

Vermilion Volleyball Celebrates A Perfect Season by Fae Overfield

Vermilion's volleyball teams are wrapping up their seasons and what amazing seasons thev were. Varsity has broken the consecutive win streak with an undefeated season thus far, totaling 21 wins and 0 losses... They started off their season with a win over Edison for all teams, freshman winning after 3 sets, JV in 2, and varsity in 5.

A truly incredible feat was their win over Huron, whose volleyball team has held the War On The Shore belt since 2016 and was first in the division last year. After 5 long, hot, sweaty sets, Vermilion brought home the belt. On September 1, the teams played Firelands. Freshman, JV, and varsity won their matches in straight



sets, bringing home the Stillman Cup. On September 23, varsity defeated Rocky River to break the consecutive wins record, 13-0.

On September 16, while playing against the Perkins Pirates, senior setter Hallie Habermehl crossed the 1000 assists mark, now totaling over 1200 assists in her high school career. On September 23, senior middle hitter Jenna Peters took all Vermilion block records with 98 blocks, 254 block kills, and 156 block assists.

On Thursday, October 7, the girls had their senior night, defeating Clyde in straight sets with scores 25-21, 25-12, and 25-10. JV

was 10-10 as of October 7, holding wins over some great teams. The freshmen team was 6-7 as of October 7.

Varsity is setting the stage for a new era of Vermilion volleyball and there is still lots of work to be done to better our program and our players, but one thing that really helps is support. To have the stands full and loud is the best feeling a player can have while on the court.
