximity. The Moses

I have not always made the right choices, and I am an alcoholic, and recently been diagnosed with PTSD and bi-polar, and I have been doing my part in getting care for this.

I don't know what type of assistance you can do for me. I am just asking if you can look into these statements.

One way or another, I will attempt to find the rules and regulations. If I have to, I will get outside help on this case. I thank you for your time and hopefully assistance in this matter.

I want to start with an explanation and a public apology

To all my relations, Hello, my name is James H. Gallaher, Jr. "Jamie." I have something to say now, so please hear me, listen; I think and feel that these things are important. So I ask you for 5-10 minutes of your day. All of you, fellow Tribal members, and especially you, our elected Tribal Leaders, first, I want to start with an explanation and a public apology. Then something for you all to think about. Because who knows, it could be you next who is subjected to the white man's laws and how they are applied to the people on our Reservation. Then I want to close with another apology. To the family of Ed Pooler, my family, I am so very sorry that this terrible accident occurred all those years ago. I did not intend, mean for Eddy to die. I get a phone call from my daughter's mother at the War Bonnet tavern in Nespelem. She was screaming that Ed had just walked up to my baby girl while she was in her walker, unzipped his jeans and just started urinating all over

my baby. Of course, I immediately became upset and started for the door, when a guy named Leonard asked for a ride to Keller and jumped on with me. I drove straight to Alice Flats, Ed's house at 100 mph plus, arrived and confronted Ed. I hit him one time by the ear with my right hand and he just died right there. Leonard started cussing around on how he didn't want to go to prison with me for this, and that we should just bring him out to the bush and leave him. I made a terrible decision then and there, that ate me alive for years, I took my cousin up on the hill there and left him, and for this I am so very sorry. I attempted to come forward back in 1992, with my then attorney, who basically told me to shut up. Dick, you and Linda have known the why and how this all happened for 12-14 years, as I know Leonard told you both. I only wish that I'd been charged long ago, that I could've come forward and apologized and faced my punishment for my actions long ago. I was sentenced to the statutory

maximum of 6 years, 72 months as you all know by now, and I have to accept this because I do feel that I deserve punishment for my actions all those years ago. Now here's something for all of you to think on, and maybe ask our Tribal leaders how these things can happen. Some 6 months, 20 days before I accidentally killed Ed, Lloyd E. Gibson, a non-Indian from Keller, Wa., Alice Flats, hunted down with a 30-30 Win. rifle Teel Dodson Largo, an Indian on our Reservation. Gibson drove from his house at Alice Flats over to Owhi Loop Road, found Largo, walked him down into the brush at gunpoint, and then shot Teel Dodson Largo, in the head. Lloyd E. Gibson "90-1-00026-5 Ferry County Court Records, Cost \$75.00 for transcripts. Mr. Lloyd E. Gibson received 127 days in Ferry County jail for this first degree premeditated murder of an Indian on our Reservation and was released 2/5/91. I received an 18 times greater of a sentence for an accidental killing, for which the papers printed: "at first blush, a four to six year sentencing range may appear to be inadequate punishment in this case". Assistant U.S. Attorney Joseph Harrington wrote.

Do you remember back in the late '90's when those 3 non-Indians kidnapped, tied up, mutilated, tortured and then murdered one of our Tribal elders, Pete Swimkin, in Keller Wa.? How is it that I served more time in federal prison for being Indian, ex-felon in possession of ammunition, yes, bullets! Than these three did in State prison for such a terrible, terrible crime committed on our Reservation?

Next, there's the most recent case of Vern Hiezer, a non-Indian from Nespelem, school teacher, reserve police officer, who raped a little girl, who, if not Indian, is a direct descendent of an enrolled Colville Tribal member, (so I was told) and therefore, she would be recognized as "Indian" for federal jurisdictional purposes, but, how it is that this non-Indian can rape a Indian child on our Reservation, be arrested, then released on P.R. and then yet again be arrested for stalking this child, then receive 6 months in Okanogan Co. jail. Please hear me, on March 18, 1987, Retrocession became effective on our Reservation, and the State of Washington lost its criminal jurisdiction, the U.S. Federal District Court has "exclusive" jurisdiction over interracial crimes on our Reservation by and through 18 USC/1152!

So how is it that these non-Indians who have committed crimes against Indians on our Reservation prosecuted in State Courts? When these State Courts are without jurisdiction to try these cases? Why didn't the United State's Attorney's office try these crimes committed within Indian Country (as defined by 18USC/1151) against Indians by non-Indians? I ask you, all of my fellow tribal members, our elected Tribal Councilmen for help in resolving this matter. We need these issues (all) addressed because at this time non-Indians can commit crimes against Indians on our reservation with little or no real punishment.

Lastly, I want to apologize to my daughter, who is the real victim in this whole tragic mess that nobody seems to even acknowledge. Forgive me, daughter, for leaving you that day with your mother at Ed Pooler's house, allowing him the opportunity to abuse you as such. It was totally my fault that you became the victim in all this and for that I am so sorry. I failed you, daughter of mine, as I had filed to gain custody of you but allowed your mother to manipulate me into not pursuing the court proceedings.

I hope that the Tribal Tribune will print this, and thank them for doing so. I would also like to thank our Tribal leaders for a few minutes of their day, and any and all efforts on their part to help me in these matters; as well I would thank all my fellow Tribal members for their time and efforts as well. Everything here is the truth as far as I know it.
