

Suspect arrested in murder case

Law enforcement officers have arrested a 33-year-old man, Neil Hiller, suspected of shooting and killing 22-year-old Joseph Deford during the early hours of May 22. According to a Tuesday release by the Del Norte County Sheriff’s Office, Hiller was arrested Monday

and charged with Deford’s homicide. The Del Norte County Sheriff’s Office said they received a call at 1:14 a.m. Thursday, May 22. The caller reported a man lying on the ground near the 200 block of Harding Avenue. An officer arrived on scene and found Deford unresponsive. The officer attempted CPR and administered naloxone, which is typically used in opioid

overdoses. However, Deford could not be revived and was transported to Sutter Coast Hospital, where a small caliber bullet was found in his back, according to police. Before the shooting, Deford was seen at the Patriot gas station on Northcrest Drive at about 12:50 a.m. Then, at 1:12 a.m., — two minutes before the 911 call — Deford was picked up by a

surveillance camera near the 1200 block of California Avenue. In the video, which has been viewed by the TriPLICATE, Deford was walking westbound, and near the end of the video he glances over his shoulder. About a minute later, the camera picks up what appears to be two men on bicycles headed the same direction Deford was walking. The source who recorded the video

wished to remain anonymous and did not want the video to be published citing privacy concerns. According to the same anonymous source, law enforcement officers were able to use the surveillance footage provided to identify and arrest the suspect Monday. Hiller appeared in court on

The Crescent City Volunteer Firefighter’s Association hosted a car wash last Friday to raise money and awareness about their upcoming benefit assessment. Del Norte County remains in red tier another week

Del Norte County will spend a twelfth week in the red tier of COVID-19 restrictions, according to state health officials. The county’s tier classification has remained unchanged in recent weeks as its COVID-19 cases have remained fairly consistent. Still, the county continues to see new virus cases, with an average of 13.5 new cases a day per 100,000 in population. That’s the highest per-person rate in the state, and would have put the county in jeopardy of moving to more restrictions if not for the

state’s small-county exemption, which allows the county to stay in the red tier so long as it has fewer than 35 cases in a week. For the week ending April 17, the week the state used to make its latest restriction level determinations, the county reported 26 cases of the virus, according to the California Department of Public Health. Numbers have continued to drop in the past week, with just 14 active cases reported in the community as of Tuesday, according to the county public health department. That’s the lowest since at least the beginning of the year. Last week another tool in the fight against the pandemic

was returned to the state’s toolbox, with federal and state health officials completing their review of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine and a western states panel giving the shots the greenlight to be administered. “After additional review, analysis and scrutiny, experts have concluded the Johnson & Johnson vaccine is safe, effective and will protect you against the COVID-19 virus,” said Governor Gavin Newson in a statement after the approval, noting he himself had already received the shot. “I encourage all Californians to trust the science, getting vaccinated is the best way to protect ourselves and our loved

ones and end the pandemic.” The use of the vaccine had been paused for several days after reports of blood clots occurring in a very small number of those who received the vaccine, mostly women between ages of 18 and 49. That pause ended April 24, after federal officials endorsed the use of the vaccine. “More than half of Californians 16 and older have received one of the three vaccines available, and the one-shot Johnson & Johnson vaccine is also an important tool in our fight to stop the spread of COVID-19, especially as more

POLICE The city plans to spend \$1,646,885 of Measure S funds over the next five years on the Crescent City Police Department needs:

- Staffing additional police officers, including a detective and a lieutenant, as well as another K-9 officer.
- New vehicles, such as detective and special assignment vehicles.
- Facility needs, including improvements to the existing station in the short term and a new police station as a long-term goal.
- Upgrades in body cameras and new tasers.

