**MOTION TO WITHDRAW PLEA BASED ON INEFFECTIVE ASSISTANCE OF
COUNSEL FOR FAILURE TO INVESTIGATE FOR CAPPED PLEA SENTENCING
AND RELATED BRADY VIOLATIONS**

NOW COMES the defendant, Antwan Stroud, and hereby moves that this Court issue an order setting aside his plea of guilty to Misdemeanor Riot in the above-captioned matter, for which he was sentenced to, among other things, stand committed jail time. Mr. Stroud further moves for an evidentiary hearing on this Motion.

Both the State and Mr. Stroud's defense counsel had constitutional duties to present this Court with all facts relevant to sentencing. They failed. Specifically, both the State, through Assistant County Attorney Thomas Craig, and Mr. Stroud's defense counsel, Attorney Justin Shepherd, did not present to this Court apparent charging and sentencing disparities involving Mr. Stroud's co-defendant and other defendants who participated in the Black Lives Matter protest which led to Mr. Stroud's conviction. These facts were material to Mr. Stroud's sentencing, and it was crucial for this Court to have this necessary information prior to sentencing Mr. Stroud. As a result, both the State and trial counsel failed this Court and failed Mr. Stroud.

The State failed this Court in two ways, both based upon its duty to disclose information favorable to the defendant: (1) despite being notified by the ACLU of New Hampshire (“ACLU-NH”) of apparent charging disparities relating to those arrested following the protest giving rise to this case, the Hillsborough County Attorney’s Office ignored the constitutional obligation it had to bring those apparent disparities forward such that this Court could consider them and such that Mr. Stroud could introduce them as mitigating evidence; and (2) despite reaching a generous plea deal with Mr. Stroud’s co-defendant, who was named in both Complaints against Mr. Stroud and whose actions helped form the basis for the charges against Mr. Stroud, weeks before Mr. Stroud’s sentencing hearing while refusing to consider a no-jail-time plea for Mr. Stroud, the prosecuting attorney failed to disclose that and other sentencing disparities that directly bore upon Mr. Stroud’s sentence.¹

Mr. Stroud’s defense counsel failed him and this Court in two related ways: (1) he failed to request any exculpatory evidence from the State prior to “capped” plea sentencing and he failed to investigate and present mitigating evidence relating to the sentencing of Mr. Stroud’s more culpable (but far more leniently sentenced) co-defendant, despite possessing significant discovery relating to that co-defendant; and (2) he failed to investigate and present evidence relating to the charging and sentencing disparities of other members of the protest.

Had this information come to light, it would have become clear that a sentence involving any stand committed jail time was not appropriate. To be clear: Mr. Stroud does not blame this Court for the sentence he ultimately received, and he appreciated then, as he does now, the encouraging words this Court offered him at the sentencing hearing. Although he would later learn that his sentence is the manifestation of deeply concerning disparities, those disparities are

the product of the State, having decided to charge and negotiate with the protest's defendants in apparently racially disparate ways, and of Mr. Stroud's defense counsel, for not bringing those disparities to light. Because the constitutional errors of the State and defense counsel failed Mr. Stroud and failed this Court, the ends of criminal justice were defeated and Mr. Stroud must be permitted to withdraw his plea, he must be allowed the opportunity to negotiate with the State anew, and this Court must receive the benefit of all relevant information prior to any resentencing. United States v. Nixon, 418 U.S. 683, 709 (D. Colo. 1974) ("We have elected to employ an adversary system of criminal justice in which the parties contest all issues before a court of law. The need to develop all relevant facts in the adversary system is both fundamental and comprehensive. The ends of criminal justice would be defeated if judgments were to be founded on a partial or speculative presentation of the facts. The very integrity of the judicial system and public confidence in the system depend on full disclosure of all the facts, within the framework of the rules of evidence."). This is what our state and federal constitutions demand, and it is necessary to preserve the sanctity of our criminal justice system and the efficacy of sentencing's goals, issues this Court was clearly mindful of when sentencing Mr. Stroud.

In further support of this Motion, Mr. Stroud states as follows:

Introduction

1. In the overnight hours between June 2, 2020 and June 3, 2020, a large crowd of about 100 people gathered on South Willow Street in Manchester in protest of police killings of African Americans. Hayward, Mark, South Willow Street Justice: Jail the Black Guy, Union Leader (January 24, 2021); Exhibit A. Police and county prosecutors have labeled it a riot. More than a dozen Black Lives Matter protesters were arrested, mostly White people, and at least seven of those arrested have been sentenced. See Exhibit B. Of those sentenced thus far, Mr. Stroud is the only protester to receive jail time, pursuant to a "capped" plea urged by the

State and a sentencing hearing in which this Court was deprived of necessary information. The other sentenced protesters—all White—will not see a jail cell. Mr. Stroud will. The difference? Mr. Stroud is Black.

2. In fact, comparing the cases of Mr. Stroud and one of the White protesters is particularly troubling. Mr. Stroud and Kyle Toledo, a White man, were allegedly “accomplice[s]” at the protest. Exhibit C. Mr. Stroud is alleged to have told Mr. Toledo to light a firework and Mr. Toledo lit a firework, sending it above a crowd of people. The two are also alleged to have approached a police cruiser with a large group and the group is alleged to have spit on the cruiser and threatened violence on the officer. In other words, the two are alleged to have engaged in the exact same conduct, except that Mr. Stroud merely “told” Mr. Toledo to light a firework whereas Mr. Toledo actually lit the firework, placing “another in danger of serious bodily injury.” In fact, the charge to which Mr. Stroud pled guilty does not even involve any allegation relating to the firework; the charge to which he pled guilty only involves alleged conduct identical to that of Mr. Toledo and the rest of the large group when it approached the police cruiser. For lighting the firework and participating in protest, Mr. Toledo pled guilty to reckless conduct, his riot charge was dropped, he received no time in jail, and he need only do 50 hours of community service, enroll in the job corps, and write an apology letter. Mr. Stroud, on the other hand, will serve 30 days in jail, the suspension window on the remaining term (which itself is twice as long as Mr. Toledo’s) is four times that of Mr. Toledo’s, and he will not be able to obtain annulment until a year-and-a-half after Mr. Toledo.

3. This type of charging and sentencing disparity extends to all those who have been sentenced following the events of June 2020. Indeed, all non-White protesters were charged with riot, whereas nearly all White protesters were charged with disorderly conduct. Mr. Stroud

did not know about the disparities, his counsel apparently did not know about them, and both the State and Attorney Shepherd deprived this Court of the ability to consider them at sentencing, which would have been a significant mitigating factor in the “capped” plea context. The State did know, and not just because the State would have had this information at its ready disposal: Attorney Craig prosecuted both Mr. Stroud and Mr. Toledo, and it appears that the State reached the Toledo plea deal weeks before Mr. Stroud was sentenced. See Exhibit D. Moreover, days after the protest, the ACLU-NH contacted then-Hillsborough County Attorney Michael Conlon to notify him of complaints the ACLU-NH had received regarding how “people of color who were arrested were charged with ‘riot,’ while the white individuals arrested were only cited with disorderly conduct.” Exhibit E.² Thus, the State—and, more specifically, the very County Attorney office prosecuting Mr. Stroud—was aware of disparities in how Black and White protesters were treated by the State; initially it was charging disparities, but those later led to plea agreement and sentencing disparities. Yet the State never shared the charging and sentencing disparities with Mr. Stroud and Mr. Stroud’s counsel never asked. If Mr. Stroud had known of these sentencing disparities, he would not have agreed to a “capped” plea; he could have charge-bargained to a lesser charge such as disorderly conduct or, like Mr. Toledo, reckless conduct; he would have been able to persuade the State to agree to a plea deal similar those granted to the White protesters who engaged in similar and, in some cases, worse conduct; or he would not have pled guilty at all.

4. Mr. Stroud’s plea was not knowing, intelligent, and voluntary, and it was the product of ineffective assistance of counsel and Brady violations. It has resulted in manifest injustice, particularly where his White co-defendants, some of whom actually engaged in acts

presenting a significant danger to others, got to skate by with community service and suspended sentences while Mr. Stroud, a young Black man, will go to jail.

5. When this Court sentenced Mr. Stroud, it articulated a powerful and legitimate message:

I think that if I were allowed to focus just on you as an individual, my choice about the sentence here would be pretty easy because I do think that the proposal that Attorney Shepherd has put forward would serve you best . . . But I have to balance that against a broader consideration here, which is what effect does the sentence I impose have on other cases and other individuals in this situation. What are the broader ramifications of this case. And peaceful protest is one of the most cherished rights that we have in the United States and in the State of New Hampshire. And we all saw last summer what happens when those peaceful protests turn violent and we also don't have to go very far to see that it doesn't take much to ignite a crowd into violence. So in order to protect the right of people to protest peacefully, the criminal justice system needs to deal firmly with those individuals who try to tip that balance over into violence . . . for that, there has to be some very serious and firm consequences beyond the rehabilitation components that Attorney Shepherd has put in place. For that, I am adopting the State's proposal . . .

6. Unfortunately, because they failed to present to this Court what would come to be known as deeply concerning charging and sentencing disparities, the State and Mr. Stroud's trial counsel have muddled this Court's message.³ Unbeknownst to this Court, the criminal justice system (in this case, all by way of plea agreements) was dealing firmly and seriously only with a Black man; the White protesters—including those like Mr. Toledo who actually took violent action—received only delicate treatment and will live their lives knowing that, so long as a

³ It should also be noted that, according to a Union Leader article, Mr. Stroud's sentence appears to have been referenced during the sentencing of Scott Kimball. See Hayward Mark, Manchester Man Gets 12 Months for Pointing Gun at BLM Protesters, Union Leader (Feb. 8, 2021). It appears to have been referenced in the context of treating defendants who resort to violence the same, regardless of which side of the debate they are on. Mr. Kimball's conviction was not related to the Black Lives Matter protest underlying Mr. Stroud's charges, but it appears to have been generally related to the same subject matter at issue in that protest. In any event, this only highlights how the State and Mr. Stroud's trial counsel have undermined this Court's message.

Black man is around when it happens, they will merely be subject to a slap on the wrist for their violent actions.

Relevant Facts

7. The underlying facts are simple and, for the purposes of this Motion and unless otherwise noted, will be taken directly from the Supporting Affidavit for Mr. Stroud's Arrest Warrant. Exhibit C. From the night of June 2, 2020 to the early morning of June 3, 2020, there was a "period of civil unrest" on South Willow Street in Manchester. A large group had gathered on the streets, yelling things like "fuck the police," a classic and historic protest against police brutality. The group moved to various locations as police officers tried to clear them from the streets. A female yelled "Kyle [Toledo] is lighting off the firework right now." She said that she brought four or five fireworks and that Mr. Toledo brought "them all." The "male holding the camera," later identified as Mr. Stroud, said such things as "light that shit." Mr. Toledo then removed the fireworks from his pocket, lit a firework, and threw the firework over the heads of people in the group. The firework landed in a parking space, prompting a nearby car to leave the area. The large group continued walking, stopping near the entrance of a shopping plaza. A police officer was driving towards the exit of that plaza and stopped at the red light. While stopped, people in the group began yelling at the officer and spitting on his cruiser. Mr. Stroud is alleged to have participated in these actions.

