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Harbor to receive 'hotel tax' shortly

Two years after the transient occupancy tax, also known as Measure C or the "hotel tax," passed, the Crescent City Harbor should finally see some of the funds.

The harbor commissioners approved

the memorandum of understanding regarding the tax at its meeting Feb. 4. The measure, which originally passed by a simple majority in 2018, allows for a 2% increase on a tax for staying in a hotel or other lodging for less than 30 days, bringing the tax from 8% to 10%. It also added a 2% tax to rented spaces in recreational vehicle parks. Multiple lawsuits followed the passing of the tax, arguing that a special tax imposed by local government required a two-thirds majority to pass. Measure C passed with 55% approval.

However, others argued that since the measure was a voter initiative, it needed only a simple majority. In the end, the latter opinion triumphed. Meanwhile, the tax agreement has passed back and forth from the county to the harbor for amendments.

The funds accrued from the increase are set to go to the harbor for two purposes. The first is to pay off the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) disaster loan, which the harbor received following the 2006

Swim team looking for more Sharks

Growing up, Emalle Hartwick participated in a lot of sports, trying to find her niche within athletics.

"My mom always wanted me to be active — tee-ball, soccer, all of it. It just was never my thing," said Hartwick, a 16-year-old Del Norte High School student.

Then, six years ago, she found her thing as a Shark, the mascot name for the Crescent City Swim Club.

"I had a friend on the team before me, it was her first year. We met around fifth grade. She said, 'Hey you should check it out.' I've been on it ever since," Hartwick said.

Hartwick encourages other youth to check out the club, and February is the perfect time to do so. The Swim Club is hosting signups throughout February on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, 5:30-6:30 p.m. at Fred Endert Municipal Swimming Pool, located at 1000 Play St.

After years of watching Emalle compete, her mom, Robin, stepped up to be president of the club, which is completely operated by volunteer parents and coaches.

"There's a whole benefit for kids, the physical activity, plus swimming is fun," Robin Hartwick said, adding winter is the perfect time to compete in swimming. "So many sports in Del Norte County kids go, yuck, I don't want to go outside during the winter. We're not a year-round team."

She said the club used to operate through the summer months, but it couldn't compete with all the other students' activities once school was out. So, the team is active from September to end of May. To join the Crescent City Swim Club, members have to also join USA Swimming. There is a \$73 yearly fee and a \$65 a month membership fee. Robin Hartwick said qualified low-income residents can get reduced fees to join.

She said the fees go toward two big expenses — the club rents the entire pool four days a week for practices and that comes to \$2,500 a month for all six lanes. Also, they travel great distances for their meets.

The Sharks are part of PAC Swim Zone 3, but must travel to other zones — south to Fort Brag, Napa Valley and Santa Rosa and north to Medford, Grants Pass and Eugene, Ore.

"It's nice to go into Oregon. The gas and motels are cheaper, but Fort Brag is really nice. The pool there is definitely

Over 300 people are expected to attend BoatSmith Whitewater Festival in Gasquet on Feb. 14 to 17 for the second year of bringing the boating community together. This year, they will officially be hosting races.


funds are spent for the purposes dictated by Measure C. Luna said that as much as the harbor would like to have 100% control over the funds, this was one of the county's non-negotiable points.

"We think that the way this worked out is you still have a lot of control, just not 100%. Because some of this tax could be used for other than that purpose, they want to have some oversight," Luna said. "I think they've been pretty generous in recognizing and responding to our

concerns."

Some commissioners also noted at the Jan. 21 meeting that the harbor likely would not be able to draw on the funds for anything other than the loan for roughly 25 years, so worrying about approval of the funds for maintenance projects and the like is not an immediate concern.

Once the county approves the MOU, the funds from the tax will be collected by the county and then deposited into a special account for the harbor established by the auditor.

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Crescent City awards \$3.8M for Front Street storm drain project to Tidewater Contractors

rescent City awarded the task of replacing its aging storm drains on Front Street to Tidewater Contractors, the second-largest Public Works project the city has ever undertaken after the Waste Water Treatment Plant rehab in 2007

City Manager Eric Wier explained at the Feb. 3 City Council meeting the project will target the storm drain on Front Street between B and G streets and long portions on C and F streets.