Crescent City Police Chief Richard Griffin attended the meeting to speak on behalf of police funding recommendations. In the wake of recent controversial police shootings across the country, Griffin said his top priority is acquiring new body cameras and tasers. He said the body cameras the police currently use fall off often and have a short battery life, meaning, they can’t last the 12 hour shifts officers work. He said Axon-made cameras are the standard in police departments across the U.S. “I would purchase Axon for myself to go out there, so if it’s something I want for myself, it’s something I want for my officers,” Griffin said. Griffin’s point became especially pertinent after a Crescent City police officer had to prevent their body camera from falling off during a struggle with a suicidal subject on Monday, Griffin said. The 36-year-old man was attempting to take his own life with a razor blade. Despite the body camera fumble, he was successfully apprehended by officers and transported to Sutter Coast Hospital where he was placed on a mental health hold. “The importance of this to me... you can put on hold the upgrades to the building, if this gets to my officers...we’re making due with the building... this is something that will save their lives and it will save the city in liability,” said Griffin.

Community Assistance League shuts its doors

The Community Assistance League of Del Norte has closed its doors after 53 years of providing financial support for transportation to non-emergency medical appointments. Diane Rawson, treasurer, said the Community Assistance League was especially important to cancer patients, who often have to travel far from home to receive care from specialists. Rawson said they had to close because of a lack of new volunteers.

The Silver Ball was the group’s biggest and best-known fundraiser, which was an annual gathering held each March. In a letter announcing the closure, the group wrote, “It is with our deepest gratitude, that all current and past members of this organization wish to extend our sincere appreciation to all who have helped our program with your labor, support and donations throughout the years.” Rawson said the group will transfer all remaining assets to the Wild Rivers Foundation.

- Pothole repairs
- Spot sidewalk repairs
- Street striping
- A major overhaul in the third or fourth year of Measure S revenues.

Jon Olson, public works director, presented the proposed street improvements to the council and the oversight board. He said the city should use the first two years of revenue to maintain 3rd, 5th, 9th, Harding and H streets. Then, the city can focus on major repairs to A Street.

Regarding streets, Chair of the Measure S Oversight committee, Kelly Schellong said she was looking forward to progress on the projects the city laid out.

“Our streets are in such bad disrepair, I wish we could do more. But, I think you’ve identified some really good projects to move forward with right away,” said Schellong. “People will see that coming to fruition.”

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The city plans to spend \$1,238,450 of Measure S funds over the next five years on Crescent City Fire Department improvements including:

- Adding three new paid firefighter positions over five years.
- Replacing fire engines and other response vehicles.
- Introducing a volunteer sleeper program and maintaining volunteer stipends.

Mayor Pro Tem Blake Inscore said he would support the game plan for the fire department, on the condition the Crescent City Fire and Rescue Volunteer Firefighters’ Association is also on board. “As long as our volunteers feel like the strategy supports them, supports those who are standing duty,” said Inscore.

POOL

The city plans to spend \$1,802,000 of Measure S funds over the next five years on Fred Endert Municipal Pool maintenance including:

- Subsidizing the pool for annual deficits, which previously came out of the city’s general fund. The average deficit of the pool is between \$300,000-375,000. Costs related to the pool include: payroll, electricity, gas and water bills and others.

Wier said the city pool is an investment in the health and welfare of residents, rather than a lucrative business venture.

RESERVE FUND

Most of the recommendations Wier presented went over well with the oversight board and the council; except for a proposed reserve fund, which would set aside 25% of Measure S revenues annually for a rainy day. Vice Chair of the Measure S Oversight committee, Heidi Kime, questioned if a reserve account should be funded at all. “The community voted for this because they want to see action and they want something tangible...I feel

like some of those visual components could really be accomplished with each fiscal year you’re proposing going into a reserve.” Committee member Ernie Perry was also worried about how the public would perceive a reserve fund. He recommended changing the name to avoid misperceptions. Kime was concerned those reserve funds might end up being spent on renovating the proposed new city hall building at 240 H Street. She suggested spending money on downtown improvements instead. Chair Kelly Schellong acknowledged the need for a new city hall, but she too said Measure S funds should not be used for that project right now. However, Councilmember Ray Altman said a reserve fund would be crucial should something unexpected happen with the city’s finances. “If you have a checking account and you have a savings account, and you spend every single dime in your checking account and you don’t have anything in your savings, what happens when your alternator breaks?” Altman asked. “I think it’s very wise to have a 25% reserve fund.” The debate over a reserve fund continued with Mayor Jason Greenough being in favor, while Inscore was not. Moving forward, Wier said he would put together a list of recommendations for the Measure S Committee Oversight Board to adopt later in the week, so the city can advance this year’s budget.

