




The Adolescent Brain



Impact of Trauma



The Maturity Gap



Teenagers Have Low Psychosocial Maturity and are Hyper-sensitive to External Influences

Psychosocial immaturity weakens capacity for:

- impulse control;
- resisting peer pressure; and
- weighing the consequences of actions.

Implications:

- Some level of delinquency is fairly typical during adolescence.
- Adolescents are constantly changing so particularly capable of change.


Hyper-sensitivity to external influences such as peers, short-term incentives and rewards; and experiences and activities

Implication: Youth respond better to incentives, experiences and opportunities than to sanctions and punishment.



Developmental Complications

- Autism & other communication disorders
- Intellectual disability
- Chronic medical conditions
- Mental illness



Senate Bill 94—Revisions to RSA 169-B:10

Statement of Purpose and Findings.

- I. In furtherance of the objectives stated in RSA 169-B:1, the general court finds that promoting the **earlier engagement in the community based services** and minimizing the involvement of youth in the formal legal system will promote the goal of **positive youth development**.
- II. The general court finds that authorizing pre-petition engagement by the department for the purpose of completing assessments and making referrals to the children's behavior health system or other appropriate services and supports will increase the use of diversion and decrease the need for future judicial involvement.
- III. It is the intent of this act to provide the department with the authority to assess all youth as early as possible in the process and the ability to share that information with law enforcement, prior to formal involvement with the court, in order to minimize the need for court involvement when the minor's needs can be met with services.

Essential Points of SB 94

- Prior to filing a delinquency petition with the court, the arresting agency or prosecutor shall refer the minor to the department of health and human services (DHHS) for a voluntary needs assessment within 2 business days of arrest
 - Minor & parent/guardian must consent to needs assessment
 - If no consent, DHHS reports to prosecutor, who can proceed with filing
- DHHS completes needs assessment within 30 days of referral
 - unless assessment already done within prior 6 months, then DHHS provides law enforcement with prior report and recommendations
- Following assessment, DHHS makes recommendations re: whether petition is necessary and for supports/services, provides report to the minor, parent/guardian, minor's attorney, and law enforcement agency
- Prior to filing, arresting agency or prosecutor must review DHHS's report and recommendations to screen the petition for participation in other voluntary services or diversion.

Exception—Immediate Detention/Placement

- ❖ A petition may be filed prior to the completion of the referral and needs assessment if prosecutor or arresting officer determines there is a need to request an order from the court for immediate detention or non-secure placement to protect the minor or the community;
- For these cases, if minor has not had an assessment in the prior 6 months, DHHS shall make the assessment available to the minor after the petition is filed
- Confidentiality and admissibility of the report, recommendations and related statements shall be treated the same as assessments completed prior to the petition



VOLUNTARY NEEDS ASSESSMENT FLOW CHART



Referring entity submits the referral form to JJreferral@dhhs.nh.gov
Referral is received by the Division for Children Youth and Families
30-Day timeframe for completion of needs assessment report begins

Case is assigned to the District Office and to an Assessment Juvenile Probation & Parole Officer.

District Office sends the Opening Letter and Brochure to the family

Juvenile Probation & Parole Officer calls the family within 72 business hours from the day the referral is received. Three attempts to contact the family are made within 14 business days

If contact is made, Juvenile Probation & Parole Officer will explain the needs assessment process, ask the family if they consent to participate and arrange an interview

The child and parent or guardian must consent to the assessment

Juvenile Probation & Parole Officer meets in-person with family, explains voluntary process and ability to withdraw consent.

Consent form signed

Family is interviewed. Collateral information and reports are gathered.

Needs Assessment (Brief CANS) is completed

Report with recommendations is completed, shared with the child, parent or guardian, attorney and the referring entity

With consent from family and referring entity, recommended referrals are made to Community Based Services (ex. Diversion, Boys & Girls club), Behavioral Health Services (ex. Mental Health Agencies, Counseling, Psychiatry), Care Management Entity (ex. Fast Forward) or Voluntary Services through the Division for Children Youth and Families (ex. Multisystemic Therapy, Intercept)

Assessment case remains open for up to 60 days to assist the family with referrals and connection to services. Once referrals are made, closing letter is sent. If any member of the family declines to participate, withdraws consent, or if no response is received

> Juvenile Probation & Parole Officer will consult with Administrator

Recommendation is made to referring entity that they may file petitions with the Court. Closing letter sent

What if consent is not given by the child, parent or guardian to make referrals or if the referring entity does not agree with the recommendations from the assessment?

If referral is made for Voluntary Services through the Division for Children Youth and Families, case will be assigned to a Juvenile Probation & Parole Officer for case management.

What if the child or family does not comply with the recommendations made by the Juvenile Probation & Parole Officer or withdraws consent to participate at any phase?

What if Law

Petitions may be filed.
Arraignment occurs.
(If the family has not already been provided the opportunity to participate in the needs assessment, it will be offered).

Adjudicatory hearing occurs resulting in a true finding. With consent of the youth, following consultation with counsel, report (or prior report) is admissible for Court disposition.
