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Candidates seek closure in runoff election

Incumbent Lori Cowan and challenger Valerie Starkey are in a runoff election for Del Norte County Supervisor District 2 because neither garnered more than 50 percent of the vote in the March primary.

We asked both candidates the same four questions to help voters decide how to cast their ballot in the Nov. 3 election.

First, introduce yourself to the voters.

Cowan: My family and I have lived in Del Norte County for

over 18 years. I have worked in Real Estate for the past 12 years. My husband and I have raised our children in this community and now we are watching our two grandchildren grow up here.

Starkey: My family moved to Del Norte County in 1974 after my father transferred as a California Highway Patrolman. I graduated Del Norte High School in 1985, afterwards moving to Sonoma County to attend college. I worked for the Sonoma County Probation Department for close to 30 years, retiring in 2015 as a probation officer. I have an amazing son, Nick, who I raised with his father, Richard. After

retirement, I returned home, to the community I love.

Why are you running for County Supervisor (or running again)?

Cowan: I am seeking re-election because I love Del Norte County and I love what I do. I deserve an opportunity to continue working for our community in order to see numerous projects come to fruition and with the support of my constituents, I will be able to keep things moving forward.

Starkey: I am running for County Supervisor because Del Norte County deserve a strong,

committed leader who will serve District 2 with respect, integrity and honesty. As a probation officer, I developed a skill set to face tough issues with a cool head and a deep respect for humanity. Based on my training, I am able to listen to all sides of an issue before providing a practical solution.

What are your top three issues facing the county?

Cowan: 1. Homelessness: Since 2016, I have been working directly with Senator McGuire in addressing solutions for our homeless community within Del Norte County. There are won-

derful things that are currently happening to help address both short term and long term needs in our community. We have been working to determine what the best “fit” is for our community, whether that would be permanent supportive housing, interim to permanent housing or development of an emergency shelter. I have been working with Del Norte Mission Possible, to not only implement a Community Homeless Shower program but also a 24-hour Homeless Shelter. The County has also recently been awarded funding for “Homekey” which is funding to

Ian’s Ride brings advocacy

Ian Mackay’s ride Oct. 5 out of Crescent City, the second leg of a 272-mile journey from Brookings, Oregon, to Fort Bragg, California, literally started with a bang.

Less than a quarter mile after kicking off the day heading south on Highway 101 from Humboldt Road, a tire blew out on the bike of one of his accompanying cyclists.

Mackay chose the Redwood Coast for his third big ride to advocate for more outdoor accessible pathways, especially for those confined to wheelchairs as he is.

His first time along the Redwood Coast was in 2006, before his injury, on the road crew for good friend Josh Blaustein’s bike tour through the region. Now Blaustein was a member of the crew accompanying Mackay.

An avid outdoorsman, Mackay suffered a spinal cord injury in 2008 from a bicycle crash, leaving him paralyzed from the neck down.

But the injury didn’t leave him inactive.

As technology caught up with his love of touring the outdoors, Mackay journeyed further and

further in a powered wheelchair.

His first big ride in 2016 was a 335-mile excursion across Washington State.

He followed that up in 2018 with a trek from Coeur d’Alene, Idaho to Port Angeles, Washington.

Along the way, he founded the nonprofit Ian’s Ride.

“What we do is advocate for a more accessible outdoors,” Mackay told The TriPLICATE.

“That can be a variety of things — pushing legislation to increase trail access, side with the cycling community, working on a grant

to get an accessible merry-go-round in a park near my home, or a pump track with ADA parts.

To make the outdoors fun with kids with chairs or anyone else in a chair.”

He added through the big ride, he demonstrates to others that it can be done.

Mackay’s electric chair is decked out for comfort on the open road. He sits beneath a red canopy to keep off the sun’s harsh rays. It’s topped by attention grabbing red flags and a pair of fuzzy dice “for style.”

In the rear are two lithium

batteries (with a third on the way to get him up the hilly sections of southbound Highway 101) and a cough-lator to actually help MacKay cough, as his high spinal cord injury prevents full breaths.

