Elk cut short Blueberry Hill's crop

Farmers Rick and Jessie Shepherd said they've long had a tenuous relationship between their commercial blueberry crop and the area's elk herds.

But after this past week, the score at Blueberry Hill Farm is pretty much Elk = 1, Blueberries = 0.

"We usually get into the late part of the season before we're out (of blueberries)," said Jessie Shepherd. "It doesn't usually

happen this early. They've completely wiped us out."

A sign taped to their production facility at 3290 Kings Valley Rd. in Crescent City, as well as a message on their phone line, informs their customers that this year's stock of blueberries has been devastated. Shepherd said she's trying to salvage as much as she can by offering 5-pound frozen bags for as long as they last.

Rick Shepherd said the blueberry bushes on their 5-acre farm usually bloom in the spring and ripen beginning in July. The fresh supply then can last a week or two into September.

"The last couple of years, however, we can't get through August," he said by phone from the deck of a salmon trawler

off the coast of Brookings, where he's also a commercial fisherman.

In past seasons, the Shepherds have been able to harvest more than

Local filmmakers slated for Sacramento festival

A trio of artists with Crescent City back-grounds have made a short film highlighting the U.S. anti-Asian immigration policy of the late 1800s. That film now is in the post-production process and scheduled to debut at a Sacramento film festival this fall.

Cable public access TV station Access Sacramento selected "Flight of the Heron" as one of

Route 197 construction closure now at midpoint

The closure of California State Route 197 north of Crescent City for work on roadway culverts has reached its midpoint.

Motorists will need to continue to use State Route 199, a short distance to the south, through Aug. 15, said state transportation officials.

Highways 197 and 199 are the primary routes between Grants Pass and U.S. Highway 101, ultimately leading to Crescent City and Brookings.

Myles Cochrane, the



California Transportation public information officer for Humboldt and Del Norte counties, said Route 197 remains completely closed about 3 miles from

the Highway 101 junction for the repairs to drainage systems.

He said the project was the more cost-effect measure of two choices.

"The other option we looked at, of allowing one-way traffic control on Route 197, would have cost \$2.1 million and taken 12 weeks," he said. "A full closure of Route 197 only had a duration of three weeks and a cost of about \$613,000."

Cochrane said local residents have been able to access their driveways from each endpoint of Route 197.

"We like to do culvert work during the summer months," he said. "A, it's quicker and more efficient: and B, it prepares the ditches for winter storms."

the 10 films to premier Oct. 5 during the 20th-annual "A Place Called Sacramento" film festival at the Crest Theater in Sacra-

More than 300 scripts were submitted as part of the selection

"Flight of the Heron" centers on the 1875 Page Act, which effectively banned the entry of Chinese women into the U.S. In 1882, Chinese men were banned through legislation as well.

"Flight of the Heron" is a project of Circle B Productions. The company was formed by Todd Bull and Olivia Reedy, who became friends through Del Norte High School drama classes, community theatre and other local activities.

Although their paths diverged after graduation, they remained friends, teaming up decades later to chase their movie-making dreams.

Todd's father, Nate Bull, was a past editor of The Triplicate. Reedy's mother also worked for the newspaper.

Circle B draws its name from a Bull family ranch, while also combining the "O" in Olivia with the "B" in Bull. It's a nod to the collaborative process the pair enjoy, as well

as their shared history. "Flight of the Heron" will be there first complete film, although they have several projects underway.

Another Crescent City native and friend of Bull and Reedy, Matt Hildebrandt performed as an acting extra in "Flight of the Heron." He ap-pears with Bill Raymond, Olivia's father and an accomplished theatre actor with 75 film credits, including appearances in "Eight Men Out," "12 Mon-keys" and "Lincoln,"

among others. Raymond also ap peared on numerous TV programs, among them "The Wire," "Miami Vice" and "Law & Order."

Yet another Del Norte High School alum, professional musician Ashley Slater, composed the film's music.