Former city council member Alex Campbell sentenced

After pleading guilty to false declaration of candidacy, former Crescent City councilman Alex Campbell has been sentenced to two years of probation, two days in jail and a \$1,600 fine. Shortly after he was sworn in to the council in January, Campbell was handed an indictment by the district attorney’s office of Del Norte County. The indictment stated Campbell lied about living within city limits, a necessary prerequisite for city council members. He was charged with two counts of perjury

and one count of false declaration of candidacy, all of which are felonies. After his indictment, Campbell admitted he owned a home outside of city limits,

but claimed he was renting a room within the city and spent most of his time there. However, Campbell eventually pled guilty to the false candidacy charge in March, at which time the perjury charges were dropped. He also resigned from the city council at the time. Campbell will also be responsible for up to \$10,000 of restitution to the city, for costs associated with training a new council member and others. District Attorney Katherine Micks said it has yet to be determined what that figure will be. Micks declined further comment on Campbell’s sentencing.

aggressive variants of the virus spread throughout the country,” said State Epide-

miologist Dr. Erica Pan in a statement after the approval. “We hope we continue to make progress in getting more Californians vaccinated so we can move beyond this pandemic.”

In all, over 13,700 doses of a COVID-19 vaccine have been administered in Del Norte County. About 37% of the state’s population is fully vaccinated.

County health officials are still holding weekly vaccination events on Tuesdays and Wednesdays at the Del Norte County Fairgrounds. 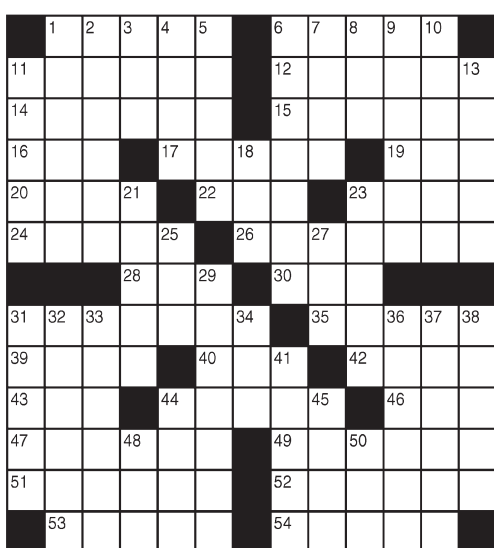
numerous great grandchildren and great great grandchildren, nieces, nephews, sister in laws, daughter in law and so many others who loved her.

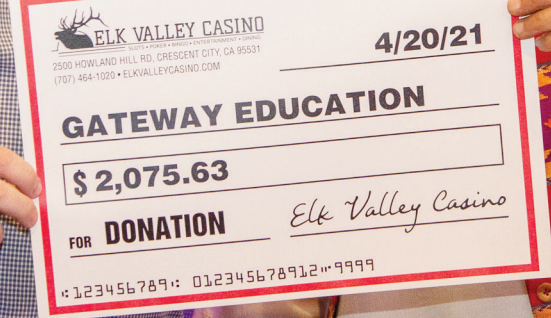

Pumping up fear along the Colorado River

Some Colorado River tribulations today remind me of a folk story: A young man went to visit his fiancé and found the family trembling and weeping. They pointed to the ceiling, where an axe was embedded in a rafter.

“That could fall,” the father quavered. “It could kill someone!”

Puzzled, the young man climbed onto a chair, and pulled the axe out of the rafter. Everyone fell all over themselves thanking him. But he quickly broke off the engagement, concerned that such inanity might be inheritable.

This resembles ongoing dithering over the 1922 Colorado River Compact, a 99-year-old agreement among the seven states through which the Colorado River meanders, on how the consumptive use of the river’s water should be divided to give each state a fair share. The agreement was necessary to get federal participation (money) to build dams to control the erratic river.

