Some progress?

Short-and long-term pay increase options are at the heart of a mediator's factfinding report issued Tuesday to the Del Norte County Unified School District and the Del Norte Teachers Association.

The report by Renée Mayne, an arbitrator

and mediator for the state Public Employees Relations Board, is a non-binding recommendation stemming from a meeting Dec. 5 between the district and the teachers, after they had reached an impasse despite nearly a year of negotiations.

The mediator's short-term recommendation is a 2% increase in

both teacher salaries and teacher flat-dollar stipends, effective July 1, 2019.

According to the report, this option would not guarantee additional salary hikes in future years.

The cost to the school district was estimated at

WINTER STORM CLOSES HWY 199; FLOOD RISK HERE

Officials closed U.S. Highway 199 early Thursday morning, from its junction with U.S. Highway 197 to the California-Oregon border, because of heavy snow and fallen trees in the Smith River

Canyon.

By 9:49 a.m., reported the California Department of Transportation, the highway had been cleared and was reopened – only to be closed again at 10:43 - only to be reopened again at 1:10 p.m.

The California Highway Patrol said in a Facebook post prior to the road being reopened that vehicles

were being escorted through the canyon.

Caltrans, Frontier, Pacific Power and Charter were on Highway 199 assisting and working to keep the roads clear.

School board recall is threatened

While Del Norte County Unified School District faculty contract negotiations continue, a community member is offering his solution to the stalemate.

Former Del Norte Teachers Association representative Mike Mealue has served notices of his intent to circulate a petition to recall each of the school board members as well as school Superintendent Jeff Harris.

Mealue told the board during the public comment portion of its Jan. 9 meeting that during his 30 years with the school district, including 10 as the teachers' union president, he directed an election campaign that defeated two school board incumbents, and helped gain voter approval of a \$25-million bond measure in 2008.

"In my opinion, the current impasse has nothing to do with money. It is about ego and power," Mealue said to the board members. "It is about ego and power."

"I apologize to those trustees who quietly supported employees. I just don't know who you are."

Mealue said he had yet to receive any support from the teachers' union for his recall efforts, but warned the board that a successful petition drive would set the district back \$60,000 in special election costs.

Harris responded that anyone has the right to initiate a notice of recall campaign, which involves basically gathering names on a petition and submitting it to the Del Norte County Elections Office.

"I would say I'm disappointed someone feels that's the only recourse left at this point, when the district and bargaining teams continue to talk," added Harris.

"I completely understand the frustration at this point, especially since the negotiations are confidential. I truly, sincerely hope we come to an

School board member has resigned to relocate

A new wrinkle has cropped up in the labor dispute between the Del Norte Unified School District and the Del Norte Teachers Association.

School board member Roger Daley, who represents District 4, has resigned to seek a job in Reno, Nevada.

District Superintendent Jeff Harris told The TriPLICATE that Daley submitted a letter of resignation to the board before its Jan. 9 meeting. Harris subsequently notified the Del Norte Elections Office on Jan. 13.

Daley, a pastor at Fort Dick Bible Church, said in media reports that his resignation had nothing to do with the ongoing negotiations between the district and its teachers. He said he's relocating for professional reasons.

Harris told The TriPLICATE that during Daley's three years on the school board, he brought well-articulated views to the members' discussions. "He's been an advocate for alternative education. He has been supportive of many of the student services we have, for foster youth, special education, the homeless, general operations of what goes on at schools," Harris said.

Now, according to board bylaws,

the school district will begin an immediate public-notification process in posting for Daley's position. The bylaws give the district 60 days to advertise the position and solicit applications.

A committee will be formed to determine candidates' eligibility and will announce certain candidates' names. The remaining board members will then host candidate interviews in a public forum.

After the interviews, the board can receive verbal or written comments before voting to select one of the candidates to fill the remainder of Daley's four-year term.

A new slate of candidates will be eligible to run for the position in

this coming November's election.

Harris said school board positions are not salaried. Rather, board members receive a per-meeting stipend, and also are eligible for health insurance or a reimbursement for a qualifying health plan similar to teachers and administrators.

School board members are paid \$264 per month for attending all of the scheduled district meetings, and \$174 per month for

attending all designated county meetings. Harris said that includes special meetings, study sessions and any emergency meetings that arise.