Bull said Raymond's presence on the set was influential, adding that the hopeful young actors gleaned as much stagecraft as possible from the old hand, who has worked with top Hollywood names. Raymond plays a smuggler who's

defying the Page Act by bringing Chinese women into the country illegally.

Hildebrandt met Bull and Reedy through music, theatre and speech at Del Norte High School. He recently retired from the City of Crescent City after 32 years of service and has been ticking off items on his bucket list.

He said he's done a little local TV, a little radio and a fair amount of theatre, but he'd never had the opportunity for film work. When he saw social media posts recruiting for "Flight of the Heron," he jumped at the chance.

Hildebrandt said he's remained active in music, but hadn't done any acting for a decade. Being a performer before live audiences is different from film work, he said, in that you're playing to a much smaller audience. But never having enjoyed big crowds, Hildebrandt said, he was able to drill right in and focus.

You might recognize Hildebrandt in his scene if you've ever been to the city's pool. He was in management there for the past 20 vears and taught swimming lessons for kids, among his other duties. He said it was the best job in town.

Only briefly retired and now working in sporting goods, he's looking at more acting opportunities. The self-admitted Disney fanatic said he might try to land a gig at Disneyland just for kicks.

"Because this was such an amazing experience, I would totally be open to other film projects in the future," Hildebrandt said.

Bull is a producer, with more than 50 ti-

tles under his belt as a performer and director.

He earned a bachelor of arts degree from San Diego State University and has written numerous scripts with Reedy, such as "Fawn's Justice," which follows a Tolowa Indian FBI agent through Del Norte County; "Singlewide Pride," a crime drama about a pot heist and real estate fraud; and "The War of Wills," a Civil War period piece.

Bull and Reedy now have written two short films together, "Flight of the Heron" and "The Lifelong Gift."

Reedy is a director and published author with more than 100 book and audio titles in her credits. And she's a former sound engineer, who's also done more than two decades of voice-over acting work.

Reedy's currently editing "Flight of the Heron.'

"I always knew she was a brilliant writer," Bull said, adding that having a female writing partner had given more realism in the storytelling.

Reedy initially was a bit reluctant to try script writing. It's a complicated form of composition and she was totally unfamiliar with the format and approach. But after reading one of Bull's screenplays, she was hooked. He helped her learn techniques and style for screenwriting, and once she was into it, the magic began.

They've had a synergistic chemistry from the beginning. "I'll put something out there and he'll really latch on and add to it, and then I'll add on to that," Reedy said.



"It takes our material to a whole other place that we wouldn't get to alone.

The short film's creators said that during auditions, a number of the actors expressed a desire to be part of a film that reveals a sordid chapter in America's history. Their passion reportedly prompted the filmmakers to pursue additional funding and find ways to include them all.

The film was shot in Sacramento and also in Locke, or the Locke Historic District, an unincorporated delta community built by Chinese immigrants in the early 1900s. The town originally was named Lockeport after George Locke, who owned the land that the town was built upon at a time when Chinese people were not allowed to own land.

The crew spent two 12-hour days in Locke. It took about 36 hours of filming to get enough material for them to work with.

Portrayed in the film as early Sacramento, Locke was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1971 and designated a National Historic Landmark District in 1990, as a representation of historic Chi

nese-American rural communities.

So far, "Flight of the Heron" has cost about \$22,000 to make and there's still work to be done. Principal shooting was wrapped, but post-production remains underway. Rather than wait for a crew from Access Sacramento, a team of about 50 actors and production crew was assembled ... out of Bull and Reedy's pockets.

The original script called for just four characters, but the crew grew as more people became interested in the telling the story. The budget grew as well, swelling from a \$5,000 plan as more equipment and people were necessary. Fortunately, the equipment was an investment that could be used for future projects.