The best they were able to do, given the sketchy information they had about each state’s future development and also about the flow of the river, was to divide the river into two “basins” around the natural divide of the Colorado River canyons: Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and New Mexico in the Upper Basin; and California, Arizona and Nevada in the Lower Basin. Each basin would get to consume 7.5 million acre-feet of the river’s water.

This placed a responsibility on the Upper Basin states to “not cause the flow of the river at Lees Ferry (the measuring point in the canyons) to be depleted” below the Lower Basin’s share.

A generous reading of that lawyerly clause in the compact would say the upper states should just be careful that their water development doesn’t dip into the lower

states’ allocation.

A less generous reading would say that if for any reason the flow at Lees Ferry fell below the average of 7.5 million acre feet — whether due to over-appropriation by the upper states, or to a natural cause like a 20-year headwaters drought — the lower states would place a call on the upper states, which would have to cut their own uses and send their water downriver, whether they “caused” the shortage or not.

To maintain that flow in a drought, the upper states would bear the full pain of the drought for the whole river.

Guess which interpretation the upper states chose for their own 1948 compact? Never mind that a compact call led by California for its share of water is nowhere mentioned in the 1922 Compact. The axe was planted in the rafter.

They might better have asked how the 1922 Compact creators themselves envisioned the unknown future. The transcripts of the 27 Compact meetings show that the seven state commissioners and their federal chairman Herbert Hoover were concerned, as late as their 21st meeting, that they did not know enough about the river’s flows to make a permanent equitable division of the waters.

Hoover summarized their concern, and their intent: “We make now, for lack of a better word, a temporary

equitable division,” leaving the further apportionment of the river’s use “to the hands of those men who may come after us, possessed of a far greater fund of information.” They even included in the compact (Article VI) instructions for reconvening to consider “claims or controversy... over the meaning or performance of any of the terms of this compact.”

By the drought years of the 1930s, it was already obvious that the 7.5 million-acre feet compact allocations were unrealistic. That would have been a logical time for the upper states to pull the axe out of the rafter, before the river was so fully developed.

But they didn’t, and as the compact began to take on the aura of something carved in stone on a holy mountain, the fear of the “compact call” gradually descended into expensive paranoia.

The vastly expensive 24 million acre-feet of storage in Powell Reservoir just upstream from Lees Ferry was created there to fulfill the Upper Basin’s self-assumed “delivery obligation,” come hell or low water.

But now, hellish low water has come to Powell, and upper states are developing costly “demand management” programs whereby someone yet unspecified would pay ranchers to fallow fields so their water can be “banked” in Powell against the dreaded “compact call.”

The seven states are now — finally — initiating negotiations on a more reality-based governance of the Colorado River. Let’s hope they have the good sense to pull that axe out of the rafters before negotiating fair water use under it.

Preserve Employer-Sponsored Health Insurance

Congress is contemplating its next move on health care.

As part of the American Rescue Plan Act, billions of dollars in subsidies are on their way to those who purchase individual coverage through the exchanges. Many lawmakers now want to turn to legislation that would create a public health insurance option.

Most Americans get coverage for themselves and their families through their jobs. They like it. Under a public option, they could eventually lose it.

One analysis of a public option plan introduced in the House in 2019 found that it would have caused nearly one in four workers to lose employer-sponsored health coverage by 2023. By 2032, it would have deprived one in three of job-based coverage.

A public option would siphon people away from employer-sponsored insurance because it could provide coverage more cheaply than private insurers. Unlike private plans that must negotiate payment rates with healthcare providers, a public plan would have the power to dictate the prices it would

pay doctors and hospitals.

That’s exactly what our nation’s existing public health plans, Medicare and Medicaid, do. Total enrollment in the two programs approaches 140 million people. That means they insure more than two in five Americans.

With that kind of clout, Medicare and Medicaid significantly underpay providers. The two programs pay hospitals just 87 cents and 89 cents, respectively, for every dollar in cost they incur caring for the programs’ beneficiaries. Those underpayments totaled nearly \$76 billion in 2019.