Another setback of the injury is the inability to regulate his body temperature. That’s where his signature dreadlocks come in handy, which hang down and loop into a small bundle in his lap.

“I don’t know how they got to be this long, to be honest,” Mackay said. “They just hit 17 years. I did it kind of on a lark, and here I am, 17 years later, still... I can’t shiver to stay warm or sweat to cool off. I live in the Olympic Peninsula, it’s cold up there, and the hair is good for that. However, in the past 3-4 months, it’s starting to get long enough where it’s getting caught in the wheels. So I have to have this silly hair wrap in my lap. But hey, it keeps me warm.”

The dreads came in handy for his run down from Brookings, as well.

“We had a lot of fun, on the side roads, cruising through Brookings, and just meandering down the coast,” Mackay said. “I will say, it was cold. Started off a little chilly day one.”

As the executive director of Ian’s Ride, Mackay said he loves being a part of the outdoor community, an ambassador and a consultant for chair manufacturers.

“I love talking with the people making the equipment that allows us to get out there, to live a lifestyle we want,” he said.

He added he’s also an advocate for more accessible trails. The Pacific Coast bikeway would be a perfect recipient of his advocacy.

Mackay said the challenge was the narrow shoulder on Highway 101 and having to keep his chair between the guard rail and the

Police welcome Drug Terminator

The Crescent City Police Department has a new tool in its ongoing war on drugs — The Drug Terminator.

Police Chief Richard Griffin told the City Council at its meeting Sept. 21 about the acquisition, which was donated by RX Safe Del Norte Coalition. Griffin said during meetings with the nonprofit, a need was discussed regarding the disposal of narcotics seized by the police department and other law enforcement agencies in Del Norte County and then adjudicated through the court process.

“Full credit goes to Sgt. Leslie Gill, who mentioned the product he used to use down in Blue Lake. It was an excellent product he researched, and we tried to get it put in our budget,” Griffin said. “But it cost just under \$5,000 and it went out the window for us with the COVID issues that came.”

That’s when RX Safe Del Norte Coalition stepped in and donated the funds to purchase the unit.

The Drug Terminator is a 55 gallon drum, converted into a cyclonic barrel burner, that is lightweight and mobile, Griffin said, that can easily dolly from storage indoors to use outside. On top is a whirlwind device to make the wood or charcoal fuel burn really hot. Griffin said after burning the drugs, it leaves behind completely sterilized ash that can be thrown away in with regular trash.

“That’s one of the best things I can say about it, is it is no longer hazardous material at that point,” Griffin said.

Jermaine Brubaker of the RX Safe Del Norte Coalition told the city council the Drug Terminator will not only help the CCPD save money disposing of illegal drug seizures and help them destroy backlogged drugs still in evidence storage, but it will also help community members dispose of personal medication.

“We know that not only is unused medication a problem within our community, when it comes to the opioid crisis, having a backlog of evidence like that just opens the door for it to get back on the street,” Brubaker said. “During the medication disposal, it costs a lot of money to get it to the DEA as well. It takes out the middle man and save money for the future.”

“We can push medication disposal in the community as well, get those medicine cabinets cleaned out give them a place a go and basically cre-

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mate it,” Brubaker added.

She said RX Safe Del Norte Coalition has been working with local law enforcement, giving them narcan (a nasal spray to help reverse an opioid overdose) and fentanyl test kits. The coalition had also planned to fund travel money associated with getting drugs disposed of in other locations, sometimes as far away as Sacramento.

“When COVID came along, we had to redistribute that budget mon-

ey, so this was a great partnership to bring on,” Brubaker said.

Griffin added the Drug Terminator will also be made available the other arms of law enforcement, including the sheriff’s office, California Highway Patrol and Tribal Police. He’s still researching if Pelican Bay State Prison is eligible to participate in Drug Terminator burns, or if the state has its own regulations for drug disposal.

“It’s an amazing donation. We’ve put it to immediate use,” Griffin said. “We’ve started an audit of our evidence

room. We have a huge need to get rid of backlog of drugs that could have been destroyed before that are just taking up room in our evidence room.”

Law enforcement officers put the Drug Terminator to use to burn illegal drugs and expired medications.

rumble strip.

