1 AN ACT relating to education.

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Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

- 3 → Section 1. KRS 161.028 is amended to read as follows:
- 4 (1) The Education Professional Standards Board is recognized to be a public body 5 corporate and politic and an agency and instrumentality of the Commonwealth, in 6 the performance of essential governmental functions. The Education Professional
- 7 Standards Board has the authority and responsibility to:
- 8 (a) Establish standards and requirements for obtaining and maintaining a teaching 9 certificate;
 - (b) Set standards for, approve, and evaluate college, university, and school district programs for the preparation of teachers and other professional school personnel. College or university programs may be approved by the board for a college or university with regional institutional level accreditation or national institutional level accreditation that is recognized by the United States Department of Education and is eligible to receive federal funding under 20 U.S.C. secs. 1061 to 1063. Program standards shall reflect national standards and shall address, at a minimum, the following:
 - The alignment of programs with the state's core content for assessment as defined in KRS 158.6457;
 - 2. Research-based classroom practices, including effective classroom management techniques;
 - 3. Emphasis on subject matter competency of teacher education students;
 - 4. Methodologies to meet diverse educational needs of all students;
 - 5. The consistency and quality of classroom and field experiences, including early practicums and student teaching experiences;
 - 6. The amount of college-wide or university-wide involvement and support during the preparation as well as the induction of new teachers;

1		7. The diversity of faculty;
2		8. The effectiveness of partnerships with local school districts; and
3		9. The performance of graduates on various measures as determined by the
4		board;
5	(c)	Conduct an annual review of diversity in teacher preparation programs;
6	(d)	Provide assistance to universities and colleges in addressing diversity, which
7		may include researching successful strategies and disseminating the
8		information, encouraging the development of nontraditional avenues of
9		recruitment and providing incentives, waiving administrative regulations
10		when needed, and other assistance as deemed necessary;
11	(e)	Discontinue approval of programs that do not meet standards or whose
12		graduates do not perform according to criteria set by the board;
13	(f)	Issue, renew, revoke, suspend, or refuse to issue or renew; impose
14		probationary or supervisory conditions upon; issue a written reprimand or
15		admonishment; or any combination of actions regarding any certificate;
16	(g)	Develop specific guidelines to follow upon receipt of an allegation of sexual
17		misconduct by an employee certified by the Education Professional Standards
18		Board. The guidelines shall include investigation, inquiry, and hearing
19		procedures which ensure the process does not revictimize the alleged victim
20		or cause harm if an employee is falsely accused;
21	(h)	Receive, along with investigators hired by the Education Professional
22		Standards Board, training on the dynamics of sexual misconduct of
23		professionals, including the nature of this abuse of authority, characteristics of
24		the offender, the impact on the victim, the possibility and the impact of false
25		accusations, investigative procedures in sex offense cases, and effective
26		intervention with victims and offenders;
27	(i)	Recommend to the Kentucky Board of Education the essential data elements

relating to teacher preparation and certification, teacher supply and demand, teacher attrition, teacher diversity, and employment trends to be included in a state comprehensive data and information system and periodically report data to the *appropriate* Interim Joint Committee on Education;

- (j) Submit reports to the Governor and the Legislative Research Commission and inform the public on the status of teaching in Kentucky;
- (k) Devise a credentialing system that provides alternative routes to gaining certification and greater flexibility in staffing local schools while maintaining standards for teacher competence;
- (l) Develop a professional code of ethics;

- (m) Charge reasonable fees for the issuance, reissuance, and renewal of certificates that are established by administrative regulation. The proceeds shall be used to meet a portion of the costs of the issuance, reissuance, and renewal of certificates, and the costs associated with disciplinary action against a certificate holder under KRS 161.120;
- (n) Waive a requirement that may be established in an administrative regulation promulgated by the board. A request for a waiver shall be submitted to the board, in writing, by an applicant for certification, a postsecondary institution, or a superintendent of a local school district, with appropriate justification for the waiver. The board may approve the request if the person or institution seeking the waiver has demonstrated extraordinary circumstances justifying the waiver. Any waiver granted under this subsection shall be subject to revocation if the person or institution falsifies information or subsequently fails to meet the intent of the waiver;
- (o) Promote the development of one (1) or more innovative, nontraditional or alternative administrator or teacher preparation programs through public or private colleges or universities, private contractors, the Department of

