



Considering Stage 3 reopenings

Dr. Warren Rehwaldt told the Del Norte County Board of Supervisors Tuesday he is working on new plans in the wake of the governor and the state Health Department allowing another variance for counties to move more quickly into Stage 3 reopening.

California has a four stage plan for reopening the economy

following closures imposed in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Information about what is called the Road to Recovery (R2R) is available online at <https://covid19.ca.gov/roadmap/>.

Rehwaldt said the new state list of what may be allowed in Stage 3 is fairly long. It includes hotels, RV rentals, campgrounds, outdoor recreational areas, galleries, museums, zoos, family entertainment centers, bowling alleys, bars, wineries and fitness

centers.

However, Rehwaldt said he is not keen on authorizing them all to open immediately and has not finalized a new plan.

“I think it would be reckless to introduce everything at once,” he said. “We’re still trying to measure (the impact of) everything that opened in Stage 2, including retail stores, barber shops, salons and places of worship. It will take some time to see that happen.”

Rehwaldt said the county Public Health Department is trying to handle reopening in a safe way that doesn’t push the envelope too far.

“I don’t have anything definitive to share today. We need to work a few more days to develop something for the public and board of supervisors’ consumption later this week,” Rehwaldt said.

Rehwaldt said the plan will likely involve first opening plac-

es that will help the economy.

“So, it would be useful to open some of our rentals, at full or 50 percent, we’re still trying to figure out the best strategy. I’m comfortable with low risk businesses, like museums and galleries. They’re low traffic,” Rehwaldt said, pointing toward Ocean World and the Mammal Recovery Center.

He said he considers RV parks

County halts changes to road

Residents of Wonder Stump Road received the news Tuesday they’ve been waiting years to hear – Del Norte County will make no changes to the beloved, redwood lined, one-lane road.

The Board of Supervisors voted to accept the county staff’s recommendation of maintaining the “status quo.” All supervisors were present except for District 2 Supervisor Lori Cowan.

For longtime resident Mack Eller, the fight to maintain the idyllic lane was waged through a social media campaign that went viral around the world and the supervisors actually listening to the overwhelming opposition to any development plans.

“It sounds like we may have won a battle, maybe not the war, because it looks like they can change their mind down the road,” Eller told The TriPLICATE. “But it sounds like the county listened to us.”

Wonder Stump Road, a two-mile stretch of road off U.S. Highway 101 about four miles north of Crescent City, got its name after an enormous, 1,500-year-old redwood toppled, and over the next 3,500 years another redwood grew up, over and around the original. The upper portion of the growth was logged in the 1800s, leaving behind an unusual stump growth that remains to this day near Eller’s property.

The lane itself features redwoods along both sides, creating

a canopy effect. Residents feared that the trees in this canopy would be logged.

The county began looking at potential hazards along the narrow lane in 2018, including ditches on either side that had to be hand cleared and low hanging branches that were problematic for emergency vehicles and school buses.

Then in July 2019, residents received a letter the county was seeking input from the community to weigh the pros and cons for making potential improvements. Several options were presented at a community meeting in December that included the widening of the road and removal of the redwood trees.

Eller’s wife Donna kicked off a “Save Wonderstump” Face-

book page with a link to a petition on change.org that now has more than 6,000 signatures from all over the world. The story was published widely, including on the front page of the Los Angeles Times.

During the Zoom meeting, supervisors heard from residents still in doubt of the final vote.

“I think it’s pretty clear what the people want with over 6,000 signatures from all over the world,” Smith River resident Joni Forsht wrote to the supervisors by email. “I just can’t see how you can ever consider removing trees from Wonder Stump Road. But, most importantly, there has been an outcry from residents who live in this

Del Norte Drive-through graduation

Del Norte Unified School District officials were forced to abandon the preferred standing graduation ceremony for Del Norte High School seniors after the county health officer did not approved their plans.

Del Norte High School will now go with the community’s second choice of a drive-through ceremony at 6 p.m. Friday — unless the school gets a last-minute reprieve from Dr. Warren Rehwaldt, county health officer.

