EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Louisville, Kentucky (Jefferson County) is the largest metropolitan city in Kentucky, spanning across approximately 400 square miles with 622,981 residents*. During business hours, the population swells to over 1 million with commuters and visitors from surrounding counties in Kentucky and Southern Indiana. To provide public safety services for Louisville's geographic area and population size, the LMPD is allocated 1,328 police officers. However, the LMPD is currently 21% below its sworn staffing needs with approximately 1,050 sworn officers. In addition to sworn police officers, the LMPD employs approximately 400 professional staff. Despite the shortage of sworn officers, the department's commitment to and responsibility for public safety remains. The LMPD is tasked with lowering crime and enhancing public safety, while simultaneously responding to calls for service, investigating crimes, and providing for the overall safety needs of its individuals and organizations. In particular, the LMPD remains dedicated to reducing the increasing crime trend experienced over recent years.

Over the past decade, the City of Louisville has experienced an increase in crime and violence that has devastated individuals, families, businesses, and neighborhoods. Examining homicides in Louisville specifically, over the last ten years (2013 –2023), the annual number of homicides has progressively increased by 200%, rising from 49 homicides in 2013 to 147 in 2023. At its highest point in 2021, 178 lives were lost to criminal homicides, equating to 28.7 homicides per 100,000 residents. In 2023 this rate dropped to 23.5 homicides per 100,000 residents, which is an 18% decrease compared to 2021.

In addition to homicides, Louisville has experienced an exponential increase in non-fatal shootings, street robberies, carjackings, and domestic violence incidents over the past decade. This document will explain overall crime concerns and map a data-driven strategic plan for the City of Louisville and the Louisville Metro Police Department to reduce crime while simultaneously improving community trust and relationships.

Historically, violent crime in Louisville, as in other cities, is concentrated in specific small geographic pockets of the city and perpetrated by a small number of individuals. However, the painful effects of crime, especially violent crime, are felt by all. The City of Louisville and LMPD recognize that a strategic plan to reduce violence and save lives in our city cannot depend on enforcement alone. Instead, it should be a focused, flexible approach that integrates intelligent enforcement efforts with community improvement and high-risk intervention. LMPD has developed a collaborative city-wide crime strategy.

This strategic plan includes a 3-front approach:

1. Data Responsive Policing (near-term)
2. Violent Offender Enforcement (mid-term)
3. Sustained Focused Improvement (long-term)

Each approach has varying time frames, from near to long-term. This is a strategy with multiple facets that must work concurrently for success. This is not a consecutive linear plan. To supplement and enhance these strategies, LMPD will utilize focused crime prevention details throughout the year, each utilizing evidence-based strategies supported by these three fronts. All three approaches have extensive academic research supporting their independent ability to reduce crime while improving community-police relationships. The City of Louisville will coordinate with the community to synchronize all three fronts for a robust, collaborative, and data-driven approach in continuing to make Louisville a safer place to live, work, and play.

To achieve these goals:

1. The LMPD will work collaboratively and in partnership with other City agencies.
2. The LMPD will work collaboratively and in partnership with community organizations and members.
3. The LMPD will implement a robust accountability system to ensure that constitutional policing practices are used by officers and professional staff.
4. The LMPD will not engage in unnecessary enforcement that may inadvertently harm communities.
5. The LMPD will coordinate across stakeholders to improve neighborhood conditions that contribute to violence
6. The LMPD will continue to provide ongoing training for officers in areas such as tactical operations, de-escalation techniques, and intelligence gathering to enhance success and improve safety for all involved.
7. The LMPD will utilize data collection and analysis for academic evaluation to ensure strategies are effective and fair.
8. The LMPD will, in addition to training and supervision, ensure the units focusing on violent crime have the necessary equipment, personnel, and resources for success.