8. Mr. Stroud was charged with felony riot and reckless conduct. The Complaints directly reference Mr. Toledo. In fact, Mr. Stroud's name does not appear in the description of the Riot offense: "simultaneously with 2 or more person, engaged in tumultuous and violent conduct and thereby purposely or recklessly created a substantial risk of causing public alarm, when Toledo along with a large group of people got in close conduct [with] Officer Mark Aquino while he was located in an unmarked Police Cruiser, this group then blocked Officer

Aquino's exit, spit on his vehicle and threatened violence on Officer Aquino which included pulling him out of his police cruiser." Nor does Mr. Stroud's name appear in the description for the Reckless Conduct offense: "was an accomplice of another person in the commission of an offense . . . when he told Kyle Toledo [] multiple different times to lit (sic) a firework . . . Toledo recklessly engaged in conduct which placed another in danger of serious bodily injury when Toledo lit a firework and threw it over a group of individuals . . ." ⁴

9. There is nothing in Mr. Stroud's discovery file pertaining to Mr. Toledo's plea agreement or negotiations, or those of any other member of the "large group" who were engaged in precisely the same conduct as Mr. Stroud. Attorney Shepherd made no discovery requests pertaining to these issues, nor is there any indication in the file that he performed his own investigation as to potential charging or sentencing disparities or, as to sentencing, sentences for similar offenses which he could have presented to this Court. There is no indication he even did a basic online search to determine who else was arrested at the protest, what they were charged with, or whether they had been sentenced. There are no notes of interviews with other participants in the protest. Undersigned counsel have reviewed Attorney Shepherd's emails in this matter and there is not even a single email to the State asking about the sentence of those referenced in the Complaints against Mr. Stroud and the discovery file, such as the person who threw the firework or the other people who yelled at the officer and spit on his cruiser. In fact, it does not appear that Attorney Shepherd so much as asked the State for exculpatory evidence as he prepared for the sentencing hearing. This is all despite clearly knowing that Mr. Toledo was a similarly situated defendant and even having, in the discovery file, Mr. Toledo's Arrest Warrant.

⁴ Again, the reckless conduct charged was dropped. Accordingly, Mr. Stroud did not plead guilty to any offense involving the firework. Mr. Toledo's conduct in lighting the firework, therefore, was undoubtedly more egregious than the conduct to which Mr. Stroud pled guilty.

In other words, Attorney Shepherd should have known that Mr. Toledo's plea deal and resulting sentence would heavily influence that of Mr. Stroud. He also should have known that numerous other people had been charged and sentenced for their participation in the protest. Much of it was public information, and most of it undersigned counsel discovered via Manchester Police press releases. See Exhibit B. Indeed, five other protesters, all White, had been sentenced before Mr. Stroud's capped plea sentencing hearing.

10. The State, too, did not offer such information. Even though a plea agreement was reached with Mr. Toledo on or before December 16, 2020, see Exhibit D (Toledo Case Summary), the State did not disclose Mr. Toledo's deal prior to Mr. Stroud's January 7, 2021 sentencing hearing. Instead, while the same prosecutor was willing to let Mr. Toledo—the man who actually threw the firework and otherwise engaged in nearly identical behavior to Mr. Stroud—serve only community service, a 6-month fully suspended sentence, an apology letter, and enrollment in job corps, he stated to Attorney Shepherd that it was “the best I can do”⁵ to offer Mr. Stroud a 12-month sentence, 30 days in jail, to obtain a GED by this June, and 2 years probation. The State also failed to disclose the problematic charging disparities and lax sentences of the five White protesters who were sentenced prior to Mr. Stroud.

11. A brief glimpse at those five sentences reveals the even more troubling nature of trial counsel's and the State's constitutional errors. All five defendants below are White.

- James Brisendine: pled guilty to arson for lighting a dumpster on fire during the protest.
 - 12 months, all suspended, counseling treatment or educational programs. No jail time.
- Andrew Magoon: pled nolo contendere to disorderly conduct where, as part of a group who were throwing bottles at officers, emerged “armed

with a baseball bat” and continuing to enter the roadway after being ordered not to do so.

- 1 year of good behavior and a \$1488 fine, suspended 12 months. No jail time.
- Kayla Sharp: pled guilty to disorderly conduct for “engaging in a riot” as part of a group throwing glass bottles at officers and “blatantly disregard[ing] [officers’] commands.”
 - 45 days, all suspended and a \$248 fine. No jail time.
- Ryan Yianakopolos: pled guilty to disorderly conduct for failing to vacate area after multiple commands.
 - \$248 fine. No jail time.
- Michael Krasyn: pled guilty to disorderly conduct for failing to vacate area after multiple commands.
 - 1 year of good behavior and a \$1488 fine, suspended 12 months. No jail time.

12. At Mr. Stroud’s sentencing hearing, the State offered the following argument as to why Mr. Stroud belongs in a jail cell: “The people of Manchester need to know that law and order will prevail in this city. And the police officers need to know that law and order will prevail in this city as well.” The State offered this argument weeks after negotiating a plea agreement with Mr. Toledo whereby he would serve no jail time and would be eligible for annulment a year-and-a-half before Mr. Stroud. The State argued: “The defendant is inciting violence against the police and should be held accountable.” The question then becomes: why are those who actually take violent action, like Mr. Toledo, not held accountable to the same degree?

13. Had Attorney Shepherd, at the capped plea sentencing hearing, presented mitigating evidence—relating to the pleas and sentencing of similarly situated, White defendants actually engaged in violent behavior at the same protest—Mr. Stroud would have unquestionably received a no-jail-time sentence. Had Attorney Shepherd performed a basic investigation, he

would have been able to present such evidence. Had the same prosecutor who negotiated Mr. Toledo's plea agreement disclosed the exculpatory sentencing evidence, Mr. Stroud would have unquestionably received a no-jail-time sentence. In fact, had the charging and sentencing disparities come to be known by Attorney Shepherd before any plea was reached—by way of a basic investigation or of Brady disclosures—Mr. Stroud perhaps would not have pled guilty at all, pled guilty to a lesser offense, or, *at the worst*, received the same sentence as those like Mr. Toledo. Knowing racial disparities with respect to the charges brought against the protesters—White people charged mostly with disorderly conduct and Black people charged with riot—would certainly have led to charge-bargaining and perhaps a sentence more in line with those listed above. None of this happened. Instead, the Black man at the Black Lives Matter protest is the only protester who will go to jail.

Argument

14. Mr. Stroud's plea was not knowing, intelligent, and voluntary, as required by Part 1, Article 15 of the New Hampshire Constitution, and the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments to the United States Constitution. Since the defendant is seeking to withdraw his plea after the sentence has already been imposed, he must show by a preponderance of the evidence that the withdrawal of the guilty plea is necessary to prevent "manifest injustice". State v. Horne, 140 N.H. 90, 663 A.2d 92 (1995); State v. Sarette, 134 N.H. 133, 138, 589 A.2d 125, 128 (1991). For the reasons explained herein, Mr. Stroud has made a sufficient preliminary showing of manifest injustice to warrant an evidentiary hearing on any contested material facts and to present expert testimony.

15. The Supreme Court has found that where counsel's performance is so deficient as to justify a finding that but for that performance the accused would not have given up his or her

right to a fair trial by pleading guilty, that plea may be set aside. See Hill v. Lockhart, 474 U.S. 52, 59 (1985). “Where, as here, a defendant is represented by counsel during the plea process and enters his plea upon the advice of counsel, the voluntariness of the plea depends on whether counsel's advice was within the range of competence demanded of attorneys in criminal cases.” Id. at 56. The analysis here is the same as that articulated in Strickland v. Washington, 466 U.S. 668 (1984). In Strickland, the Supreme Court adopted a two-part standard for evaluating claims of ineffective assistance of counsel. There, citing McMann v. Richardson, 379 U.S. 759 (1970), the Court reiterated that “[w]hen a convicted defendant complains of the ineffectiveness of counsel's assistance, the defendant must show that counsel's representation fell below an objective standard of reasonableness.” 466 U.S. at 687-688. The Court also held that “[t]he defendant must show that there is a reasonable probability that, but for counsel's unprofessional errors, the result of the proceeding would have been different.” 466 U.S. at 694.

16. Brady violations—that is, the prosecution’s failure to disclose evidence favorable to the accused—can also ground a challenge to the validity of a guilty plea. See, e.g., Ferrara v. United States, 456 F.3d 278, 291 (1st Cir. 2006); see also Matthew v. Johnson, 201 F.3d 353, 364, n. 15 (“Even if the nondisclosure is not a Brady violation, it may be argued . . . that it made it impossible for [the defendant] to enter a knowing and intelligent plea.”); Sanchez v. United States, 50 F.3d 1448, 1453 (9th Cir.1995) (a defendant challenging the voluntariness of a guilty plea may assert a Brady claim); United States v. Wright, 43 F.3d 491, 496 (10th Cir.1994) (under limited circumstances, a Brady violation can render a defendant's plea involuntary); White v. United States, 858 F.2d 416, 422 (8th Cir.1988) (Supreme Court precedent did not foreclose a

Brady challenge to a guilty plea), cert. denied, 489 U.S. 1029 (1989); Campbell v. Marshall, 769 F.2d 314, 321 (6th Cir.1985) (similar), cert. denied, 475 U.S. 1048 (1986).⁶

17. Under Brady v. Maryland, the prosecution must disclose to the defendant evidence that is favorable to the accused and “material either to guilt or to punishment.” 373 U.S. 83, 87 (1963) (emphasis added). “Failure to disclose such evidence violates a defendant’s due process right . . .” United States v. Weintraub, 871 F.2d 1257, 1260 (5th Cir. 1989). Indeed, in Weintraub, the court held: “We must set aside the sentence and remand for further proceedings, however, based upon our conclusion that the prosecution improperly withheld favorable evidence that was material to [the defendant’s] punishment.” Id. at 1259.

18. Courts have noted the dangerously synergistic relationship between Strickland and Brady errors. Courts have considered, and scholars have asserted that such errors should be considered, together and cumulatively. See Cargle v. Mullin, 371 F.3d 1196, 1221 (10th Cir. 2003) (emphasizing the “synergistic effect” of Strickland and Brady errors); Starling v. State, 130 A.3d 316, 336 (Del. 2015) (Strickland and Brady violations “combined” to “undermine[] our confidence in the verdict”) Blume & Seeds, Reliability Matters: Reassociating Bagley Materiality, Strickland Prejudice, and Cumulative Harmless Error, 95 J. Crim. L. & Criminology 1153 (2005) 1154 (“[C]ourts should consider the impact of Brady violations and Strickland violations together . . .”). Accordingly, this Court should consider both the Mr. Stroud’s trial counsel’s errors in failing to investigate in preparation for capped plea sentencing and the State’s failure to disclose evidence favorable to the defense, to wit, harsh plea sentencing disparities, including those with racial undertones.