Principal Randy Fugate walked through Plan B option of the drive through graduation ceremony for the school board at their June 4 meeting.

For Plan B, Harding and Small streets will be closed off. Parents and graduates will be queued up in 160 cars and wind their way up to the stage. Meanwhile, radio station KPOD has offered to broadcast the ceremony live, Fugate said, so they can listen to the whole ceremony. In addition, it will be live streamed on Facebook

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101 closed overnight June 15-18

Travelers need to know that there will be four full overnight closures of U.S. Highway 101 south of Crescent City from June 15 to June 18.

Caltrans will close the highway from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. from just north of Wilson Creek Bridge (post mile 13) to Humboldt Road (post mile 23.8) in Del Norte County to keep progress moving on the Last Chance Grade project.

Traffic will be piloted through the project every two hours. There is no detour around the road closure.

Emergency services will be accommodated through the closure, if necessary. Electronic overhead signs will also be used to notify motorists of the plan.

“Since we were unable to complete the work during the last full closure in May, we will use these four nighttime closures to fulfill our purpose,” said Karen Sanders, Resident Engineer for the Last Chance Grade Project. “We must fill the roadway to keep the project moving forward. This work entails backfilling the adjacent turnout a maximum of nine feet and backfilling the roadway one foot to reach 5 feet above ground anchor drilling at the wall on the west side of the roadway. Ground anchor drilling will begin within the next few weeks.”

Police Chief speaks at Black Lives Matter rally

Crescent City Police Chief Richard Griffin spoke with those present at a rally in Crescent City Sunday, saying that the local police department has already made many changes that protestors have asked for as part of the national Black Lives Matter movement.

Organized by teachers Sarah Elston, Paige Thompson and Jenn Longrie, it was the second such event held locally in the wake of the Memorial Day death of George Floyd in police custody in Minneapolis. The rally was in front of the Del Norte County Fairgrounds on U.S. Highway 101

“We are out here to support the black community, we’re out here to support communities nationwide and worldwide that are standing up to say that people have been silent too long,” Thompson said. “I’m really glad to see we have the support of our local law enforcement agencies. They’ve been wonderful. It’s

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Tribal members call to end cycle of abuse

More than 100 native and non-native men and women marched to Yurok headquarters in Klamath Friday to bring to an end the cycle of abuse fueled by allegations of bullying in the workplace by a former staff member.

Javier Kinney resigned in November as executive director with little public explanation other than a commitment from Tribal Chairman Joseph James to the Tribe's sexual harassment policies.

James rehired Kinney in April, which rekindled the animosity between tribal citizens and the council leader.

In a Facebook post, James reiterated his commitment to supporting women's and men's rights and in the belief in giving second chances. He did not attend the rally Friday.

The "Call to End the Cycles of Abuse" protest march began at 5 a.m. from Weitchpec to Sregon. From Sregon, the protesters went by water via jet boat to Requa, then marched from Jet Boat Tours parking lot the rest of the way to the Yurok Tribal Offices in Klamath.

Among the many speakers was Ruthie Maloney, the tribe's former assistant director of self-governance. She said she was happy that so many turned out in support of the march.

"I thought it was good for (being during) the pandemic," she said. "It shows how important it is taking our lives in our hands to protest on this important issue."

Event co-organizer Susan Masten, President of Women Empowering Women for Indian Nations, was also ecstatic with the turnout, especially with such short notice at the beginning of

the week.

"And we're pleased men, women and children are here, too, because it just shows we all care about each other and we all want

to stop the violence," Masten said, adding the protest march an important step in removing Kinney. "I think this will ensure when an action comes to the table, it

will pass. That's what we're counting on, that this will make the difference."

Masten said she would like to see council governance reformed.

"Today what do want to have are HR policies that protect the employees and ensure there isn't abuse at the workplace so the employees can feel safe," Masten said.

To keep the momentum from the march, she urged demonstrators to sign a petition and for elders to sign a special letter to tribal leaders, asking if anyone present had a hand in crafting the Yurok Tribe's Constitution.