Education, or the Kentucky Commonwealth Virtual University and waive administrative regulations if needed in order to implement the program;

- (p) Grant approval, if appropriate, of a university's request for an alternative program that enrolls an administrator candidate in a postbaccalaureate administrator preparation program concurrently with employment as an assistant principal, principal, assistant superintendent, or superintendent in a local school district. An administrator candidate in the alternative program shall be granted a temporary provisional certificate and shall be a candidate in the Kentucky Principal Internship Program, notwithstanding provisions of KRS 161.030, or the Superintendent's Assessment process, notwithstanding provisions of KRS 156.111, as appropriate. The temporary certificate shall be valid for a maximum of two (2) years, and shall be contingent upon the candidate's continued enrollment in the preparation program and compliance with all requirements established by the board. A professional certificate shall be issued upon the candidate's successful completion of the program, internship requirements, and assessments as required by the board;
- 17 (q) Employ consultants as needed;

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- (r) Enter into contracts. Disbursements to professional educators who receive less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in compensation per fiscal year from the board for serving on an assessment validation panel or as a test scorer or proctor shall not be subject to KRS 45A.690 to 45A.725;
- 22 (s) Sponsor studies, conduct research, conduct conferences, and publish 23 information as appropriate; and
- 24 (t) Issue orders as necessary in any administrative action before the board.
- 25 (2) (a) The board shall be composed of seventeen (17) members. The secretary of the
 26 Education and Labor Cabinet and the president of the Council on
 27 Postsecondary Education, or their designees, shall serve as ex officio voting

1		members. The Governor shall make the following fifteen (15) appointments:
2		1. Nine (9) members who shall be teachers representative of elementary,
3		middle or junior high, secondary, special education, and secondary
4		vocational classrooms;
5		2. Two (2) members who shall be school administrators, one (1) of whom
6		shall be a school principal;
7		3. One (1) member representative of local boards of education; and
8		4. Three (3) members representative of postsecondary institutions, two (2)
9		of whom shall be deans of colleges of education at public universities
10		and one (1) of whom shall be the chief academic officer or head of an
11		educator preparation program of an independent not-for-profit college
12		or university.
13	(b)	The members appointed by the Governor shall be confirmed by the Senate
14		under KRS 11.160. If the General Assembly is not in session at the time of the
15		appointment, persons appointed shall serve prior to confirmation, but the
16		Governor shall seek the consent of the Senate at the next regular session or at
17		an intervening extraordinary session if the matter is included in the call of the
18		General Assembly.
19	(c)	Each appointed member shall serve a three (3) year term. A vacancy on the
20		board shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment within
21		sixty (60) days after it occurs. A member shall continue to serve until his or
22		her successor is named. Any member who, through change of employment
23		status or residence, or for other reasons, no longer meets the criteria for the
24		position to which he or she was appointed shall no longer be eligible to serve
25		in that position.
26	(d)	Members of the board shall serve without compensation but shall be permitted

to attend board meetings and perform other board business without loss of

1			income or other benefits.
2		(e)	A state agency or any political subdivision of the state, including a school
3			district, required to hire a substitute for a member of the board who is absent
4			from the member's place of employment while performing board business
5			shall be reimbursed by the board for the actual amount of any costs incurred.
6		(f)	A chairman shall be elected by and from the membership. A member shall be
7			eligible to serve no more than three (3) one (1) year terms in succession as
8			chairman. Regular meetings shall be held at least semiannually on call of the
9			chairman.
10		(g)	The commissioner of education shall serve as executive secretary to the board
11			and may designate staff to facilitate his or her duties.
12		(h)	To carry out the functions relating to its duties and responsibilities, the board
13			is empowered to receive donations and grants of funds; to appoint consultants
14			as needed; and to sponsor studies, conduct conferences, and publish
15			information.
16		→ Se	ection 2. KRS 164.295 is amended to read as follows:
17	(1)	The	six (6) state comprehensive universities:
18		(a)	Shall provide, upon approval of the Council on Postsecondary Education,
19			associate and baccalaureate programs of instruction;
20		(b)	Shall provide, upon approval of the Council on Postsecondary Education,