⁶ To clarify, while a guilty plea may waive a defendant’s right to exculpatory evidence as to *guilt or innocence*, see generally United States v. Ruiz, 536 U.S. 622 (2002), the favorable evidence that should have been disclosed prior to sentencing here was material to *sentencing*, not guilt or innocence.

Mr. Stroud’s trial counsel was ineffective in failing to investigate prior to reaching a “capped” plea agreement and for failing to investigate in preparation for “capped” plea sentencing

19. Mr. Stroud’s trial counsel’s performance fell below an objective standard of reasonableness in two ways. First, knowing (or having access to public materials indicating) that numerous others were involved in similar actions as Mr. Stroud and knowing that at least one person, Mr. Toledo (named in the Complaints against Mr. Stroud) engaged in more egregious alleged conduct, failed to conduct even a basic investigation into Mr. Toledo’s and others’ sentences and plea deals. Second, trial counsel also failed to investigate charging discrepancies, which would have been publicly available, and therefore ineffectively forewent charge-bargaining and, ultimately, a lesser charge which would have helped to balance the racial inequities resulting from the protest. These deficient performances clearly resulted in prejudice, as it rendered Mr. Stroud’s “capped” plea not knowing, intelligent, and voluntary and subjected Mr. Stroud to charging disparities and a significantly more severe sentence than his White co-defendants. The result would have been different on several levels: Mr. Stroud may not have pled guilty at all, he may have charge-bargained to a lesser charge, and he would certainly have received a lesser sentence.

20. Investigating similar sentences in preparation for a sentencing hearing—and in preparation for negotiations with prosecutors—is not exceptional performance. It is a common matter of course for defense attorneys and often a necessary lodestar for a sentencing court—and for plea negotiations—particularly in cases involving co-defendants. As the United States Supreme Court has noted, “[p]revailing norms of practice as reflected in American Bar Association standards and the like . . . are guides to determining what is reasonable.” Strickland, at 688-89. See, e.g., National Legal Aid & Defender Association, Performance Guidelines for Criminal Defense Representation (Black Letter), Guideline 6.2 (“[C]ounsel should be fully

aware of, and make sure the client is fully aware of . . . the general range of sentences for similar offenses committed by defendants with similar backgrounds.”); 1 ABA Standards for Criminal Justice 4-4.1, commentary, p. 4-55 (2d ed. 1982) (“The lawyer also has a substantial and important role to perform in raising mitigating factors both to the prosecutor initially and to the court at sentencing . . . Investigation is essential to fulfillment of these functions.”).

21. As this Court is well-aware, a “capped” plea is one in which the parties agree to maximum limit on the sentence and, after presenting argument and evidence to the Court, the Court decides a sentence at or below that limit. *See, e.g.*, N.H. R. Crim. P. 29(k)(14)(C). Accordingly, any type of mitigating evidence is absolutely necessary. In fact, the discovery and use of mitigating evidence to sustain a lower sentence is perhaps the only reason a capped plea may be advisable and, in any event, it indicates that defense counsel is going to put all effort into investigating and preparing for a sentencing memorandum and the sentencing hearing. A crucial aspect of that effort is investigating and presenting a range of, or specific sentences for similar offenses committed by similarly situated defendants. Here, that would be—at the very least—Mr. Toledo, but it would also extend to others in the “large group” with whom Mr. Stroud protested. Attorney Shepherd failed to conduct this basic investigation. Instead, he spoke to this Court for all of five-and-a-half minutes, focusing on Mr. Stroud’s character (undoubtedly one aspect of good mitigating evidence, but far from enough) and how he believed a no-jail-time sentence would be “more constructive.” This effort was far from sufficient and fell below the standard of reasonableness.

22. “Before deciding whether to plead guilty, a defendant is entitled to the effective assistance of competent counsel.” Padilla v. Kentucky, 559 U.S. 356, 364 (2010). This includes

such assistance as advising about the consequences of a sentence, see generally Padilla, and communicating plea offers. See generally Missouri v. Frye, 566 U.S. 134 (2012).

23. Importantly, effective assistance of counsel also includes fully investigating, preparing, and presenting a defense at sentencing. See, e.g., Martinez-Ayala v. Taylor, 2019 WL 3247187 (D. Ore. Jun 19, 2019); Porter v. Muniz, 2017 WL 3021022 (N.D. Ca. July 17, 2017), appeals dismissed, 2019 WL 3296803 (9th Cir. April 17, 2019) (Trial counsel at defendant’s non-capital resentencing hearing was ineffective for advising defendant to accept a sentencing agreement after an inadequate investigation.); Phillips v. White, 851 F.3d 567 (6th Cir. 2017) (concluding that defense counsel deficiently failed to prepare or present a defense at sentencing, and that prejudice could be both presumed under United States v. Cronin, 466 U.S. 648 (1984), and found under Strickland v. Washington, 466 U.S. 668 (1984)); Lopez v. State, 462 S.W.3d 180 (Tex. Ct. App. 2015) (Retained counsel was ineffective in aggravated robbery plea sentencing for failing to adequately investigate and present mitigation evidence.); In re Williams, 101 A.3d 151 (Vt. 2014).

24. The United States Supreme Court has addressed the failure to investigate in preparation for sentencing in Wiggins v. Smith. 539 U.S. 510 (2003). The issue in that case involved defense counsel’s limited investigation and decision to not present certain mitigating evidence at a capital sentencing proceeding. Id. at 521. Wiggins is noteworthy here because, like the capital sentencing proceeding in that case, mitigating evidence—or, for that matter, any and all evidence supporting a lesser sentence—is crucial for a “capped” plea sentencing hearing, and often determinative. In both cases, counsel must extend every effort to provide the sentencing judge or jury with reason to impose a sentence lower than the maximum; this is the context in which counsel’s performance is evaluated.

25. In Wiggins, the court outlined how a failure to investigate is to be analyzed:

[S]trategic choices made after thorough investigation of law and facts relevant to plausible options are virtually unchallengeable; and strategic choices made after less than complete investigation are reasonable precisely to the extent that reasonable professional judgments support the limitations on investigation. In other words, counsel has a duty to make reasonable investigations or to make a reasonable decision that makes particular investigations unnecessary.

Id. at 521 (quoting Strickland, at 690-91). The court noted how, in a previous case, it found ineffective assistance where “counsel’s failure to uncover and present voluminous mitigating evidence at sentencing could not be justified as a tactical decision to focus on [the defendant’s] voluntary confessions, because counsel had not ‘fulfill[ed] their obligation to conduct a thorough investigation of the defendant’s background.’” Id. at 522 (quoting Williams v. Taylor, 529 U.S. 362, 396 (2000)). The issue in Wiggins, the court noted, was not necessarily whether counsel should have introduced mitigating evidence, but whether the *investigation* “supporting counsel’s decision not to introduce mitigating evidence . . . was *itself reasonable*.” Id. at 523 (emphasis in original). Further, “[i]n assessing the reasonableness of an attorney’s investigation [] a court must consider not only the quantum of evidence already known to counsel, but also whether the known evidence would lead a reasonable attorney to investigate further.” Id. at 527. In finding defense counsel ineffective for not conducting a full investigation into possible mitigating evidence, the court noted how pre-sentencing investigations “should comprise efforts to discover *all reasonably available* mitigating evidence . . .” Id. at 523 (quotations omitted) (emphasis in original). It based its holding in part on the “principle that strategic choices made after less than complete investigation are reasonable only to the extent that reasonable professional judgments support the limitations on investigation.” Id. at 533 (quotations omitted). The limitations on the investigation in Wiggins, the court determined, were not reasonable. And like the charging and

sentencing evidence here, “[t]he mitigating evidence counsel failed to discover and present in Wiggins is powerful.” Id. at 534.

26. In this case, Mr. Stroud’s trial counsel did not even conduct a basic investigation into the charges, plea deals, or sentences of Mr. Stroud’s co-defendant, or other protesters. He did not so much as ask for exculpatory evidence. Despite easily available public information on other protesters who were charged with lesser offenses than Mr. Stroud, trial counsel did not so much as ask about potential charging disparities prior to giving in to a “capped” plea. Upon review of his file, the only investigation he apparently performed was to contact several individuals to provide character references for Mr. Stroud. Ultimately, the only piece of mitigating evidence Attorney Shepherd presented to this Court was a brief statement from Mr. Stroud’s mother. But there was absolutely no excuse for failing to at least inquire into the charges, pleas, and sentences of others who were arrested at the same protest as Mr. Stroud: other members of the “large group” referenced repeatedly in discovery as having engaged in the very same alleged actions as Mr. Stroud; others who, as would have been evidenced by a basic case summary report, were sentenced far more leniently than the State was demanding of Mr. Stroud; and others who, like Mr. Toledo, were far more culpable than Mr. Stroud. Whatever limited investigation Attorney Shepherd performed, it was not “itself reasonable” and, because the racially charged sentencing and other disparities would have been “powerful” evidence in plea negotiations and to put before this Court, Wiggins demands a finding of ineffective assistance and the withdrawal of Mr. Stroud’s plea.

27. In re Williams is also instructive. In that case, the court found sentencing counsel ineffective following a guilty plea to four counts of involuntary manslaughter for failure to provide more than just perfunctory assistance. 101 A.3d 151 (Vt. 2014). The defendant, who

was 19 years old, was initially charged with four counts of murder and arson after he intentionally set fire to paper in his waste basket in his bedroom. The fire spread and killed occupants of the apartment above, a woman and her three grandchildren. Similar to the capped plea context here, the parties entered a plea agreement amending the original charges to four counts of involuntary manslaughter with a maximum sentence of 50-60 years, but the agreement allowed the defense to argue for a sentence from 20-60 years. A pre-sentence investigation (“PSI”) report by a probation officer recommended a sentence of 40-60 years, which was imposed by the trial court after hearing a number of “bereaved” victims’ family members express their desire for maximum punishment. The PSI had identified mitigation evidence, including petitioner’s lack of a criminal record, no drug or alcohol abuse, graduation from high school as a foster child, remorse, efforts to get people out of the burning building, and descriptions by people who knew him as a good, hard-working person. The court found counsel’s conduct deficient and not based on strategy because counsel called no witnesses and did not even submit a sentencing memorandum in advance of the hearing “to present his arguments for the minimum sentence in a less hostile and emotionally-charged atmosphere. Instead, he offered a few remarks about petitioner’s childhood, essentially repeating the information in the PSI.” The court explained that counsel must have addressed:

the highly unusual gap between the minimum sentences of twenty and fifty years allowed by the plea agreement; the need to give the sentencing judge reasons to impose a sentence at the low end of the permitted range; the need to develop the positive information about petitioner which appeared in a brief sketch of a few pages in the PSI; and the need to stand up to the strong emotional feelings present in the courtroom. Each of these would be a matter of concern; collectively, they are fundamental errors sufficient to undermine confidence in the fairness of the sentencing hearing.

Id. at 163.

28. Much of the factors in that case are present here, from capped plea arrangement to the need to present more than cursory evidence justifying a lesser sentence. Simply put, Attorney Shepherd needed to give this Court reason to impose a sentence lesser than the maximum “capped” sentence. He could have done so easily with presentation of similar defendants’ sentences, all of which were lesser than Mr. Stroud’s and included no jail time.

