

Monoclonal Antibody Therapy

- Vaccine-induced Immunity or Infection-induced Immunity or Manufactured Immunity
- Infection vs. Disease
 - COVID VACCINE & BOOSTERS prevent infection a little, Prevent disease some, but Prevent Severe Disease a lot!
- Monoclonal Antibody (mAb)
 - Sotrovimab from GlaxoSmithKline for Omicron
 - 8/day; Monday through Friday
 - COVID-19 Medication Options Minnesota Dept. of Health (state.mn.us)




The State of COVID-19 Carl Vaagenes







Statewide Hospitalized COVID Patients






75+% Hospitalized COVID Patients Are Unvaccinated (79% unvaccinated at Alomere between Nov-Dec)










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Transfer Locations


COVID Situational Update

- National Guard response team of 50 aid the staffing shortages in multiple facilities, including those in New Hope, Onamia, and Fergus Falls.
- A team of 16 personnel from FEMA providing monoclonal antibody treatments in central Minnesota and help staff the vaccination site at the Mall of America
- Severe shortage of ICU and M/S bed availability causing difficulty transferring all patients to higher level of care
- Difficulty getting patients right care, the right time, and the right location
- High pressure on staffing positions across organizations (COVID & Non-Covid)
- 900+ patients across MN experiencing discharge delays to LTC due to capacity and staffing limitations
- Self-imposed 50% to 70% reduction in surgery cases to ease pressure on staffing and IP census
- Disruption to Ambulances: Frequent long distances transfers (2 transfers took 15 hours vs. 5 hours)




16% POSITIVITY RATE FOR MOBILE COLLECTIONS (was greater than 42%)

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Reality Check: About 1 in 5 healthcare workers have left medicine since the pandemic began — Here's why

The U.S. healthcare sector has lost nearly half a million workers since February 2020. Of the remaining workers, 31 percent have thought about leaving.

- 1. Many healthcare workers believed vaccines would ease the traumas endured in initial surges. However, plateauing vaccination rates, lifted mask mandates and the delta variant undid such hopes.
- COVID-19 patients may be more difficult to deal with now. Some are belligerent and resist basic medical procedures, while others have assaulted doctors and nurses and yelled and threaten to sue for treatments the FDA hasn't authorized for COVID-19 treatment. These experiences inflict deep psychological scars.
- Healthcare workers want to help patients, and their inability to adequately do so is taking its toll. Providers aren't exiting the field because they can't handle their jobs they're quitting because they can't handle being unable to do their jobs.