Masten said the letter and the petition calls on tribal leaders to take three key steps:

- Institute mandatory harassment and anti-bullying training for the Tribal Chairman, Council and staff
- To conduct an independent investigation of the tribe's human resources policies
- To hold an executive session for employees to voice their concerns about any abuse in the workplace.

Graduation surprise for preschoolers

This week, nearly 200 Del Norte County children moving on from pre-school to kindergarten are receiving backpacks and t-shirts during drive-by graduations thanks to the work of the Del Norte Child Care Council (DNCCC) and funding from Wild Rivers Community Foundation (WRCF).

"With graduation ceremonies involving large crowds cancelled because of COVID-19, our hearts broke for the littles," said Melodee Mitchell, the Del Norte Child Care Council's executive director. "This

is a big milestone and we didn't want our littles and their parents to miss out."

The DNCCC and the WRCF's 3READ23 Literacy Initiative is working with local preschools, churches and tribes that have scheduled drive-by graduation ceremonies this week. Participating schools include Mary Peacock, Joe Hamilton, Little School of the Redwoods and Smith River schools. A total of 189 youngsters will graduate from preschool to kindergarten, according to Jessica Ortiz, 3Read23 Literacy Initiative coordinator.

The backpacks were as-

sembled by the teachers and delivered to preschool sites, including extra backpacks for preschoolers already enrolled for the following year.

"In all of their little backpacks, they're receiving from the school district kindergarten registration forms," Mitchell said.

The teachers will also give students t-shirts, which read "Readers Become Leaders" on the front and "Kindergarten Here I Come!" on the back, during drive-up events.

At each school site, teachers and volunteers will follow strict health

and safety guidelines and protocols required from their school superintendent. This may include some school sites allowing only one teacher per class to distribute the graduation amenities, and must require face masks, gloves and sanitizer.

"Though it may not have the weight of a high school graduation, Del Norte's youngest students are celebrating a milestone that's no less important in the time of COVID-19," Mitchell said.

Suspect in custody after 11-hour standoff

A standoff between an armed motorist and law enforcement that closed down both directions of U.S. Highway 101 over the weekend came to a peaceful conclusion at about 2:30 a.m. Sunday.

According to the California Highway Patrol press release, on June 6, at approximately 3:17 p.m., CHP Crescent City Area was advised that the National Park Service (NPS) was in a pursuit

of a tan Buick Century. The pursuit was heading northbound on U.S. Highway 101 at mile post marker 101 HUM 131.7, in Humboldt County.

At the Del Norte County line, NPS requested CHP take over the pursuit. According to the CHP, their units got in position and deployed a spike strip, successfully deflating all tires. The suspect vehicle continued traveling north for about one mile before coming to a stop at MPM 101 DN

16, blocking the northbound traffic lanes.

As CHP units initiated felony stop procedures the driver, who was the sole occupant of the vehicle, displayed a firearm and would not relinquish the weapon to law enforcement personnel. He remained in the vehicle pointing the gun at himself and threatening his life. He refused to comply with the directions of the officers for approximately 11 hours. U.S. Highway 101 was closed due to

public safety while officers continued to negotiate with the man.

According to the CHP, the subject ultimately surrendered and was taken into custody. Cooperating agencies included the Del Norte County Sheriff Erik Apperson, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, Fish and Wildlife, National Parks Service, State Parks, Yurok Tribal Police and the California Department of Transportation.

On Monday morning, CHP Public Information Officer Brandy Gonzales said the suspect was in CHP custody, awaiting charges and the investigating officer was completing his report.

"He just wanted to be let go," Gonzales said about the subject of hours-long negotiations. "We just wanted to safely get him removed and safely get everybody out of there."

Because travelers were stranded on Saturday

night, officials allowed hotels and motels to rent rooms. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, California lodging establishments have been allowed to providing rooms only to essential workers.

Also, the Del Norte County Office of Emergency Services worked with the Red Cross and Yurok Office of Emergency Services to provide blankets and other supplies to motorists stranded on the hill between South Beach and Klamath.

suitable for a low risk category, saying tourists could rent a spot and still adhere to social distancing guidelines. However, he placed bars and gyms in a high-risk category.