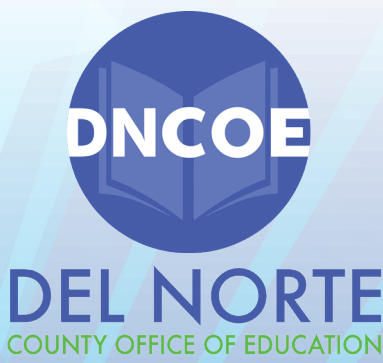

Del Norte students dance towards opening night

Cue the lights, costumes and music.

The Del Norte High School dance team will perform “The Greatest Show,” its winter concert, at Crescent Elk Middle School’s auditorium in Crescent City this Friday and Saturday.

The performances begin at 7 p.m.

After more than three months of practice and hard work, the

dancers came together this week for their final run-throughs and dress rehearsals.

The team consists of students from the high school’s dance classes taught by Katie Peña. Ninety of her students will perform this week, with all 150 of her students performing during the dance team’s upcoming spring concert.

As with previous winter concerts, this weekend’s performances will follow a set of themes, including modes of transporta-

tion, life in the military, the seven deadly sins, and a variety of musicals.

The first theme flows through a set of four travel methods: boats, race cars, airplanes and walking. From there, the dancers take the audience through the life of a soldier, then the seven deadly sins.

The second half of the show will be a delight for theater junkies, as it focuses entirely on show tunes with a musical theater theme. “The whole second half is probably

my favorite, because we’ve never really done anything like that before,” Peña told The Triuplicate.

Nearly all of the dances are choreographed by students, such as the “Mamma Mia” piece designed by senior Grace Mayes. Mayes, president of the Dance 3 class, has participated in six performances with the team during her high school years.

She said her favorite aspect of this concert is seeing the dancers collaborate. “Just see-

ing everybody coming together and working so hard to make sure that everything’s done, because we’ve struggled a little bit this year. But we’ve pulled it together pretty good.”

For some of the seniors, the winter concert creates a bit off melancholy, since it will be their next-to-last high school performance. “I’m super sad and it’s starting to hit,” said senior and Dance 3 vice president Simone Magarino.

“It’s just dance, but

then it’s like, ‘Oh, wait, that’s like a part of your life.’ Kinda crazy.”

Magarino not only dances during the performance, she also runs the lights - a creative endeavor in itself, given that each dance has unique lighting.

Pre-sale tickets to the performance are \$8 and available at Del Norte Office Supply. Tickets are \$10 at the door, \$5 for students and seniors, \$3 for children 6 to 12, and free for children 5 and younger.

dized safe travel, and a winter storm warning for Gasquet and Hiouchi was in effect through Thursday. The snow was expected to diminish during the evening, according to the National Weather Service.

The forecast called for up to 12 inches of snow at the upper elevations between Grants Pass and Gasquet.

Meanwhile, Crescent City had a hazardous-weather warning in effect through Thursday evening, with moderate to heavy rains and possible hail in the forecast. A flood watch was in effect until noon.

“This storm created a lot of rain, but no major issues for us,” said Crescent City Manager Eric Wier. “Large storms with lots of rain and minor flooding is fairly typical for us.”

He added that the city had received no reports Wednesday night of significant weather-related problems.

“With persistent rain over the last week, creeks and streams are already elevated. The additional rainfall will likely result

in some small streams and creeks overtopping their banks on the coastal plain,” according to the weather service website in Eureka.

The weather service warned of localized city flooding near the coast.

RogueWeather.com posted on its Facebook page that roads throughout southern Oregon and northern California were difficult to impossible to navigate on Thursday, and that the storm’s repercussions were likely to continue through Friday.

They’re alive after sneaker wave hits

Vicki Mizel and Doctor Siggie are lucky to be alive.

Mizel was “swallowed up and tossed around” by a sneaker wave that hit the beach just before noon Jan. 11 north of Gold Beach.

That same day, similar waves resulted in the deaths of two children near Cannon Beach.

Mizel and her cat, Doctor Siggie, who walks along with her on a leash, had taken advantage of a break in the weather to enjoy the sun and stroll the beach. They were walking on a stretch near the parking area at the north end of Nesika Road, where it dead ends.

“It’s a beach we’ve been going to for five years,” she said. “I didn’t know anything about king tides and sneaker waves.”

Predicted for that day at Wedderburn was a 7.9-foot high tide at 11:22 a.m., according to the website saltwater-tides.com.

King tides are both extraordinarily high and low ones that occur once or twice a year, usually when Earth is closest to the sun, often in January.

Sneaker waves occur more frequently and unexpectedly, suddenly running up on the beach beyond where previous waves were reaching. They occur as waves amplify each other when they combine, instead of canceling each other out.