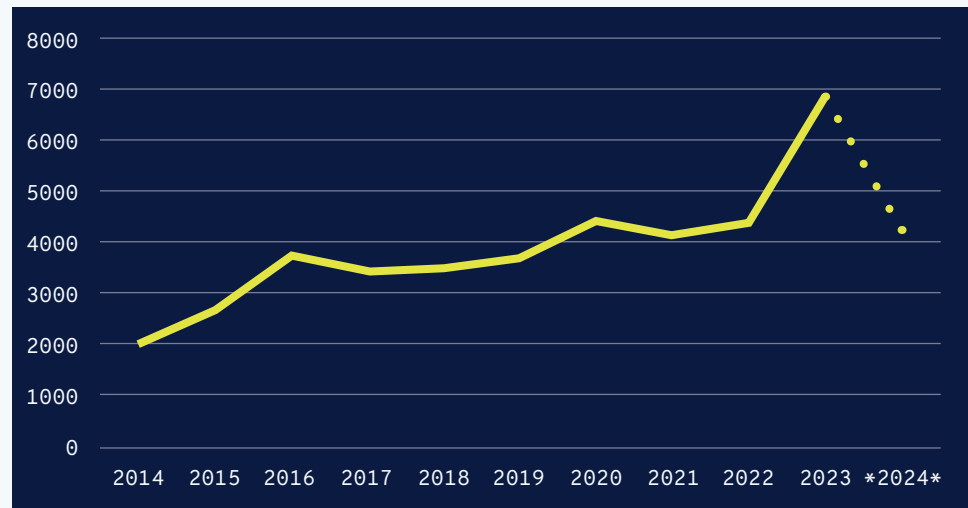

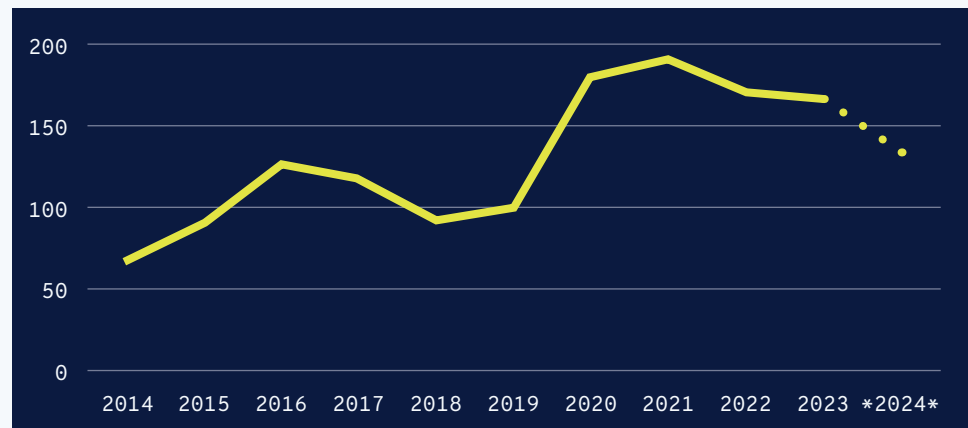

and not the full calendar year like the other years (solid line).