“If I touch that rumble strip, it tends to pull me into traffic. And my chair pulls a little to the left anyway and I’m always correcting. It was a little anxiety-rich first day, getting back into the swing of the ride,” he said.

Mackay said his chair’s top breakneck speed, no pun intended, is 7.5 mph. On a flat route, with both batteries in their prime, Mackay can go 50 to 60 miles.

“But with hills, with a battery that’s a couple years old, it’s going to be tough. We have a 40.5 mile day out of Crescent City on day two to just south of Orick. With hills, not sure if we’re going to make it or not,” he said.

He added his chair actually works in his favor navigating a consistent speed on the hills, where his escorts on bicycles have to ride their hand breaks to keep even with him on downhills.

“I don’t love being on the side of highways. It’s pretty good. There are some places that are a little

sketchy. But I’ve got the best crew a guy could ask for. They get out there and make me feel pretty safe,” Mackay said.

During the pandemic, he’s had to cut back on some of the regular activities he enjoys during his rides.

“I love to sit in a brewery at the end of the day, talk about the ride while drinking a cold one,” he said, adding he was able to stop at SeaQuake on Saturday and Port O’Pints on Sunday, but with a smaller crowd. “And rather than hotels, we’re doing Air BNBs to stay isolated.

We get there, everything gets Clorox wiped down. I have to recognize I am a high risk person, we just do everything we can to keep our bubble small.”

Mackay added he was unable to invite his many close friends from UC Santa Cruz, where he was injured, nor was he able to invite his dad up from San Diego.

But his mom, Teena Woodward accompanies him as driver on his crew. She’s grown accustomed to following her son on the open road, even if she did think he was crazy during the first big ride.

“Then it became this big whirlwind as he got a lot of attention. It became bigger than him wanting to go on a long ride with his buddies and drink beer. It got to be really big,” Woodward said. “In 2018 it was terrifying coming down the Cascades, with RVs and smoke and no visibility. I was really worried. Now, this is the third time. I’m coming into it with no expectations, you really don’t know what’s around the next corner. It’s always a big energy push to keep him going. I’m proud of him. It’s what he loves to do.”

Over the years, as Ian’s

Ride has gained national attention, Mackay has seen progress big and small, from the State of Washington paving a six-mile section of Hurricane Ridge allowing access to explore the back country of a national park, to seeing moms with developmentally disabled kids get involved.

Regardless how big the results of his advocacy, Mackay said the message, in the end, remains simple.

“People, no matter what their ability level is, get outside,” he said. “We have an incredible world to explore. Go check it out. Don’t stay in your house.”

purchase and rehabilitate hotels/motels into permanent- long term housing which will create 30 permanent housing units within our community.

2. Last Chance Grade: As everyone knows, Last Chance is the main artery within Del Norte County. I have been an active voice and an ongoing presence in not only Sacramento but also Washington, D.C. to make certain that Last Chance Grade remains the focus allowing us to continue to move forward to obtain the funding necessary to keep this project moving forward.

Starkey: I have more than three issues I will make my top priorities if I am fortunate enough to be elected for a seat on the Board of Supervisors. Frankly, I believe that my top issues will rotate regularly to reflect the needs of the residents in District 2. The bottom line is the residents’ top issues will become my top issues, no matter how small or how complex. We must focus on the issues that affect the largest percentage of our community and work in service to our entire

community, rather than on issues that affect less than 1% of the population of Del Norte county.

But in addition to the residents’ concerns, and given my career experience, I lean toward wanting to provide more opportunities for youth and looking for solutions to keep our elderly protected and in their homes for as long as possible. I am also a strong advocate for our at “risk populations” and feel robust programming and services are essential. I believe seeking alternatives which will apply best practices that are not only effective, but cost saving as well. And, of course, transportation (Last Chance Grade and Highway 199) should stay on every Supervisor’s front burner.

Why should voters support or oppose Measure R to raise the sales tax within county limits by 1 cent?