Those waves can knock people down, fill their clothing

and shoes with sand and water, and drag them out to sea because they can’t get up.

“When the wave hit, the undertow and swift current began pulling me out,” said Mizel. “I wasn’t prepared. Thank goodness I had my cat on a leash and in my arms.

“I kept thinking, ‘Tuck and roll, breathe, tuck and roll.’ As the current was moving, I went back to my training. I had excellent training and learned that technique years ago.

“I was screaming, and a young man named Talon Salonen, who was walking his dog on the beach, heard me.”

“My girlfriend and I were just hanging out at the beach and we saw this other person,” Salonen said. “We were walking up the steps from the beach when a huge wave came up to the step right behind us.

“I handed my dog’s leash to my girlfriend and ran back down to the beach when I heard screaming, and I saw this poor lady who was up to her neck in water.”

“He asked, ‘Do you need help?’ right after a large log tumbled to the left of us,” Mizel said.

Just as the wave was receding, pulling Mizel and her cat along, Salonen gave Mizel his hand and pulled her up.

“I was a little worried about the cat,” Salonen said. “He was hanging on for dear life.”

“I was amazed the cat stayed calm and wasn’t freaked out or panicked,” Mizel said. “Literally, the hand of God helped me.”

Salonen kept hold of Mizel’s hand as he walked the 65-year-old woman and her 17-year-old cat to higher

ground.

Salonen is 21 years old and lives in Nesika Beach, where he works as a temporary caregiver for a disabled man.

He looked for Mizel’s lost shoes after the rescue, and when he couldn’t find them borrowed a pair from his mother for Mizel to wear.

Meantime, Siggie the cat avoided being given a bath after his traumatic experience, making do with being towel dried.

Mizel still has a swollen, stiff neck from the day’s exertion, but otherwise she and Siggie are staying warm and snug.

Mizel since has learned that Curry County Emergency Management posts local information for high-surf and weather events from the U.S. National Weather Service on its Facebook page.

A notice on that page, dated Jan. 7, warned, “A high surf event is possible Saturday morning to Sunday morning. Right now, it looks like High Surf Warning conditions will be met (vs. High Surf Advisory), and very large breakers of 30-35 feet are possible.”

According to the National Weather Service, “For much of the West Coast, sneaker waves kill more people than all other weather hazards combined.” Its website warns that waves can surge more than 150 feet up the beach. “Never turn your back on the ocean.”

agreement beneficial for students and teachers, regardless of the concept of recall.”

A separate recall petition must be submitted for each individual board member involved.

According to Del Norte County Clerk Alissia Northup, 20%

of the registered voters in Del Norte County would have to sign each petition to trigger all of the recalls. She said that equates to about 3,000 signatures from the approximately 15,000 registered voters.

Northup said the school board has seven days to respond to Mealue’s notification. He must also publish his notification in the local press – which he had not done as of The Triuplicate’s Jan. 14 issue.

Northup said that once he has the board’s response and has met the publication requirements, Mealue may submit the correct form to her office. He then has 120 days to gather the required signatures

- which would be a first for her, said Northup.

“I’ve never had a recall petition go through here. The last recall I remember being successful was for California Gov. Gray Davis in 2003,” she said.

\$360,000 each year.

The pay recommendation for the long term would offer the following additional increases in upcoming years:

- A three-year agreement that provides a 2% salary increase each year from July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2022.
- An additional 0.5% salary increase if “local control funding formula” revenue increases by 3.5% or more from the prior year, in 2020-21 and 2021-22.
- An additional 0.5% salary increase if the revenue formula increases by 4% or more from the prior year, in 2020-21 and 2021-22 (up to a total of 1% additional per year).

For school districts and charter schools, the local control funding formula establishes uniform grade span grants, including revenue limits, general-purpose block grants and most state categorical programs.

- An increase of \$500 per year towards health and welfare for the years 2020-21 and 2021-22.
- A 2% increase in the flat-dollar stipend each year of the three years 2019-20 through 2021-22.
- The district and the teachers’ union would establish a labor management committee to explore health insurance options.

According to the mediator’s report, the long-term option provides for a guaranteed total increase of 7.14% at the end of three years - at a three-year cost increase to the district of 13.72%, which equates to just over \$2.4 million.

If the local control funding increases beyond the above thresholds, the potential of an additional 2% salary increase provides the possibility of additional raises for the faculty.