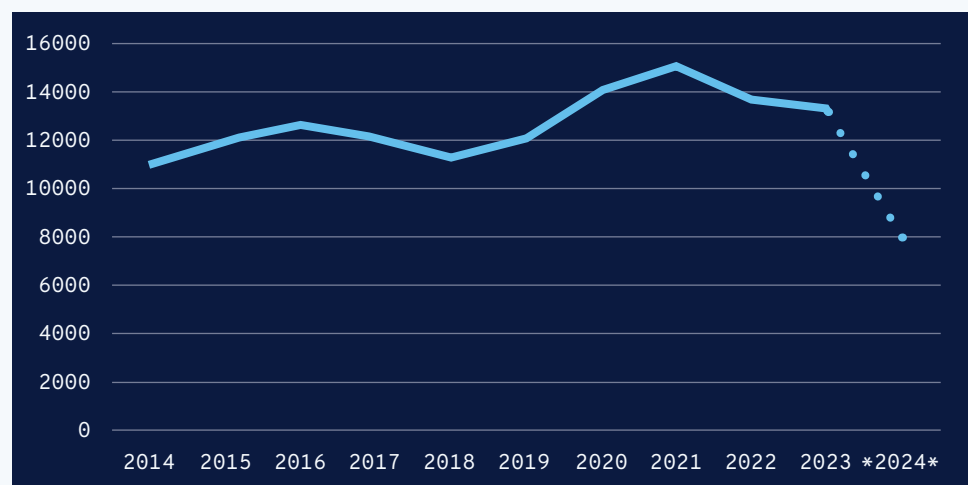

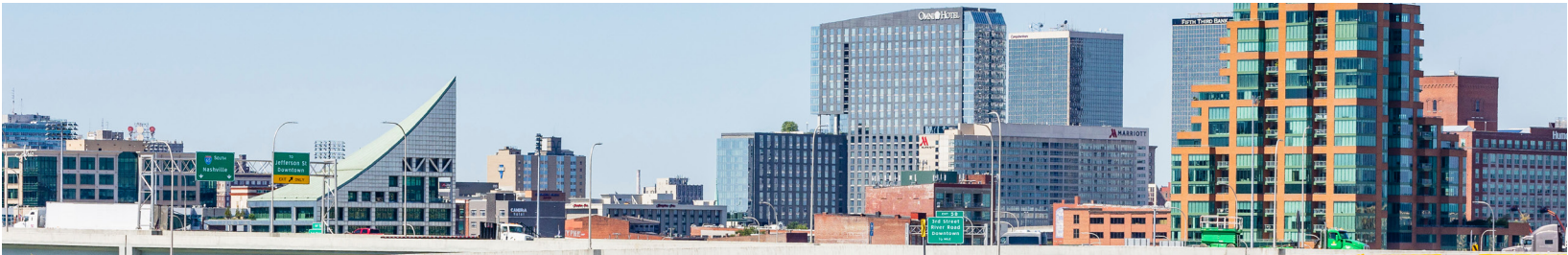
HOMICIDES

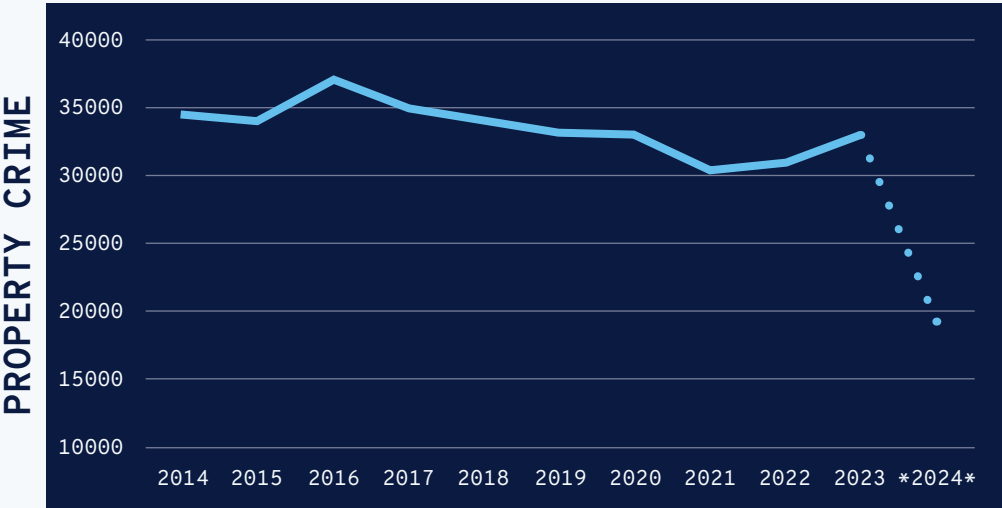

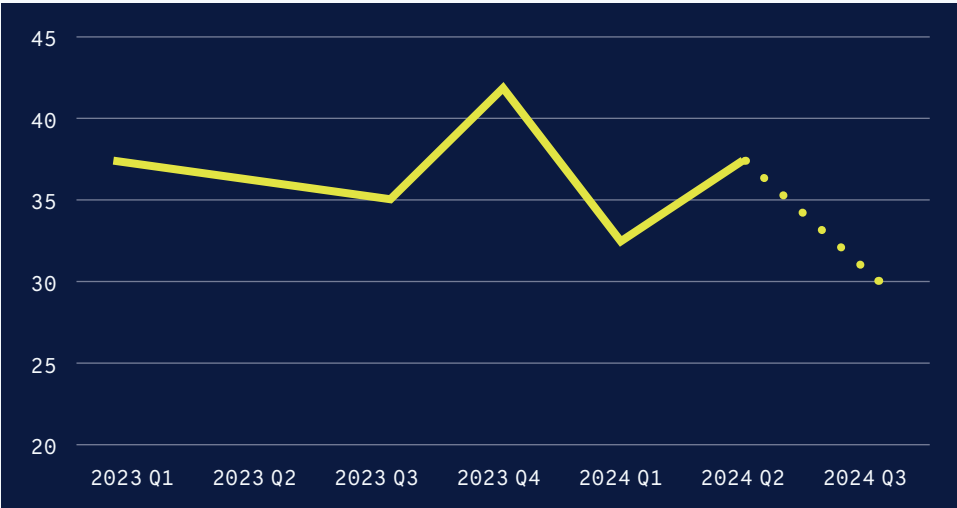

1. DATA RESPONSIVE POLICING

Data Responsive Policing is a decision-making strategy based on recent crime trends. This concept is utilized throughout all divisions and units of the LMPD when making decisions and assessing priorities. One specific example of this strategy in practice would be division commanders deploying officers for increased police visibility for deterrence in areas with high rates of crime. Another example may be detective units gathering intelligence for a coordinated investigative response regarding a pattern of burglaries in a particular geographic area.

This plan is focused and direct. The plan begins with a crime analysis to identify micro-locations (such as specific blocks or small areas) where crime is most recently prevalent. LMPD division commanders will assign officers to be visible in these areas at the times most prone to crime. Visibility can take place in the form of citizen contacts, walking patrols, or strategically parking patrol vehicles with red/blue lights on for a short period of time. Investigative units will focus on the identification, surveillance, and deterrence of repeat offenders in these areas most prone to crime. LMPD Command Staff will review violent crime data daily, weekly, and monthly. Crime data will be continuously analyzed to determine if locations have shifted. Resources and patrols will be directed to new locations when or if they evolve. Division Commanders will be responsible for developing strategies beyond deployment to address crime within their respective divisions. These strategies may include community engagement opportunities or other collaborative work with the community. Their strategies and deployment of resources will be reported on and documented through weekly CompStat meetings and will be reviewed for effectiveness.

This plan incorporates a focus on problem solving and analyzes crime and intelligence to develop a thoughtful and effective approach. It relies on evidence-based decisions, using accurate, real-time data to guide individual division strategies and ensure resources are deployed where they are most needed.

Much of the violent crime in Louisville is perpetually concentrated in small geographic pockets and often committed and fueled by a small group of individuals. This plan focuses collaborative resources on apprehension of the most violent people in the community, seizures of illegally possessed firearms, successful prosecutions, and reduced recidivism. Reducing repeat violent offenders in our city leads to a more safe and healthy community.

The City of Louisville will focus on the most violent individuals through the following programs:

1. Prohibited Firearm Possessor Project
2. Violent Offender Warrant Service
3. Group Violence Intervention

Prohibited Firearm Possessor Project

The Prohibited Firearms Possessor Project (PFP) is a data-driven initiative focused on addressing criminal cases involving firearms.

The end goal of the PFP Project is to reduce violent crime through a multi-tiered approach that swiftly addresses those participating in illegal, violent activities. Emphasis is placed on seizing illegal firearms and prosecuting illegal possessors who further the cycle of violence in our community. By delivering a well organized and thorough investigation, the prosecutors on the team are more successful in ensuring prohibited firearms possessors receive the maximum possible penalty under the law. This approach is not a one-size-fits-all solution. Cases processed through the PFP Project are intentionally selected and receive careful consideration and prioritization.

The project team consists of members from the LMPD (Criminal Interdiction Division), ATF (Louisville Office), U.S. Attorney's Office (Western District of KY), the Commonwealth Attorney's Office (30th Circuit), the KY Attorney General's Office, and the Jefferson County Attorney's Office. This collaborative project strengthens firearms-related cases by providing enhanced support and resources to patrol officers and detectives.

Violent Offender Warrant Service

The Violent Offender Warrant Service (VOWS) prioritizes identifying and pursuing individuals actively wanted for the most violent crimes, ensuring justice for victims and continued safety within our community. Creating a crime strategy to focus on wanted violent offenders involves a multi-faceted approach that includes law enforcement, community engagement, technology, and inter-agency cooperation. LMPD will work closely with prosecutors to ensure cases against apprehended violent offenders are robust and prioritized in court.

The service of any high-risk arrest warrant will be coordinated and conducted by LMPD members with proper training, supervision, and accountability. Subsequent after-action reports will be reviewed for department-wide performance improvement.