Providers compensate by charging private insurers more. A study from the RAND Corporation found private health plans pay hospitals 247 percent of what Medicare would pay for the same service, on average.

Adding a low-paying public option to the mix would force providers to shift yet more of their costs onto private plans. Private insurers couldn’t simply absorb those additional costs. Their margins are already thin. The cost of care eats up 80 percent to 90 percent of every premium dollar. Higher costs for private insurers would

mean higher premiums and deductibles for employers and patients.

Some employers would respond by dropping coverage and directing their employees to the public option. Privately insured individuals would do the same. And the cycle would repeat, until the public option had pushed private health plans out of the market.

So, adding a public option is not, as its proponents assert, a way to expand consumer choice or inject new competition into the health insurance market. Instead, it would reduce consumers’ choices and destroy the insurance market.

Employer-sponsored insurance has been at the heart of the U.S. healthcare system for decades. And it’s popular. Seven in 10 people with job-based coverage give their plan a grade of “A” or “B,” according to the Kaiser Family Foundation.

Congress should listen to these folks - and not take any action that would harm our system of employer-sponsored health plans.

The project is subject to NEPA review because it is being funded, in part, with Federal funding available from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance.

Proposed Action

The proposed action will cover the expansion of the existing Justice Center. The expansion would allow the Tribe to increase the functions of the Tribal Court and the Yurok Tribal Police as a multi-purpose justice facility. The expansion of the existing facility will allow the Tribe to create additional space that utilizes existing water and wastewater services. The current space occupied by the Yurok Tribal Police is inadequate to meet the needs of their program and the communities that they serve.

Location

The proposed project will be located on the Yurok Reservation, on an approximately 0.3-acre parcel (APN 140-091-003) located at 230 Klamath Boulevard, within the town of Klamath, Del Norte County, California, east of State Highway 101 (U.S. 101).

Finding

The U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance has determined that the proposed demolition and replacement of the facility would not significantly affect the quality of the human or physical environment. It is not expected that an environmental impact statement will be prepared for this project.

On Friday, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration lifted its pause on the use of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, following a review by a federal vaccine safety review panel. The workgroup further recommended that vaccine information fact sheets be culturally and linguistically appropriate, and available in multiple languages at an accessible reading level to inform conversations between health care providers and vaccine recipients.

Washington, Oregon and Nevada joined California’s COVID-19 Scientific Safety Review Workgroup in October. The workgroup, made up of nationally-acclaimed scientists with expertise in immunization and public health, has concurrently and independently reviewed the FDA’s actions related to COVID-19 vaccines. It will continue to evaluate other COVID-19 vaccines as they go through the federal process.

Oregon stands to receive millions in funding

A major new piece of legislation, co-sponsored by Oregon Congressman Peter DeFazio, was introduced in the House of Representatives Thursdau. The Recovering America’s Wildlife Act of 2021 (RAWA) would provide vital new resources for the conservation of Oregon’s at-risk fish and wildlife species.

The legislation would dedicate \$1.3 billion annually to state fish and wildlife agencies to implement congressionally mandated State Wildlife Action Plans, like the Oregon Conservation Strategy, and dedicate an additional \$97.5 million for conservation led by tribal fish and wildlife agencies.

ODFW estimates that \$23 million per year would come to Oregon under the Recovering America’s Wildlife Act. ODFW would use these new funds to implement the Oregon Conservation Strategy and connect more Oregonians to the outdoors. This would add an estimated 12 percent to ODFW’s current budget and greatly expand programs and partnerships that maintain healthy fish and wildlife populations by maintaining and restoring functioning habitats, preventing declines of at-risk species and reversing declines

in these resources where possible.

“From my perspective, passing this bill would be the most significant moment in fish and wildlife conservation in the United States this century,” said Curt Melcher, director of the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife. “The Recovering America’s Wildlife Act would allow us to fully implement the Oregon Conservation Strategy and truly begin to address species conservation proactively instead of the reactive, emergency approach.”

