

A festive evening awaits

Hampton Falls brings the holidays home with its first Christmas Market

AREN SABATINI, coordinator for the Hampton Falls Farmers Market, listened as market baker Liz Blankenship discussed what she'll be bringing to the first Christmas Market. When Sabatini mentioned her sourdough starter, Sabatini said, "I need to buy one for my niece."

The town of Hampton Falls will once again gather for its annual Christmas tree lighting on Saturday, Dec. 6. But this year the event will be a full holiday festival, with several town departments and organizations pitching in to create memories.

The town's first Christmas Market goes up Saturday, Dec. 6, from 4 to 7 p.m., on the Town Common. There will be something for everybody, even the organizers.

Sabatini said the Christmas market is an outgrowth of the spring, summer and fall markets. The town hasn't been without holiday cheer, according to her.

"The Rec Department coordinates the tree lighting. Santa and Mrs. Claus arrive by fire truck, there's hot chocolate and cookies, there's music." It's "heartwarming" and "quintessential New England," she said.

But she and Rec Committee member Linda Savov wanted to see more, and they brainstormed. They came up with the idea of the Christmas Market and ran it by others.

Savoy said, "This year we wanted to get as many departments involved as possible." So they reached out.

Librarian Erin Sniderman has

traditionally set up displays on how different cultures celebrate in December, and she agreed to take her Festival of Lights to the

The Historical Society agreed to provide the cocoa and cookies, while the Friends of the Bandstand signed on for hot cider and doughnuts and at least one live

band. They reached out to local businesses, too. Dodge's, the Agway store, agreed to run a tree-andwreath sale, while the Tonry Tree Farm donated both a fresh tree to raffle and the town tree to light.

The Rec Department will have a make-and-take ornament activity, so families can decorate the tree they win or buy at the event.

Then there's the market itself, modeled in part on the classic German Christmas markets.

According to Sabatini, about 20 vendors have signed on, and she expects more. Some are holdovers from the summer market, some new.

Blankenship, who bakes sour-

Ethan Paulini, artistic director for Whitefield's Weathervane Theatre, remembers one patron who bought tickets for one of the theater's holiday shows, "Who's Holiday," as soon as they went on sale. "They told me, 'I'm going to bring my elderly mother and watch her blush," Paulini

recalled with glee. Weathervane's fourth holiday show season brings a little spice and a lot of

nice to the North Country. The three productions may appeal to different demographics, but they all aim to bring a little more Christmas spirit to the Great

North Woods. The holiday shows are staged at the Mountain

View Grand Resort, also in Whitefield. First up is "Who's

adults-only comedy about The Grinch's Cindy Lou Who, who is now all grown up, just released from jail and lives in a trailer park."

Weathervane is in its third year of staging the comedy. Paulini was as surprised as anyone when the raunchy piece got accepted by his audiences.

"We were doing 'Mama Mia' in the summer repertory season, and I announced the holiday programming in my curtain speech," he said.

By the next day, 78 of the venue's 200 seats were already sold, and all three shows sold out within a week.

He knew he was on to something. Last year there were four performances, sold out by September, and this year he's considering adding a fifth.

dough bread for the summer market, will have her breads on hand along with homemade pretzels.

"We'll have fine jewelry, Liz's bread, goat soap, honey, meat and seafood," Sabatini said.

The Police Department will hand out goodie bags and safety information, and the Fire Department will wire the community

But the holidays aren't just about cocoa and shopping, and with this event, the committee intends to touch townspeople's hearts. Resident Anne Lane has run her own food collection event for four years. "She calls it the 'Reverse Advent Calendar' food drive," Blankenship contributed.

Lane puts out lists of components for a holiday dinner, townspeople pick them up along with boxes, and they add an item to their box every day for the month of December.

Last year 215 boxes were filled and returned to Lane; this year the hope is for 250, according to Blanken-

She added that Lane has two or three specific lists, depending on what local food pantries are short on.

For example, St. Vincent de Paul might be short on cranberry sauce, so that goes on the St. Vincent list,"

The Lincoln Akerman School PTO also will have a presence with their Giving Tree, Savoy said.

And the town's Nativity scene will be on display, Sabatini said.

Sniderman has been offering her Festival of Lights inside the library for several years, but now she's ready to take it to the community.

"The idea is looking at how other cultures celebrate light," she said. She's

been mounting displays on Christmas, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, Diwali and more.

'It expands the conversation," Sniderman explained. "It may expose somebody to the greater conversation. It brings us together."

And that's the committee's goal: To bring Hampton Falls together for one magical night. While the

town is closely knit, all the women noticed that the same people showed up for everything. With the Christmas market, Blankenship said, they hope to see a full community turn-out.

"We're going to make it happen," she said, adding, "It's a wonderful environment to pull everyone together."

And, Savoy said, "to dis-

connect from their phones, even if just for one hour."

The Christmas Market is hosted by the Hampton Falls town committees and departments; the library; recreation department; police and fire departments; and the Hampton Falls Farmers Market.

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


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

and had a New York run, in addition to being performed all over the country, according to Paulini. "The audiences love it," he said. "It's a little naughty, and they think, 'We're laughing at things that shouldn't be laughed at."

