ANCASTER — First came the cooler temperatures, then the dimmed day and finally cheers and applause from eclipse gazers at the Lancaster Fairgrounds when the moon totally blocked out the sun for less than a minute on Monday.

'Scary and sad and magnificent all at the same time," Boston's Shirley Lee said after her daughter, Ella, convinced her to drive five hours to experience the total solar eclipse.

Lee, whose daughter was visiting from Los An-

Thousands packed the fairgrounds parking lot looking to enjoy the eclipse while others threw down blankets and coats on the snowless grass

Records: Rep. threatened to kill cops, rape chief's wife before leaving PD

■Threats allegedly made after former officer Jonathan Stone was suspended for "inappropriate" relationship with teen.

CONCORD — Republican state Rep. Jonathan Stone lost his job as a Claremont police officer in 2006 after investigators said

"postal" shooting spree that included killing his police chief and raping the man's

Investigators said Stone made the violent threats within earshot of several police officers after he was

yearlong "inappropriate" personal relationship with a 15-year-old girl who went to Stevens High School.

"Stone's conduct goes so far beyond what is expected of a professional police officer that only appropriate resolution is his removal from office," wrote Claremont Police Detective Capt. Colby Casey, who has since died.

For years, Stone fought to he threatened to go on a suspended five days for a keep the records of Clare-

gations secret.


Last month, the state Supreme Court ordered those files be released in response to Right-to-Know Law requests by the New Hampshire Union Leader, other media and the American Civil Liberties Union of New Hampshire.

Claremont Police Capt. Mark Chase, now retired, opened the investigation in February 2006 into Stone's

mont PD's internal investi- relationship with the girl, whose name was redacted from the records.

The two had a personal relationship for about a year, and it "progressed to the point where they call each other almost on a daily basis for hours at a time, Chase wrote.

Stone and the girl denied they had a sexual relationship.