State agencies will need to provide a 25 percent match in order to access funding from RAWA. Over 18,000 individuals have already donated more than \$400,000 to the recently created Oregon Conservation and Recreation Fund since the campaign launched in July 2020, which demonstrates that Oregonians are committed to supporting the Oregon Conservation Strategy and connecting Oregonians to outdoor opportunities.

“Oregon has a strong history of protecting and enhancing fish, wildlife and the lands and waters that support them. This new funding opportunity

College of the Redwoods releases economic impact report

In an effort to better understand College of the Redwood’s fiscal impact on the community and to support their mission to improve the livelihoods of our service region, the college recently commissioned a study to measure the economic benefits they generate for students, taxpayers, and society as a whole. What they found is that, compared to other avenues for investment, both students and taxpayers receive a very high return on their investment from attending and supporting CR. The findings are from Fiscal Year 2018-19.

For starters, if students complete a degree at CR, they will receive \$127.7 million in increased earnings over their working lives. This translates to a return of \$5.20 in higher future earnings for every dollar students invest in their education. This is an average annual rate 21.9%. For comparison, the stock market’s 30-year

average annual rate is 9.9% and the interest earned on a savings account is 0.8%.

For every taxpayer dollar invested, California taxpayers will receive \$4.60 in return, for as long as those students remain active in the state workforce.

Over the years, students have studied at CR and entered or re-entered the workforce with newly acquired knowledge and skills. Today, thousands of these former students are employed in the region. The net impact of CR’s former students currently employed in the regional workforce amounted to \$87.8 million.

CR employs 561 full-time and part-time faculty and staff, most of whom spend their income in the region for groceries, mortgage and rent payments, dining out and other household expenses. The college also supports the local economy with expenditures related to day-to-day activities in facilities, supplies and professional

services areas. Together, the net impact of the college’s operational spending added \$45.9 million in income to the regional economy.

Additionally, CR invests in construction each year to maintain its facilities, create additional capacities and meet its growing educational demands. This means they employ many local businesses, generating more short-term jobs in the regional economy. The net impact of CR’s construction projects was \$3.9 million in added income for the service region.

“This economic impact report clearly shows the importance of CR in that we contribute extensively to tax revenues but also act as one of the largest employers in our service area while at the same time serve as a robust producer of a highly skilled independent workforce,” President Keith Flamer said.

Padilla urges Biden administration to invest \$700 billion in universal child care

U.S. Senators Alex Padilla (D-Calif.), Elizabeth Warren (D-Mass.), and Tina Smith (D-Minn.), and Assistant Speaker Katherine Clark (D-Mass.), along with Senators Ron Wyden (D-Ore.), Bernie Sanders (I-Vt.), and Cory Booker (D-N.J.), are urging the Biden administration to include at least \$700 billion over the next 10 years for long-term, structural investments in universal child care in the American Families Plan.

Child care accessibility is a critical issue in California. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, 6 in 10 Californians lived in a child care desert with limited access to care, and thousands have been forced to close during the pandemic.

“As the pandemic has made clear, child care is essential infrastructure that makes all other work in our country possible. High quality child care also has long-lasting benefits for young children’s development,” wrote the lawmakers. “We believe this is a generational opportunity to invest in affordable, quality care for all children who need it, and we urge you not to let it go to waste.”

The American Rescue Plan included more than \$40 billion for child care programs. However, it is not a long-term solution to the lack of affordable, high quality child care for working families. Child care providers, who already operated on razor-thin margins, have experienced closures, reduced enrollment, and increased operating costs throughout the pandemic. By

one estimate, the combined relief funds are enough to fill this revenue gap for less than six months.

The American Families Plan, the lawmakers write, presents an opportunity to transform this broken system into one that is sustainable for families and providers over the long run. The plan should include making child care an entitlement for every family who needs it, capping out-of-pocket costs for families at no more than 7% of income, and raising payment rates for providers to ensure that they are paid a living wage with benefits, equivalent to other educators with similar credentials.

