

# **2025 WPA Major Awards**

## **A-Mark Prize for Investigative Journalism**

The A-Mark Foundation supports investigative reporting and, in 2023, introduced the first A-Mark Prize for Reporting on Misinformation and Disinformation.

Last year, the Wyoming Press Association Foundation partnered with the A-Mark Foundation to introduce the A-Mark Prize for Journalism and Investigating Journalism in Wyoming, awarding \$15,000 in prize money to promote public understanding and importance of a free press in our state. The objective of this award is to encourage investigative, solutions-oriented, and other forms of in-depth reporting from the free press striving to clarify complex topics that serve and educate our communities and demonstrates the highest degree of journalistic professionalism.

This year's contest winners showed outstanding initiative, effort, and creativity by delivering original reporting that revealed little-known or concealed facts and offered meaningful perspectives on important public issues.

## **Wyoming EPSCoR Science Reporting Award**

The Wyoming EPSCoR Science Reporting Award honors a reporter for consistent excellence in a body of work on scientific issues that include, but are not limited to, environment, energy, wildlife and technology.

The judging criteria includes four categories: (1) Writing quality, which includes clarity, grammar, style, organization and engagement of lead; (2) Command of content knowledge; (3) Consistent quality among all submitted stories; (4) Relevance and “so what” factor, which includes information about why this scientific issue is important.

The winner was selected by a panel of judges, including a member of Wyoming EPSCoR and a faculty member from the University of Wyoming's Department of Communication and Journalism.

## **Jim Tiemann Memorial Legal Reporting Award**

The Jim Tiemann Memorial Legal Reporting Award was created in memory of Jim Tiemann, a longtime reporter for the Rawlins Daily Times who went on to head the Wyoming State Bar Foundation before his death in 2000.

This award honors a reporter for consistent excellence in a body of work on legal issues. Judging criteria will include clarity, writing quality, accuracy and knowledge of subject matter in stories dealing with legal issues.

The winner was selected by a panel of judges, including a member of the Wyoming State Bar, a faculty member of the University of Wyoming's Department of Communication and Journalism and Jeannie Tiemann.