Reedy said she knew from day one the film had to be made, because it takes on a much-overlooked, dark part of American history. She said the Page Act was an injustice that needed to be addressed, a feeling that was shared by the throng of actors and crew members who volunteered for "Flight

1,200 pounds of blueberries. Lately, the pair said, they've been lucky to pick and package 6,000 pounds

"We had 8,000 pounds of berries just two weeks ago that we were going to harvest," said Rick Shepherd, "Now, we have none."

He said the elk usually infiltrate his farm's defenseless boundaries to eat both the berries and the leaves, with the bulls causing additional damage and spillage by sweeping their massive horns side to side.

"They usually come in around 10 p.m. I chase them out, but I can't be out there all night," he said. "Like this morning at 3 a.m. I chase them off, but as soon as I leave, they come right back in."

Shepherd said that in their 27 years at Blueberry Hills Farm, they've been okay with the amount the elk have taken. But now, the herd's numbers have grown so large that he no longer knows how to cope with the problem.

For one thing, given the irregular shape of the Shepherds' acreage, fencing would be too costly and ineffective.

Makenzie Henk, a scientific aid for the California Department of Fish and Wildlife's elk project, said her organization is tracking a number of the herds north near Tolowa and south of Crescent City. She said that elk population is increasing by 10% to 15% each year.

"But it's notoriously difficult in ecology to put a finer number on the total population," said Henk. "The last population estimation (of elk) in Del Norte and Humboldt counties was 1,600, using minimal count data," Henk said.

A minimal estimation count isn't completely scientific, she added, since it relies on the observation relatively few volunteers and state staff.

Henk recommended that landowners fend off the elk by using deterrents such as scenting and by hazing

can report elk damage through the wildlife

them with loud noises and flashing lights.

Meantime, she said, service's website, www. farmers and landowners wildlife.ca.gov/Living-with-Wildlifeand, and can apply to the state for compensatory funding.

Still the best baker in the show

ne might say the life source of county fairs runs through Ron Crook's veins.

His great-grandfather handled livestock and was involved in horse racing at local fairs. His grandparents and their friends sold the property currently occupied by the Del Norte County Fair to its board of directors in the 1930s. His father was instrumental in getting the lamb barbecue. His brother was a county fair livestock manager for "years and years and years." And his sisterin-law volunteers at fairs to this day.

Now 78, Crook retired a year ago after 40-plus years as the Curry County Fair director and another 10 as director of the Coos County Fair.

So, there you are. County fairs are in his blood.

It should come as no surprise, then, that the wall of Crook's home on the family ranch just off Pistol River, some 16 miles north of Brookings, is filling with grand-champion competition ribbons.

His category of choice? "I've competed in the Del Norte County Fair for several years in baking,"

said Crook. "I've always enjoyed competing in other fairs. You can't enter in your own fair, right?"

His most-recent best-in-show honors in Crescent City were earned by his apple pie with decorated crust, braided challah bread, and yeast dinner rolls.

Crook said he's been baking ever since he was a "4H-er" as a kid. He even started a catering side gig with a fellow maintenance man in 1993 to earn a little additional in-

Over the years, that evolved into formation of a nonprofit group with dedicated volunteers averaging \$25,000 in donations

annually to the Curry County Fair to help underwrite fair maintenance

But for competitions, he enjoys baking rolls, breads, pies and cookies. His recipes come from family and friends, then by trying the results on gatherings at the Pistol River family ranch.

"Baking has always been a fun, fun thing," Crook said.

Some chefs will say they're only as good as the recipe they follow. So Crook must have been provided with some pretty good recipes ... he's won at least one best-inshow each year he's entered.

That said, he did notice the turnout was down this year at the Del Norte Fair. "The fair has always been a part of my life. I always liked to enter. I encourage others to enter, too," Crook said.

"So much of our history is derived from the county fair. It's the one time of year you get to see neighbors from the north and south parts of the county that you haven't seen all year."

So Crook was surprised to see the dip in the number of baking competitors at this year's county fair. He urges local chefs to plan ahead and participate next year.