Group Violence Intervention (GVI)

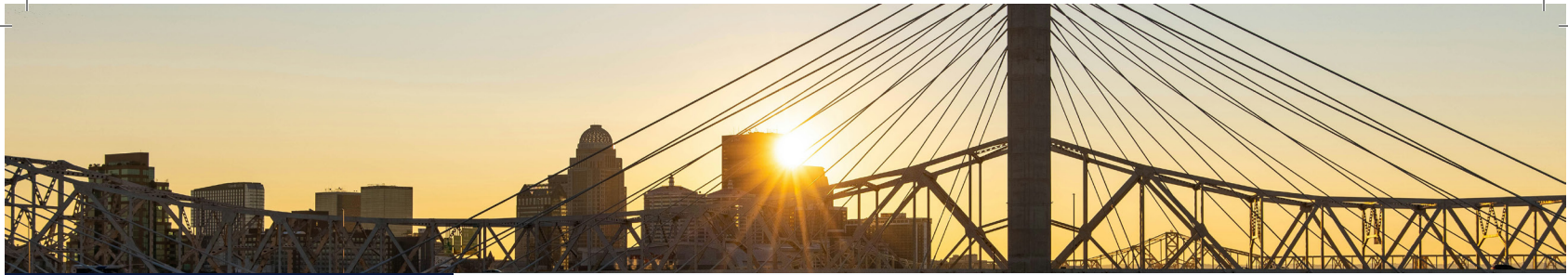
Group Violence Intervention (GVI) is an evidence-based focused deterrence strategy to reduce violent crime. Effective implementation of GVI strategies has been shown to significantly reduce gun violence in many cities, including Baltimore, Boston, Cincinnati, New Orleans, and Indianapolis (Braga et al., 2018). GVI reduces violent crime, specifically homicides and shootings, by minimizing harm to communities through deterrence before enforcement, and offering support and resources to those most at risk of offending. Potential offenders are often linked to groups known for perpetuating and influencing violence in neighborhoods. Offenders and groups are “officially notified” by law enforcement, prosecutors, clergy, and community members that they are aware of their actions and involvement in violence. The message delivered is that services are available, the violence must stop, or heavy consequences will be imposed on them and their group. These notifications can take place in the form of individual “custom notifications” or group “call-ins” where a large group of at-risk individuals are invited to a meeting to receive this message and resources in-person.

In the City of Louisville, GVI is managed by a Project Manager in the Office of the Mayor. LMPD has a GVI liaison team that participates in meetings, conducts notifications, and coordinates enforcement. Other state and federal partners and community stakeholders are involved in the GVI Governance Board and process. LMPD’s role in GVI is to coordinate and conduct notifications and to follow up with heavily focused enforcement should the violence continue post notification. Thus, the success of GVI is further dependent on communication with district and circuit court judges. LMPD and the City of Louisville will work to establish ongoing communication and strategies for the success of GVI with our local court system.

The overall principles and objectives of GVI include (National Network for Safe Communities, 2015):

- First, do no harm
- Strengthen communities’ capacity to prevent violence
- Enhance legitimacy
- Offer help to those who want it
- Use enforcement strategically

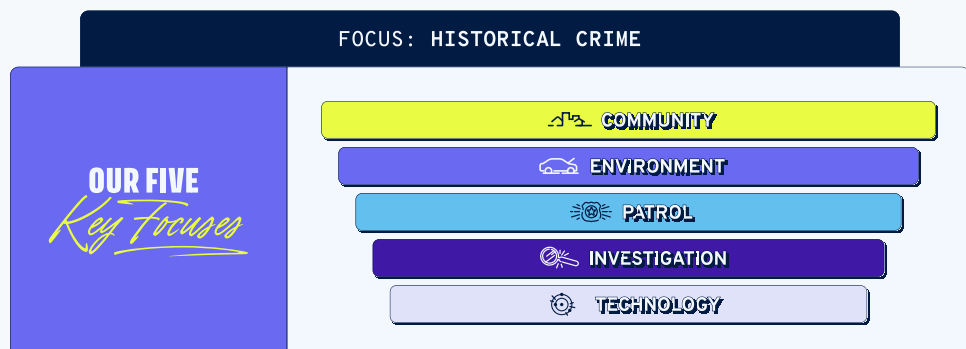

The third front of the LMPD crime reduction plan is Sustained Focused Improvement. Sustained Focused Improvement (SFI) focuses on addressing: (1) the internal operational needs of the LMPD, and (2) the needs across Louisville communities, to sustain crime reductions and create the conditions necessary to support healthy and vibrant communities. For example, the SFI concentrates on repairing urban blight, updating technology, devoting investigative resources, improving relationships among neighbors, and community-police engagement. Internal operational needs will include staffing, resources, training, and technology to complete this work. Utilizing evidence-based methodologies, LMPD has identified areas in Louisville with the greatest opportunity and need for improvement based on crime trends over the past 9-12 months. For the first year of this strategy, the five identified census tract areas will remain constant. Consistency and time are key to sustaining improvement. This approach is a long-term plan and will take time and multiple resources to see lasting results.

This strategy differs from Data Responsive Policing in that DRP locations are identified through very recent crime data and may or may not overlay with SFI locations. Additionally, DRP locations may change week to week. The SFI strategy analyzes crime over a longer period of time to identify specific areas needing robust and comprehensive improvements. These improvements include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Increased police visibility for safety and security
- Devoted investigative resources for crimes in these areas
- Neighborhood Block Watches
- Resident survey of needs and ideas
- Police-community engagement
- Technology improvements; cameras, lighting, license plate readers
- Graffiti removal
- Improving green spaces
- Vacant lot clean-up
- Trash removal
- Abandoned vehicle removal

To address the concerns of chronic crime in our community, this strategy includes 5 Key Focuses: Community, Environment, Patrol, Investigations, and Technology.

The 5-focuses include:

1. Community

- Direct community engagement
- Violence deterrence messaging given to individuals at high risk for violent crime
- Neighborhood Block Watch assessment/coordination
- Increased town halls / community meetings in areas
- Faith leadership outreach
- Residential needs and risk assessments
- Food/Utility needs assessment
- Trauma/Grief counseling (Victim service support)
- Assess additional service needs

- Vacant home assessment
- Abandoned vehicle assessment
- Trash/Debris assessment
- Overgrown yards
- Broken streetlights
- Billboards and Signage