29. As one court put it long ago: “An arbitrary and unreasonable disparity between the sentences of codefendants who are similarly situated, of course, cannot be defended.” People v. Godinez, 434 N.E.2d 1121, 1126 (Ill. 1982); see also Jung v. State, 32 Wis. 2d 541, 553 (1966) (“Equality of treatment under the Fourteenth amendment . . . requires substantially the same sentence for persons having substantially the same case histories.”). In fact, in the federal context, it is statutory. See 18 U.S.C. § 3553(a)(6) (1994) (requiring one sentencing consideration to be “the need to avoid unwarranted sentence disparities among defendants with similar records who have been found guilty of similar conduct”). Here, the similarly situated White defendants, some of whom, like Mr. Toledo or even Mr. Brisendine, were clearly more culpable than Mr. Stroud. Yet trial counsel failed to alert this Court to the fact that the State’s capped plea was much more severe than Mr. Toledo’s sentence and those of the other sentenced defendants who participated in the protest. That this kind of disparity was allowed to go unnoticed by Mr. Stroud and this Court cannot be defended. That is ineffective assistance and it undoubtedly resulted in prejudice: Mr. Stroud entered a plea that was not knowing, intelligent, or voluntary and was the product of a significant lack of information in how Mr. Stroud’s White peers were treated.

30. Similarly, trial counsel’s failure to investigate the charging disparities resulted in a plea of guilty to a charge much more severe than Mr. Stroud’s White peers. While they got

away with disorderly conduct, Mr. Stroud was forced to plead guilty to riot. Had trial counsel merely investigated these charging decisions, as the ACLU-NH did, Mr. Stroud likely would not have been pleading guilty to riot in the first place and if he pled guilty, he, like Mr. Toledo and others, would likely have done so to reckless or disorderly conduct.

31. In any event, Mr. Stroud’s plea and the resulting sentence—the only one from the protest with jail time—was the product of ineffective assistance of counsel. The prejudice resulting therefrom is clear⁷ and this Court should grant Mr. Stroud’s Motion so that he may withdraw his plea, negotiate with the State such that, if he pleads guilty, he does so to a charge that is not racially disparate, and, if he is re-sentenced, that his sentence be purged of the troubling disparities outlined herein, which were not presented to, nor known by this Court at sentencing. Put simply, Mr. Stroud’s sentence is the epitome of manifest injustice, and the source of that injustice lies solely with the State and Mr. Stroud’s trial counsel.

The State violated Mr. Stroud’s constitutional rights under Brady by failing to disclose charging and sentencing disparities prior to the “capped” plea agreement and prior to sentencing

32. By failing to disclose exculpatory charging evidence, failing to disclose sentencing disparities, and *using* the absence of what we now know to be serious charging and sentencing disparities along racial lines *against* Mr. Stroud (e.g., “The people of Manchester need to know that law and order will prevail in this city”), the State has violated Mr. Stroud’s rights under Brady and, by extension, his constitutional right to due process and fair treatment under the law. These serious Brady violations—independent of, or considered cumulatively with, trial counsel’s ineffective assistance—must result in an order granting this Motion and

⁷ It should be noted that the Strickland analysis is an objective one and “should not depend on the idiosyncrasies of the particular decisionmaker.” Strickland, 466 U.S. at 695.

allowing the State the opportunity to right this racially-charged wrong, and Mr. Stroud the opportunity to fight for equity.

33. For relief pursuant to a Brady violation, the test is “not whether the defendant would more likely than not have received a different” result had the favorable evidence been disclosed, but whether that result is “worthy of confidence.” Kyles v. Whitley, 514 U.S. 419, 434 (1995).

34. First, to the extent it is in any doubt, the charges, plea deals, and sentences of similar defendants engaged in similar or more culpable conduct at the same protest was favorable plea negotiation evidence and certainly mitigating sentencing evidence, and therefore Brady material. Second, for the reasons articulated at length above, it was clearly prejudicial to Mr. Stroud. And under Brady, Mr. Stroud need not even meet the Strickland standard for prejudice; he need only undermine the “confidence” in his sentence. Here, it is difficult to imagine how the charging and sentencing disparities would *not* have affected the charge to which Mr. Stroud may ultimately have pled guilty and certainly difficult to imagine how those disparities would not have affected his sentence, even under the riot charge. This Court would not have imposed a jail-time sentence had it known what the other similarly situated (and, in some cases, more culpable) protesters were getting, and that is without even considering the racial undertones at play.⁸

35. Indeed, it is untenable to suggest that this Court would be fine with sentencing the only Black man (of those protesters sentenced thus far) to jail while the White defendants, most of whom were charged only with disorderly conduct, got off with slaps on the wrists. See, e.g., Wallace v. State, 768 So.2d 1247, 1250 (Fla. Ct. App. 2000) (noting “the fundamental

proposition that racism has no place in our system of justice”); Zant v. Stephens, 462 U.S. 862, 885 (1983) (identifying race among factors that are “constitutionally impermissible or totally irrelevant to the sentencing process”). This is not to suggest that the State acted intentionally in bringing racially unjust charges and negotiating racially unjust pleas,⁹ and Mr. Stroud need not make any such showing to succeed on this Motion. Rather, the racial injustice infecting the State’s treatment of White defendants compared to that of Mr. Stroud is something that Mr. Stroud should have known during plea negotiations and something this Court simply should have been able to consider when it rendered its sentencing decision. Based on the nature of the case, the underlying protest, and the goals of sentencing as articulated by this Court, whether Mr. Stroud was charged, negotiated with, and sentenced differently than his White peers (some of whom were far more culpable) is something this Court should have had the benefit of understanding. Had the State¹⁰ not failed this Court in that respect, there is a great possibility that this Court would have issued a different sentence. Of course, for Brady violations, Mr. Stroud need only show that the result is no longer worthy of confidence; he has clearly done so.

36. For these reasons, the State’s Brady violations rendered Mr. Stroud’s plea not knowing, intelligent, and voluntary and his sentence can only be described as manifest injustice. Accordingly, this Motion must be granted and Mr. Stroud must be permitted to withdraw his plea.

Conclusion

37. For the foregoing reasons, Mr. Stroud respectfully asks that this Court schedule an evidentiary hearing on this Motion and grant his Motion to withdraw his plea.

WHEREFORE, for the above-stated reasons, Antwan Stroud hereby requests the following relief:

- A. This Court schedule an evidentiary hearing on this Motion;
- B. Grant Mr. Stroud's Motion and allow him to withdraw his plea of guilty to Misdemeanor Riot; and
- C. Grant such further relief as is just and proper.

The following is a summary report based on my personal recollection. My bodyworn camera was activated at the time of this incident, and contains audio and video recordings of the activities noted below. For a more detailed account please refer to these recordings.

On Tuesday June 2nd 2020 Det Brian O'Leary and I were operating in our roles as members of the MPD Crisis Negotiation Team in support of the patrol response to planned peaceful protests in Stark Park and reports of planned purposeful mischief and rioting on South Willow St. At approximately 2300 hours, several hours after the event began, we were advised that a large crowd had gathered on South Willow St in the area of Weston Rd / Dunkin Donuts / Mobil / Taco Bell / PetSmart, and that portions of this crowd had become increasingly aggressive and disorderly; kicking police vehicles, surrounding police vehicles, lighting off fireworks in confined spaces, and ultimately overtaking a portion of South Willow St - a major thoroughfare in the City - preventing traffic from flowing freely. We were also advised of a large presence of individuals armed with long guns both in the general area, and intermingling with the crowd. Our response was requested in order to encourage this crowd to disperse via the presence of additional manpower, and the use of the MPD LRAD (Long Range Acoustical Device) - which makes PA announcements more clearly heard over a loud crowd, and also has the capability of sounding an audible tone designed to make people uncomfortable and motivate their compliance.

In anticipation of this event, five (5) pre-recorded announcements were created (an initial order advising subjects they were in violation of the disorderly conduct rsa and needed to vacate the area, a repeated order to disperse advising that failure to comply would result in physical removal and/or arrest, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the uncomfortable audible tone to follow without compliance, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the volume of the tone being increased, and finally a repeated order to disperse with a notification that the violators willful self-exposure to this audible tone may result in them placing themselves at risk of injury.) A transcript of the exact verbiage of these announcements has been attached to this report.

Upon our arrival to the area we personally observed what had previously been reported (a large crowd blocking a portion of the roadway and shouting loudly) - with additional large crowds lining the sidewalks on either side of South Willow St, and in the parking lots of Dunkin Donuts, Taco Bell, and PetSmart. We were directed to drive to the general area of the intersection of Weston Rd and South Willow St, and to begin sounding the orders advising these subjects of the offense they were violating, ordering them to disperse, and advising them of the sounding of the tone should they not comply. We broadcast these commands in the area of South Willow and Weston Rd, the PetSmart parking lot, Northerly on South Willow St to March Ave, and ultimately Southerly on South Willow St back to the intersection of Weston Rd. Shortly after beginning the commands portions of the initial crowd, including those furthest away from us, began dispersing - which was an indication that the notifications were able to be clearly heard and understood.

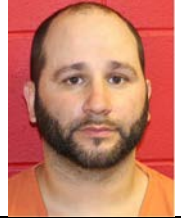

Arrest Made In Connection With Social Media Post

In the early morning hours of June 2, 2020 an arrest was made in connection with a social media post referencing calls for criminal behavior and acts of violence. Through a joint investigation lead by Manchester Police, with the assistance of New Hampshire State Police, Ashland Police and the FBI, law enforcement was able to charge 19 year old Daniel Zeron with Criminal Threatening.

On May 30, 2020 Manchester Police were made aware of a Facebook post inviting people to protest racism and police brutality. The post referenced "tipping police cars," "graffiti," and asking people to "take examples from riots in other cities." Through investigative techniques, Manchester Police were able to determine the post had originated from a home in Ashland, New Hampshire.

Through their investigation, police determined that Zeron was the author of the post. The post has since been taken down, however Manchester Police continue to closely monitor social media.

"We cannot and will not tolerate any suggested riots or acts of violence against our community," says Manchester Police Chief Carlo Capano, "The men and women of the Manchester Police Department work tirelessly to keep our community safe and the actions of Daniel Zeron undermine our efforts and leave our citizens in a state of uneasiness. We will work with our prosecutors to make sure Zeron is held accountable for his actions and we will push for the strongest penalties allowed by law."

Zeron was held on Preventative Detention and he will be arraigned today, June 2 in Manchester Circuit Court.

On June 3, 2020, I was on Facebook in the attempt to look for footage that was taken during the period of civil unrest that occurred on South Willow Street from the night of June 2, 2020 into the early morning of June 3, 2020.

It was during my search I came upon a males Facebook page that was using the name of Otm Dsmoove. The URL name shows the males name being Antwan Stroud. The URL of the Facebook profile is:

Once I was located on that Facebook profile I noticed that there was a Facebook Live video that was saved on his Facebook profile outline. This video began at June 2, 2020 at 2043 and lasts for 1 hour three minutes and 48 seconds.