"We've got to get more entries in there. It makes for a much more interesting show," he said. "Plus. it's educational. The judges explain what won first place and why it won. It gets others talking about why one entry is better than another."

As for Crook, he's already planning his

next year's entries, and in more categories, especially now that he has a little time on his hands since retiring.

He's also planning to enter his winning recipes at the Oregon State Fair, which kicks off Aug. 23 in Salem. Those plans include new recipes in breads, pies, cookies, even cinnamon rolls.

"I've never entered in the state fair," said Crook, "not since I was a '4H-er.' I thought I'd do it this year for the thrill of

Remembering the S.S. Emidio

M ilitary history records show a 6,912-ton tanker, was the first casualty attributed to the Imperial Japanese Navy's World War II submarine activity on California's coast.

A total of four attacks on shipping vessels off the California Coast were recorded before Christmas in 1941.


The Emidio was owned by Socony-Vacuum Oil Co., which later became Mobil Oil. The ship was sailing from Seattle to San Pedro, California.

A Japanese sub locked onto the Emilio in the early afternoon of Dec. 20, 1941, firing its 14-cm. deck cannon at the tanker until its captain raised a white flag and ordered the crew to abandon ship.

According to historical accounts, the Japanese ignored the surrender and continued to fire the cannon, hitting three crewmen who were lowering a lifeboat.

There were four remaining crewmen on board -- a radio operator and three engineers -- when the sub fired a torpedo that hit the engine room, killing two of the engineers and injuring the third.

The Emidio took five blasts from the 14-cm. cannon as well as the torpedo strike,

killing five sailors in all.

The Japanese were driven off by a Catalina Flying Boat that dropped depth charges, with the sub-marine diving below the surface and escap-

The Coast Guard Cutter Shawnee rescued the Emidio's remaining 31 survivors, who rowed 16 hours to Humboldt Bay. The abandoned tanker drifted north until it broke up on the rocks off Crescent City

The bow drifted into the harbor, where it remained until it was scrapped in 1959.

The remains of the hull are still in the harbor, with a commemorative plaque nearby. The site has been declared a California Historical Landmark.



of the Heron."

Reedy said her upbringing, with an actor father and writer mother, and her early career prepared her for this must-make movie. She said people came out of the woodwork asking to be part of the poignant story.

Bull noted that before the advent of digital techniques, it would have been far too costly to make the film — maybe up to \$120,000. What's more, there may not have been an audience for the work. But

thanks to online content providers such as Netflix and Hulu, there is a hunger for a wider range of material, he

"Flight of the Heron" begins in a hospital room, with a dying woman whose long-lost love has reappeared with the ability to time travel. They emerge in 1875 and are confronted by the anti-Asian sentiment and laws that had affected the woman's ancestors, whose legacy will benefit many lives.

It's an important theme at time when the benefits and risks of immigration are being debated internationally. Bull said it's possible the film could go

further still, noting the heavy investments in moviemaking coming out of China. He said the Chinese are looking for positive scripts that would do well in that nation as well as America.

A 10-minute version of "Flight of the Heron" is due back to Access Sacramento by Sept 3. Bull and Reedy will be interviewed on Access Sacramento on Sept. 4.

A longer version, 15-17 minutes, is expected for future festivals. Hildebrandt said he hopes there will be a way to arrange a screening of the film here.

Is dam removal the answer to all these issues?

Dear Editor:

While I greatly appreciate the effort that Mr. Creager made in the July 27 Triplicate, "It's the reservoirs that promote algae," he goes on to create the scenario that if the four Klamath River Dams are removed, it will solve all of the river's problems.

Of course, given the fact that much of the past 10

years or more of "science" regarding dam removal has been roundly disputed by a number of reputable scientists, I will leave that to be bandied about by people with more expertise than I.

What I see in most proponents of dam removal is the failure to answer a couple of important questions.