Cowan: Residents of unincorporated Del Norte County should support Measure R as it will provide a safer future for Del Norte County. Measure R will allow the County to continue to fund important county services by providing support for law enforcement, maintaining emergency dispatch services for fire, ambulance and law enforcement, maintaining jail and criminal justice programs and also addressing repair of potholes and streets in Del Norte County. Measure R provides a prudent plan to help address the County’s most critical needs for which no other funding ex-

ists to meet these growing needs.

Starkey: Voting for a tax increase is a personal decision for voters to make. I agreed with the Board of Supervisors when they voted to place the measure on the ballot, leaving it up to the people who it directly affects to decide. I am in support of Measure R, not because I believe in raising taxes, but I want to make sure that our residents have the necessary services to keep them safe and healthy. If the voters decline the increase, then as elected officials, we will need to figure out ways to provide the best services with the revenue available, cutting all unnecessary spending. Should

the voters agree to the tax increase, I will still insist that all unnecessary spending be eliminated and that the oversight

committee has all the information they need to provide the public with regular, accurate reports regarding spending.

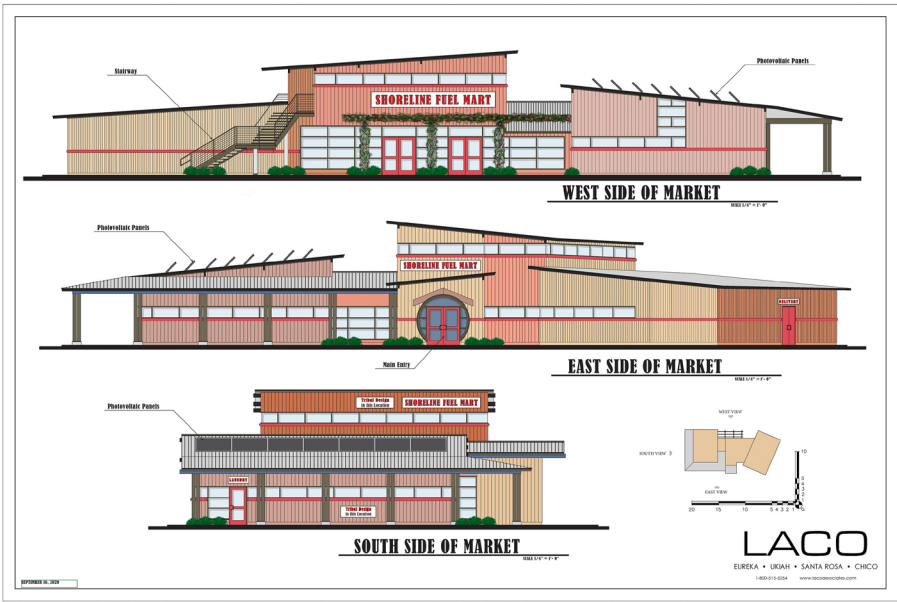
Yurok Tribe purchases nine-acre Shoreline Market parcel in Orick for fuel mart

The Yurok Tribe recently acquired the Shoreline Market in Orick and will soon begin building a state-of-the-art fuel mart, laundromat and tribal government office on the nine-acre property.

“This project is a win, win,” said Joseph L. James, the Chairman of the Yurok Tribe. “In addition to providing important services to local residents, the business will produce new employment opportunities and serve as a source of revenue for tribal programs. This acquisition also represents the recovery of a significant piece of land within our ancestral territory. Bringing this land back under tribal ownership is just as important as the financial gains it will generate.”

Sherri Provolt, the Orick District Representative on the Yurok Tribal Council, said the Yurok Tribe has engaged the Orick community at every stage of this endeavor, adding the community is grateful for all of the support it has received.

“The people of Orick are just as enthusiastic as we are about the plans for this property,” Provolt

said. “Owning a modern fuel mart in proximity to one of the busiest parts of Redwood National and State Parks will benefit the Tribe in the present and in the long term.”

Donna Hufford, the Director of Orick Chamber of Commerce, said the Orick community is excited about the Yurok Tribe's plans to renovate, renew and rejuvenate this property.

“We are delighted that this new business will serve as the southern gateway into our community,” Hufford said. “As a community organization, we thank the now former owners of the Shoreline Market for the excellent service they extended to local residents and the greater public.”