Meanwhile, Rehwaldt said the county public

health website has been updated.

The website (<http://www.co.del-norte.ca.us/covid19>) as of 5 p.m. June 10, shows out of 1,758 tests administered, there have been 47 confirmed cases in Del Norte County, with no new, no active cases and no hospitalizations. It also breaks down the demographics of the confirmed cases:

24% , ages 0-17
62%, ages 18-49
10%, ages 50-64
4%, ages 65 or older.

Fugate said the graduate will then get out, walk across the stage for their diploma, while the family follows in position, staying in their cars.

Michael Hawkins told The TriPLICATE Wednesday it appears

Dr. Rehwaldt chose to stay with an abundance of caution in which plan to approve.

"A lot of counties are handling graduations as a local decision, while others are staying with the state level," Hawkins said.

Allowing communities to host mass gatherings is in the state's Phase 4 in its Resilience Roadmap to reopening.

Hawkins said the school still has plans in place for Plan A should Rehwaldt change his mind at the last minute.

Rehwaldt did not return The TriPLICATE's request for comment before the deadline for this edition.




Fugate said nobody voted for a third option, a virtual ceremony. Elizabeth Ward, School Board Student Rep-

resentative, said her fellow seniors voted for the in-person graduation as their first preference.

"The drive through was the second choice," Ward said. "The virtual option got destroyed. It got no votes."

Hawkins said he's holding out hope that Rehwaldt could still change his mind at the last moment. If Plan A is approved, it is a two-stage outdoor ceremony on DNHS Whalen Field, splitting the seniors into two groups, with one ceremony at 4:30 and a second at 7:30 p.m. Each graduate would be allowed to bring two to three family members who will be seated six feet apart in the bleachers, with seniors seated 12 feet apart on the football field.

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Bill Steven: Making it over the finish line

Undersheriff shares memories of 32 years

When Bill Steven gave his final radio call as undersheriff May 22, his “1010,” he gave a long list of people who helped “keep him straight” through his 32 years

with the Del Norte County Sheriff’s Office. At the top of his list of supporters was his wife, Alania. “I just wanted to thank everybody who got me over the finish line over the years, over the decades,” Steven said. “But she was that rock that was with me for this whole journey and I couldn’t have done it without her.” As is tradition, the dispatcher then read off over the radio a long list of career accomplishments by Steven, obviously choking back emotions. The recording can be viewed on the DNCS’s Facebook page. Steven said he actually gets kidded a lot by others who ask what hasn’t he done at the sheriff’s office? “I tell people I never played with bombs, or suspected bombs, and I

never had a dog,” Steven said, referring to the canine unit. Other than that, Steven’s name is just associated with some of the biggest events in Del Norte history. A native of Crescent City, Steven split his time growing up between here and the family ranch in Big Flat (located out in the boonies near Hiouchi). Steven got out of town after high school for a three-year stint in the U.S. Army, then returned home. He used veterans benefits to put himself through the police academy and was hired on by Sheriff Mike Ross in February 1988.

He quickly progressed from working as a bailiff at the jail, to boating safety and patrolman. Then his career took a swerve. “By the summer of 1990, I was growing my hair out and my beard long for the drug taskforce for quite a few years,” Steven said. “The only downside to drug enforcement, there were a lot of 2 a.m. calls and my wife didn’t care for that. We got married in that period. My wedding pictures are of me with this big red beard down to here (motioning halfway down his chest) and hair halfway down my back.” During his four years

on the drug task force, Steven set a Del Norte County cash seizure record of \$540,000 that stands to this day. After 1994, Steven handled regular detective work and actually caught a bank robber. “That was kind of a cool case. He had a funny name – Harley Ray Davidson,” Steven recalled. He also helped solve a cold case murder case. In 1995, Steven was promoted to sergeant and worked at the jail for a while. In 2001, Steven was again promoted to detective sergeant and started working general and serious crimes, like sexual assaults and murders. “Most cops who’ve been up through the ranks like me will tell you it’s