When I clicked play on this video, I noticed right away that the male holding the camera was the same person whose Facebook page I was currently on and that video took place in the area of South Willow Street in Manchester NH. I also noticed that the male was apart of a large group of people and they were standing out side of Budget Gas (445 South Willow Street).

The group then began walking south on South Willow before stopping again and yelling things like "fuck the police" "fuck MPD" "fuck the feds" "fuck all those niggas".

At approximately 1240 into the video a group of Manchester Police Officers approached the group and informed them that they had to keep moving. The group then continues to move south on South Willow Street. The group then stops in front of Laundro Max (465 South Willow Street).

At approximately 2158 into the video, you can hear a female say "Kyle is lighting off the firework right now". The female then says that she brought four or five fireworks and that he brought them all.

Protests

On June 2, 2020 Manchester Police closely monitored events in the city spurred by the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis. An organized event at Stark Park was peaceful, but as the night went on other groups started to become unruly.

At 8pm at Stark Park, a candlelight vigil organized by Black Lives Matter brought in about 700 people. The event lasted just over an hour, and remained peaceful throughout. There was no criminal behavior or arrests made at that location. Afterwards a small group of approximately 50 marched down Elm St, becoming disruptive. The group eventually met up with others gathering on South Willow Street. At one point a juvenile on a bicycle kicked a police cruiser, spit on it, and started shouting profanities. He was arrested.

Manchester Police used a multitude of measures to allow for a peaceful protest, to include a uniformed presence, a loud speaker, and high frequency sounds. Despite their efforts, some people would not comply with officers requests. At times fireworks were set off in the road and shot in the direction of the police officers, lanes of traffic were blocked by protestors, and bottles and other items thrown at officers. Police in civil disobedience gear had to disperse the unruly crowd down S. Willow St and multiple arrests were made. There were 10 adults and 3 juveniles arrested. Most arrests were for Disorderly Conduct and Riot, but one man was charged with arson for setting a dumpster on fire. All were released on PR bail and court will be scheduled for a future date.

"I'm proud of the professionalism and restraint all of our officers showed last night under some extreme circumstances. The acts of violence and destruction of property will not be tolerated" says Chief Carlo Capano. "It's important for the public to understand the difference between both of last night's events. The Stark Park event was very well organized and remained a peaceful candle light vigil in memory of George Floyd. These are the type of peaceful protests the Manchester Police Department will always support. The acts of violence, rioting and disrupting our community in any way will not be tolerated and the two different events should not be confused."

The Manchester Police Department will continue to do everything we can to keep our community safe.

The following report is a synopsis of the interview, intended to summarize the content of what was discussed. The sequence of the information is not necessarily in the order in which it took place nor is it the exact wording that was used during the interview.

On 2 JUNE 2020 at approximately 2341hrs, I, Officer Matzelle, was working in the summer uniform of the day and riot gear along with several hundred officers from the Manchester Police Department, the New Hampshire State Police, the Nashua Police Department, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office, and elements from the military police from the New Hampshire National Guard, were assigned to South Willow Street during a period of riots and protesting related to an incident that occurred in Minneapolis.

While assigned to South Willow Street, I was tasked as the leader of an "arrest team" which was responsible for apprehending people perpetrating crimes and who were inciting riot and significantly negatively influencing the attitude of other protestors based on actions such as throwing bottles at police officers, screaming obscenities, damaging police vehicles, and blocking roadways. During this assignment, numerous individuals committed these

crimes but were unable to be arrested due to their large numbers. During this incident, police utilized a multitude of measures in an attempt to allow for peaceful protest but simultaneously deter and prevent crime such as; uniformed presence, loud speaker announcements to disperse including warnings that those who do not may be apprehended in accordance with RSA 644:2 (Disorderly Conduct), and use of the LRAD (Long Range Acoustic Device) which produces a high frequency sound which produces discomfort to deter criminals.

Despite all of these warnings many individuals persisted with their criminal behavior such as a male in a crowd of approximately one hundred people, identified as;

who I observed approach the riot line, scream at police officers, and bang on their riot shields. Seeing this, I grabbed Liggins by the front of his shirt, pulled him through the riot line and apprehended him with the assistance of my arrest team. During this apprehension, Liggins struggled by pulling his arms in toward his chest as we attempted to cuff him, kicked his legs out, and flailed his body despite having been told to give up his hands and to stop resisting. Ultimately, Liggins was placed into flex-cuffs and transported to MPD Headquarters for booking and processing.

LRAD DEPLOYMENT SUMMARY

The following is a summary report based on my personal recollection. My bodyworn camera was activated at the time of this incident, and contains audio and video recordings of the activities noted below. For a more detailed account please refer to these recordings.

On Tuesday June 2nd 2020 Det Brian O'Leary and I were operating in our roles as members of the MPD Crisis Negotiation Team in support of the patrol response to planned peaceful protests in Stark Park and reports of planned purposeful mischief and rioting on South Willow St.

At approximately 2300 hours, several hours after the event began, we were advised that a large crowd had gathered on South Willow St in the area of Weston Rd / Dunkin Donuts / Mobil / Taco Bell / PetSmart, and that portions of this crowd had become increasingly aggressive and disorderly; kicking police vehicles, surrounding police vehicles, lighting off fireworks in confined spaces, and ultimately overtaking a portion of South Willow St - a major thoroughfare in the City - preventing traffic from flowing freely. We were also advised of a large presence of individuals armed with long guns both in the general area, and intermingling with the crowd. Our response was requested in order to encourage this crowd to disperse via the presence of additional manpower, and the use of the MPD LRAD (Long Range Acoustical Device) - which makes PA announcements more clearly heard over a loud crowd, and also has the capability of sounding an audible tone designed to make people uncomfortable and motivate their compliance.

In anticipation of this event, five (5) pre-recorded announcements were created (an initial order advising subjects they were in violation of the disorderly conduct rsa and needed to vacate the area, a repeated order to disperse advising that failure to comply would result in physical removal and/or arrest, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the uncomfortable audible tone to follow without compliance, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the volume of the tone being increased, and finally a repeated order to disperse with a notification that the violators willful self-exposure to this audible tone may result in them placing themselves at risk of injury.) A transcript of the exact verbiage of these announcements has been attached to this report.

Upon our arrival to the area we personally observed what had previously been reported (a large crowd blocking a portion of the roadway and shouting loudly) - with additional large crowds lining the sidewalks on either side of South Willow St, and in the parking lots of Dunkin Donuts, Taco Bell, and PetSmart. We broadcast these commands in the area of South Willow and Weston Rd, the PetSmart parking lot, Northerly on South Willow St to March Ave, and ultimately Southerly on South Willow St back to the intersection of Weston Rd. Shortly after beginning the commands portions of the initial crowd, including those furthest away from us, began dispersing - which was an indication that the notifications were able to be clearly heard and understood.

These commands were broadcast for approximately forty-three (43) minutes, consisted of approximately one-hundred and seventy-two (172) commands, and the "tone" function was only activated briefly on two occasions - once after approximately fifteen minutes while initially engaged in the Weston Rd / South Willow St / PetSmart area, and the second time after approximately forty minutes while in the area of Taco Bell. There was a subsequent approximately five (5) minutes of broadcasting that consisted of approximately twenty (20) commands - bringing the total amount of time that notifications were broadcast to approximately forty-eight (48) minutes, and the total amount of commands given to approximately one-hundred and ninety-two (192).

Throughout this entire forty-eight minutes that notifications were being broadcast, several arrests were made for a variety of offenses. For the specifics on those arrests, please refer to those arresting officers` reports. The purpose of this report is solely to document the fact that these arrested parties were issued repeated clear and concise lawful orders to disperse.

It should be noted that the NH State Police were also on scene in a support role, and were also utilizing an LRAD unit with audible tone capabilities, however this report does not reflect any notifications made or tones sounded by the NH State Police. It is also of note that once the NH State Police began utilizing their LRAD, we ceased utilizing ours.

The sequence of the information is not necessarily in the order in which it took place nor is it the exact wording that was used during the interview. For an exact account please reference the associated video for this case.

On 6/3/20 at approximately 2345 hours I (Officer Bates) responded to S Willow St. and Weston Rd. for a disorderly crowd. LRAD DEPLOYMENT SUMMARY

I was later able to confirm with Capt. Okeefe that Keagan had become disorderly while standing outside of the mattress warehouse on S. Willow St. and failed to leave the area after given several orders to move away. He explained that Keagan had been instigating interactions and acting in a threatening manner towards other bystanders prior to him being asked to leave the area. He also explained that following this Keagan began to square off on him resulting in Capt. Okeefe spraying him with OC spray and him subsequently running southerly on S. Willow St. For further information regarding this please reference Capt. Okeefe`s supplemental report.

On June 2, 2020 at approximately 2000hrs, I was assigned to the candlelight vigil at Stark Park. The event had over seven hundred people to honor George Floyd. The four organizers from Black Lives Matter had been in contact with me about the peaceful event, so I knew the numbers they had expected.

My team assisted the attendees across the street around 2130hrs, so they could safely reach their vehicles on Elm Street. However, a group of approximately thirty to fifty people decided to march south on River Road. The group marched south on River Road, East on Webster Street and south on Elm Street. They stopped several times to yell at the officers following them due to the fact they were walking in the middle of the street.

The group of protesters eventually walked east on Queen City Avenue and South on South Willow Street. They ended their journey in the parking lot of AutoZone, 921 South Willow Street.

It should be noted that due to the untimely death of George Floyd, multiple protests had been appearing on social media, to include a violent protest slated to begin at 2030hrs on today's date. The event specifically targeted 401 South Willow Street and 655 South Willow Street.

Multiple members of our department had been dealing with a group of disorderly individuals south of our location. Several arrests were made and the crowd seemed to thin out. Members of the Nashua Police Department and the New Hampshire State Police were on scene to help disperse the group of protesters who began their night at Stark Park.

Around 0035hrs, New Hampshire State Police ordered all the protesters standing in the AutoZone parking lot to vacate the premises or risk being arrested. Multiple people fled the west side of the street while another group of onlookers stood on the east side of South Willow Street in front of Hannoush Jewelers, 950 South Willow Street.

My attention was drawn to a male subject wearing a red t-shirt. He was yelling and screaming at a person who was dressed in a military style uniform. The subject was loud, boisterous and swearing. I began telling the crowd to leave as it was time to end the event.

LRAD DEPLOYMENT SUMMARY

The following is a summary report based on my personal recollection. My bodyworn camera was activated at the time of this incident, and contains audio and video recordings of the activities noted below. For a more detailed account please refer to these recordings.

On Tuesday June 2nd 2020 Det Brian O'Leary and I were operating in our roles as members of the MPD Crisis Negotiation Team in support of the patrol response to planned peaceful protests in Stark Park and reports of planned purposeful mischief and rioting on South Willow St.