"The storm drain system during the real heavy storms creates a lot of issues, overflowing on 3rd Street and into residences

that has dislocated a lot of families during these storm events,"

Wier said. "The original system that was put in the 1950s was

cast iron and needs to be replaced." The contract with

Tidewater Contractors comes to \$3.833 million.

Wier said much of that will be paid from the \$4 million Community Development Block Grant it received. The City Council approved allocating another \$167,000 to the project from its water fund, leaving the city with a contingency fund of about \$426,000 according to Wier.

In addition to replacing the storm drains, the city approved Tidewater Contractors' \$50,000 alternative to also replace street lights and install additional conduits for receptacles and tree wells for a PA systems along Front Street.

Wier said this will move Front Street

closer to the city's vision for the street's future.

"This is not to just build a storm drain project, but to put the street back to the way it is on the master plan

reducing it to two lanes and utilize existing asphalt through the building of a median strip to have diagonal parking along Front Street," Wier said.

Tidewater Contractors was the lowest of five bids city staff received. Wier said work is planned to begin April 26 with an expected completion date of February 2021.

He added there is a "hard" end date of June 30, 2021, as the CDBG funds must be expended by an expenditure deadline of July 31, 2021.

As a result of this move, the school district will be working with stakeholders, including staff, parents, students, site administration, and the board of trustees, to develop a list of desired attributes, which will be incorporated into the search process for the next DNHS principal.

Del Norte pharmacies offer drug take-back service

wo pharmacies in Del Norte County now take back medicines for no charge. Both CVS and Walgreens drug stores now have bins next to their pharmacy counters where customers can deposit their prescription and over-the-counter medicines, ointments, lotions, vitamins, medicine patches and pet medications.

CVS is located at 657 U.S. Highway 101. Walgreens is located at 787 L St.

"This is big news that we now have not one but two locations where people can safely dispose of their medications and pharmaceuticals,' said Ted Ward, director of the Del Norte Solid Waste Management Authority, in a press release.

Medicines may be placed in these bins in their original packaging and those materials will be properly managed, following collection so personal information is kept secure. The double-lock bins cannot be opened without two separate keys from both the pharmacist and the collection company.

Customers who are especially concerned about protecting their personal information may also choose to empty their solid medications into a clear Ziploc bag. After removing or obscuring personal information, empty plastic pill bottles with numbers 1, 2, 4 or 5 inside the chasing recycling arrows may be placed in recycling bins.

Ward advises that medicines should never be flushed down the drain or toilet, as those drugs are pollutants and

neither wastewater treatment plants nor septic tank companies have the means to remove drugs dissolved into wastewater.

Both Walgreens and CVS programs also accept liquid medicines. CVS asks its customers to place those closed liquid containers into sealed Ziploc bags before placing them into the bins.

One slight difference in the programs is Walgreens accepts inhalers while CVS does not.

Neither medicine dropoff program accepts illegal drugs like heroin, cocaine or methamphetamine; chemicals like hydrogen peroxide; or mercury thermostats. Similarly, neither program accepts "sharps" like Epi-pens, needles, syringes, lancets or other sharp containers. Sharps in FDA-approved

containers can be disposed of without charge at the following locations:

Del Norte County Transfer Station, 1700 State St.

Open Door Community Health Center, 550 East Washington Blvd.

Del Norte Senior Center, 1765 Northcrest Dr.

"I am especially impressed by the commitment Walgreens and CVS have shown by creating and paying for these drug take-back programs," Ward said. "In my opinion, that is really an excellent new customer service.'

In 2018, SB 212 was signed into law with the intent to reduce accidental poisonings, reduce abuse of prescription drugs and to improve water quality. Ward said when fully implemented, this law will establish comprehensive, producer-funded take-back programs for pharmaceutical and sharps wastes across California.

"One of the requirements of this law is that every community with a population of 50,000 or more will have access to an in-store drug take-back program. I am just thrilled that years ahead of this requirement, we already have two local pharmacies in Del Norte which are taking these new and important responsibilities seriously," Ward said.