fun being a detective. When you’re the guy in charge of the detectives and you’re working the important cases, the high profile cases, the murders, the child molesters, you just get a lot of satisfaction out of working those cases, seeing them through to the end and sending people to prison for long time,” Steven said. Steven then took the administrative leadership position of commander and finished out his career as undersheriff, working with Sheriff Erik Apperson who joked he was none too pleased to see him go. “I was very fortunate that I inherited Bill in his position and had instant access to him,” Apperson said. “That made my transition into being sheriff so much easier because I was able to pry out all that institutional knowledge he’s had and gained over the years.

But, about five or six years ago, Steven set his career limit at age 55. “I just decided when I

hit the double five, that was enough, and stuck to it,” Steven said. He is still work as retired annuitant, though, assisting with some administrative tasks. He also hopes to be more involved in as a local volunteer firefighter, something he’s done since 2008. Steven’s career accomplishments include international goodwill, as well, leading to the sister city relationship between Rikuzentakata, Japan, and Crescent City. Many know how a boat from Takata High School in Rikuzentakata was swept away to sea after the 2011 eastern Japan earthquake and how the subsequent tsunami destroyed the Crescent City Harbor. What most don’t know, Steven said, was the boat sat in the sheriff’s office back parking lot for months after being hauled away from South Beach. “After they confirmed it was from Takata High School, where more than 20 students and a couple teachers died, I knew they really wanted it back for

deep, spiritual reasons. But nobody was lifting a finger to do it,” he said. So, he volunteered to spearhead its return. “So, I went over there with my son and these five or six kids. They treated those kids like they were rock stars for a week,” Steven recalled. “All that led to the development of a sister city relationship between Rikuzentakata and Crescent City.” Of all his biggest career accomplishments, Steven said that \$500,000 drug seizure and solving the cold case were pretty good. But they pale in comparison to his little idea that blossomed into international good will. “They’re both cop stories with pretty depressing undertones. This story was the happy story I get to tell people,” Steven said. “I was at the right place at the right time to come up with the right idea from my living room that eventually led to a sister city agreement. I get to pack that around with me for the rest of my life and that feels pretty good.”

National Forest restrictions aim to prevent wildfires

Fire restrictions are in place on the Six Rivers National Forest as officials prepare for an above-normal fire season for much of California. Restrictions are effective immediately and until further notice. “We’re taking this step much earlier than normal, but it’s necessary to protect our employees, our communities and forest resources,” Forest Supervisor Ted McArthur said. “With an above-normal fire season projected for much of California, anything we can do to keep our firefighters and communities safe, is a step in the right direction,” he said. McArthur said 95 percent of all wildfires in California are human-caused. “Reducing the number of human-caused fires on the forest ensures our firefighters are available to safely respond and manage other incidents,” he said. Under these fire restrictions, igniting, building,

maintaining, or using a fire outside of developed recreation sites, designated fire-safe sites, and wilderness areas within the boundaries of the Six Rivers National Forest, will be prohibited. Specifically, fire restrictions on the forest:

- Limit open campfires to developed recreation sites, designated fire-safe sites and wilderness areas within the boundaries of the forest. See the attached list and map for locations.
- Permits are not required in developed recreation sites; however, a free California campfire permit is required for fires in designated fire-safe sites and the wilderness areas. Permits may be obtained online at www.preventwildfireca.org/Campfires/.
- Limit smoking to enclosed vehicles or building, in areas at least three feet in diameter that are barren or cleared of all flammable material, developed recreation sites, and within designated fire-safe sites. See the attached list

and map for locations.

- Prohibit operation of internal combustion engines except off paved, gravel, or dirt National Forest System roads and trails and boats on a water surface.
- Prohibit welding or operating acetylene or other torch with an open flame.

General exemptions to these restrictions include:

- Using lanterns or portable stoves using gas, jellied petroleum, or pressurized liquid, in an area at least three feet from any flammable materials, with a valid free California campfire permit (www.preventwildfireca.org/Campfires/). Barbeque grills using briquettes are not allowed.
- Using chainsaws for fuelwood gathering within the terms of a valid fuelwood-cutting permit, or persons operating under the Forest Service waiver of fuelwood permits for personal-use.