The economic development project will

involve the construction of a two-story building this is approximately 6,000-square-feet. The first floor of the partially solar-powered facility will house a minimart that will be filled with snacks, cold beverages and other convenient items. The laundromat will also be on the ground level, but it will have a separate entrance. The second story will contain

offices and two conference rooms. The US Highway 101- adjacent business will offer eight unleaded and high-flow diesel fuel pumps as well as multiple electric vehicle charging stations. Once complete, the conventional fuel dispensers and electric charging stations will be open 24 hours a day. During construction, the gas pumps will remain open for local residents and others because there is only one fueling station in Orick.

The town of Orick is named after a traditional village called Owr-rekw and is roughly in the center of the Yurok Tribe's ancestral territory on the coast, which extends from the Little River in Humboldt County to Damnation Creek in Del Norte County. Several Yurok families, whose roots reach back

to the original village of Owr-rekw, continue to live in Orick today.

Tribal officials said the acquisition of the Shoreline Market is a critical component of the Tribe's long-term plan to create jobs and a more resilient economy in the region, where a large majority of the 6,200-plus Yurok citizens reside. In the past two years, the Tribal Council has invested in three new businesses within and outside of the Yurok Reservation:

- The Mad River Brewing Company in Blue Lake in 2019
- The Weitchpec Nursery in 2020

Amezcua said he simply wants to help people.

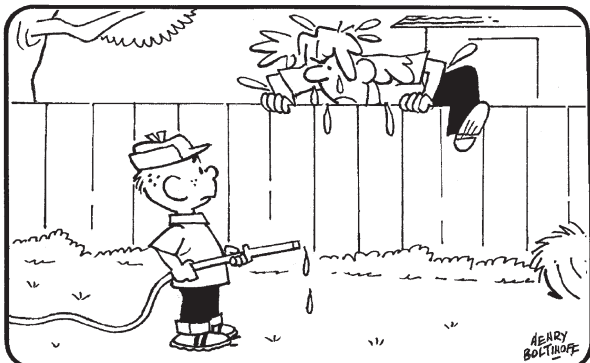
"I understand that I may be called to serve them during their worst day and my goal is to be helpful," Amezcua said.

At the swearing in ceremony, Amezcua's wife DNSO Deputy Corina Amezcua pinned on his badge.

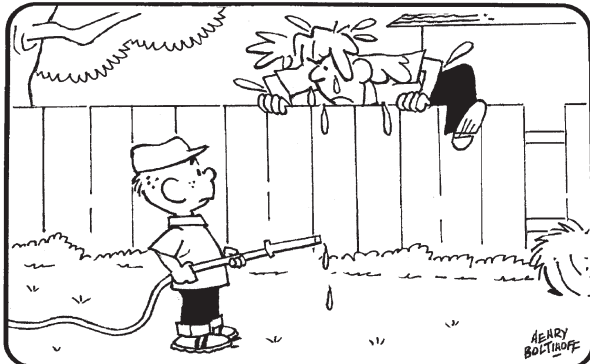
Additionally, Naverez who inspired Amezcua to achieve a career in law enforcement, retired from a meritorious career with the CHP and is now also a DNSO deputy.

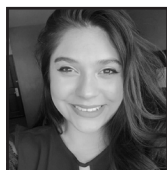

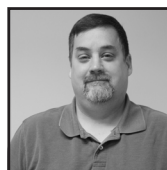

La Cappell’s closing doors less than month after debut

Kathy and Joseph Lujan had big dreams and no fears opening their new restaurant La Cappella’s during the pandemic.

However, less than a month later, the couple realized there were too many factors aligned against them to keep their doors open. La Cappella’s will close permanently as soon as the excess food stock and inventory are sold off.

Joseph said many factors led them to realize not long after their opening Aug. 15 they were in over their head.

The first was structural. For example, the Ansul system, a fire extinguishing system required in industrial kitchens, hadn’t been inspected since 2008.

“That was over \$4,000 right off the bat,” Joshua said.