Over the past 20 years or so, there have been quite a few dams removed (in the hundreds, I'm told) on West Coast rivers, yet the numbers of adult salmon returning to the rivers continue to decline.

If all it takes is restoring water quality to the Klamath River, which is something that the actual level of water restoration is clearly disputed by dam removal,

why haven't other rivers on the West Coast experienced the fish population restoration that clearly was expected following the removal of their dams?

Finally, I tip my cap for making algae seem like a vital issue for public health during low-water times in the Klamath River; but August and September maybe, certainly not for six months.

There are far more important issues to be resolved in California that could use that \$450 million than problematic Klamath River restoration by dam removal.



After a summer filled with weight lifting, 7-on-7 games, and running through plays in street clothes, the Del Norte football program finally put on the pads this week as they prepare for their season opener on Aug. 23.

"When they aren't wearing pads everybody is a little bit faster. That is what we have been doing over the summer," said Del Norte head coach Nick White. "So the first day of pads the kids are a little bit slow

with what they are doing — they have 10 pounds of gear on. That is expected, but Tuesday was definitely better (than Monday) and we actually did some full contact on Tuesday, which gets everybody hyped up and going.'

Although the pads take some getting used to, they also add a little bit of energy as the practices become more physical.

"Hitting is a lot more fun than coming out here without pads and going through walk-throughs and stuff," said senior quarterback OJ

Through the first few days of full practice, Calleja said the team's identity is already starting to emerge.

"We are going to be a physical

Fishing options abound on ocean



It has been a good week for sportfishermen on both sides of the California-Oregon border as the tuna have moved in about as close to shore as they ever come, lots of California halibut have been biting on the beaches, and bottomfish has remained consistent as usual.

Surf perch are also pleantiful in Northern California and Southern Oregon for anglers who prefer to keep their feet on land.

On the ocean

The tuna have moved in close out of both Crecent City and Brookings. The fish started being hauled in between 15 and 20 miles from shore early in the week, after being caught between 30 and 40 miles from shore late last week.

There have also been lots of California halibut caught throughout the week, both on the beaches of Southern Oregon, and on South Beach in Crescent City.

Anglers fishing from the beaches are still finding lots of surf perch as well throughout the Wild Rivers Coast.

Some of the most consistent fishing in the area is always bottomfishing, and rockfish and lingcod continue to provide relatively easy limits for anglers who are targeting them.

Crescent City is still seeing its fair share of Pacific halibut

throughout the week as well. The only fish on the ocean that don't seem to be biting much at the moment are salmon. The salmon bite has been slow all season out of Crescent City. There have been some strong fishing weeks for ocean salmon out of Brookings this summer, but the catch as slowed up there as well this week with warmer water close to shore.

River fishing

With salmon fishing still slow on the ocean, an anglers best bet to nab a salmon right now is the Klamath River.

Although fishing on the Upper Klamath is still slow, the Lower Klamath River saw a bit of a surge this week. If that continues, the start of the fall salmon season should get off to a good start on Thursday.

This year the spring salmon run has been subject to unprecedented regulation due to See **Reel Deal** / A7

The Redwood Coast Rodeo had a brand new look this year as the Coastal Farm and Ranch Challenge of Champions Tour, based out of Oregon, made its debut at the Del Norte County Fair on Saturday.

We decided that we needed a change because we were having a hard time getting the riders to come up," said Kim Floyd, CEO of the Del Norte County Fair. "We had wonderful stock and a great stock contractor for many years, but since we are so far away and the Ukiah Rodeo was on top of us it was really difficult to get the riders to buy into driving all the way up to Crescent City."

Although there were fewer total events than in past years with the California Cowboys Professional Rodeo Association, there were lots more bull riders in Tri-Counties Bank Area on Saturday.

'We had been doing the same thing for the last (18) years, so we thought we would try something

new," said Herk Sturdevant, who took over as president of the Redwood Coast Rodeo Committee this year. "We thought that we would try the Bulls and Barrels and see

how that goes. I think there was a pretty good turnout, so we will see if we continue to do the same thing. It turned out pretty good."