Additional exemptions may be found in attached Forest Order 20-01-001.

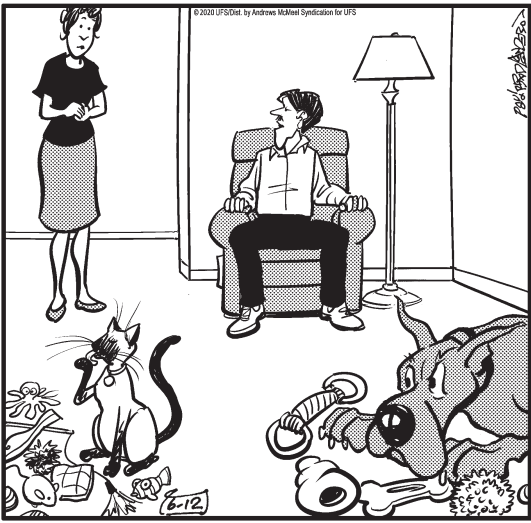

change.

“We’ve already changed one of our policies – the carotid is no longer in our policies, the choke hold,” Griffin said, noting the quick action taken after Gov. Gavin Newsom banned the hold on Friday. “We’re also progressive on this before. A lot of the policies you are wanting in place are already in

place in California, especially the Crescent City Police Department.”

“Just understand, we’re here with you, we are community, too. We serve you, we understand our oath to you, and I’m ready for some change, too,” he added.

Griffin told The Triplicate that residents in the large metropolitan cities, where many of the protests were followed by looting and rioting, could learn a lot from a small

town like Crescent City.

“You know your neighbors. If America could get back to that, know your neighbor, love your neighbor, a lot of things could be solved,” he said. “A lot of the negative stuff I don’t put towards the movement. I think there’s a lot of people who have been cooped up, been locked in our houses for three months. So, you had a lot of anger to begin with towards the government, this sparked

it. It was kind of a perfect storm with no distractions.”

To help get the message out from more voices, Shawn Dean, a former college advisor at Del Norte High School and a member of the NAACP, was distributing information on how to get involved with and donate to the Humboldt County NAACP Chapter. He also recommended Del Norte County groups like True North Organizing

Network’s campaign against bullying and for grade-school students to look into the Gay-Straight Alliance and the indigenous people’s clubs.

Thompson said the rally provided the perfect opportunity to bring attention to a problem that permeates all parts of society, from small towns like Crescent City to large urban centers.

“White supremacy is everywhere. And even if you yourself are not white su-

premacist or you yourself don’t feel yourself being a racist, it is so interwoven in the way our education system, our justice system,” Thompson said. “It’s hard to hear things like that at first. It’s hard to acknowledge. You get defensive. It takes listening to the voices of the people who are affected... really hearing what they’re saying and taking yourself out of the center of it and put other groups at the center of the conversation.”

beautiful place of peace.”

Donna Eller told The Triplicate they were amazed the petition signatures printed out to 284 pages.

“They started coming from all over the world — Zimbabwe, Kenya, England, New Zealand. We were wondering how in world they were finding our Facebook page,” Eller said. “A lot of them were military who used to live here or came here as tourists. A lot of them grew up here and moved away. We have several generations who walked through the tree tunnel, many to get their wedding pictures

taken there.”

In the staff report, Roads Superintendent Jeff Daniels and Assistant County Engineer Rosanna Bower wrote that the staff considered seven conceptual alternatives, taking into consideration community response, the number of traffic collisions, effort and expense to maintain the road and the trees in the area.

Del Norte Local Transportation Commission Executive Director Tamera Leighton told the supervisors Tuesday that the county requested funding from the commission to complete its Wonder Stump Road study.

Leighton added she hoped everyone who signed the petition op-

posing any changes to the road would read the document “rather than the chatter on social media” so they could get past a lot of misinformation and understand the facts of what the county was looking at.