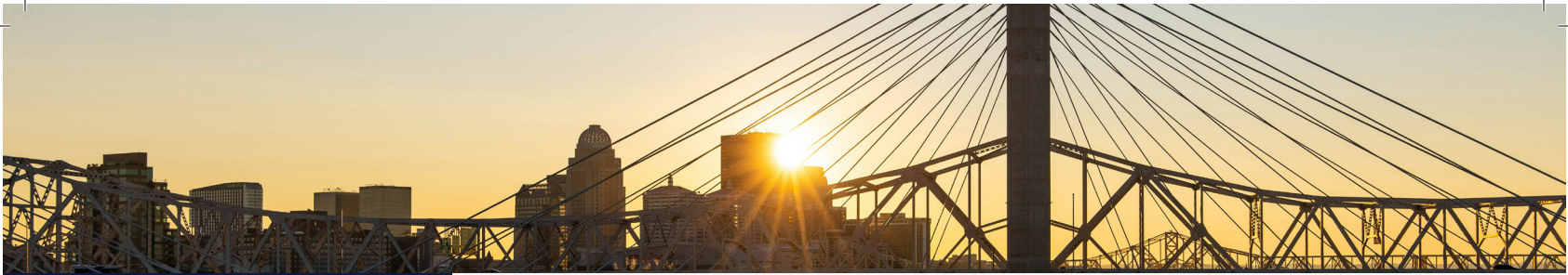

A SFI Work Group will be established to include members of LMPD, the Mayor’s Office, Office of Safe and Healthy Neighborhoods (OSHN), Codes and Regulations, Metro Parks, Public Works, Metro Alcohol and Beverage Control, and other Metro agencies. The work group will communicate with Jefferson County Attorney’s Office, Commonwealth Attorney’s Office, and other community partners who can effect change and coordinate improvements in a collaborative manner. The SFI Work Group will meet at least quarterly to discuss goals and assess achievements. Crime data will be analyzed to measure the effectiveness of this strategy.

By focusing on metrics of future crime trends, we can measure effectiveness and continually refine our strategies and community needs to achieve measurable, impactful results.

Individual Operation Plans and After-Action Reports will be produced prior to and post deployment, respectively.

Internal Communications

Continued messaging of the department's mission, vision, and values is key to ensuring each member of LMPD understands their role in keeping our community safe, protecting constitutional rights, and holding each other accountable. Through repetition and constant reinforcement, members of LMPD will thoroughly grasp the department's crime strategies, the differences in each, and how they are deployed and measured. Leadership will identify formal and informal leaders within LMPD to champion and convey the overall strategies. In addition to roll call training and continued internal messaging, formal training and discussions on the department's crime strategy will be incorporated into the 2025 annual in-service curriculum for sworn and professional staff. LMPD will utilize the Peregrine platform to empower internal decision-making through crime data and analytics.

External Communications

LMPD will regularly use local media outlets to deliver overall crime plans and updates through media releases, press conferences, and individual interviews. In addition to external media, LMPD will leverage communication with the community through social media outlets: Facebook, Instagram, and X. LMPD will continue to engage and collaborate with key stakeholders within the community to share and support LMPD's mission. By fostering strong relationships with clergy, business leaders, and community advocates, citizens will be more connected and comfortable sharing information regarding violent crime and offenders. LMPD partners and collaborates with Zencity for continuous assessment of community sentiment through community surveys and input for more informed, transparent, and effective decisions.

Evaluation and Review

Recognizing the importance of constant improvement is crucial in understanding proper evaluation of crime strategies. Crime is sometimes a moving target and requires constant, focused attention to improve overtime. This is not a linear plan. This is a plan with multiple facets that must work concurrently for success. LMPD will evaluate and review methods and strategies through weekly CompStat meetings and quarterly in-depth analysis of deployment efforts over time. During CompStat meetings, division commanders will be accountable for articulating and planning resource deployment to reduce crime in their respective divisions and areas of responsibility. Quarterly reports and an annual review will be released publicly updating progress under this plan. LMPD will promote feedback internally and externally, utilizing internal communication methods and online community surveys and feedback portals. Additionally, with partnership and consultation from an academic institution, LMPD will receive evidence-based advice and feedback regarding performance and opportunities for improvement.

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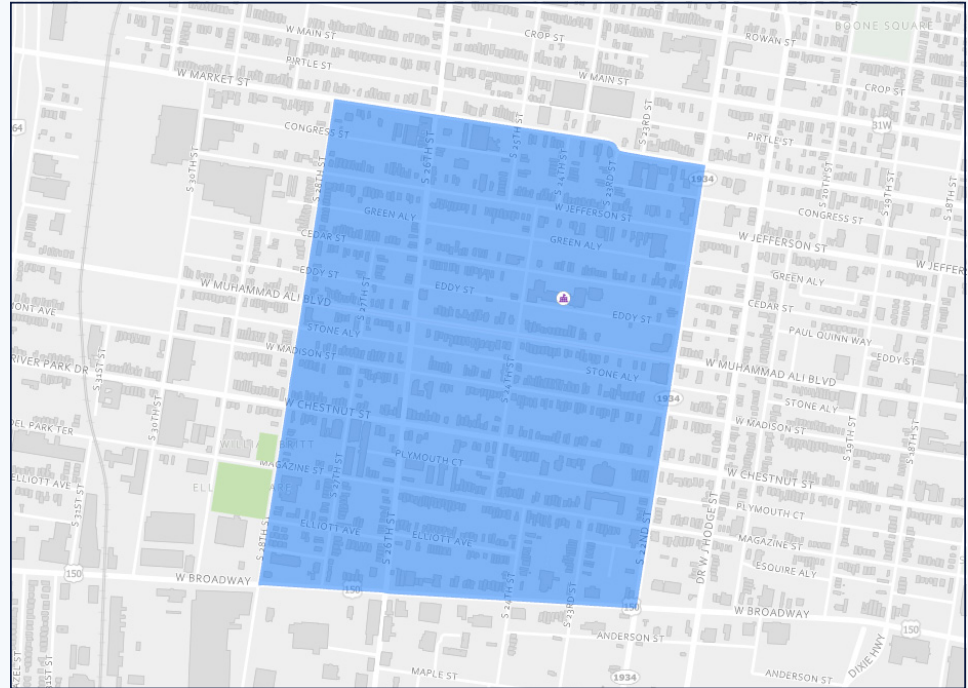