At approximately 2300 hours, several hours after the event began, we were advised that a large crowd had gathered on South Willow St in the area of Weston Rd / Dunkin Donuts / Mobil / Taco Bell / PetSmart, and that portions of this crowd had become increasingly aggressive and disorderly; kicking police vehicles, surrounding police vehicles, lighting off fireworks in confined spaces, and ultimately overtaking a portion of South Willow St - a major thoroughfare in the City - preventing traffic from flowing freely. We were also advised of a large presence of individuals armed with long guns both in the general area, and intermingling with the crowd. Our response was requested in order to encourage this crowd to disperse via the presence of additional manpower, and the use of the MPD LRAD (Long Range Acoustical Device) - which makes PA announcements more clearly heard over a loud crowd, and also has the capability of sounding an audible tone designed to make people uncomfortable and motivate their compliance.

In anticipation of this event, five (5) pre-recorded announcements were created (an initial order advising subjects they were in violation of the disorderly conduct rsa and needed to vacate the area, a repeated order to disperse advising that failure to comply would result in physical removal and/or arrest, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the uncomfortable audible tone to follow without compliance, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the volume of the tone being increased, and finally a repeated order to disperse with a notification that the violators willful self-exposure to this audible tone may result in them placing themselves at risk of injury.) A transcript of the exact verbiage of these announcements has been attached to this report.

Upon our arrival to the area we personally observed what had previously been reported (a large crowd blocking a portion of the roadway and shouting loudly) - with additional large crowds lining the sidewalks on either side of South Willow St, and in the parking lots of Dunkin Donuts, Taco Bell, and PetSmart. We were directed to drive to the

general area of the intersection of Weston Rd and South Willow St, and to begin sounding the orders advising these subjects of the offense they were violating, ordering them to disperse, and advising them of the sounding of the tone should they not comply. We broadcast these commands in the area of South Willow and Weston Rd, the PetSmart parking lot, Northerly on South Willow St to March Ave, and ultimately Southerly on South Willow St back to the intersection of Weston Rd. Shortly after beginning the commands portions of the initial crowd, including those furthest away from us, began dispersing - which was an indication that the notifications were able to be clearly heard and understood.

These commands were broadcast for approximately forty-three (43) minutes, consisted of approximately one-hundred and seventy-two (172) commands, and the "tone" function was only activated briefly on two occasions - once after approximately fifteen minutes while initially engaged in the Weston Rd / South Willow St / PetSmart area, and the second time after approximately forty minutes while in the area of Taco Bell. There was a subsequent approximately five (5) minutes of broadcasting that consisted of approximately twenty (20) commands - bringing the total amount of time that notifications were broadcast to approximately forty-eight (48) minutes, and the total amount of commands given to approximately one-hundred and ninety-two (192).

Throughout this entire forty-eight minutes that notifications were being broadcast, several arrests were made for a variety of offenses. For the specifics on those arrests, please refer to those arresting officers' reports. The purpose of this report is solely to document the fact that these arrested parties were issued repeated clear and concise lawful orders to disperse.

It should be noted that the NH State Police were also on scene in a support role, and were also utilizing an LRAD unit with audible tone capabilities, however this report does not reflect any notifications made or tones sounded by the NH State Police. It is also of note that once the NH State Police began utilizing their LRAD, we ceased utilizing ours.

The purpose of this report is solely to document the fact that these arrested parties were issued repeated clear and concise lawful orders to disperse.

It should be noted that the NH State Police were also on scene in a support role, and were also utilizing an LRAD unit with audible tone capabilities, however this report does not reflect any notifications made or tones sounded by the NH State Police. It is also of note that once the NH State Police began utilizing their LRAD, we ceased utilizing ours.

continuously entering the roadway area of S. Willow St.

Shortly thereafter the NH State Police bear cat then began making announcements via they LARAD PA system ordering the crowd to disperse. After several announcements/lawful orders to disperse the police line began to move forward in a south eastern direction towards the Mobil gas pumps in an effort to clear out the remaining crowd. While moving forward Yianakopolos was still in the area. As the police line moved toward Yianakopolos, he put his hands up and wouldn't vacate the premise of the Mobil, S. Willow St/Weston Rd area. After receiving multiple commands to disperse the area and given every opportunity to vacate the area Yianakopolos failed to comply with the orders and was taken into custody without incident. Yianakopolos was initially handcuffed (cuffs checked for tightness/fit and double locked). Custody of Yianakopolos was then transferred to the HCSO at which time zip tie cuffs were applied by the sheriffs and was then transported to Valley Street Jail at which time he was booked.

The following is a synopsis of the event and is intended to summarize what occurred. It is not verbatim nor is the information necessarily in the exact chronological order in which it occurred.

On June 3, 2020 at approximately 0110 hours, I (Officer Dann) was assigned to crowd control in the area of South Willow Street and Weston Road in the City of Manchester, NH. This was due to a large group of protestors who gathered in the area. At that time I was positioned within the protest line with several other Officers (wearing helmets and holding shields) attempting to maintain order and disperse a large crowd that was chanting and attempting to antagonize the Police. Many of these subjects remained in the roadway and on private property even after being told to disperse the area.

It should be noted that the New Hampshire State Troopers who were assisting us, were operating their armored vehicle known as the "Bear" and utilizing a long range acoustic Device, emitting sound waves in an effort to disperse the crowd. As we continued the crowd control measures, we were facing in a southerly direction and two males separated from the protest group and walked out in the middle of the street towards the front of the line. Both were Caucasian males and appeared to be in their early twenties. I observed one to be tall with a thin build while the other was short and stalky. The tall male was later identified as;

Ryan Yianakopolos

Both males were given several lawful orders by myself and other Officers to get out of the street which they initially ignored (Disorderly conduct). Eventually they complied and moved back several feet but remained on the sidewalk at the intersection of So. Willow Street and Weston Road. As others from the protests group began to disperse, both the shorter male and Yianakopolos remained on the sidewalk and in the parking lot of the Mobil Gas station located at 1050 So Willow Street. I gave several loud verbal commands directed towards the males again to disperse and leave the area but they refused while standing still and putting their hands up.

Myself and the group of Officers moved towards the males and I gave one final loud verbal command for them to leave the area which they refused. I then notified Yianakopolos that he was under arrest and he simply stood facing us with

his hands straight up in the air. I then told him to put his hands behind his back which he initially did not do. Officer Jaworski and I then pulled Yianakopolos down to the ground where I could safely place him in handcuffs. I put him in handcuffs at that time, double locked them and made sure Yianakopolos was quickly returned to his feet and removed from the area. I walked him over to an awaiting arrest team consisting of Hillsborough County Sheriff Deputies, namely Lt. Brian Newcomb and Deputy Woodbury who took custody of Yianakopolos. At that time Yianakopolos stated that he was trying to move from the area, and asked me if he could go now as he was ready to leave. I notified him that he was given numerous commands to leave and that it was too late as he refused to comply. He was transferred out of handcuffs and put into a set of "Flexicuffs" at that time. As they took custody of him, I returned to my position in formation to help complete crowd dispersal. Please see Officer Jaworski's report for further. LRAD DEPLOYMENT SUMMARY

The following is a summary report based on my personal recollection. My bodyworn camera was activated at the time of this incident, and contains audio and video recordings of the activities noted below. For a more detailed account please refer to these recordings.

On Tuesday June 2nd 2020 Det Brian O'Leary and I were operating in our roles as members of the MPD Crisis Negotiation Team in support of the patrol response to planned peaceful protests in Stark Park and reports of planned purposeful mischief and rioting on South Willow St.

At approximately 2300 hours, several hours after the event began, we were advised that a large crowd had gathered on South Willow St in the area of Weston Rd / Dunkin Donuts / Mobil / Taco Bell / PetSmart, and that portions of this crowd had become increasingly aggressive and disorderly; kicking police vehicles, surrounding police vehicles, lighting off fireworks in confined spaces, and ultimately overtaking a portion of South Willow St - a major thoroughfare in the City - preventing traffic from flowing freely. We were also advised of a large presence of individuals armed with long guns both in the general area, and intermingling with the crowd. Our response was requested in order to encourage this crowd to disperse via the presence of additional manpower, and the use of the MPD LRAD (Long Range Acoustical Device) - which makes PA announcements more clearly heard over a loud crowd, and also has the capability of sounding an audible tone designed to make people uncomfortable and motivate their compliance.

In anticipation of this event, five (5) pre-recorded announcements were created (an initial order advising subjects they were in violation of the disorderly conduct rsa and needed to vacate the area, a repeated order to disperse advising that failure to comply would result in physical removal and/or arrest, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the uncomfortable audible tone to follow without compliance, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the volume of the tone being increased, and finally a repeated order to disperse with a notification that the violators willful self-exposure to this audible tone may result in them placing themselves at risk of injury.) A transcript of the exact verbiage of these announcements has been attached to this report.

Upon our arrival to the area we personally observed what had previously been reported (a large crowd blocking a portion of the roadway and shouting loudly) - with additional large crowds lining the sidewalks on either side of South Willow St, and in the parking lots of Dunkin Donuts, Taco Bell, and PetSmart. We were directed to drive to the

general area of the intersection of Weston Rd and South Willow St, and to begin sounding the orders advising these subjects of the offense they were violating, ordering them to disperse, and advising them of the sounding of the tone should they not comply. We broadcast these commands in the area of South Willow and Weston Rd, the PetSmart parking lot, Northerly on South Willow St to March Ave, and ultimately Southerly on South Willow St back to the intersection of Weston Rd. Shortly after beginning the commands portions of the initial crowd, including those furthest away from us, began dispersing - which was an indication that the notifications were able to be clearly heard and understood.

These commands were broadcast for approximately forty-three (43) minutes, consisted of approximately one-hundred and seventy-two (172) commands, and the "tone" function was only activated briefly on two occasions - once after approximately fifteen minutes while initially engaged in the Weston Rd / South Willow St / PetSmart area, and the second time after approximately forty minutes while in the area of Taco Bell. There was a subsequent approximately five (5) minutes of broadcasting that consisted of approximately twenty (20) commands - bringing the total amount of time that notifications were broadcast to approximately forty-eight (48) minutes, and the total amount of commands given to approximately one-hundred and ninety-two (192).

LRAD DEPLOYMENT SUMMARY

The following is a summary report based on my personal recollection. My bodyworn camera was activated at the time of this incident, and contains audio and video recordings of the activities noted below. For a more detailed account please refer to these recordings.

On Tuesday June 2nd 2020 Det Brian O'Leary and I were operating in our roles as members of the MPD Crisis Negotiation Team in support of the patrol response to planned peaceful protests in Stark Park and reports of planned purposeful mischief and rioting on South Willow St.

At approximately 2300 hours, several hours after the event began, we were advised that a large crowd had gathered on South Willow St in the area of Weston Rd / Dunkin Donuts / Mobil / Taco Bell / PetSmart, and that portions of this crowd had become increasingly aggressive and disorderly; kicking police vehicles, surrounding police vehicles, lighting off fireworks in confined spaces, and ultimately overtaking a portion of South Willow St - a major thoroughfare in the City - preventing traffic from flowing freely. We were also advised of a large presence of individuals armed with long guns both in the general area, and intermingling with the crowd. Our response was requested in order to encourage this crowd to disperse via the presence of additional manpower, and the use of the MPD LRAD (Long Range Acoustical Device) - which makes PA announcements more clearly heard over a loud crowd, and also has the capability of sounding an audible tone designed to make people uncomfortable and motivate their compliance.