For the last decade the Chal-

lenge of Champions Tour has been focusing on bull riding as the main attraction of their events.

"All the guys here rode bulls professionally and our idea was to put together a tour where guys like to get on good bulls," said Jason Mattox, the promoter and producer of the Challenge of Champions Tour. "They bring good bulls for these guys to get on and we bring in the best guys. It makes for good rides, it's great for the crowd, and great for the sponsors."

Although the tour brought in all of the bull riders, with the exception of junior bull rider Quenton Phillips, there were still several ways for community members to participate.

"We did the barrel race to try to get more of the adults and kids from the community involved in the rodeo," Sturdevant said.

Younger kids also had a few chances to get into the action with the return of mutton bustin', as well as the always popular calf scramble which brings kids out to

we will look to install more of what we are doing offensively and defensively."



The only other place to fish for salmon this time of year is in the Rogue Bay, but that has reportedly slowed significantly over the last week.



Imagine an alien invasion last night in Crescent City. A group of youthful musicians here did just that, playing an appropriate soundtrack to accompany such a sci-fi spectacular.

The performance featured this year's participants in Amy Ross's North Coast
Summer Band Camp at Crescent Elk
Middle School.

The musicians were fifth-through eighth-grade band members from Crescent City and Brookings schools, sprinkled with more-experienced high school musicians filling in.

Now in her 25th year running the camp, and the first year since she retired as music teacher at Crescent Elk, Ross said this year's theme was "Solar System and Space."

The students practiced Aug. 5-9 to perform recognizable sci-fi staples such as John Williams's "Theme from Star Wars" and the lesser-known but equally challenging "Aliens Landing in the Backyard."

Ross said the camp is a good way for the developing musicians to keep their skills honed over the summer break.

"On Monday, it always sounds pretty ragged," said Ross. "With only one or two years of experience, this music can be a lot harder (for the students) than anything they've done before. There's a lot of notes to learn and new rhythms to read.

"But it's amazing the progress they make over

In past years, the camp has enrolled as many as 70 band members. (Sorry, no strings in the band, Ross said.) But this year, there was a smaller turnout, 25 campers. So, the 10 high school helpers and seven staff took on greater importance as mentors and fill-ins.

Joshua Peterson, 19, a recent Brookings
High School graduate, was one of those who
volunteered to be a helper as he awaits enrolling
at Southwestern Oregon Community College's
Curry campus.

"I love this camp," said Peterson. "It gets everyone together to prepare them for the next year."

Peterson has been playing bass guitar for five years. After three years of participating in the camp, this was his first as a high-school helper.



"As the experienced musician, you have to help more than those in your own section," he said. "You get questions like how to play a rhythm, was this the right note.

"Ms. Ross does a great job with the kids, making sure they get the help they need."

Some students attend the camp for reasons easy to understand, such as Patince Diehl, a Crescent Elk Middle School student now in her second year on baritone sax (or barry sax, for short).

"Why'd I join band camp? Why not? I love band. It's really fun, spending time with people and playing music."

For others, summer band camp offers an opportunity to hone up on an instrument they're still just learning, like Del Norte freshman James Appel, who has been playing tenor saxophone for just half a year.

"I switched over from percussion, after starting with the clarinet," said Appel. "So, I joined band camp to warm up for high school. I changed to sax because I like the feeling of moving your fingers and changing notes. It's really fun, being part of a band"

part of a band."

Appel isn't the only one who's switched instruments before settling on one instrument of choice.

Charley Tygart initially followed her father, as a

trombonist, in the third grade. But school district music programs don't begin until the fifth grade, when she chose to switch to percussion.

Now in the seventh grade, she felt drawn back to the trombone at Crescent Elk Middle School.

And, Tygart admits, she came into camp a little rusty. "It'd been all summer since I'd played music or heard music," she said.