“Before the project was initiated there was a lot of misinformation going on in the Wonder Stump community area,” she said. “I really appreciate that county staff’s initiating this work to put an end to some of the misinformation, trying to get facts out there, solicit public comment and do the hard job.”

The report contained more than 200 written comments and a printout of the petition’s 6,200 signatures. Del Norte Local

Transportation Commission’s Commonplace tool was used to gather the community input.

“The outcome of the planning document is the majority of participants in the planning process would like to see the status quo maintained,” Bauers and Daniels wrote in the report. “This is the easiest alternative to achieve since the ‘Summary of Wonder Stump Road Community and Stakeholder Engagement’ was undertaken with no funding identified or anticipated for environmental studies, right-of-way acquisition, design or construction.”

However, Mack Eller had concerns with the report’s wording that “planning activity for Wonder

Stump Road didn’t result in any promises or absolutes.”

“Maintenance has and will continue to require the periodic removal of trees and impacts to tree roots and canopies,” the report said. “Any future project along Wonder Stump Road will comply with the California Environmental Quality Act.”

“It left it a little open-ended in my opinion,” Mack Eller said.

However, he pointed to a suggestion he liked by District 1 Supervisor Roger Gitlin. Gitlin asked Del Norte County Probations Chief Lonnie Reyman, who was listening in via Zoom, if his department would be up to allowing probationers to “burn off

hours” by keeping culverts free of roots and debris that could save a potential \$10,000 to \$20,000 to the county.

“I’d be happy to participate in a program that allows offenders to complete their community service hours,” Reyman replied.

Donna Eller summed up the community’s feelings for not removing the trees in an email to the supervisors. She said she goes out of her way to drive down through the tunnel to get to town. In the 15 years she’s lived there, Eller said the trees never jumped out to cause the only couple of accidents she knows of along the road.

“It’s never the tree’s fault,” Eller said.

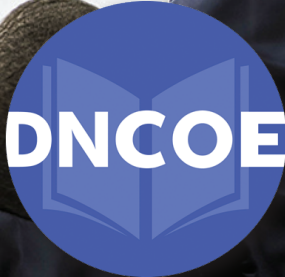



Large wildfire risk is high through September

Federal officials who track weather and climate are seeing an above normal significant large wildfire potential for Northern California and Southern Oregon in the current fire season.

According to the National Significant Wildland Fire Potential Outlook, Predictive Services section of the National Interagency Fire Center, the areas are still in drought despite above-normal precipitation in May.

Precipitation in May

was above normal over a large portion of the region. However, precipitation totals since the rainy season began on October 1, 2019 have been below normal in all but a small portion of far northeastern California. Some central and western areas have received less than half of the normal rainy season precipitation. This has led to a weak snowpack that will be almost entirely gone by early June and very light snow melt runoff.

Current outlooks call

for warmer and drier than average conditions from June through September. Pacific frontal systems are expected to occasionally move across the region in June, and some will bring lightning. Dry north to northeasterly wind events will follow frontal systems. Dead fuels are expected to dry to critical levels in June and the annual fine fuel crop will be sufficiently cured to carry fire in June.

In the Pacific Northwest, most areas west of

the Cascade-Sierra crest that are below 6000 feet will have Above Normal Significant Fire Potential in June. Areas above 6000 feet are will still receive the benefits from the weak snowpack in June. In July and August north to northeasterly winds are less likely, so elevations below 3000 feet (west of the crest) return to Normal Significant Fire Potential.

The summer monsoon is expected to be close to normal, in terms of its impact on California. Due to the

overall precipitation deficit and spreading drought conditions, dead fuels at all elevations are expected to be sufficiently dry to carry fire beginning in July. Even below average lightning occurrence and amounts will pose a high risk of large fires in timber. Elevations above 3000 feet and PSAs dominated by timber (the northwestern mountains) have Above Normal significant large fire potential in July through August. In September, there is a transition

from the lightning threat back to the offshore wind threat. So due to these potential weather triggers and the expectation of very dry fuels in all areas, all areas have Above Normal Significant Fire Potential in September.