Michael Hawkins, the school district’s director of communications, said by email that “the Del Norte County Unified School District Board of Trustees agrees with the factfinder’s report and fully supports the multi-year option, as it provides guaranteed salary and health and welfare increases to teachers and other certificated staff members and allows the board time to review current budget allocations.

“This option also allows district staff the opportunity to develop a list of suggested budget changes and/or reductions that will be necessary to maintain a balanced budget for the future.”

Marshall Jones, the teachers’ association president, said there were recommendations in the mediator’s fact-finding report that were favorable for his members.

“We’re pretty pleased with the report. The mediator highlighted that there is a crisis within the district, especially with retention, and the district is not doing anything to address retention,” he said.

However, Jones said, union negotiators felt the district’s numbers provided to the mediator regarding proposed pay increases were misleading, resulting in a lower recommended figure.

“We are still fighting for our community to ensure students have the best teachers they can have. In order to attract premium teachers, they need to have a salary that attracts the best,” Jones said.

“I don’t hold a lot of hope out. I don’t see them reaching out with a contract that is equitable and fair.”

Meantime, a new contentious issue has evolved from the negotiation process: the definition of just what constitutes a “last, best and final offer.”

In a Jan. 13 letter to teachers’ union members, Jones wrote: “Last

week, for the first time (school district Superintendent) Jeff Harris announced that the district has no intention of finishing the bargaining process and will not be imposing a last, best and final offer.

“They are acting in bad faith by refusing to finish the bargaining process, and they are attempting to prevent a settlement that would help end our teacher recruitment and retention crisis.”

Harris told The TriPLICATE that a difference of opinion regarding the definition of a “last, best and final offer” is understandable.

“By law,” said Harris, “‘last, best and final offer’ is not the last step of a negotiating process. The last, best and final offer is the ability to do an implementation...”

“A lot goes into a last, best and final offer. Our district hasn’t indicated we have a last, best and final offer. We haven’t told them we intend to impose one,” Harris said.

“Throughout the state, a last, best and final offer typically is imposed when reducing salary benefits, reducing pay and overall compensation. Not very often is it used to take a raise in the negotiating process.”

In December, slightly more than 90% of the Del Norte Teachers Association members voted to go on strike if an agreement was not signed. By law, the association must give the school district three days’ notice if it is taking that action.

While the two sides continued to meet this week in negotiations, the union continued its preparations should there be a strike.

Jones said picket captains held a meeting Tuesday, and a general membership meeting was scheduled for Thursday evening, with a community outreach meeting to follow.

A higher wage isn’t the measure of a good teacher

Dear Editor

It seems to have become an annual event in the spring for Del Norte teachers to engage the local school district with complaints of not being respected - and for whatever reason, think that raising pay and overall compensation is the mechanism that will garner that respect.

If that is the standard being applied to the average wage and benefit package of wage earners in the county, then teachers - even those at the bottom of the compensation ranks - are indeed well respected.

Teaching compensation packages generally place them in the upper 15% of all income earners in the county, some in the upper 5%.

Quality, retention and declining numbers of teachers are not a unique problem exclusive to the Del Norte Unified School District. A dismal economic picture, low academic achievement in the county’s population, homelessness, and general remoteness from population centers are also not unique in California.

While the current offer of increases from the school district may seem overly cautious, teachers and their vocal advocates may wish to consider a few things when asking for that annual raise in compensation - which, I might add is being offered, miserly though it appears to be.

Most employees in the county do not normally receive annual pay increases, or increasing compensation

packages (the exception being public employees, of which the district’s teachers are in that group).

As has been said ad nauseam, the cost of living in this county should afford ALL teachers a rather comfortable living, particularly in light of the fact that they all should have a college education.

The fact that teachers receive higher compensation elsewhere should not even be a factor if a teacher’s focus is on providing the best possible educational experience for the students in their respective classrooms.

This annual wrangling with the school district over compensation is unseemly at best, and smacks of elitism at the worst.

My father was a lifelong public-school teacher, who began his career at \$900 per year, \$100 per month over a nine-month contract. No pay for the summer months, period. It was a pretty meager living, supplemented by coaching sports teams, in order to support a growing family of four.

This occurred in a small, rural community not unlike Crescent City, where his earnings nowhere near placed him at the top of the wage earners in the community.

I do not recall that his compensation, or lack thereof, was much of an issue. He seemed to be much more focused on how well he performed in the classroom.

My, how far we have come in those intervening years, how much the focus has changed.