In anticipation of this event, five (5) pre-recorded announcements were created (an initial order advising subjects they were in violation of the disorderly conduct rsa and needed to vacate the area, a repeated order to disperse advising that failure to comply would result in physical removal and/or arrest, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the uncomfortable audible tone to follow without compliance, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the volume of the tone being increased, and finally a repeated order to disperse with a notification that the violators willful self-exposure to this audible tone may result in them placing themselves at risk of injury.) A transcript of the exact verbiage of these announcements has been attached to this report.

Upon our arrival to the area we personally observed what had previously been reported (a large crowd blocking a portion of the roadway and shouting loudly) - with additional large crowds lining the sidewalks on either side of South Willow St, and in the parking lots of Dunkin Donuts, Taco Bell, and PetSmart. We were directed to drive to the

general area of the intersection of Weston Rd and South Willow St, and to begin sounding the orders advising these subjects of the offense they were violating, ordering them to disperse, and advising them of the sounding of the tone should they not comply. We broadcast these commands in the area of South Willow and Weston Rd, the PetSmart parking lot, Northerly on South Willow St to March Ave, and ultimately Southerly on South Willow St back to the intersection of Weston Rd. Shortly after beginning the commands portions of the initial crowd, including those furthest away from us, began dispersing - which was an indication that the notifications were able to be clearly heard and understood.

These commands were broadcast for approximately forty-three (43) minutes, consisted of approximately one-hundred and seventy-two (172) commands, and the "tone" function was only activated briefly on two occasions - once after approximately fifteen minutes while initially engaged in the Weston Rd / South Willow St / PetSmart area, and the second time after approximately forty minutes while in the area of Taco Bell. There was a subsequent approximately five (5) minutes of broadcasting that consisted of approximately twenty (20) commands - bringing the total amount of time that notifications were broadcast to approximately forty-eight (48) minutes, and the total amount of commands given to approximately one-hundred and ninety-two (192).

Throughout this entire forty-eight minutes that notifications were being broadcast, several arrests were made for a variety of offenses. For the specifics on those arrests, please refer to those arresting officers' reports. The purpose of this report is solely to document the fact that these arrested parties were issued repeated clear and concise lawful orders to disperse.

It should be noted that the NH State Police were also on scene in a support role, and were also utilizing an LRAD unit with audible tone capabilities, however this report does not reflect any notifications made or tones sounded by the NH State Police. It is also of note that once the NH State Police began utilizing their LRAD, we ceased utilizing ours.

The following report is a synopsis of the interview, intended to summarize the content of what was discussed. The sequence of the information is not necessarily in the order in which it took place nor is it the exact wording that was used during the interview.

On 2 JUNE 2020 at approximately 2341hrs, I, Officer Matzelle, was working in the summer uniform of the day and riot gear along with several hundred officers from the Manchester Police Department, the New Hampshire State Police, the Nashua Police Department, the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office, and elements from the military police from the New Hampshire National Guard, were assigned to South Willow Street during a period of riots and protesting related to an incident that occurred in Minneapolis.

While assigned to South Willow Street, I was tasked as the leader of an "arrest team" which was responsible for apprehending people perpetrating crimes and who were inciting riot and significantly negatively influencing the attitude of other protestors based on actions such as throwing bottles at police officers, screaming obscenities, damaging police vehicles, and blocking roadways. During this assignment, numerous individuals committed these

crimes but were unable to be arrested due to their large numbers. During this incident, police utilized a multitude of measures in an attempt to allow for peaceful protest but simultaneously deter and prevent crime such as; uniformed presence, loud speaker announcements to disperse including warnings that those who do not may be apprehended in accordance with RSA 644:2 (Disorderly Conduct), and use of the LRAD (Long Range Acoustic Device) which produces a high frequency sound which produces discomfort to deter criminals.

Despite all of these warnings many individuals persisted with their criminal behavior such as a female in a crowd of approximately one hundred people, identified as;

who I observed approach the riot line, scream at police officers, and bang on their riot shields. Seeing this, I grabbed Nabors by the front of his shirt, pulled him through the riot line and apprehended him with the assistance of my arrest team. During this apprehension, Nabors struggled by pulling his arms in toward his chest as we attempted to cuff him, kicked his legs out, and flailed his body despite having been told to give up his hands and to stop resisting. Ultimately, Nabors was placed into flex-cuffs and transported to MPD Headquarters for booking and processing.

LRAD DEPLOYMENT SUMMARY

The following is a summary report based on my personal recollection. My bodyworn camera was activated at the time of this incident, and contains audio and video recordings of the activities noted below. For a more detailed account please refer to these recordings.

On Tuesday June 2nd 2020 Det Brian O'Leary and I were operating in our roles as members of the MPD Crisis Negotiation Team in support of the patrol response to planned peaceful protests in Stark Park and reports of planned purposeful mischief and rioting on South Willow St.

At approximately 2300 hours, several hours after the event began, we were advised that a large crowd had gathered on South Willow St in the area of Weston Rd / Dunkin Donuts / Mobil / Taco Bell / PetSmart, and that portions of this crowd had become increasingly aggressive and disorderly; kicking police vehicles, surrounding police vehicles, lighting off fireworks in confined spaces, and ultimately overtaking a portion of South Willow St - a major thoroughfare in the City - preventing traffic from flowing freely. We were also advised of a large presence of individuals armed with long guns both in the general area, and intermingling with the crowd. Our response was requested in order to encourage this crowd to disperse via the presence of additional manpower, and the use of the MPD LRAD (Long Range Acoustical Device) - which makes PA announcements more clearly heard over a loud crowd, and also has the capability of sounding an audible tone designed to make people uncomfortable and motivate their compliance.

In anticipation of this event, five (5) pre-recorded announcements were created (an initial order advising subjects they were in violation of the disorderly conduct rsa and needed to vacate the area, a repeated order to disperse advising that failure to comply would result in physical removal and/or arrest, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the uncomfortable audible tone to follow without compliance, a repeated order to disperse with notification of the volume of the tone being increased, and finally a repeated order to disperse with a notification that the violators willful self-exposure to this audible tone may result in them placing themselves at risk of injury.) A transcript of the exact verbiage of these announcements has been attached to this report.

Upon our arrival to the area we personally observed what had previously been reported (a large crowd blocking a portion of the roadway and shouting loudly) - with additional large crowds lining the sidewalks on either side of South Willow St, and in the parking lots of Dunkin Donuts, Taco Bell, and PetSmart. We were directed to drive to the

general area of the intersection of Weston Rd and South Willow St, and to begin sounding the orders advising these subjects of the offense they were violating, ordering them to disperse, and advising them of the sounding of the tone should they not comply. We broadcast these commands in the area of South Willow and Weston Rd, the PetSmart parking lot, Northerly on South Willow St to March Ave, and ultimately Southerly on South Willow St back to the intersection of Weston Rd. Shortly after beginning the commands portions of the initial crowd, including those furthest away from us, began dispersing - which was an indication that the notifications were able to be clearly heard and understood.

These commands were broadcast for approximately forty-three (43) minutes, consisted of approximately one-hundred and seventy-two (172) commands, and the "tone" function was only activated briefly on two occasions - once after approximately fifteen minutes while initially engaged in the Weston Rd / South Willow St / PetSmart area, and the second time after approximately forty minutes while in the area of Taco Bell. There was a subsequent approximately five (5) minutes of broadcasting that consisted of approximately twenty (20) commands - bringing the total amount of time that notifications were broadcast to approximately forty-eight (48) minutes, and the total amount of commands given to approximately one-hundred and ninety-two (192).

Throughout this entire forty-eight minutes that notifications were being broadcast, several arrests were made for a variety of offenses. For the specifics on those arrests, please refer to those arresting officers' reports. The purpose of this report is solely to document the fact that these arrested parties were issued repeated clear and concise lawful orders to disperse.

It should be noted that the NH State Police were also on scene in a support role, and were also utilizing an LRAD unit with audible tone capabilities, however this report does not reflect any notifications made or tones sounded by the NH State Police. It is also of note that once the NH State Police began utilizing their LRAD, we ceased utilizing ours.

Additional Protest Arrest and Warrants

On June 4, 2020 three arrest warrants were issued for people involved in the protests that happened in the city Tuesday night. Manchester Police have found several videos of people being disruptive and acting recklessly on South Willow Street on the night of June 2, 2020.

One of the videos shows a group of people yelling profanities at police officers and a male lighting a firework and throwing it over the heads of others. It landed in an occupied parking lot. The video also shows a group surrounding an occupied police cruiser, kick it and spit on it.

Through their investigation police had enough evidence to issue arrest warrants for 20 y/o Kyle Toledo of Hooksett and 18 y/o Antwan Stroud of Manchester. Toledo turned himself in on a warrant for Reckless Conduct and Riot. Stroud is wanted for Criminal Liability for Conduct of Another, Reckless Conduct and Riot.

Police also located a video showing a person throwing a rock at uniformed officers. The same individual can be seen throwing a water bottle at a bus and another at officers. Through their investigation police identified the suspect as 23 y/o Dylan Smith of Deerfield. Smith is wanted on three felony counts of Riot.

If you have any information regarding the whereabouts of these suspects, or any information pertaining to the incidents that took place on June 2, 2020, please call Manchester Police at 603-668-8711 or the Crime line at 603-624-4040.

The Manchester Police Department wants the public to understand that although the protests of that night have ended, incidents that occurred are still being investigated. The disruptive, criminal behavior will not be tolerated.

M.O. Subject seen leaving rear of building right before reporting a dumpster fire

On 06-03-2020 at approx 0055hrs, I (Det Skerry) was conducting surveillance during a large protest on S.Willow St in the area of Weston Rd to Jobin Dr. I was working in a plain clothes capacity, and operating an unmarked Manchester Police Dept vehicle. While I was parked in a shopping mall lot at Newbury Comics/Five Below (777 S.Willow St), I observed a tall white male wearing tan cargo shorts, a black "hoodie" sweatshirt, and a baseball hat later identified as (Jameson Brisendine [REDACTED]), walk from the rear of the building between 777 S. willow St and 100 Cahill Ave and walk along side of the end unit (Newbury Comics) northerly. I observed him walking in the direction of Det Fierimonte, so I advised him there was a male walking toward the rear of his vehicle.

Det Fierimonte advised that the male stood in front of the stores and smoked a cigarette. Det Fierimonte advised that the male had returned to the rear of the building minutes later. Det Fierimonte then advised the male walked back by his vehicle minutes later, and approached Det Olsen and DeJoy's vehicle. The male advised Det DeJoy that there was a dumpster fire behind the building. I observed Det Olsen and DeJoy drive toward the rear of the building. They advised over the radio what this male had told them. I observed the male now walking easterly through the lot toward S. Willow St. He turned north on the west side walk and was mixed in with a group of Nashua Officers. I was able to follow him to the vacant lot south of Wendys on S. Willow St where he entered the driver seat of a white 2014 Volvo 60 registered to Bonnie Brisendine [REDACTED]. It should be noted that there was in fact an active dumpster fire in the alley behind Five Below/Sherwin-Williams, and MFD responded to put the fire out.