Because of the added challenge of fighting wildfires with COVID-19 restrictions, fire officials are asking the public to be especially diligent in preventing fires and fire restrictions have been imposed in many locations.

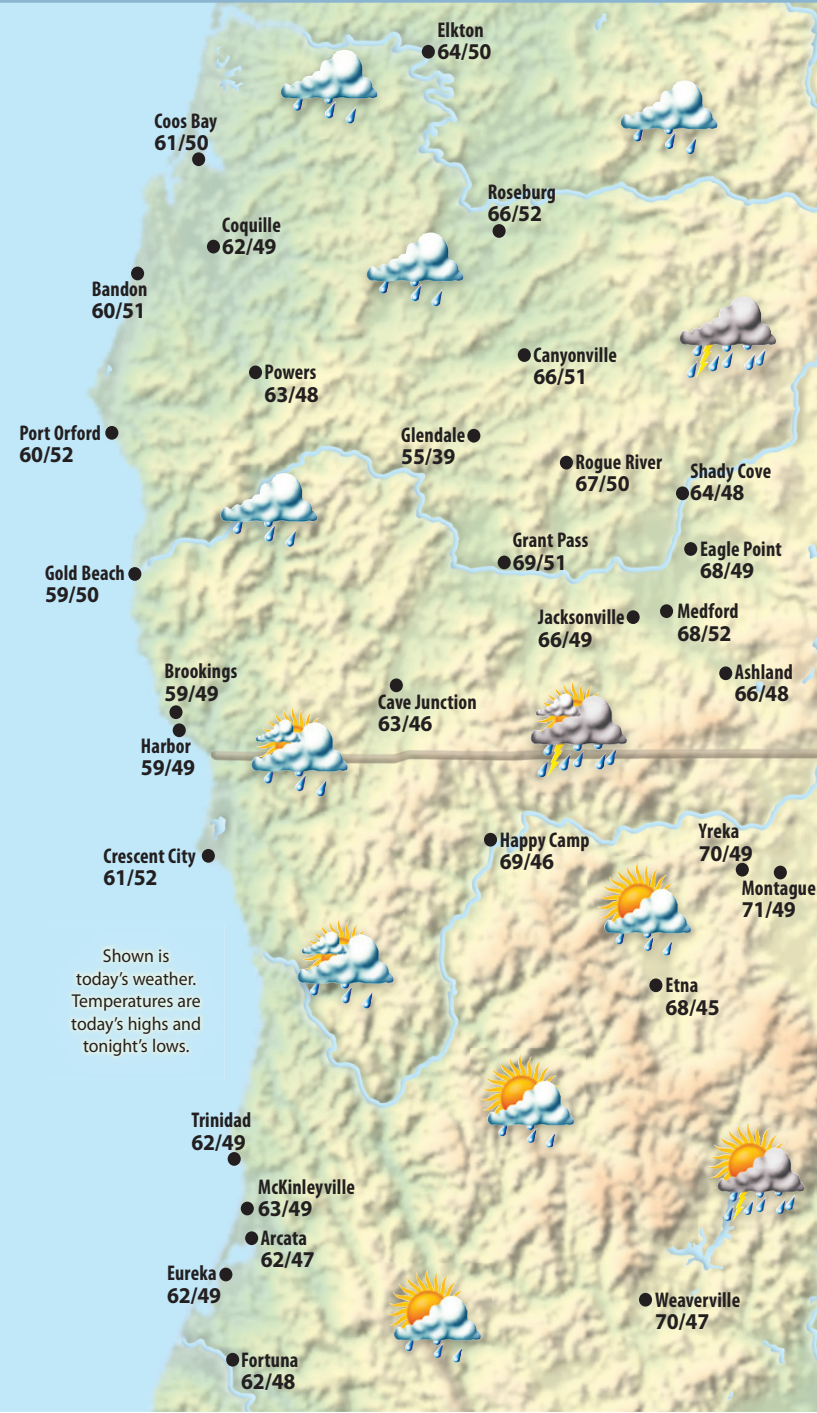