Sustained Focus Improvement Area 1: W Broadway to Market, S 22nd to S 28th



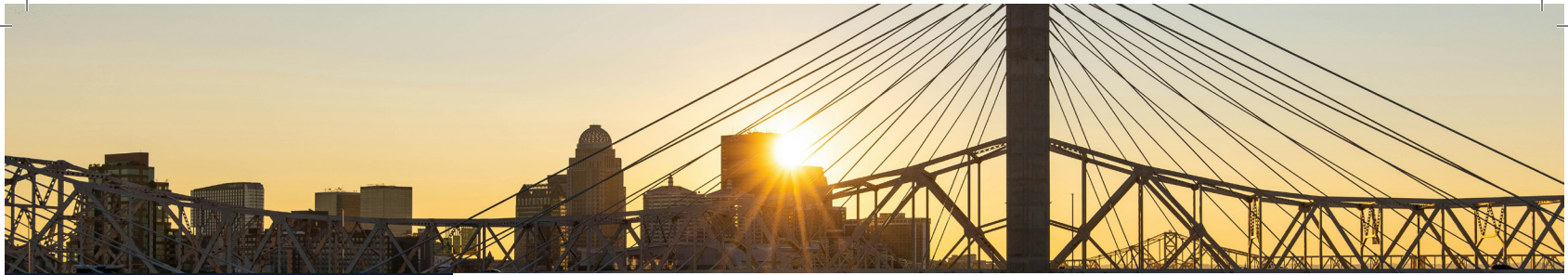

This predominantly residential area includes a portion of the Russell Neighborhood, and it reflects the city's rich history and diversity. While the area is mostly residential, there is also a business corridor on Broadway which includes various establishments such as banks, restaurants, and night life opportunities. Deemed the Russell Neighborhood after prominent African American educator Harvey C. Russell Sr, it is also the home of Club Cedar located at 26th /Cedar St. A landmark in the neighborhood for more than 40 years. Located in this area is also Byck Elementary and several churches to include Church of the Living God, Mt. Lebanon Baptist Church, Moore Temple Church of God in Christ, Zion Baptist Church, and The Historic York Street Missionary Baptist Church. Bordering the area is Elliott Park, located on 28th between Elliott Ave. and Magazine St.



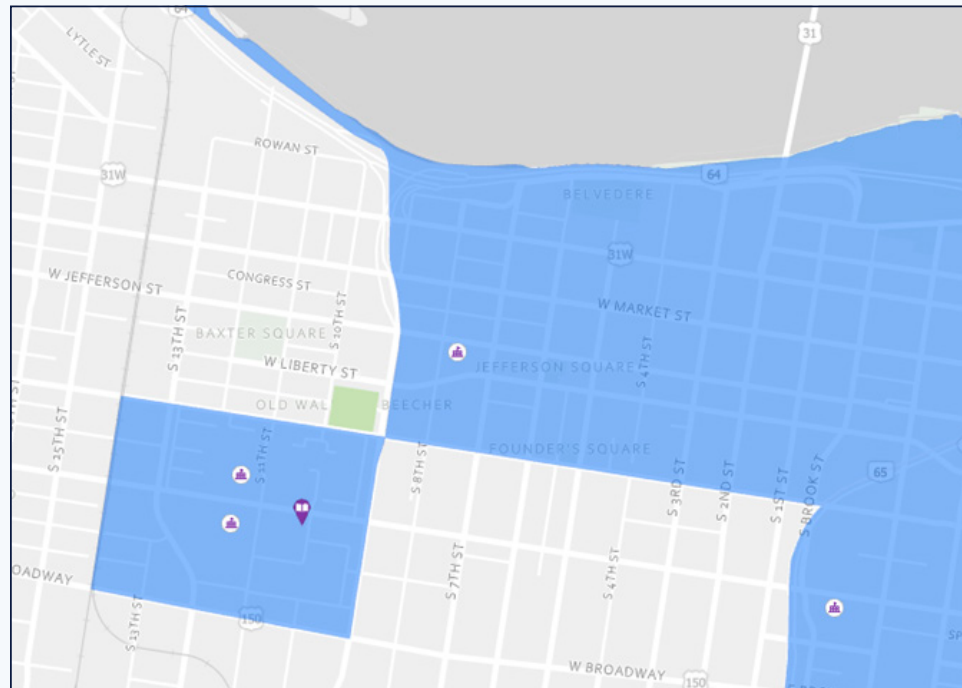

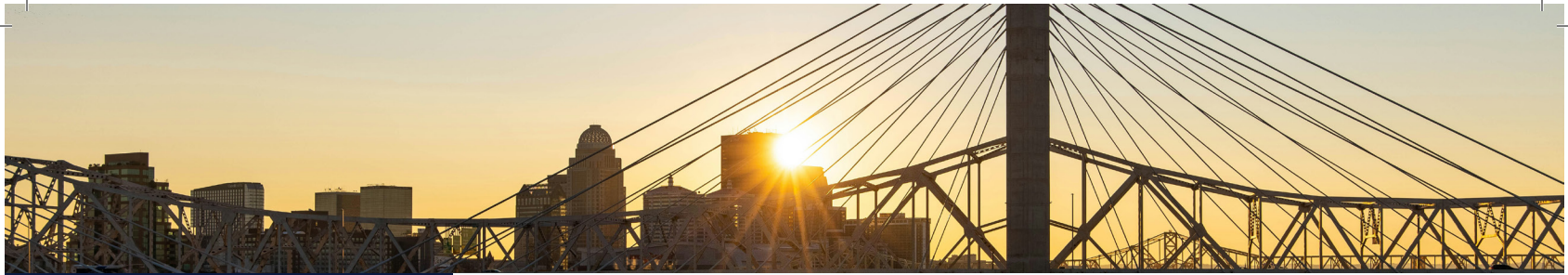
This area is the largest of the SFI areas and includes a section of the Russell Neighborhood, the city's Central Business District, and a portion of the downtown medical district.