The play is now a tradition with his northern audiences, he said. "It's like 'The Nutcracker,' 'A Christmas Carol,' only it's rated R," he quipped.

Paulini aims to reach all audiences with his programming, so the second show of the season will be "The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe," based on the beloved children's classic by C.S. Lewis. This play has been a staple in their repertoire, and Paulini likes the idea that it's more than just one night. "People will seek out the movie version, they'll read the book with their grand-children," he said.

The third production is "Miracle on South Division Street," and it's new to the North

Country, Paulini said. It involves a family in Buffalo, a father who moved from Poland in World War II, three children and a statue of the Virgin Mary that may not be Mary after all.

"Miracle" has been a harder sell than the first two shows, perhaps because it's unfamiliar, but Paulini promised that those who see it will love it. The play provides the ambience of a family gathered around the TV, laughing together at an old sitcom, he said, adding, "When word gets out, this will be our best show."

The Weathervane has been in existence for 60 years, pro-

viding the North Country with professional repertory theater. The partnership with Mountain View Grand began three years ago, according to Paulini. "We were doing fall shows and small holiday shows," he recalled. "The resort was looking for an experience for their guests."

So they teamed up. The first year featured the first performance of "Who's Holiday" and a show called "Winter Wonderettes" based on a Ronettes-type girl singing group.

In the second year, "Who's Holiday" returned, by popular demand, and the rep crew did

its first "The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe." That production of the Lewis classic brought hundreds of schoolchildren, he recalled.

"We have other ideas, but the ones that are popular, people ask for time and time again," he said. Last year brought a "Who's" reprise and a musical review, "North Country Christmas," which he plans to offer again on a rotating basis.

Despite the busyness of the season, and the weather, Paulini has no trouble filling the seats at the Mountain View Grand. "The draw," he said, "is tradition.

It's sharing the experience with people you love, in a celebratory way."

The Weathervane is the northernmost professional theater in New Hampshire, one hour from the Canadian border, and the area gets the worst of Granite State winters.

But that doesn't stop his hardy audiences, Paulini said. "We're used to it up here."

Paulini, who grew up in Boston and lives in New York on the off-season, said, "I've always had the best of the best at my fingertips. The arts have given me my identity, my career."

The North Country deserves the "best of the best" too, he believes. He's eager to see young people experience the options and the different viewpoints the

arts bring.
And for "Who's Holiday," he advised, "Get a sitter."

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Global Christmas Market blends world traditions with local giving

Area artists, vendors and nonprofits unite to support families facing rising food insecurity

During the early 2000s, while he was in Germany for the Air Force, Phil Meyer visited Christmas markets in Europe and enjoyed, as he recalls, "the food, the smells, the lights, the vendors, the overall experience of performers."

Now, Meyer, who lives in Pelham, is teaming up with other good-hearted people to create a similar experience for shoppers that will raise money to help feed the food-insecure in the Nashua and Merrimack areas.


New Hampshire World Christmas Market, a new family-friendly holiday celebration, will feature some of New England's best foods and beverages, along with products made by talented local artists and artisans, according to organizers.

The event, they say, will "bring together the magic of Christmas with the rich cultural heritage of New England and beyond" and will celebrate craftsmanship, community spirit and global holiday traditions.

The market will be held Dec. 13 and 14 at Anheuser-Busch Biergarten, 221 Daniel Webster Highway, Merrimack.

The event will be presented by Nourish New England, a nonprofit, all-volunteer organization that was officially launched close to a year ago. One of its main objectives is to support food banks and soup kitchens.

"What we're attempting to do at events like this one, and others we've been a part of, is to raise funds to actually fund and also support and supply those other

nonprofits that are other supporting people in need," said Meyer, one of the organization's leaders.

Although inspired by celebrations in Europe, Christmas around the world is

the event's theme. Food will include Brazilian cuisine; roasted glazed nuts made by a Filipino couple; boba tea, a Taiwanese drink; and raclette

their cheese from Switzerland and France.

Santa and Mrs. Claus will be there. So, too, will elves. There will be a DJ and music throughout the event, including at least

two bands, and the Granite State Ringers, a handbell choir. Activities will include a photo booth and a Kids Zone featuring face painting, games and more. Anheuser also will open its gift shop.

The event's participating artists and artisans will have a variety of items to purchase including cutting boards, ornaments, candles, carved wood, felt gnomes, dream catchers, soaps, stained glass and crocheted items.

Although three local places providing food access will be the chief beneficiaries of the event's proceeds, Meyer hopes the Christmas market

will become an annual event, whose help spreads throughout New England.

"I love it because it gives back to community," said Kendra Smith, owner of Soel Sistas, a Nashua cafe, catering and food truck business, and one of the event's food vendors.

The cause is close to her heart. Smith heads Feed the Kids, a Nashua organization that amongst its good works provides food to students during sum-

A former lunch lady for the Nashua School District, Smith saw students who experienced food inse-

curity — and had been no stranger herself to the problem.