We followed the vehicle south on S. Willow St and Det Feather attempted to stop the vehicle using his unmarked police vehicle equipped with emergency lights. The vehicle did not immediately stop, and then pulled back into the same parking lot and stopped. We conducted a Felony Stop on the vehicle, and the driver complied with our commands immediately. He was placed into handcuffs by me, and checked for proper fit. He was told he was not under arrest, and a short time later was taken out of handcuffs and agreed to questioning. I checked him for weapons with negative results, and he consented to a search of his person. I located two cigarette lighters in his right pocket.

Det Feather read Jameson his rights and we asked him where he was coming from. He said that he was watching the protest, and then walked north on S. Willow St and cut through behind Newbury Comics/Five Below. He said he was trying to observe which way the protesters were being moved. He initially advised that he had not been behind the business, but then changed his mind when we advised him that we physically watched him come out from behind the building. Jameson ultimately stated that he stood out front, and smoked a cigarette. He then said that he was "pumped up" thinking about the band Sublime and walked back behind the building. He then stated that he drank a beer. We asked him how the dumpster fire started, and he stated that he started it. I asked him if he threw his cigarette in the dumpster? He replied "No". I asked him if he lit something on fire and threw it in the dumpster? He replied "No" I then asked him if he reached into the dumpster and used the one of the cigarette lighters found on his person? He replied "Yes".

Based on the observations made by Detectives, and the fact that Jameson admitted starting the fire, He was the placed into custody for one count of Arson. The transport wagon arrived and transferred him to VSJ with out incident. The evidence was submitted as PJS1 (NH Driver License) and PJS2 (Two cigarette lighters).

On June 3rd, 2020 at 0100 hours, I, Det O`Connor, was assigned to the Manchester Police Department Special Enforcement Division/ Street Crime Unit. I was wearing plain clothes with my badges displayed around my neck. I was operating in an unmarked police vehicle. I, along with other members of SED were tasked to conduct surveillance on the organized/ non- organized protests occurring around the city.

At this time, detectives were alerted to a dumpster fire that had just been ignited behind Five Below, located at 777 South Willow Street. Detectives observed an individual coming from behind the store shortly before the fire started. Detectives watched as he walked northerly down S. Willow Street and got into a white color Volvo sedan. Detectives attempted to conduct a motor vehicle stop but the vehicle continued to travel for several hundred feet without stopping. The vehicle final came to a stop in the parking lot of Five Below.

Detectives conducted a felony stop and detained the driver, later identified as

The vehicle was cleared and Brisendine was being cooperative so the handcuffs were removed. It was explained to Brisendine that he was being detained, he said he understood and agreed to answer some questions after Det. Feather advised him of his rights. Brisendine was asked what he was doing in the area, he explained that he came down to see a "once in a life time thing" referring to the protests. Brisendine said that he was by Chipotle but started to clear out when everyone else did. Brisendine said that he went down towards Home Depot before cutting back up to South Willow Street.

Brisendine initially denied having anything to do with starting the fire. I explained to Brisendine that there were cameras behind the business and that we would be reviewing the footage. I told him that now would be the time to come clean and be honest. Brisendine said "okay, I lit it". Brisendine said that he was "pump up" and thinking about the band "Sublime. Brisendine said that he walked behind there, drank a beer, took a piss, and lit whatever was in the dumpster with his lighter. Brisendine then turned around and placed him hands behind his back wanting to be placed under arrest.

Brisendine was subsequently placed under arrest, he was handcuffed which were double locked and check for proper

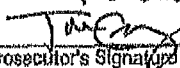

I, Detective Ryan Heile being duly sworn, depose and say,

I am a Police Officer. I herewith make application for the issuance of an Arrest Warrant against the defendant(s): Antwan Stroud (DOB 14 2001) OF 331 Lake Avenue, Apartment 1, Manchester NH

1. I have information that a crime (or offense) has been committed by the defendant(s) as follows:

NH RSA 626:8/631:3 Criminal Liability for Conduct of Another, Reckless Conduct (M)
644:1 Riot (B)

2. Details:

On June 3, 2020, I was on Facebook in the attempt to look for footage that was taken during the period of civil unrest that occurred on South Willow Street from the night of June 2, 2020 into the early morning of June 3, 2020.

It was during my search I came upon a males Facebook page that was using the name of Oim Dsmoove. The URL name shows the males name being Antwan Stroud. The URL of the Facebook profile is:

<https://www.facebook.com/antwan.stroud>

Once I was located on that Facebook profile I noticed that there was a Facebook Live video that was saved on his Facebook profile outline. This video began at June 2, 2020 at 2043 and lasts for 1 hour three minutes and 48 seconds.

When I clicked play on this video, I noticed right away that the male holding the camera was the same person whose Facebook page I was currently on and that video took place in the area of South Willow Street in Manchester NH. I also noticed that the male was apart of a large group of people and they were standing out side of Budget Gas (445 South Willow Street).

The group then began walking south on South Willow before stopping again and yelling things like "fuck the police" "fuck MPD" "fuck the feds" "fuck all those niggas".

At approximately 1240 into the video a group of Manchester Police Officers approached the group and informed them that they had to keep moving. The group then continues to move south on South Willow Street. The group then stops in front of Laundro Max (465 South Willow Street).

At approximately 2158 into the video, you can hear a female say "Kyle is lighting off the firework right now". The female then says that she brought four or five fireworks and that he brought them all.

At approximately 2235, you can hear the male holding the camera say "light that shit" twice. Afterwards you can see a male who is wearing a blue shirt, blue jeans, black baseball hat exposing his front left pocket showing multiple items that are cylinder like in shape and light brown, which I believe to be fireworks. The male then removes the fireworks from his pocket.

The male holding the camera again says, "you light that shit nigga". At approximately 2342 into the video, you can hear the male holding the camera say "Someone on my live said light that shit don't be a bitch" At approximately 2346 into the video you can see the male in the blue shirt lighting the firework on fire. The male is holding the fireworks in his left hand and holding a fire-producing product (possibly a lighter) in his right hand. After the firework is lit he throws the firework over the heads of the people in the group they are in. The lit firework lands in the front parking of the Laundromax Free Dry Laundry (465 South Willow Street). The actually lit firework lands roughly 10 feet from an occupied lighter colored vehicle. In the

video, you can see someone exit the vehicle and then the vehicle quickly reverses out of the parking space that they were legally parked in to leave the area. At approximately 24:23 you can see the vehicle reversing. In the video, you can see the firework actively sending sparks in all directions.

On June 2, 2020, at the time of the firework going off Officer Austin Good, Detective Aaron Stone, Detective Guy Kozowyk and I were providing security to the area of 401 South Willow Street and were positioned in the area of the Zoo health club (377 South Willow Street). I was personally able to see the firework go off and called it over the radio. Directly south and west of the parking lot there was grassy areas and I was worried that a fire would be produced from the firework. As the lead arson investigator with the Manchester Police Department, I know that fireworks burn at extreme temperatures, which can cause other items to be ignited on fire, which are included but not limited to grass, clothing, vehicles and structures. I then began walking towards the firework. I was not close to the firework but I could tell the fire work was sending sparks feet in all directions. It was while I was walking towards the firework it went out, due to the fact that there was no actual fire I went back to my post.

After the firework was thrown by the male in the blue shirt the entire group again started walking further south on South Willow Street. The group then stops near the entrance of the strip mall containing Petco (1049 South Willow Street).

It was during the time the group was near the entrance they noticed a police officer (Mark Aquino) was speaking with someone while he was inside of an unmarked black police SUV. The male holding the camera along with the male in the blue shirt began walking west towards Officer Aquino. As the two males are walking towards Officer Aquino, Officer Aquino begins to drive towards the exit of the parking lot. As Officer Aquino is driving towards the exit the male holding the camera turns back and begins walking towards the cruiser and says "you pig, you pig bitch, you fucking faggot, I will slap anyone of you niggas". As the male is yelling this, he is walking towards the cruiser as well as the group of people that are still located at the entrance/exit of the parking lot. As the male holding the camera gets close to the group and the cruiser you can hear him say "roll your window up pussy". Due to the fact that there is a red light at the exit of the parking lot Officer Aquino had to stop at this location.

At approximately 45:28 into the video you can hear the male holding the camera say "run this bitch ass nigga out of this shit". As the male is saying this, he walks closer to Officer Aquino. At this point, there are large group of people, which include individuals on pedal bikes. The male holding the camera said that "that there is niggas spitting on this shit". After he said that you can hear the male holding the camera spitting on Officer Aquino's police cruiser as well. The male then said "we spitting on his shit" "nigga on god" "nigga we spitting on his shit bad". Throughout this part of the video, you can see people walking in front of Officer Aquino's vehicle.

Due to the fact that I was currently working during this incident I heard Officer Aquino saying on the radio that he was being blocked in by a group of individuals and that his cruiser was kicked. Due to this, a group of police officers arrived on scene, which can be also seen on the video and arrested an individual or kicking his cruiser.

On June 4, 2020, at approximately 09:03 I emailed Detective Canada Stewart and Detective Matthew Mara a picture I took off the original Facebook profile who I believed to be: Antwan Stroud. Both Detectives confirmed that the person who was holding the camera was in fact Stroud.

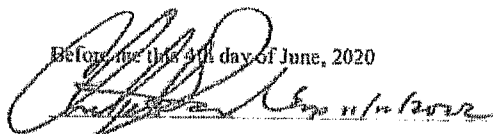
Based upon the foregoing information (and upon my personal knowledge) there is probable cause to believe the defendant did commit the crime of Criminal Liability for Conduct of Another Reckless Conduct (M) as above stated, due to the fact Antwan Stroud (09/14/2001) was an accomplice of another person in the commission of an offense with the purpose the commission of the offense when he told Kyle Toledo (10/11/1999) multiple different times to lit a firework while they were both located on South Willow Street within a large group of people. Toledo recklessly engaged in conduct which placed another in danger of serious bodily injury when Toledo lit a firework and threw it over a group of individuals, which caused an actively lit firework to land roughly 10 feet from an occupied vehicle that was parked in Laundro Max (465 South Willow Street) which caused the vehicle to reverse and leave the area.

Based upon the foregoing information (and upon my personal knowledge) there is probable cause to believe the defendant did commit the crime of Riot (B) as above stated, due to the fact Anthony Stroud (09914/2001) simultaneously with 2 or more persons, engaged in tumultuous or violent conduct and thereby purposely or recklessly created a substantial risk of causing public alarm, when Toledo along with a large group of people got in close contact Officer Mark Aquino while he was located in a unmarked Police Cruiser, this group then blocked Officer Aquino's exit, spit on his vehicle and threatened violence on Officer Aquino which included pulling him out of his police cruiser.

There is probable cause to believe the defendant did commit a crime I request the court issue an arrest warrant and order a duly authorized officer to take the defendant and bring him before the court having jurisdiction.

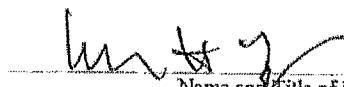