- (b) Shall provide, upon approval of the Council on Postsecondary Education, graduate programs of instruction at the master's degree level in education, business, and the arts and sciences, specialist degrees, and programs beyond the master's-degree level to meet the requirements for teachers, school leaders, and other certified personnel; and
- 25 (c) Shall provide research and service programs directly related to the needs of their primary geographical areas.
- 27 (2) A comprehensive university may provide, upon approval of the Council on

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1		Post	tsecondary Education:
2		(a)	Programs of a community college nature in their own community comparable
3			to those listed for the Kentucky Community and Technical College System, as
4			provided in KRS 164.580; and
5		(b)	[Upon approval of the Council on Postsecondary Education, an advanced
6			practice doctoral program in nursing in compliance with KRS 314.111 and
7			314.131; and
8		(c)	Upon approval of the Council on Postsecondary Education, one (1) or more
9			additional Advanced practice]Doctoral programs, including but not limited
10			to Doctor of Philosophy degree programs, advanced practice doctoral
11			degree programs, and doctoral degree programs for professional practice
12			and licensure.
13	(3)	<u>In a</u>	order to be eligible to submit a proposal for a new doctoral program to the
14		<u>Cou</u>	ncil on Postsecondary Education, a comprehensive university shall maintain:
15		<u>(a)</u>	A first to second year retention rate in at least two (2) of the last three (3)
16			<u>years:</u>
17			1. In the seventy-fifth percentile of all comprehensive universities
18			nationally; or
19			2. In the eightieth percentile of all comprehensive universities within
20			states that are members of the Southern Regional Education Board;
21		<u>(b)</u>	A six (6) year graduate rate for bachelor's degrees in at least two (2) of the
22			last three (3) years:
23			1. In the seventy-fifth percentile of all comprehensive universities
24			nationally; or
25			2. In the eightieth percentile of all comprehensive universities within
26			states that are members of the Southern Regional Education Board;

1	<u>(</u>	(c)	Sufficient unrestricted cash reserves and short-term investments to cover
2			the institution's total operating and nonoperating expenses for three (3)
3			months as calculated from the prior fiscal year's audited financial
4			statement[The Council on Postsecondary Education, in consultation with the
5			Advisory Conference of Presidents pursuant to KRS 164.021, shall develop
6			criteria and conditions upon which an advanced practice doctoral degree
7			program may be approved. The criteria shall include but not be limited to a
8			determination of the academic and workforce needs for a program,
9			consideration of whether the program can be effectively delivered through a
10			collaborative effort with an existing program at another public university
11			within the Commonwealth, and the capacity of a university to effectively offer
12			the program. A university requesting approval of an advanced practice
13			doctoral program shall be required to provide assurance that funding for the
14			program will not impair funding of any existing program at any other public
15			university].
16	(4)	(a)	If a comprehensive university is seeking to offer a new doctoral program
17			which may require additional general fund appropriations for capital or
18			operating expenses beyond the university's regular appropriations, the
19			university shall submit a proposal to the Council on Postsecondary
20			Education for review and evaluation. The council's review shall include but
21			not be limited to:
22			1. The proposed program's alignment with the mission and goals of the
23			comprehensive university;
24			2. The statewide or regional need the proposed program seeks to fill and
25			how the comprehensive university, through the offering of this
26			program, would fill this need;
27			3. Student demand for the proposed program;

1		4. Employer demand for the proposed program, including any potential
2		industry partners;
3		5. Utilization of current institutional resources to deliver the proposed
4		program and how the program would complement existing program
5		offerings and not shift resources away from those existing programs;
6		6. A five (5) year budgetary analysis of the proposed program, including
7		program costs, funding sources projected to support the program, and
8		the amount of general fund appropriations needed for capital or
9		operating expenses;
10		7. The proposed program curriculum;
11		8. Any specialized accreditation or licensure requirements for the
12		proposed program and analysis of how those would be met;
13		9. Admission and graduation requirements for the proposed program;
14		<u>and</u>
15		10. Administrative oversight to ensure the quality of the proposed
16		<u>program</u> [The council shall promulgate administrative regulations setting
17		forth the agreed on criteria and conditions identified under subsection
18		(3) of this section].
19	<u>(b)</u>	Any specialized resources needed by the council to evaluate a
20		comprehensive university's proposal for a new doctoral program submitted
21		in accordance with paragraph (a) of this subsection shall be funded by the
22		comprehensive university.
23	<u>(c)</u>	A proposal submitted in accordance with paragraph (a) of this subsection
24		shall be submitted no later than January 1 of an odd-numbered year for
25		consideration in the council's budget request for the next biennial budget in
26		accordance with KRS 164.020(10) and 164.7915.
27	(5) The	Council on Postsecondary Education shall review each proposal submitted in