Then there were the electrical and plumbing issues. “We had Swede Company Electric come up here and look at it,” Joshua said. “He looked at it and said, ‘Oh my God. You guys are so under powered.’ The breakers were heating up. Both panels needed to be replaced. We’re

talking major amounts of money that should have been done a long time ago.” And as head chef, Kathy admits her goals were too ambitious. “Part of the problem was my fault, too. We had a big menu. And everything is made from scratch,” Kathy

said. “Maybe I should have started off smaller. But I wanted to please everybody. Even with the menu I had, people were like, ‘Oh, you don’t have this?’” As much as a buzz was created by a new restaurant in town, the opening proved to ill timed. “There are still a certain percentage of people uncomfortable to step out during COVID,” Joshua explained. “And the fires didn’t help. Nobody wanted to go out after they said shelter in place. That was a week of revenue we lost.” “We were busy, but not busy enough. With the amount of staff we had,” Kathy said, pointing to their greatest expense in labor costs to keep 13 full-time employees, “we needed to do at least, net, \$3,000 a day. Instead they were averaging

\$2,200 and on slow days \$1,500.” Joshua said if they had more money, they would wait out the slow start if they could. “But you can’t fight COVID, number one. And number two, you can’t fight a building that has major issues and we have no control over,” he said. This week Kathy slowly tabulated sales of the remaining food stuffs and supplies, from the meats and cheeses out of the deli counter to shelves of cleaning and cooking stock. She had to sell her brand new oven last week, still on a pallet, wrapped in plastic, at a loss. Kathy also started up a GoFundMe page to raise \$500 to qualify for a matching Federal Small Business Relief grant. To contribute, find the link on the La Cap-

pellas Facebook page. The couple plans to learn from the situation and try again at another location sometime in the near future. In the meantime, Kathy plans to try her hand at catering orders, going to people’s houses. “I’m going to take the most popular items that we sold and go from there,” she said. “There’s a reason why things happen, I believe that. This is a lesson for us. It also told us, don’t buy this building. It also showed us what the community loves.” “It’s the American dream,” Joshua added. “You get knocked down, you get back up. This is the greatest country on Earth, regardless who is running it. There’s opportunity. And we love this city. We’re going nowhere. We want to spend the rest of our lives here.”

Free firewood permits

The Six Rivers National Forest (SRNF) will continue to issue free personal-use firewood permits through Dec. 31 despite closures due to COVID-19 or the wildfires.

Although the permits are free, woodcutters will still be required to hold a personal-use firewood permit and follow all regulations within that permit. To receive a free permit, call any SRNF ranger district office, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. - 4 p.m.:

- Gasquet Ranger District: (707) 457-3131
- Orleans/Ukonom Ranger District: (530) 627-3291
- Lower Trinity Ranger District: (530) 629-2118

• Mad River Ranger District: (707) 574-6233 With all offices still closed to the public, all permits will be mailed to requestors, so allow extra time for delivery. The permit package will include the permit, a personal-use firewood map and firewood tags. These permits are only valid on SRNF lands open to firewood cutting. With a personal-use firewood permit, up to 10 cords of firewood may be cut for personal use. Any previously obtained 2020 firewood permits will count toward the 10-cord limit. A cord is the amount of tightly piled wood in a stack four feet high by four feet wide by eight feet long.

If a 2020 firewood permit was purchased prior to COVID-19 office closures, the permit remains valid and can be used until the termination date of the permit. Additional information, including maps, may be found at www.fs.usda.gov/main/srnf/passes-permits/forestproducts. It is the responsibility of the permit holder to be aware of the daily firewood-cutting restrictions in effect. Firewood-cutting restriction information can be obtained by calling (707) 441-3665 or visiting www.fs.usda.gov/goto/srnf/firewood-pal. In addition, permit holders need to be aware of any forest closures in effect. Currently, there are closures around the Slater (Gasquet Ranger District), Red Salmon Complex (Orleans/Ukonom and Lower Trinity Ranger Districts), and August Complex-North Zone (Mad River Ranger District) fire areas. For information on these closures, go to www.fs.usda.gov/alerts/srnf/alerts-notice.