"Coming in here the first day, I was like, 'Oh, my gosh, I don't understand.' It's so much more difficult. But I didn't panic."

Helping the young musicians from feeling overwhelmed was Kristen Volta, Ross's replacement as Crescent Elk's music teacher. The 23-year-old recent graduate of Northem Arizona University admitted she probably looks about the same age as some of the older students.

"Band is so enjoyable, so important to education and kids' academic life," she said. "This one-week band camp can be tough for the sixth- and seventh-graders, but it's a helpful jumpstart for those who have been too busy over the summer.

It gets them thinking again about playing music."
One of the exercises Volta uses to help indecisive, often younger, students choose the proper instrument is "instrument petting zoo." She lays out the instruments for the students to handle and play a bit ... ensuring to sanitize the mouthpieces before passing them along.

"The instruments require a different embouchure to play," she said, scrunching up her lips to demonstrate the different pucker it takes to play a trumpet versus a clarinet. "We find that kids adapt better to one over the other, and we help steer them in the right direction."

When Volta took the director's baton during "Planets," a piece she chose for the band camp, Ross sat in with the students on flute. She'll continue to help Volta with the summer program however she's needed.

Said Volta: "Ross is big, big shoes to fill. The kids adore her. She has helped so many of them through the years.





now is used for weight loss.

Cholesterol **Plummets After** Giving Up Bread

DEAR DR. ROACH: What is your opinion of the keto diet? I have been doing it for a few weeks now and lost a few pounds, but it goes against everything I usually eat -high quantities of red meat, lots of full-fat foods and dairy. Since I am losing some weight and actually feel better and am sleeping better, I like the short-term results, but I cannot see this as a long-term way of life. I am concerned about all that fat going into my body and clogging my arteries. I exercise every day with Zumba, jogging, etc. --J.P.

ANSWER: The ketosis diet favors very large amounts of fat -- 60% to 80% of calories, with 15% to 20% of calories from protein and 5% or less from carbohydrates. The theory is to cause ketosis, a physiological condition of ketones in the blood as a result of high fat intake. It has been used since the 1920s as a treatment for seizures, but

Like every diet, it has both good and bad aspects. On the good side, it is effective at short-term weight loss. However, much of the apparent early weight loss is due to water weight, which is a universal finding on a highfat diet. Weight gain is likely when stopping the diet. It is highly restrictive. Further, many of the foods that you can't eat on this diet are those that have been shown to be associated with improved health, especially vegetables and most fruits. Most people will have a substantial increase in cholesterol levels (by as much as 50%). The red meat and saturated fat probably present an independent risk of heart disease and cancer (even apart from its effect on cholesterol), although this remains somewhat controversial. I do not recommend the keto diet for long-term use, at all. It may have some benefit in helping with short-term

weight loss, but I think there are much healthier alternatives for most people.

column about the 58-year-old woman who felt like she had oil in her eye reminded me of having a very similar situation.

I described it to my optometrist, and he also diagnosed ocular migraine. I wanted another opinion, because the only symptom I had was the oil, no headache or visual disturbances. The ophthalmologist diagnosed blepharitis, or clogged oil glands at the base of my eyelashes. She recommended placing a warm pack of rice in a sock over my eye and then washing the eye area with baby shampoo on a washcloth. I did this for a week or two, and on my visit with her to recheck the eyes, the problem was gone. -- J.P. ANSWER: Thank you for writing. Blepharitis is caused by changes in the meibomian glands, oil glands that are present in both eyelids, often associated with changes in bacteria. I usually see people with this condition noticing red eyes and a gritty sensation. However, you are quite right that it includes

blurry vision, and the eye-care

professional sometimes can

see an oily or foamy film over the eye.

The treatment the ophthalmologist recommended works for most people. Gentle lid massage may help get additional oily material out of the glands. However, antibiotics or other treatments are sometimes necessary.