The Central Business District in Downtown Louisville is a hub of commerce, culture, and tourism, where businesses, hotels, restaurants, and entertainment venues intersect, making it one of the most dynamic areas in the city. The central business district is broken up into three main districts: Whiskey Row, Museum Row, and South Fourth Street. A visible and proactive police presence is crucial to maintaining the safety and vibrancy of this district. By deterring crime and addressing issues such as theft, vandalism, and public disturbances, officers help create an atmosphere where residents, visitors, and employees feel secure. This sense of safety encourages foot traffic, allowing local businesses to thrive, whether it is a fan attending a game or concert at the KFC Yum! Center, professionals attending a conference, tourists exploring Fourth Street Live, or those looking for cultural entertainment at the Kentucky Center for the Performing Arts, a sense of safety is important to everyone. Furthermore, police officers play a key role in facilitating large events, managing traffic flow, and ensuring smooth operations, which supports the district's economic health. The ongoing partnership between law enforcement and the local business community helps build trust and encourages investment, making the district a safe and vibrant destination for all.

Additionally, police presence, heightened awareness, and safe environmental designs around hospitals and medical districts are vital to ensuring the safety and security of patients, healthcare workers, and visitors. Hospitals operate 24/7, making them vulnerable to various challenges such as theft, disturbances, or emergencies. Many victims of violent crime receive emergency treatment and support services at downtown hospitals. A strong police presence helps deter crime, manage traffic, and respond quickly to incidents, allowing hospitals to focus on patient care without disruption.

Other notable locations in the area include the Western Free Public Library, Jefferson Square Park, and Old Walnut Street Park. Schools in the area include Central High School, Coleridge-Taylor Montessori, and Ackerly/Bingham Guidance Center Special Education.



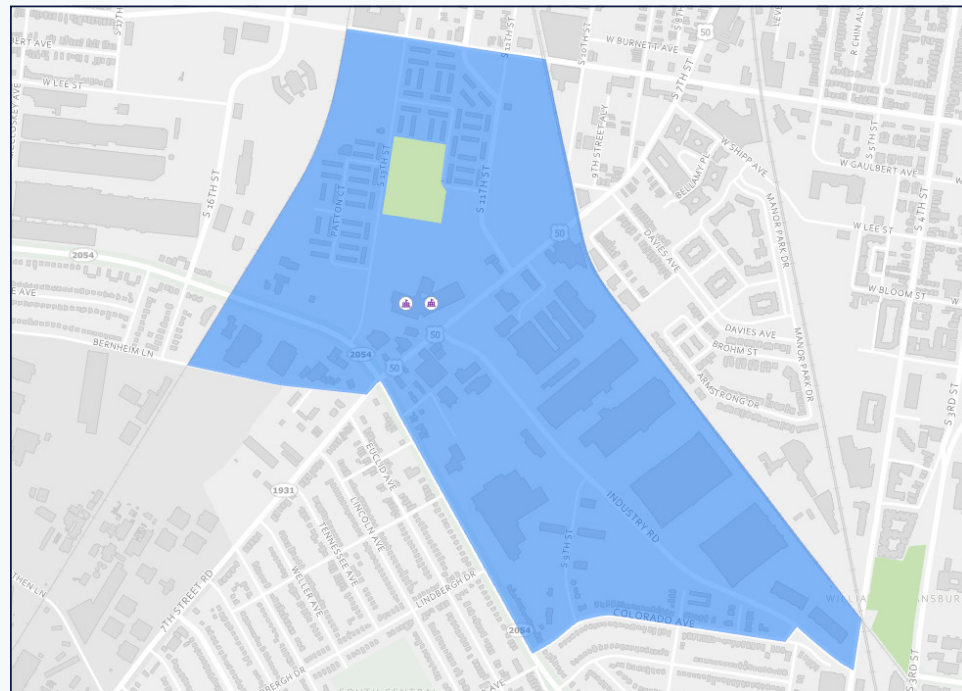

Sustained Focus Improvement Area 3: *Park Hill*



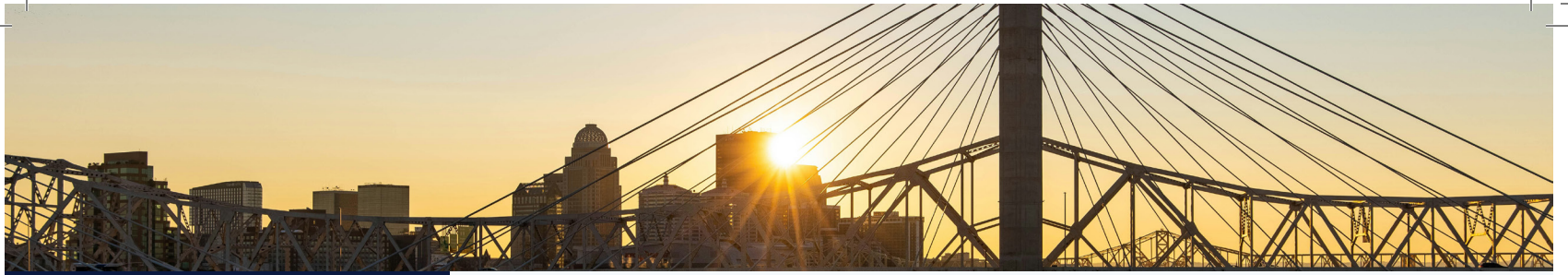

This area has boundaries of Hill Street, railroad tracks on either side, and its southern border is primarily Algonquin Parkway. While primarily residential, Park Hill also offers many commercial businesses on Industry Rd. 7th Street serves as a major artery in this area which allows easy access to downtown and the southern parts of Jefferson County. Park Hill has a rich tradition of being a tight-knit community and is known for its active community organizations and events. Notable churches here include First Gethsemane Baptist Church and Kingdom Land Baptist Church. Schools in the area include McFerran Preparatory Academy and Western Day Treatment Center. Popular parks include Park Hill Park and William B. Stansbury Park which borders the area near 4th St and Industry Rd.