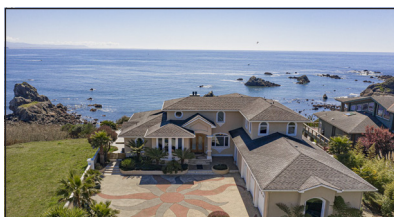



When he returns, approach the kids together, and in an age-appropriate manner, explain to them separately what happened. Many young people experiment with drugs because they think

that addiction and death won't happen to them. Knowing what happened to their cousin could ensure it won't happen to either of them.

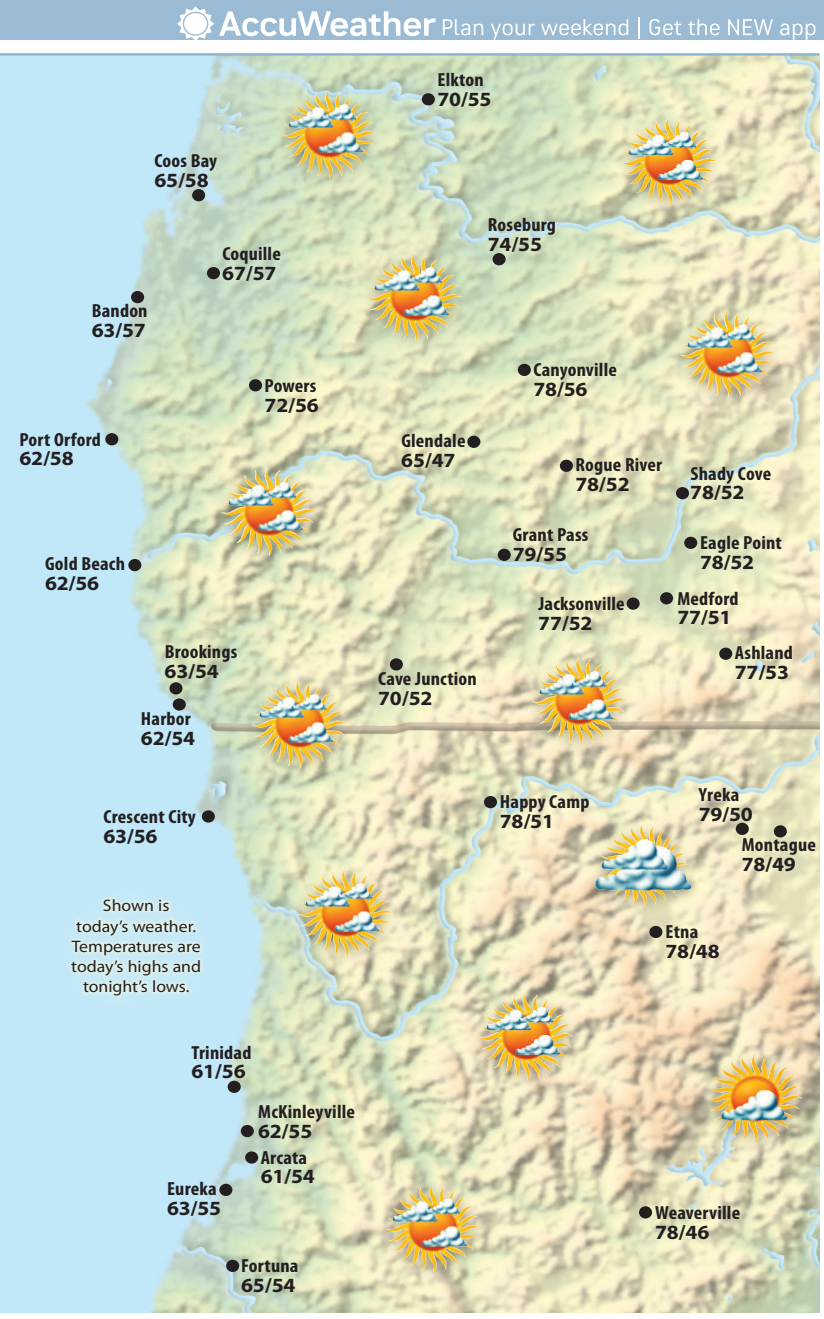