1	accordance with subsection (4)(a) of this section and shall make a
2	recommendation to the General Assembly on the viability of the proposed
3	program. The recommendation:
4	(a) Shall identify whether a general fund appropriation should be made to fund
5	capital or operations for the proposed program amount. If the council
6	recommends a general fund appropriation, the recommendation shall
7	include a proposed amount for the general fund appropriation; and
8	(b) May provide recommendations regarding alternative options to meet any
9	statewide or regional needs identified by the comprehensive university in its
10	<u>proposal</u> [The council shall review advanced practice doctorates consistent
11	with its review schedule for all other academic programs].
12	(6) If the General Assembly appropriates funds for a doctoral program proposed in
13	accordance with subsection (4)(a) of this section:
14	(a) The comprehensive university shall submit the program approval request to
15	the council for regular review and approval. The Council on Postsecondary
16	Education may:
17	1. Provide conditional approval of the program to permit the institution
18	to begin the process of programmatic accreditation as required for
19	professional practice; and
20	2. Condition final approval upon obtaining full programmatic
21	accreditation, as applicable; and
22	(b) The Council on Postsecondary Education shall review the doctoral program
23	at least once every five (5) years to ensure continued efficacy, productivity,
24	and quality and in conjunction with KRS 164.020(16).
25	(7) A comprehensive university seeking to offer a new doctoral degree program that
26	certifies that the new doctoral degree program will not require additional general
27	fund appropriations for capital or operating expenses beyond the regular

1	appropriations shall submit a proposal to the Council on Postsecondary
2	Education for review and approval through a process developed by the council in
3	accordance with KRS 164.020(15). In developing its process, the council shall
4	consider the elements set forth in subsection (4)(a) of this section, as applicable.
5	(8)[(6)] A comprehensive university shall not[:
6	(a) Offer the terminal degrees of Doctor of Philosophy or Doctor of Musical Arts;
7	doctor's degrees required for professional practice and licensure in medicine,
8	veterinary medicine, chiropractic, dentistry, pharmacy, law, or optometry; or
9	the primary degree required for professional practice and licensure in
10	architecture. The existing school of law at Northern Kentucky University is
11	exempted from the requirements of this paragraph; or
12	(b)] describe itself in official publications or in marketing materials as a research
13	university or research institution unless designated as such by a nationally
14	recognized authority for the classification of research universities. Nothing in this
15	<u>subsection</u> [paragraph] shall be construed as precluding a comprehensive university
16	from conducting basic, applied, or translational research.
17	→ Section 3. If a comprehensive university meets the eligibility requirements of
18	subsection (3) of Section 2 of this Act and seeks to submit a doctoral program for review
19	or approval which was studied as part of 2024 Ky. Acts ch. 199, and included in the
20	report submitted pursuant to 2024 Ky. Acts ch. 199, sec. 2, the comprehensive university
21	shall use the results of that study for its proposal to the Council on Postsecondary
22	Education for review and evaluation for consideration in the Council's 2026-2028
23	biennial budget recommendation notwithstanding subsection (4)(c) of Section 2 of this
24	Act. The Council may request additional information as necessary, but shall not require
25	specialized resources as described in subsection (4)(b) of Section 2 of this Act.
26	→ Section 4. Pursuant to KRS 164.020(15), the Council on Postsecondary
27	Education shall ensure that the process to approve new doctoral degree programs at the

1 University of Kentucky and University of Louisville, as authorized in KRS 164.125 and

- 2 KRS 164.815, is consistent with the process set forth in subsections (4) to (7) of Section 2
- 3 of this Act.