This investment would have lasting positive effects,

not just on children and families, but on the economy at large. A recent study from the National Women’s Law Center and the Center on Poverty and Social Policy found that providing affordable, high-quality child care to every family that needs it would increase the number of women with young children working full time by 17%, narrow the pay gap between women and men, and increase women’s lifetime earnings by nearly \$100,000 on average, with a corresponding increase in their savings and Social Security benefits.

“The American Families Plan presents an historic opportunity to not only recover from the devastating effects

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Building a digital defense with some spring cleaning

Take advantage of the next rainy spring Saturday and do some deep cleaning of your digital devices. In the end, you will be safer from bad actors trying to steal your money and your identity – and your device may actually run more efficiently.

Delete apps from your phone

Remember that game that your child just had to download on your device? But hasn’t been touched in two years? Or that yoga app you are sure you will use next week (but next week has come and gone dozens of times already?) Get rid of them. Both Android and iPhones give you the option to see how long it has been since you’ve used an app. Make sure you physically go in and uninstall the app –

don’t just delete it from your home screen.

Android

- Open the Play Store.
- Tap the hamburger menu in the top-left corner.
- Tap My Apps & Games > Installed > Change “alphabetical” to “last used.”

For any app you don’t use anymore, tap the name of the app, and then tap “uninstall” to get rid of it.

iPhone

- Head to Settings > General > iPhone Storage, to find a list of all your apps, organized by size. This section also lists the last time you used an app. Tap the app, and then tap the “delete app” button.

Delete software from your computer

Outdated software can be a huge security risk. Haven’t updated your PC since Win-

dows 7? Still have a copy of your tax software from 2009? Really? Why? Uninstall them! While you are at it, make sure you’ve got automatic updates enabled so your operating system stays up-to-date.

Of importance, be sure to uninstall Adobe Flash Player as it is no longer supported and is a prime pathway for malware.

Windows

- Open Settings > System > Storage, and then click on Apps & Features.
- Under the “sort by” dropdown, select “install date.”

- Go through and remove anything you don’t need. If an app is unfamiliar, search for it online to see if it’s something you need or if you can safely get rid of it.â€

Mac

- Click the Apple icon > About This Mac, and then select Storage > Manage > Applications.

- Go through to see if there are any apps you no longer need and delete them. If you have many apps, it’s useful to click the “last accessed” option to sort by the last time you opened the app.

Delete old documents from your devices or accounts

It’s a good idea to go through your documents and other files, too. Getting rid of big, old files can help improve your computer’s performance in some cases. Also, be sure to clear out your “downloads” folder periodically to ensure you

don’t accidentally click on anything you didn’t intend to download. Finally, check any online storage accounts you have for no-longer-needed items and get rid of them.

Remove Old Browser Extensions

You installed an extension years ago and used it once. Extensions can be handy, but nothing comes for free. Some browsers steal your data. Remove the ones that don’t “spark joy” for you anymore.

Chrome

- Click the puzzle icon > Manage Extensions.
- Click the “remove”

button on any extensions you don’t need.

Firefox

- Click the three-dot icon > Add-Ons.
- For any extensions you no longer need, click the

three-dot icon next to the extension, and then select “remove.”

Safari

- Click Safari > Preferences > Extensions.
- Click the “uninstall” button on any extensions here you do not need.

Get rid of old devices

Finally, time to ditch that 10-year old cell phone in the drawer... or that desktop that’s been sitting unused in your basement forever. Before you recycle or donate the items, though, make sure you wipe the device of any personal info. Restaurant Revitalization Fund opening soon

SBA Administrator Isabella Casillas Guzman announced Tuesday the U.S. Small Business Administration will begin registrations at 9 a.m. Friday, April 30, and open applications on Monday, May 3, for the Restaurant Revitalization Fund. The online application will remain open to any eligible establishment until all funds are exhausted.

“Restaurants are the core of our neighborhoods and propel economic activity on main streets across the nation. They are among the businesses that have been hardest hit and need support to survive this pandemic. We want restaurants to know that help is here,” said Guzman. “The SBA has focused on the marketplace realities of our food and beverage businesses in designing the Restaurant Revitalization Fund to meet businesses where they are. And we are committed to equity to ensure our smaller and underserved businesses, which have suffered the most, can access this critical relief, recover, and grow

more resilient.”