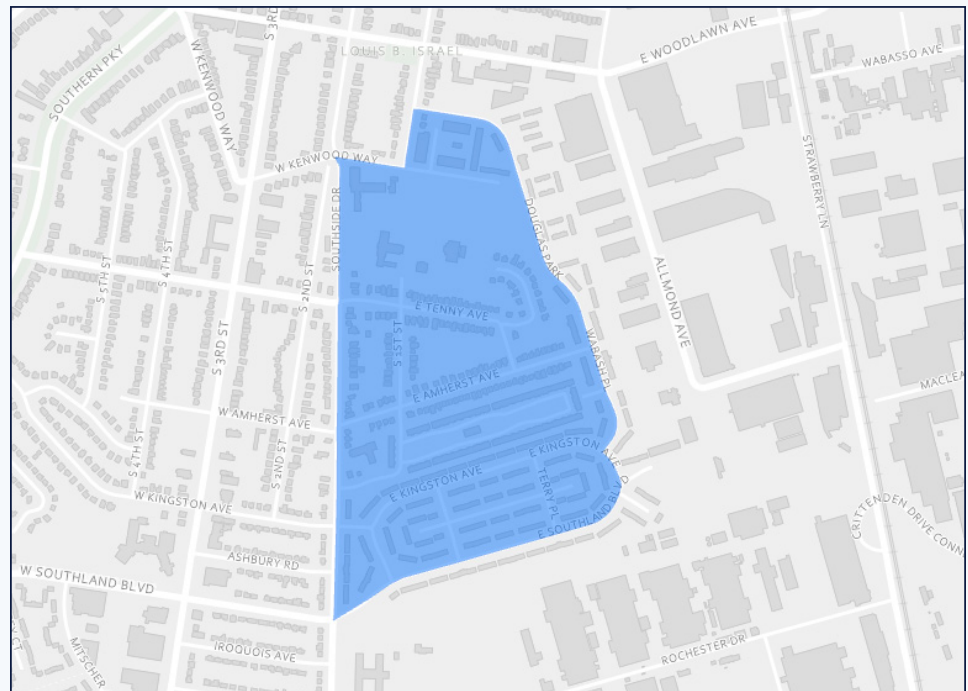

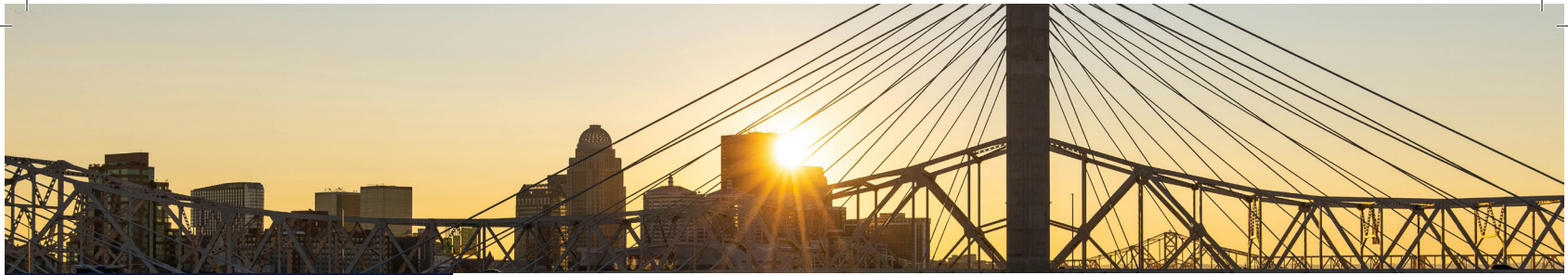

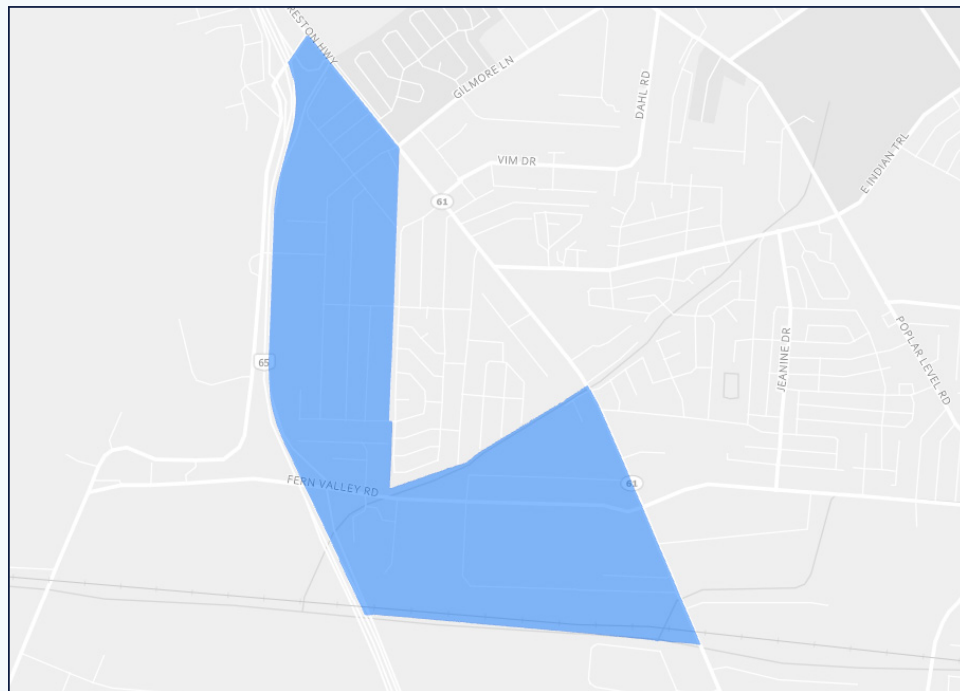