For \$5, she said, a hot dinnertime meal can be provided to a child. Feed the Kids also will have a booth at the event, which will inform the public about its mission and how the public can help.

Jessica Moores, owner of Manchester Craft Market at the Mall of New Hampshire in Manchester, whose store features the works of 260 local artists, authors and small businesses, will be participating, too.

"I will be there with a selection of products from the store. Just to give people just a little sample, an opportunity to do a little bit of shopping, if they can't get to the mall to check us out," said Moores, who expects to have paintyour-own ceramic kits, works of local authors of children's books and other items for sale.

"I believe in what Nourish New England is doing as a nonprofit working (to fight) food insecurity. I thought it was a great opportunity to get out of the mall a little bit, support a cause, get together with a bunch of other local businesses and nonprofits," she said.

For Linda Comrie, owner of Sweet Dreams Confections in Derry, being a food vendor at an event that will help the hungry fits with her company's support of the anti-hunger cause — she donates half of her profits to food banks and other organizations.

"I think in general food insecurity is growing and has been growing exponentially over the past 10, 20 years," Comrie said. "Most recently, the past few years, our food

banks, pantries and soup kitchens have noticed a growth of sometimes over 65 percent of who they're serving."

"I come from a humble beginning. My husband as well. Our thought is we want to continue to help support our community. How can we do that? We volunteer, do all those things. But how else can I be more impactful? How else can my family be more impactful? I noticed that there are a lot of organizations that are struggling to support those who really needed the support most."

Food insecurity, she said, is not confined to the homeless, she said.

"It could be a twoincome family that had to replace their roof or their septic or their furnace. Something large happened and now, all their money is going to that, and they need some help feeding their family," she said.

Comrie plans to offer a variety of items for sale, including sourdough, chocolate-covered peanut butter balls, dried craft cocktail infusions, snack mixes and a hand-created hot cocoa blend.

"It's very creamy, smooth," she said. "A lot of kids love that."

The event will run from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 13, and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday, Dec. 14.

General admission tickets cost \$10. Tickets cost \$8 for first responders, military and seniors age 65 and older with an ID. Kids 12 and younger are admitted free of charge.

Purchase of tickets online prior to the event is encouraged.

Currier and Ives Cookie Tour marks 20 years of sweet tradition

Holly LeClair, one of the organizers for the Currier and Ives Cookie Tour, remembers one year when an ice storm struck the Monadnock region in December.

"It hit the weekend of the tour, so it put a slight damper on things," she said, adding that Jaffrey was without power for 13 days. She doesn't know what her Jaffrey hosts did with all their uneaten cookies. "Maybe they ate them," she said, adding, "But they probably gave them to charity."

Everybody wins in the Cookie Tour, now in its 20th year. The guests get to sample cookies, the businesses get to court new customers,

and a local nonprofit reaps the financial results.

The tour gets its title from the nickname for this corner of the state, and it has its roots in the Inn at East Hill Farm in Troy.

Sally Adams, the late owner of the inn, got the idea and went to her staff, including LeClair. "She said, 'I want you to do this,' and I said, 'Oh, OK," LeClair recalled. "The first year, we had eight stops." They sold 26 tickets, at \$5 a ticket. But a tradition was

Adams's plan for the tour was to focus on the area's inns and B&Bs, LeClair said. But the B&Bs, true to their name, served breakfast, and there was too tight a window between breakfast and the Cookie Tour.

Also, she said, there are

comparatively few B&Bs in her area, compared to the North Country. So they opened the tour to other hosts.

"Over the years, we've had libraries, historical societies and small businesses as hosts," she said.

The plan for this year includes 16 stops, according to LeClair, with four more on a waitlist for next year. They don't want the tour to get unwieldy, she said. And they're now pulling in upwards of 200 people.

LeClair was the first chairman and ran the event for several years. She now assists Perri Ammann, Adams's granddaughter and the current chair. "I'm a sub-chairman." LeClair said with a smile.



Among other things, she can be simple, or they manages the website and the maps.

For businesses, the tour opens up new possibilities. "It broadens the awareness of their companies," LeClair said. "We'll hear things like, 'I've driven by here for years and never stopped in."

The tour is also a good Christmas-spirit-builder, according to LeClair. "It's fun to do. It's not crazy expensive, and everybody wants to see how you decorate for the holidays."

While the guests come back year after year, the cookies change accordingly, she said. The first offering from the Inn at East Hill was a "rich, soft, chewy, dark" molasses cookie. They've also done a mint truffle, and for LeClair, a "mint-andchocolate girl," that was

can be complex. LeClair remembered one year a business in Peterborough produced "Ugly Sweater" sugar cookies. All recipes are available at the sites on postcards, she said.

The inn has a commercial kitchen, and each year she and Ammann take recipe suggestions to Chef Mark Drury. They winnow down the ideas, and Drury goes to work.

LeClair warns the businesses to plan for at least 200 people. Sometimes they run out. It's not a problem at the inn, because Drury can just whip up a couple more batches, but it is an issue when the smaller businesses run out.

"The customers," she said, "do not like that."

It's recommended that each guest take one cookie, though some

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

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
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