Established under the American Rescue Plan, and signed into law by President Joe Biden on March 11, the Restaurant Revitalization Fund provides a total of \$28.6 billion in direct relief funds to restaurants and other hard-hit food establishments that have experienced economic distress and significant operational losses due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This program will provide restaurants with funding equal to their pandemic-related revenue loss up to \$10 million per business and no more than \$5 million per physical location. Funds must be used for allowable expenses by March 11, 2023.

“Recognizing the great urgency to help restaurants keep their doors open – and with a clear mandate from Congress – the SBA worked at a breakneck speed and is excited to launch this program,” said Patrick Kelley, SBA associate administrator, Office of Capital Access. “From day one, we engaged with diverse stakeholders in the food industry

community to make sure we built and delivered the program equitably, quickly, and efficiently.”

For the first 21 days that the program is open, the SBA will prioritize funding applications from businesses owned and controlled by women, veterans and socially and economically disadvantaged individuals. All eligible applicants are encouraged to submit applications as soon as the portal opens. Following the 21 days, all eligible applications will be funded on a first-come, first-served basis.

Consistent with the legislation and the intent of Congress, the SBA continues to take steps to ensure the equitable distribution of relief, particularly for the smallest businesses, by creating a \$9.5 billion set-aside: \$5 billion for applicants with 2019 gross receipts of not more than \$500,000; \$4 billion is set aside for applicants with 2019 gross receipts from \$500,001 to \$1,500,000; and \$500 million for applicants with 2019 gross receipts not more than \$50,000.

Huffman, colleagues introduce Utility Resilience and Reliability Act

On Monday, Rep. Jared Huffman (CA-02) joined Rep. Mike Thompson (CA-05) and Rep. Doug LaMalfa (CA-01) along with Representatives Anna Eshoo (CA-18), Doris Matsui (CA-06), John Garamendi (CA-03), Mark DeSaulnier (CA-11), Ro Khanna (CA-17), and Jimmy Panetta (CA-20) to introduce the Utility Resilience and Reliability Act, a bipartisan bill to make the national energy grid more reliable and resilient to natural disasters and extreme weather events.

“Public Safety Power Shutoffs literally leave thousands of my constituents in the dark and at risk. With wildfire season upon us, we cannot compound the crises California communities are up against with unsustainable power shutoffs,” said Huffman. “By improving the strength and dependability of the electrical grid, this bill will make sure that utilities are doing the work to provide reliable power and keep Californians safe.”

“The last two years, Public Safety Power Shutoffs have hit our district and our entire region hard, forcing businesses to close and leaving communities vulnerable and we cannot allow this to become routine,” said Thompson. “That’s why I’m proud to again introduce the Utility Resilience and Reliability Act which will give us the tools to shore up the national electrical grid so that not only can we better respond to these events, but also be more resilient overall. This will allow our grid to better withstand disaster and keep our communities safe.”

“Power shutoffs every time the wind blows are not the makings of a modern economy. They’re costly and an embarrassment,” said LaMalfa. “The Utility Resilience and Reliability Act will alleviate both the threat of wildfires and the power shutoffs that plague millions each year by making it easier for federal, state and local governments to work together to keep our grid operating safely and efficiently.”

“In the midst of this public health crisis and as fire season approaches, we can’t afford power outages that left our communities in the dark in past fire seasons. That’s why I’m joining my Bay Area colleagues to introduce legislation to make our electrical grid more resilient to extreme weather and provide reliable power to Californians,” said Eshoo. “This legislation ensures California’s utilities reduce the risk of wildfires without shutting off power during this already difficult time.”

First introduced in June 2020, the Utility Resilience and Reliability Act addresses reliability and resiliency of the national electrical grid by:

- Establishing a program through the Department of Energy to advise and, be a resource for, states and local utilities on ways to improve the resiliency of their electrical grids.
